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Church Dedication at Columbus, Ohio

Sunday, October 3, 1954, was the day which was chosen by the members of Holy Cross Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Columbus, Ohio, to formally dedicate their chapel to the glory of Almighty God and the salvation of precious souls.

On that Sunday, in spite of very bad weather, more than 100 Deaf and a few hearing gathered for two services of dedication and thanksgiving. After the opening ceremony, Pastor Donald E. Simon, pastor to the Deaf in Columbus, preached the dedication sermon, based on the Scripture text Romans 14:17-19: "For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink, but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Ghost. For he that in these things serveth Christ is acceptable to God and approved of men. Let us therefore follow after the things which make for peace, and things wherewith one may edify another." Responses to the liturgy were led by Mr. John Riddlebaugh, with hymns rendered in signs by Mrs. George Baker, Mrs. John Riddlebaugh, Mrs. Marie Donaldson, and Mr. John Schwartz.

In the service of praise held on Sunday afternoon, the Rev. Martin Kosche, pastor to the Deaf, Indianapolis, Ind., delivered an inspiring sermon. It was based on the very familiar words of Psalm 136:1. "Oh, give thanks unto the Lord; for He is good; for His mercy endureth forever." Responses to the liturgy for the afternoon service were led by Mr. Harry Case. The hymns were rendered in signs by Mrs. S. Fankhouser, Mrs. Fred Case, and Miss Emma Lou Henshaw. After the service, light refreshments were served by the ladies' guild.

Although Holy Cross Lutheran Congregation has only been organized since 1946, Lutheran services for the Deaf have been held since the early 1920's in the Columbus area. One of the earliest. and prob-

ably the first, of the Lutheran pastors to the Deaf who served Columbus was the Rev. O. C. Schroeder, who is now pastor to the Deaf and the Blind in Chicago, Ill. He was succeeded by the Rev. N. E. Borchardt, who served the Columbus field from his home station in Cleveland, Ohio. When Pastor Borchardt accepted the call to serve the Deaf in Detroit, Mich., the Rev. T. F.

Frederking took over the work in Ohio, western New York, and western Pennsylvania. Columbus was then numbered among the many stations which he served.

In 1946 a meeting was held with Pastor Frederking at Columbus. At this time the members of the Columbus group decided to form an organized congregation, officially adopting the name "Holy Cross Lutheran Church for the Deaf." The following year the first resident pastor was called for Columbus and the southern Ohio area. The Rev. J. A. Beyer accepted this call and served as pastor to the Deaf in Columbus until 1949. At this time Pastor Beyer accepted a call to serve the Deaf in the Seattle, Wash., area. In January, 1950, the Board of Missions to the Deaf supplied a student vicar to assist Rev. Frederking, who again was serving Columbus. He was Mr. Luther Russert, now pastor in St. Helens, Oreg. Vicar Russert served until June, 1950.

On July 9, 1950, the present pastor, the Rev. Donald E. Simon, was installed as pastor of Holy Cross Church.

During these many years services were held in one of our hearing Lutheran churches.

In August, 1951, the present building was acquired at the cost of \$15,500. Services were begun in this building in October of that year. This building is a three-story brick house. It serves as chapel and parsonage.

Although the building has been used for services during these past three years, the congregation decided to postpone the formal dedication services until necessary repairs and the remodeling could be completed. This remodeling took much longer than was originally planned, but the members of Holy Cross Church are proud that they were able to do all of the work themselves, even though there were less than twenty active members. The chapel as now completed can seat approximately fifty people.

On June 13, 1954, the first confirmation service in the new building was held with a class of six adults. They were: Mr. and Mrs. George Baker, Mrs. Sherwin Fankhouser, Miss Emma Lou Henshaw, Mrs. Marie Donaldson, and Mrs. Fred Blackford.

The ladies' guild, which was begun under the pastorate of the Rev. J. A. Beyer, has monthly meetings at the church and has been (Continued on page 41)



Worship in the Family Circle

A short while ago the mailman brought us a new book published by the Moody Press in Chicago. Its title is *Bible Readings for the Family Hour*, by Martin P. Simon. It was sent us that we might give a review of it in the DEAF LUTHERAN. Publishers do this in order to make people acquainted with a new publication.

The book immediately interested us greatly, first, because it gives help to parents in establishing and carrying on in the circle of the family, with small children present, a profitable family devotion. It is hard to keep small children interested unless you have materials written in the language of children; and Dr. Simon's book uses the language that little children can understand. We were interested also because the Rev. Martin Simon is a very successful Christian educator of children. He not only gives the facts that the Bible gives us but also, through them, creates the right attitude in the children. They are led to want to do the right thing and to believe the truth, for the author seeks "to make them glad to accept God's will for their lives."

