# Meeting of the Mission Council in St. Louis

December 1, 1954, Pastor Buege, chairman of our Board, and the undersigned attended the Mission Council, which met in St. Louis. Representatives of each Mission Department attended. Everyone gave a brief report on his respective mission. Also we gave such a report, and one suggested that something like it should appear in the DEAF LUTHERAN. Among other things, we reported that we now have 38 fulltime men, 35 ordained and 3 vicars, and 3 part-time workers. And we learned of the third, Pastor Hildebrand of Las Vegas, N. Mex. There are 37 organized congregations and 235 preaching stations. Our communicants number a little over 4,000. Our men work in 36 residential and 14 city schools and in two schools for mentally retarded children. In religious classes at these schools we have an enrollment of 1,572. Furthermore, we have 83 deaf-blind under our spiritual care.

Among the problems discussed was what to do concerning work among the Deaf and blind in foreign countries. It was interesting to all present that our Lutheran Deaf have organized a Deaf Lutheran Missionary Society for the purpose of promoting work among the Deaf of foreign countries. We mentioned that Pastor Lutz, who worked with the Deaf in the States for several years and now has returned to India after his furlough, intends to open a school for the Deaf in India. For this purpose the Missionary Society gave him \$280 worth of equipment to take with him. Furthermore, we told them that we are keeping in touch with some of our missionaries in Japan and New Guinea regarding work among the Deaf there. In Japan there are 90,000 Deaf, 80 schools with an enrollment of about 10,000 and only eight churches for Deaf. God grant that in the near future we may be able to bring Christ, the Savior of the world, also to Deaf in these countries. The Council encouraged our Board to take initial steps toward establishing work in these countries.

Other topics discussed were: "The Work of Social Welfare," "Training of Future Missionaries," and others. It was a profitable meeting. Thus one gets an insight into the far-flung missions of our church.

The following day we visited the Seminary sign classes, beginners and advanced, conducted by Pastor Reinking. We were pleased to see that quite a number of young men are taking up the study of the language of the Deaf. May our dear Lord bless these classes and move the heart of one or the other to enter this our so richly blessed Mission.

The next day we went to Springfield in order to spend some time with Mr. Wm. Ludwig, our first deaf student in our Seminary, and also with Mr. Ronald Aspnes, a G. I. who was confirmed by Pastor Bremer last August and intends to become a pastor for the Deaf. Mr. Ludwig is making fine progress in every class, for which we thank God. Mr. E. Thaler, an intimate friend of Mr. Ludwig, also is very much interested in our Mission, and declared himself willing to go out as vicar in our work. Sunday, December 5, we went with them to Jacksonville, Ill., where they help Pastor Uhlig in Sunday school work. Pastor Uhlig at present is vacancy pastor in Salem Church. We assisted him there in the distribution of the Holy Supper. During that time Vicar Neisch conducted services for the Deaf in their church. Thereupon we conducted a Communion service for the Deaf, while Pastor Uhlig held another service in Salem Church.

December 6 we returned to our loved ones with a thankful heart to our God and Savior!

At St. Matthew's Church of the Deaf, Jackson Heights, there are two services held every Sunday, one at 11 A. M. and one at 3 P. M., in order to give more people a chance to attend. Pastor Kraus and Vicar Hoemann have their hands full, for not only are two services held at St. Matthew's, Jackson Heights, but one each Sunday at the Westchester Mission in the Village Church, Bronxville, and in the Nassau Mission in Epiphany Church, Hempstead, and at St. Mark's, Harlem, five services at four places each Sunday in that great metropolis, besides Bible class and Sunday school at St. Matthew's. They are working in New York.

Mill Neck, N. Y. — The Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, which organization conducts the school for the Deaf at Mill Neck Manor, in fall announced that with the addition of three more teachers there now are nine teachers on its faculty. The school will get a share of the funds which will come through the "Building for Christ" collection, which The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod is taking next March.

St. Paul, Minn. - On November 8 Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Kruse observed their fiftieth wedding anniversary. Mr. Kruse has for twenty-three vears been treasurer of the Board of Missions to Deaf of The Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod. Both have been members of Redeemer Lutheran Church of St. Paul for 41 years. The management will not make that mistake again and cut off the signer at any time.

On the afternoon of September 19 the chapel was dedicated. It is called the Keyl Chapel in memory of the late Rev. Theodore S. Keyl, who, as pastor of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, in 1936 was instrumental in bringing about the establishment of a mission for the Deaf at Newark. This work was carried on at St. Matthew's. Rev. Rud. Keyl, son of the sainted Rev. Keyl, Sr., assisted in the dedication.

