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# Ephphatha Conference

Each year in midsummer all the full-time Lutheran pastors to the Deaf of our Synod meet for the Ephphatha Conference. This year 33 pastors and three vicars from all parts of the U. S. A. met at St. Paul, Minn., July 2—6.

#### **Opening Service**

Conference opened with a Communion service at Calvary Chapel for the Deaf. Pastor Thies preached on 2 Corinthians 4:1-7, speaking of the pastor's sacred privilege and duty to preach the Gospel of Christ. After the service, condolences were given to Pastor and Mrs. Bailey and Pastor Uhlig on the recent loss of loved ones. Pastor Mackensen, the conference chaplain, opened each of the seven sessions with a devotion.

#### Essays

One of the chief purposes of the conference is to give the pastors in this very specialized field of church work the opportunity to discuss their work. Stimulating and profitable discussions arise from the problems that come up in our work and from the ideas of the different pastors for the better serving of the spiritual needs of the Deaf.

Dr. Gaertner wrote and delivered a helpful essay on "How to Prepare Young Men for the Work of Deaf Missions; and What Helps Are Available for the Busy Pastor Among the Deaf."

Pastor Gyle wrote up many of his own experiences into a practical paper on "The Establishing of New Preaching Stations, Organizing Groups into Congregations, Serving Small Groups, etc."

In this connection also Pastor Rohe made a very thorough and scholarly study of the Book of Acts to learn how the Apostles went about the work of preaching and teaching the Gospel, in an effort to glean ideas that would be helpful in planning and developing our work among the Deaf.

Pastor Beyer rendered the fourth chapter of Romans into signs. This caused much lively discussion as to which is the best way to sign certain words, phrases, and ideas, to convey the meaning most clearly to the Deaf.

Pastor Kraus, with the help of four children from the Minneapolis Oral School, gave a demonstration on the instruction of oral children. Together with Pastor Gerhold, he also presented additional liturgical forms for Deaf church services. Pastor Scheibert led a study period in correct signing and shading of the signs to convey different meanings and niceties of language.

#### New Sign Manual

It was brought to our attention that the Convention of American Instructors of the Deaf and the Social Service Conference for the Deaf are working jointly to publish a new sign manual. Our men were encouraged to submit good signs either to our conference secretary, Pastor De-Laney, or to Pastor Westermann at Washington, D. C., for the consideration of the committee in charge of this project.

#### Screen Session

At the Monday evening session an assortment of movies, slides, and filmstrips relative to Deaf church work were shown, among them an especially interesting set of pictures on a new sign language developed by a Sir Richard Padgett of England.

#### **Board Highlights**

Pastor Buege, chairman of the Board, and Dr. Salvner, executive secretary, addressed the conference in behalf of the Board. Both spoke words of encouragement based on God's promises. Dr. Salvner pointed out how the statistics have again shown increases and blessings under God. For example, there are now 4.099 communicant members in our Lutheran churches for the Deaf, compared with 3,751 one year ago. Pastor Buege discussed the new budget for the year 1955, according to which Synod will be asked to designate \$185.763 for Deaf Missions. Dr. Salvner also reported that a memorial fund of several hundred dollars is available which probably can be used to publish a hymnal for the Deaf, which Pastor DeLaney has compiled and edited.

#### Expansion to India!

Among the visitors at the conference was missionary Arnold Lutz, now on furlough from India. (See article in June DEAF LUTHERAN.) Formerly he had been a minister to the Deaf at Minneapolis, Minn. During his seven years in India he has noted the sad plight of the Deaf in that benighted land. He addressed the conference and, to the evident delight of all, announced that he has the permission of the Board of Foreign Missions to devote a portion of his time to mission work among the Deaf in India when he returns in September of this year. This will be the first step in foreign Deaf work to be undertaken by our Church.

#### Boost the L. D. M. S.

This announcement very naturally invoked a lively discussion on the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society, which was organized in the East several years ago to gather funds for foreign Deaf Mission work. To date some \$800 have been gathered. It appears that this money will soon be put to good use for the purchase of visual aids, etc., to assist missionary Lutz in his very difficult undertaking. The conference secretary, Pastor DeLaney, was appointed treasurer pro tem of the Society for one year.

It was pointed out that the Lord of the Church is also presenting to our Synod opportunities to take up the work among the Deaf in New Guinea and in Japan.

#### Congratulations!

Congratulations were extended to Pastors Beyer and A. Ferber, who have each completed 30 years of service in Deaf work.

#### Thanks!

A vote of thanks was given to the staff at the Concordia College for its hospitality to the conference and also to Mr. J. P. Miller, board member, who so graciously opened his home to the conference for a Sunday evening get-together around a generous supply of Sweigert's (Dr. Salvner's meat-packer son-in-law's) sausage and many other delicacies.

The next meeting of the conference will again be at St. Paul over the first week end of July, 1955.