The book brings 365 daily devotions, each one on a page; and there are some simple but thought-provoking questions. There is also a short prayer for each day. The price of the book is three dollars; but by getting it one gets material for a whole year, and one can use the book repeatedly. It is substantially bound to withstand usage; the page is 6×9 inches; the print is clear. It can be obtained from Moody Press, 810 N. La Salle, Chicago, from Concordia Publishing House, St. Louis, or from Rev. Simon at Highland, Ill.

Inasmuch as deaf parents who have hearing children have a problem, this book may be of help to them. The simple language makes it very acceptable to the Deaf. Many of the present-day devotional materials are not especially suited to the needs of the Deaf because the language is too difficult. And many are not suited to the worship in the family circle, but rather are intended to be used by people individually. But the family worship is one of the greatest opportunities that parents have to train their children in the fear of God.

But let us never think that anything can or should displace the Bible in private devotions. That still is and must remain the one great source of information, and it must be used daily; the other helps are to be just that — helps that make difficult words and sentences clearer to us.

"Bought with a Price"

God is the Owner of everything, because He made everything and everything is upheld by His power; but He can claim us as His own not only because He created us but also because He bought us back, or redeemed us.

In the days of the past world wars the windows showed service stars, a star for every member of the family that had answered the call of the country. A little boy, walking with his father, noticed a gold star. "What does that gold star mean?" he asked. "It means that someone who lived in that house has died for his country." As the bright evening star flashed in the sky, the young lad said: "God has a gold star in His window, too, because Jesus, God's Son, died for His country."

This is a great and overwhelming truth. Every one of us is a lost sinner. But God sent His Son, who took human form through being born a man of the Virgin Mary in order to become one of us so that He might take our place in the judgment of God and be charged with our sins and pay the price for all mankind, suffering and dying for us.

The truth of our salvation was beautifully brought out by a man who had been a heathen. He made a circle of dry leaves and twigs and put a worm into that circle. Then he lit these twigs. The poor worm wiggled but could find no escape from that encircling fire and bundled together to die. The man took the worm out of the circle and said: "So God has made me free when I could not escape the fire of hell." He truthfully stated the case; so you and I were freed because Jesus died for us and God removed us from the flaming fire of hell. And He did so because He loved us.

The lesson is clear. Because He redeemed me, therefore I belong to Him and owe Him everlasting thanks.

In the third chapter of the book That I May Be His Own, which we review in this article, Rev. Rein brings out this truth very beautifully and strikingly. He cites a number of touching stories in which freed people realized the debt of gratitude that they owed those who had made them free. One of these stories tells of a Brooklyn preacher in the days of slavery who one Sunday brought some slaves into the service and urged his members to buy them and set them free. He tells of one slave who told his benefactor: "Master, I belong to you. Let me serve you as long as I live, not because I have to, but because I love you, for you bought me free."

Can we feel otherwise toward Jesus? "Lord of Glory, Thou hast bought me with Thy lifeblood for a price; never grudging, to redeem me, that tremendous sacrifice."



Table of Duties OF SUBJECTS

All government is of God. "The powers that be are ordained [given] of God" (Romans 13:1). Therefore God expects that we obey our government in all things except when they command us to disobey God. This we learned in our last study. However, we have also other duties toward our government.

Support Your Government by Paying Taxes

Jesus says: "Render [give or pay] unto Caesar [the government] the things that are Caesar's" (Matthew 22:21). And by His Apostle Paul He tells us: "Render [give] therefore to all their dues: tribute [taxes] to whom tribute is due; custom [revenue, or toll], to whom custom" (Romans 13:7). This is a plain command of God. Christians who believe that Jesus died for their sins will not try to cheat the government nor rejoice when they have deceived the assessor. Many people do this, but not true Christians. That is breaking God's commandments. Christians serve the Lord Jesus. who says: "If ye love Me, keep My commandments" (John 14:15). And when taxes become high and burdensome, a true Christian will not complain against his government, but to His God because of his own sin and, above all, because of the one great sin in our country: the love of money.

Support Your Government by Daily Prayer

Also this is a command of our Savior Jesus Christ. In 1 Timothy 2:1, 2 He says by His Apostle Paul: "I exhort therefore that, first of all. supplications, prayers, intercessions. and giving of thanks be made for all men, for kings, and for all that are in authority." Yes, pray for our President and for all rulers. Prav that God may hold His protecting hand over them, give them wisdom and understanding, hinder the work of those who seek to overthrow all government, as the Communists do today. And let us thank God for the many blessings which He has given us through our government. "This is good and acceptable in the sight of God, our Savior" (v.3). Then we shall "lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty" (v.2).