The baptistry was dedicated in the evening service. It is called the Boll Memorial Baptistry, in memory of the late Arthur Boll, founder of the mission. The Rev. Herman J. Rippe, President of the Atlantic District of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, officiated. In both services the sermons were preached by Pastor Erwin E. Schroeder of St. Paul, Minn., member of the Board of Missions to the Deaf of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod. Pastors C. Gerhold and Geo. Kraus interpreted the words of the speakers.

The altar, like the altar of Christ for the Deaf Chapel at Jacksonville, Ill., is not placed against the rear wall, but at the fore part of the chancel enabling the officiant to face it and the congregation at all times.

Miss Gloria Teramoto, member of the congregation, has painted a memorial plaque for the chapel.



# Joshua

The book of Joshua tells us how the Children of Israel came into possession of the Promised Land of Canaan and how the tribes received their portions by allotment under Joshua, the son of Nun.

It is called the book of Joshua, because Joshua was the leader under whom the work was done; but he is not mentioned as the writer of this book. The writer evidently was an eyewitness because in chapter 5, verse 1, he says "until we were passed over," and in verse 6 he speaks of the land that the Lord "would give us." The book has always been accepted without any reservations.

The first section of the book, chapters 1 to 12, tells of the conquest of the land. Chapter 1 speaks of Joshua's selection as leader, his instructions and encouragement. Chapter 2 we read of the arrangement the spies made with the woman Rahab about protecting her and her relatives, because she had given lodging to the spies. Chapters 3 and 4 relate the crossing of the River Jordan, the water miraculously standing as a wall. Chapter 5 tells of the sanctification of the people; chapter 6 of Jericho's walls coming tumbling down: chapter 7 of Israel's defeat because Achan had stolen, and of Achan's punishment; chapter 8, of how Ai is taken. Chapter 9 relates how the Gibeonites were spared. Chapters 10 to 12 describe how various kings, or chiefs, were captured and the whole country taken.

Chapters 13 to 22 tell of the allotments made, or the inheritances given, to the various tribes. There are very interesting incidents related in these chapters. Particularly in chapter 20 it is interesting to learn of the six cities of refuge which were selected, three on each side of the Jordan. If anyone by accident killed anyone, a relative, or blood avenger, had a right to slay the one that killed his relative by accident. But the killer could flee into one of these cities of refuge and was safe if the trial showed that the killing was accidental. When the high priest of that time died, the killer could safely return to his home. This is a symbol of Jesus, the real city of refuge of mankind.

In the last two chapters are addresses by Joshua to the assembled tribes. In them he reminded them of the blessings they had received and showed how all promises had been fulfilled. He warned them not to mix freely by marriage with the heathen nations about them and admonished them to keep the commandments of the Lord. The people promised that they would serve the Lord, but soon forgot their promises. He said: "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."

Joshua was a good leader, and if the people had followed his advice, the troubles of which we shall hear in the next books of the Bible would not have come upon them.

# "That I May Be His Own"

That is the title of the booklet by Rev. R. C. Rein, the Executive Secretary of the Central Illinois District of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, which presents a study of Stewardship. The title is taken from the explanation of the Second Article, in which Dr. Luther shows that the purpose of the life and death of Jesus Christ was to save me "that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him."

Last month we reviewed the first chapter of that book. It showed that God is the Owner of everything, because He made everything and upholds everything by the powerful word. The second chapter teaches me that I belong to God because He created me and gave me all that I have; I must keep in mind that He is the Owner of me also, and must praise and thank Him and serve Him according to His will and directions.

God created me. We know that many people are confused because there are many who do not believe that God really is and that He is the Creator. But we are not troubled about that. We believe the story of the Bible. We know that things do not begin by themselves. Never yet have the wise men of this world been able to create anything that lived; life comes from some living parent. Originally life comes from Him who Himself is life, God; when He blew the breath of life into Adam, Adam became a living soul, and "He is not far from every one of us, for in Him we live and move and have our being." Acts 17:27, 28.

All that I have is from God. "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above and cometh down from the Father of lights," says St. James (1:17). My body with its members and marvelous senses is His creation. This my body is preserved by food which His wisdom has provided and His power lets grow. The rules of life, the laws of nature, with which people have learned to figure and on which they can depend, are from Him.

But I have more than bodily blessings from God. I have His forgiving mercy, which is far greater than the other blessings mentioned. He stooped down to save us when man went away from Him in sin. Through His grace we have a Savior, His own Son. As man in faith accepts Jesus as his Savior, man becomes God's dear child, and the heavenly Father cannot deny His child any good thing.

And this heavenly Father gives us things with which we should work and which we should handle. As we belong to Him, so these things belong to Him, and He may withdraw

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### Table of Duties To Wives

When Eve had listened to the devil and had taken of the forbidden fruit and then had given it to Adam, God said to her, "Thy desire shall be to thy husband, and he shall rule over thee." Genesis 3:16. And, therefore, God in Ephesians 5:23 says "the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the Head of the church."