The Ephphatha Conference is always a big event, both profitable and enjoyable, in the yearly calendar of the Lutheran pastor to the Deaf. Perhaps it can be best said in the words of the hymnist: "The fellowship of kindred minds is like to that above."



# Memorial Hymnal for the Deaf

Mr. Harry W. Baals of Fort Wayne was serving his fourth term as mayor of that city when the Lord called him out of this life May 9. He was a member of Trinity Lutheran Church and deacon for the past 16 years. His body was laid to rest the following Wednesday, awaiting the glorious Resurrection Day. The family had asked "that flowers be not sent, but that memorials for the training of clergymen for the Deaf will be gratefully received."

"Training of clergymen for the Deaf." There were several possibilities. One was to subsidize young men at the seminaries in preparing for work among the Deaf, or to help in the training of men right into their prospective field. However, when Ephphatha Conference met in St. Paul, July 2-6, the publishing of a hymnal for our work was discussed. One of our men had been working on it for some time. When asked about it, he replied that nothing was being done about it, since it would involve such a great expense, approximately \$1,500. One of our workers who had heard about the Baals Memorial Fund asked whether we could not use \$200 of it for the getting out of about fifty hymns. Then the good Lord put into our mind the idea: "Why not use the entire fund for a Memorial Hymnal in memory of the deceased

mayor of Fort Wayne!" This appealed strongly as a wonderful idea to Mrs. Baals and her daughter. who is a graduate of our Detroit School and a member of our Fort Wavne congregation. And immediately they sent us a check for \$1,050. Now we can go to work with our hymnal. God be praised. A hearty "Thank you" to the Baals family and to all who sent in moneys for this Memorial Hymnal! It will be used for "training clergymen to the Deaf" to sing the praises of our Lord and Savior in the sign language, and the Deaf will sing with them! J. L. S.

# The Cost of the Lutheran Mission to the Deaf

February 1, 1953, to January 31, 1954

Mr. G. F. Kruse of St. Paul is the Treasurer of the Board of Missions to the Deaf of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. At the recent meeting of all missionaries he gave a very interesting general report of the cost of the work for the last fiscal year.

**Total Disbursements were \$290, 855.28.** That is much money. It was spent that the Deaf might better know that Jesus Christ is the Savior also of the Deaf.

**Budget allowance was \$151,000.** That means that the Treasurer of our Church sent Mr. Kruse \$151,000 to help the different congregations of the Deaf to pay the salaries and traveling expenses of the pastors of the Deaf. This money comes from the missions contributions of all the members of the Church.

Paid by Deaf congregations, \$15,-381.50. That is what the organized congregations of the Deaf paid towards the salaries of their pastors.

The 75-Per-Cent arrangement brought \$11,113.52. When a pastor conducts a service in some city, 75%goes for expenses and 25% is sent into the general budget treasury of the Church. This 75% is a great help to defray the traveling costs of the workers.

**Total receipts were \$269,554.78.** This amount includes grants from the "Conquest for Christ" collection and loans from the Church Extension Fund for the building of chapels and parsonages, helping the congregations of the Deaf with their financial problems.

These are large figures. They show that God has given our Church "an open door" with the Deaf and that our Christians are gladly paying large sums every year that the Deaf might have the Gospel. We also see from a study of these figures that the congregations and preaching stations, whose 75% of collections was \$11,113.52, gave the other 25%, or \$3,704.51, to the general synodical treasury; thus we learn that the total contribution of Deaf congregations and stations was \$30,199.53. We learn, therefore, that about ten per cent of the cost of the work among the Deaf is contributed by the Deaf, and the hearing brethren gladly pay 90 per cent. This must spur the Deaf on to greater efforts to do more, and to thank God that He raised up friends who gladly pay much that the Deaf might hear God's Word. U.

# Exodus

The second book of the Bible is called Exodus. That word really means "going out" or "departure" and tells us of the escape of the people of Israel from Egypt through Moses. The period covered is the time of about 400 years between the death of Joseph and the first part of the life of Moses. The 400 years are briefly mentioned in the first chapter of the book, and we are told how the Hebrew people multiplied until the Egyptians became afraid that they might become too strong and defeat them, and how the wicked king ordered all male children killed so that the Hebrew nation would die out.

In this book we see how that Hebrew nation now sets out to go into the land which God had promised Abraham and his children. Here Moses now comes before us; he is the great leader; the nation is not ruled by a king, but God leads them through leaders that get their advice and orders directly from God. Such a nation is not called a kingdom, as Israel has no king; it is not a republic, in which the people elect the leaders and are ruled by certain laws that they make themselves; but Israel is ruled by God directly, who chooses and directs the leaders, and such a rule is called a theocracy.

In chapters 2 to 6 God gives the command for the departure from Egypt; Moses is born, is called in the story of the burning bush, presents himself to his people as their leader and tells them of the coming departure, and then goes to the Egyptian king and demands, "Thus saith the Lord God of Israel, Let My people go."

