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# Ordination and Commissioning of Rev. W. H. Lange

The impressive rite of the ordination and commissioning of the Rev. William H. Lange was performed in Trinity Lutheran Church, Los Angeles, Calif., at 3:30 P. M., Sunday, September 19, 1954.

A large number of about 200 deaf people and about 150 hearing were inspired by the sermon, based on "The Healing of the Deaf Man," Mark 7:31-37. This very fitting and interesting message to the hearing people, to the new missionary, and to the Deaf, was preached by the Dr. Geo. W. Gaertner, Pastor of Memorial Lutheran Church for the Deaf in Oakland, Calif., and also the West Coast Regional Representative of Synod's Board of Missions to the Deaf. Dr. Gaertner was also the officiant in the ceremony of ordination and commissioning of the new missionary, with the help of the Rev.

Im. F. Hodde, who served as liturgist in the service, and is pastor of Trinity Church as well as the Visitor of the local circuit. The Rev. Arnold T. Jonas, pastor of Pilgrim Lutheran Church for the Deaf, interpreted the sermon and the liturgy.

A reception in the new and modern fellowship hall of Trinity Church followed the service. The ladies of Pilgrim Church served at the beautifully decorated table the cakes and cookies which they had baked, with coffee and punch. Pilgrim Congregation of the Deaf presented Rev. Lange with two beautiful gifts as a remembrance of his ordination and commissioning. The first gift was a pocket-size Communion service to be used in communing the sick and shut-ins. The second gift was a beautiful clergy cross to be worn with the pastor's robe.

It was a memorable day in the history of our Deaf - memorable because it was just forty years ago in August of 1914 that the first service in signs for the Deaf was held in this same Trinity Church in Los Angeles. At that first service the Rev. T. M. Wangerin preached, having come out from Milwaukee, Wis., for the service and for a survey to explore the needs of services for the Deaf in California. Now, forty years later, the Deaf returned to Trinity to accommodate both the Deaf and the hearing in this combined service of signs and speech and to ordain and commission another pastor to take care of the growing needs of the Southern California area.

A choir of seven ladies interpreted the singing of the hymns for the

Deaf. These ladies were Mesdames F. V. Farmer, Esther Kingsley, M. Nilson, F. Degner, H. Thuve, F. Miller and Perry Stephenson, members of Pilgrim Church for the Deaf. Mr. Harold Thuve served as leader for the Deaf in the signing of the liturgical responses by the congregation. There were many wonderful words of praise both from the Deaf and the hearing people for the beauty and impressiveness of this service.

The Rev. Wm. H. Lange was born in Minot, N. Dak. His father, the Rev. A. H. Lange, served a Lutheran congregation near Minot. Later the family moved to Concordia, Mo. Pastor Wm. Lange attended Lutheran parish schools in his youth. To begin his theological training, he entered St. Paul's College at Concordia, Mo., being graduated in February, 1947. He received his final training for the ministry at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, being graduated last June. His studies there were interrupted by a vicarage of three years, as he taught school one year at Knoxville, Tenn., and spent two years as vicar of Martin Luther Church, Tokyo, Japan. He now will assist the Rev. A. T. Jonas in the Southern California area, at Long Beach, San Diego, and Santa Ana, and will take charge of the Deaf children in the school at Long Beach and the State School for the Deaf at Riverside, Calif.

Former pastors who have served the Deaf in Los Angeles and Southern California include the following: Rev. N. F. Jensen, full time from November, 1914, to September, 1917; and part time from 1917 to April, 1926; Rev. Gerhardt F. Ferber served from April, 1927, to July, 1942; the Rev. Walter D. Uhlig served the Deaf from September, 1942, until the summer of 1948; Vicar William Reinking served during the three months of summer in 1948; and the present pastor, Arnold T. Jonas, since October 12, 1948. The Los Angeles congregation numbers some 125 baptized members. Nine more members were added by the rites of Baptism and confirmation on the 15th Sunday after Trinity, September 26, 1954. Pilgrim Congregation has its own chapel and fellowship hall for the Deaf, located at 3425 W. 15th Street in Los Angeles. The Deaf also own the parsonage at 927 S. Gramercy Place. The Lord has so blessed the preaching and teaching of His Word that now two missionaries are necessary to take care of the work in this large and growing area. May He continue to bless the preaching, the teaching, and the labors of the new missionary to the glory of His A. T. J. holy name.