### The Woman Shall Be a Helpmeet Unto Her Husband

In Genesis 2:18 we read that God for Adam made "a help meet (fit) for him." A woman should be her husband's helper, love and honor him as the husband given unto her by God, cheer and comfort him in his work, and do her household duties out of love for him. She should be his helpmeet; therefore, according to God's Word the husband is the head of the wife, and God wants her to obey. In Ephesians

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them from us any time and very rapidly if we forget that He is the Owner and do not properly use them. How fast can fortunes be wiped out!

Let us thank and praise Him for His mercies and blessings! Let us sincerely exclaim: "All that I am and have, Thy gifts so free, in joy, in grief, through life, dear Lord, for Thee!" 5:22 we read: "Wives, submit yourself unto your own husbands," and in Titus 2:5 God urges the women to be "obedient to their own husbands." It is evident that a husband should not rule over his wife as a tyrant, but "as Christ is the Head of the church."

### The Woman Should Be Obedient for Christ's Sake

God tells us this. Ephesians 5:22 says that women should submit themselves "as unto the Lord," and Colossians 3:18, that they should obev "as it is fit (right) in the Lord." The Christian wife should remember that in obeying her husband and being a helpmeet unto him, she is serving her Lord and doing the things that please Him. "As the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in everything." Ephesians 5:24. This is loving obedience. A loving husband will make it very easy for his wife to be obedient.

### A Christian Home, a Blessed Home

What a blessed home if the husband loves his wife as Christ loves the church, and if the wife is subject to her huband as the church is subject to Christ! Read Ephesians 5:22-25. Sarah is a good example. Peter writes: "Sarah obeyed Abraham, calling him lord." 1 Peter 3:6. Christian women are to be Sarah's daughters and not be frightened, for they are pleasing their Lord, who loved them and shed His blood for them. Read Titus 2:4, 5. J. L. S.

### Thursday, February 3 Psalm 145:8-21

The Lord is good to all; He gives life and food and happiness to all people; but the greatest happiness only we believers can have, because that comes from forgiveness through Jesus.

*Prayer*: Lord, we praise You because of Your goodness and because of Your mercy in forgiving us our many sins. Amen.

### Friday, February 4 Ephesians 3:14-21

The love of Christ is beyond our understanding, Paul says. The love Jesus showed for us by suffering and dying on the cross in our stead is the greatest possible love. "Greater love hath no man than this."

*Prayer:* Help us, O Lord, to understand Jesus' very great love for us; and help us show our thankfulness to Him. Amen.

Why should we be afraid of any earthly enemy when we have the great God to protect us? These words were first asked by God of the Israelites, but now He asks us who believe in Him why we have worries and fears. Trust Him!

*Prayer:* We are Your people, O Lord, and we ask You to protect us always with Your power and love through Jesus. Amen.

### Thursday, February 10 Ecclesiastes 12:1-8

The holy writer here urges us to remember the God who created us. We must serve Him from youth on so that when we reach old age, or have times of trouble, we know He is with us always. He will help us if we pray to Him.

*Prayer:* Give us a strong faith, heavenly Father, in You and in Your Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, that we trust You always. Amen.

### Friday, February 11 Job 42:1-10

God can do all things; He has power to do anything He wants; therefore we say He is omnipotent (all-powerful). No one can keep anything from God; He knows even our thoughts; therefore we say He is omniscient (all-knowing).

*Prayer:* Hear us, heavenly Father; we pray for our friends. Bless them and give them a strong faith in Jesus, our Savior. Amen.

### Saturday, February 12 Psalm 51

Every time we do wrong we sin against God, because we break His Law — the Ten Commandments. Because of these many sins against God, He is right and just to judge us guilty; but because Jesus died for us, He sets us free.

*Prayer:* O Savior, wash away all our sins in Your blood shed on the cross for us. Make our hearts clean again. Amen.

### Sunday, February 13

### Acts 17:22-31

God gives us our body, life and breath, and all we need to live. He created us and still gives us what we need, and looks after us, because we are His children. Therefore we think of Him as our heavenly Father.

*Prayer:* Make us sure, Lord, that because You raised Jesus from the dead You will raise us also to live in heaven. Amen.

### Monday, February 14 Genesis 9:1-7

When God created man, He made him like Himself — a holy being with a mind and a will and a soul that will live forever. No one has the right to take away another's life; that authority belongs to God alone.

*Prayer:* We pray to You, O God, to make men see that war and killing are wrong and to give us peace on earth. Amen.

### Tuesday, February 15 Deuteronomy 30:15-20

God gives us our choice — life and good things, or death and evil. If we follow Jesus, do God's will, and receive forgiveness for our sins and mistakes, we shall have good things now and life in heaven. God says, "Choose!"

*Prayer:* Help us, Lord, our God, to choose life with You through faith in Jesus, our Savior from sin, death, and evil. Amen.