In chapters 7 to 12 things are made ready for the departure; in ten plagues, or very bad troubles, the Egyptian people are made willing to let the people go, and the Hebrews get ready. The Passover is ordered, the killing and eating of the lamb and the protection of the Jewish homes by the blood of the lamb over their doors, telling them already of the blood of Christ that protects us from the devil.

The actual departure is told us in chapters 13 to 18, where we read how the Egyptians were destroyed and the Israelites saved, and the journey is begun. There are wonderful portions of praise in this section and stories of God's care for His people, even as He now cares for us.

God's direct rule over His people through His servant Moses is further made clear and strong by the giving of the Law and the instructions how to build the tent church, or tabernacle, where God would bless them in a very special way, chapters 19 to 34.

The chapters 35 to 40 then bring us the story of the building of the tabernacle. The people brought their offerings plentifully, the tabernacle is constructed and dedicated.

The tabernacle is to tell the people about a wonderful temple that God will erect in this world, His holy Christian Church that will be coming in the New Testament, when the Savior, or Messiah as the Jews called Him, will have come.

God is making ready the nation that will bring to the world the Savior, and the story of the wanderings and the tabernacle and the escape from the slavery of Egypt should give us advice and light and hope as we wander through the desert of this world toward the Promised Land of Heaven and are blessed through the Church and escape from hell and the devil.

Many stories of sin and punishment are related in this book, but it is "for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the Scriptures might have hope." U.



# Table of Duties OF SUBJECTS

God's Word teaches that we should honor our President, or Governor, or Mayor, or any other government official as servant of God.

#### Obey Your Government

God says in His holy Word: "You must needs be subject," Rom. 13:5, and again: "Put them in mind to be subject to principalities and powers, to obey magistrates," Titus 3:1. Therefore we should obey not only "for wrath," that is, because the government punishes those who will not obey, but also "for conscience' sake," for God's sake. Peter writes: "Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake," 1 Peter 2:13. A Christian's conscience is bound up in God's Word. It praises him when he obeys, and warns him when he disobeys. "For the Lord's sake" we should obey every law of our government, be it Federal, or State, or city. And a Christian will obey even though it is an unwise law in his opinion. God says: "Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man," 1 Peter 2:13. Christians are to glorify God's name. What will the world think if a Christian obeys not the government! He will put shame upon the name of Jesus. He bought us with His blood and made us His own. As God's people let us respect our government and obey every law of our country.

#### When Not to Obey

Yes, sometimes we cannot obey. Perhaps a government commands people not to preach Christ and Him Crucified for sinners and not to pray to the one true God, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Then we cannot obey. King Darius signed a law forbidding everyone to pray to his god for 30 days, and commanding everyone to pray only to the king. Daniel did not obey, but continued praying to his God as before. The Jewish leaders commanded the disciples not to preach in Jesus' name. But the Apostles said, "We ought to obey God rather than men," Acts 5:29.

Obey your government, but not when they command you to disobey God! J. L. S.

*Prayer:* Keep us interested, O God, in reading and hearing Your Word. Make our faith stronger through it. Amen.

## Saturday, September 4 Psalm 147:1-20

God knows how many stars are in the sky; He takes care of all things.

Therefore we should never worry; He takes care of us.

*Prayer:* We want to honor You, O Lord, and give praise to You. Let your Holy Spirit help us do that. Amen.

## Sunday, September 5 Mark 7:31-37

The group of pastors in our church who bring the Gospel to the Deaf are called Ephphatha Conference, because of Christ's words to this Deaf man in our reading.

*Prayer:* Help us to tell others about the Savior and the many blessings we receive from You, O Lord, through Him. Amen.

#### Monday, September 6

#### 2 Corinthians 3:4-11

Through the Law of God we see that we are sinful and worthy only of death; but through the Gospel the Holy Spirit shows us we have eternal life through Christ.

*Prayer:* Our God, we thank You that You promise us eternal life through our Savior, Christ. Amen.

## Tuesday, September 7 Isaiah 29:18, 19

God's Book, the Bible, leads us to Jesus; so to learn more about Him we must read our Bibles daily. "Search the Scriptures . . . they explain about Me," Jesus says.

*Prayer:* Make us humble, O Lord, and give us faith in our Savior so our joy increases. Amen.

## Wednesday, September 8 Matthew 12:31-37

Through what we say people can know what kind of heart we have. Do we speak evil things — lies, gossip, curses, etc.? Or do we confess Jesus through our speech daily?

*Prayer:* O Holy Ghost, let us never speak evil against You, but help us always speak good things of God and of one another. Amen.

#### Thursday, September 9 James 3:1-12

Sins of speech are very bad. God's Word here compares them to the fire of hell because lies, curses, and angry words can cause so much suffering.

*Prayer:* Give us help from the Holy Spirit to keep our speech kind and clean to show Your glory. Amen.

#### Friday, September 10 Psalm 119:89-96