# "Building for Christ"

The Board of Directors of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod has given the green light to an effort to be made early in 1955 to collect five million dollars in a "Building for Christ" program. The troublesome problem was this: Very necessary building operations confront several of our important educational and welfare agencies. Instead of having five separate campaigns, there is to be one concerted effort. A very good idea. This procedure lifts the entire program into prominent view through its great size, for five million is a very large sum of money; and it saves endless duplication of effort. Among the beneficiaries of this effort is our Mill Neck, N. Y., Lutheran School for the Deaf.

We of the Mission to Deaf gratefully think of the aid given our congregations at Cleveland, Seattle, Sioux Falls, Jacksonville, and other cities. The True Light Mission in Chinatown in New York, which is doing such outstanding work, has been benefited by the grants of the L. W. M. L.

But not only these efforts that receive publicity are worthy of note, but the unnumbered small "cups of cold water" given by the faithful women of Jesus are written in His Book to be remembered. We remember a housewife, who in the course of one year gave 668 meals to beggars; we have never left a parsonage on our missionary journeys to the Deaf without invoking a blessing upon the "woman of Shunem" who had fed and lodged the missionary as did her sister in the days of Elijah the Prophet.

These deeds of love done unto Him by serving the least of His brethren certainly will receive the "Well Done!" U.

## "The Most Blessed Work on This Earth"

## The Book of Numbers

The Book of Numbers is the fourth of the five books of Moses. It is called **Numbers** because the first chapter **tells us of the numbering** of the people. God commanded Moses to take a census. This counting was repeated in chapter 26. There were counted 603,550 males over twenty years of age in the first census, and 38 years later, at the second census, they counted 601,730 males over twenty years of age. Thus one can figure that about three million Hebrews wandered from Egypt to the Promised Land.

The book tells the story of the wandering in the desert. Moses had planned to lead them directly north to the land which was to be their home. So they wandered in 11 days to Kadesh, 150 miles from Mount Sinai, which was only 50 miles from Beersheba. From Kadesh the spies were sent out to look over the situation. This was really the decisive point. The people listened to the evil report of ten of the twelve spies and became afraid to go further. Two of the spies urged the people to go ahead with Moses, but the people refused. It must have been very hard for Moses. Then God said that they would **wander forty years** in the desert and all the men over twenty would be dead at the end of these 40 years and not enter the land, except Joshua and Caleb, the two who trusted God. And so the people wandered about. They would stay at one place for awhile and then go on to another place and stay awhile again.

This book we can divide into four sections. Chapters 1 to 4 we have the census of the state and of the church during the last days at Mount Sinai. Chapters 5 to 10 we have many laws about persons and things that the people in their wanderings should observe. Chapters 11 to 19 tell many stories of how the wicked were punished for not obeying God, and more laws are listed. Chapters 20 to 36 tell how the people came back to Kadesh and the desert of Zin and Aaron's and Miriam's deaths and more disobedience of the people and more laws.

Everywhere in this book we see the patience of God and His love for His people, and many statements and happenings spoke of and foreshadowed the coming of the Savior. An interesting book indeed is Numbers. Let us read it often for warning and encouragement. U.

September 17, 1952, Mr. and Mrs. Chester Orr were confirmed in Bethlehem Church, Vancouver. Six weeks later Mr. Orr was stricken

with bulbar polio and rushed into an oxygen tent. His doctor said he could not live more than one week.

But Jesus, the Great Physician, knew differently. After several months Mr. Orr was able to breathe without the iron lung. But then the gracious and almighty God, who had helped and strengthened him thus far, laid upon him another very heavy cross: Mrs. Orr died entirely unexpectedly a few minutes after giving birth to her third child, a truly beautiful daughter. At her baptism she was given her sainted mother's name: Mary Louise.

Shortly before the birth, a school friend of Mr. Orr, **George Atkinson**, arrived from Edmonton with his hearing wife, a registered nurse, for a visit. The childless Atkinsons had arrived to care for the Orr household in expectation of the Orr's new baby.

Instead of merely visiting, the Atkinsons remained indefinitely. God had provided them with a family of three children in a very unexpected way. And God had supplied the Orr children with devoted and loving substitute parents.

To the amazement of countless people, Mr. Orr has left the hospital and is now in a rehabilitation center, where he is undergoing further treatment intended to prepare him for a different type of work, by which to support his family.

May each of us praise God for His great love and power and grace in this case. And may our God continue to remain with Mr. Orr, his family and the Atkinsons, to bless and to heal! J. A. B.