### Wednesday, February 16 Genesis 3:1-7

"Did God really say you cannot eat from each tree in the garden?" the devil asked Eve. In similar ways he tries to raise doubt in our minds about the goodness and kindness of God. Study God's Word diligently so you can overcome Satan.

*Prayer:* As we read Your holy Word, the Bible, help us, Lord, to learn Your will and give us power to obey it always. Amen.

### Thursday, February 17 Genesis 3:8-15

Adam knew he had sinned against God by his disobedience and was afraid. When we disobey God, we should be truly sorry about it, tell Him about it in prayer, and ask His forgiveness because our Savior, Jesus, died for us.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, help us believe that You crushed Satan's power as our heavenly Father promised that it should happen. Amen.

### Friday, February 18 Isaiah 64:4-9

White is the symbol of purity, cleanness, and holiness. But our lives and hearts are filthy black with sin. Even our best deeds, our righteousnesses, are like dirty, filthy rags; the white is spotted by sin.

*Prayer:* We come to You, O Savior, with all our sins; make our hearts white with the clean robe of forgiveness. Amen.

### Saturday, February 19 Psalm 14

All mankind has turned away from God; sinful man is not on the way that leads to God. It is like stepping off the clean sidewalk into a mud puddle; people are dirty with the mud of sin, and only Jesus can make us clean again.

*Prayer:* Help us learn about You and Your will, O God. We want to seek You as we read Your Word and think about it. Amen.

### Sunday, February 20 Romans 3:9-26

The righteousness of God here means that righteousness which we get from God through our faith in Jesus; because God forgives us our sins through Jesus, He accepts us and treats us as though we were righteous ourselves.

*Prayer:* Give health, strength, and courage to all who teach Your holy Word, O Lord. Bless them always. Amen.

### Monday, February 21 Romans 7:13-25

We fall into sin again and again because our bodies are sinful. Who will free us from our sinful, mortal bodies? Jesus will free us so that in heaven we can serve God eternally with glorious bodies like His.

*Prayer:* Thank You, God, for sending Jesus to become our Savior, and to free us from sin so we can serve You forever. Amen.

### Tuesday, February 22 Revelation 3:14-22

Without Jesus we are wretched hopeless; miserable — without comfort in our sorrows and troubles; poor — we lack the riches of His blessings; blind — we cannot see the way to heaven; naked — we need the robe of His righteousness.

*Prayer:* Come into our hearts, Lord Jesus, and stay with us always through faith. Amen.

### Wednesday, February 23 Isaiah 53:1-6

Jesus was tormented because we left God and chose sin; He suffered bruises because of our sins; He took our punishment so that we have peace with God. Because He suffered instead of us, our souls are saved.

*Prayer:* Lord, we thank You for Your great love, placing all our sins on Jesus so we need not suffer punishment for them. Amen.

### Thursday, February 24 John 10:11-18

Just like sometimes a shepherd gets hurt or loses his life taking care of his sheep, so Jesus willingly gave His life for us — His sheep. He gave His life to save us from everlasting death and to assure us of life eternal.

*Prayer:* We pray for the "other sheep" as You call those who do not know You, Jesus. Make them believers too. Amen.

### Friday, February 25 Philippians 2:1-11

God arranged for a Savior for us to take away our sins. Jesus obeyed perfectly and suffered and died on the cross for us, just as the heavenly Father had planned. We should thank Him for this perfect obedience for us.

*Prayer:* Heavenly Father, make us, who are Your children, willing and obedient to do Your will like Jesus. Amen.

### Saturday, February 26 2 Corinthians 5:6-21

Jesus, the holy, innocent Son of God, was made to suffer the punishment for all our sins through His death on the cross. He took the guilt of our sins upon Himself so that we shall not have to suffer eternal punishment.

*Prayer:* Christ Jesus, through our faith in You, give us a new mind, new hopes, new joys, new goals, new feelings. Amen.

### Sunday, February 27 Matthew 17:1-8

Three of Jesus' disciples heard the heavenly Father Himself tell them that Jesus is His Son. We know from the Word of God that Jesus is God's Son and Mary's Son — Immanuel — God and man — our Savior.

*Prayer:* Let us hear the teachings of Your beloved Son, O Lord; help us to love Him as our Savior and do His commandments. Amen.

### Monday, February 28 Isaiah 9:2-7

Jesus is true God and true man. He is true God as we saw in yesterday's reading and as God again tells us through the prophet Isaiah today. He is true man, born of the virgin Mary. This wonderful Jesus is our Savior.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, give us unending peace — peace between us and God through the forgiveness of all our sins. Amen. W.O.N.

What is the significance of Baptism? Romans 6:4.

What kind of clothes did John the Baptist wear? Matthew 3:4.

Who claimed his right as a Roman citizen? Acts 22: 27, 28.