## Meeting with Friends, Old and New

During the past eleven years all the fields of our mission have been officially visited by us, some several times. But never the Twin City Fields, which were under our care for many years. And why not? It is not that we had forgotten them. Off and on we preached to some of the groups during these eleven years. Finally we got around to visit some of the Minneapolis stations, and in August we shall, God willing, visit the St. Paul Field.

The first stations we visited were Duluth-Superior. Work was begun here in August, 1913, with an attendance of 21 in the first service.

For some time we had intended to start the work there, but we always failed. Then God took things into His hands. He took three of our Lutheran men of the Minneapolis Congregation and placed them into Duluth-Superior. There they found themselves without Gospel preaching. There were services for the Deaf, but there was not a "word about salvation." They therefore wrote us, saying: "We come to you as the man of Macedonia came to Paul, saying, Come over and help us." We thanked God for this letter and were glad to accept this call. And God was with us. More and more Deaf were instructed and confirmed, and a congregation was organized with about 30 members. Some of these have moved away. and some are now with Christ in glory. For ten years we held monthly services. In 1923 P. Ferber was installed as pastor for the Northern Minnesota and North Dakota Deaf. For 17 years he lived in Duluth and faithfully served this group with services and a weekly Bible class. Then P. Lutz, now missionary in India, ministered to them for two years. Since then P. Bremer has been serving them every month. Thus the word of Christ and His love has been preached to the Duluth-Superior Deaf for more than 40 years. What a blessing!

May 22 we accompanied P. Bremer to these cities and preached the sermon, basing it upon 1 John 2:28 and urging them to "abide in Jesus." We were happy to see some of the oldtimers whom we had served for many years, and also glad to see many new faces. At the present time there are 19 communicants in Duluth and 8 in Superior. After the service the ladies served dinner.

Schroeder and E. Mappes. Mr. Ed. Rodda, her husband, died five years ago. She has five children and five grandchildren

Then there was to be a short meeting, in which we were to speak informally on certain matters. We showed them that the love of Christ should constrain (urge) them to attend services faithfully, often to come to the Lord's Table, and liberally to support Christ's work of saving souls. However, this meeting lasted almost two hours. So many questions were asked, and many things had to be discussed. May God continue to bless this fine group and their pastor unto the glory of our Savior's name. In this service Pastor Bremer came to the Lord's Supper with his members.

Monday we made several calls and then drove to Grand Rapids, where we have five communicants. However, it proved to be a very inopportune evening for the service. Only one came, the others were detained. Among these was a couple who never had missed a service. A Communion service was held with the one. There were three of us, and Jesus says: "Where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst of them," Matt. 18:20. So there were four of us. Tuesday we called on Mr. and Mrs. Stokes, two very enthusiastic members. They expressed their deep regret that they were not able to attend the service. However, we brought a message from God's Word also to them. May God bless this little group!

June 13 we visited the Mankato group. Our first service there was held in February, 1927, with an attendance of seven. Rev. Lutz served them in 1944 and 1945. Since then Rev. Bremer has been their pastor. It was Trinity Sunday, and we reminded them of the Father's mercy to them that during all these years they had learned to know from John 3:16, then of the Savior's love in shedding His blood for their sins, and of the Holy Spirit's love in blessing the Word in their hearts. In the sermon we dwelt especially

on the work of the Holy Spirit, on the basis of John 7:37-39. After the service we urged them to thank Father, Son, and Holy Ghost for this love by attending church regularly, by coming to Holy Communion often for the strengthening of their faith, and also by giving gladly for the Lord's work, and that not only for their pastor's expenses and salary, but for all our mission work in all the world. They now number 16 communicants. All of these were members when we conducted services years ago. Thanks, dear Lord, for keeping them in Thy grace!

The following Monday we visited the seven patients under P. Bremer's care at the St. Peter State Hospital. To some of these we brought comfort from God's holy Word in times past. Each one had to be visited individually. Two of them are deafblind. Hjalmar Waage we found seriously ill. His face brightened up when his pastor spoke to him of JESUS, just as it did when we visited him years ago. On July 12 he died, trusting in Jesus who loved him! Now he is with his Savior. We still are in this world of sorrows. May God grant to every one of us such a blessed end! JL.S.

# Our Work in Ohio, Indiana, and Kentucky

Missions to the Deaf were begun over 50 years ago in Cincinnati, Columbus, Cleveland, and elsewhere by the sainted Rev. A. Boll. After him, the Revs. O. Schroeder, N. Borchardt, E. Baker, and Wm. Gielow established many missions to the Deaf in Ohio, Indiana, and Kentucky. At the present time the Rev. Theo. Frederking of Cleveland and the Rev. Donald Simon of Columbus serve the Deaf in Ohio, while the Rev. Martin Kosche of Indianapolis and the Rev. Ernest Scheibert and Vicar H. Drachenberg serve cities in Indiana and Kentucky.

In these places our missionaries serve about 800 baptized Deaf, 300 communicants, and 100 Deaf children in Sunday schools. There are churches for the Deaf in Cleveland, Columbus and Indianapolis. But the work for the Deaf in these States is only a small part of our national work.

By the oral and manual methods the blessed Gospel of Jesus and the truths of the Bible are brought to thousands of Deaf people, to the salvation and blessings of many immortal souls purchased by the precious blood of our Savior. May we often remember this difficult but blessed work in our prayers.

#### Central District News

**Chicago.**—**Mr. Norman Ginn** is a deaf-blind friend living in a suburb of Chicago. He is a faithful, cheerful Christian in spite of his double handicap. Mr. Ginn contributes to our work and receives Holy Communion regularly.

In the Chicago area we render personal service to 41 deaf-blind. Our magazines in raised type have among their readers about 300 deafblind, who reside in many cities all over the world. They write to us in Braille from Bombay and Calicut, India; Shanghai, China; Tokvo. Japan; Jerusalem, Israel; Damascus, Svria; Cairo, Egypt; Capetown, South Africa; Sydney, Australia; Kingston, Jamaica; Auckland, New Zealand: Mexico City, Mexico: Buenos Aires, Argentina; Lisbon, Portugal; Rome, Italy; Paris, France; San Juan, Porto Rico; Berlin, Germany; Edinburgh, Scotland; London, England, and nearly all the principal cities of the U.S.A. and Canada.

We thank God that these sightless fellow men are able to learn the Gospel of God's redeeming grace in Christ Jesus. Pray for us and pray for them. O. C. S.

*Prayer:* Jesus, make us kind and forgiving. Keep us from thinking and doing evil to others. Amen.

#### Friday, November 19 Psalm 119:169-176

When we learn God's Word, we find many reasons to praise Him; we see how He promises many blessings and keeps all His promises. To forgive you for your Savior's sake is the greatest promise of God.

*Prayer:* Let us return to You, O Lord, through Jesus, who came to seek and save the lost. Amen.

### Saturday, November 20 Judges 7

Gideon, the leader of the army of the Children of Israel, obeyed God in all things; he trusted Him to help in the battle, and God did. We, too, can trust God in our battle against Satan and sin.

*Prayer:* We give glory to You, O God, for helping believers with Your great power. Amen.

### Sunday, November 21 Matthew 22:15-22

All we have belongs to God; we are only His managers. Therefore from love of Jesus we should use all our things and our entire life to give thanks and glory to Him.

*Prayer:* Make us good citizens, O God; help us work and pray for good government. Amen.

### Monday, November 22 Philippians 3:17-21

We must honor God and work for Him and His kingdom rather than give our whole attention to our life on earth. Let us think about our eternal life in heaven and work and pray for that.

*Prayer:* Everliving Savior, free us from our sins, that when we die, we may receive glorious bodies like Yours. Amen.

#### Tuesday, November 23 Isaiah 32:1-8

The wind, the tempest (storm), a dry place, and a weary land mean all our troubles; Christ is our Shelter (protection) and Comfort in all our troubles.

*Prayer:* Make us kind and generous, O Lord, in helping all who need our help. Amen.

#### Wednesday, November 24 Romans 13:1-7

God gives us our government to rule over us and protect us and to punish people that do wrong. Therefore God wants us to obey and honor our government.

*Prayer:* Give us a government, O God, that serves You and does Your will. Amen.

#### Thursday, November 25 Mark 12:41-44

*Prayer:* Help us, O Lord, to be thankful to You for all the good things You have given us. Amen.

### Friday, November 26 Psalm 124

Without God to help us in our troubles, life would be too hard for

#### Saturday, November 27 Ruth 1

The Branch of Righteousness means Jesus, our Savior, who was born from the family of David twenty-eight generations later. Praise and thank God for sending His Son to be our Savior. Prayer: Just as the priests offered sacrifices to You continually, O Lord, help us show our thanks to You always. Amen. W. O. N.