Who truly believes in God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, has forgiveness and gets what he prays for. The only unforgiven sin is to keep calling the Holy Spirit a devil (Mark 3:28-30, Matt. 12:28, 29).

Prayer: Jesus, keep us and our friends from sin, and give us eternal life. Amen.

Saturday, March 5 Galatians 4:1-7

Before Christ came, God's people were like little children and servants, ruled by many laws (elements, v. 3). When Jesus came and fulfilled these laws, we, like grown-up children, became free.

Prayer: Lord, give us Christ's spirit; then we will without fear gladly pray to our heavenly Father. Amen.

Sunday, March 6 Matthew 26:36-46

Be watchful and not sleepy, says Jesus. The devil can easily lead "sleepy," careless people to sin. Studying and obeying God's Word, we stay watchful.

Prayer: Jesus, give us the power to say No when the devil tempts us. Amen.

Monday, March 7 Luke 24:36-43

After Jesus rose from the dead, His disciples touched and felt His body, and He ate food. Also after His resurrection He had His human nature.

Prayer: Lord, when in fear and trouble, let us know You are near us. Amen.

Tuesday, March 8 John 19:1-18

Jesus was a Man with human feelings, and He felt pain when beaten and despised. The leaders of the people had more blame than Pilate and wanted Him killed. Have we any use for Jesus?

Prayer: Lord, give us church leaders that bring us to You. Amen.

Wednesday, March 9 Hebrews 4:14-16

The high priest prayed for the people. So Jesus, who feels all our sorrow, knows our feelings and gives us mercy.

Prayer: O Jesus, You know our weakness; have mercy upon us! Amen.

Thursday, March 10 John 6:41-51

The people thought Jesus to be only a man; so they did not understand that only He, God's Son, can give us eternal life; that only His Gospel, like bread for the body, feeds our soul.

Prayer: Jesus, bless the missionaries that bring the Bread of Life to many now starving spiritually. Amen.

Friday, March 11 Matthew 5:17-20

Every word of the Bible is true and will stand. Jesus did not destroy the laws of the Old Testament, but fulfilled them; and when the terms of a contract are fulfilled, it is ended. God's Moral Law will always remain.

Prayer: Lord, bless our teachers, and let them teach Your Word faithfully. Amen.

Saturday, March 12 Isaiah 42:1-4

Jesus is that "Servant" who, in a quiet, loving way, brings salvation to the world. He makes well the sorrowful, "bruised" soul and makes the flame of faith ("smoking flax") burn brightly.

Prayer: Jesus, with Your power lift up and strengthen us. Amen.

Sunday, March 13 Romans 5:15-21

Adam's sin brought death to all; the "free gift" is God's Son and salvation (John 3:16); He "obeyed," kept the Law, for all. Believing, we have salvation.

Prayer: God, thank You for giving us salvation through Jesus. Amen.

Monday, March 14 John 12:44-50

What Jesus said was what the Father told Him to say; He shows us God's heart and will. Who despises Him despises God.

Prayer: Lord, let us study, understand, and do Your Word and will. Amen.

Tuesday, March 15 John 4:31-38

Doing the Father's will was to Jesus more important than food. He saw the unsaved people like ripe grain to be harvested for heaven. What a lesson and honor for us! He wants us to help win souls for God.

Prayer: Jesus, make us worthy and willing soul winners. Amen.

Wednesday, March 16 John 8:21-30

Christ's enemies did not believe they would be lost for not believing that Jesus was the promised Messiah. He said that they would see it after He would be "lifted up," that is, crucified and brought to life again. Then they saw that He was right.

Prayer: Jesus, You brought us back into God's family. Thank You. Amen.

Thursday, March 17 Galatians 3:10-14

Those who think that they can save themselves by keeping the Law are condemned ("cursed") because they cannot do so perfectly. People are saved by faith in Jesus, who was "cursed" for us by being hanged on the "tree" (cross).

Prayer: Jesus, we thank You forever for making us free. Amen.

Friday, March 18 Revelation 5:10-14

We are blessed by the Lamb, Jesus on His throne, surrounded by the "beasts," the living ones, God's messengers; and the leaders join all in praising Jesus, who "opened the book," showing God's salvation.

Prayer: Blessing and honor and glory and power be unto You, O Jesus, forever! Amen.

Saturday, March 19 Hebrews 9:23-28

Jesus shed His blood only once for all people and for all time; once we live and have our chance — only once. When He comes again, He will judge whether we believed or not.

Prayer: Lord, give us faith, and keep us in faith; then we can await Your coming with joy. Amen.

Sunday, March 20 John 1:29-36

God told John the Baptizer that Jesus, though younger than John,

existed from eternity, being God's Son and the Lamb that would save the world from sin, bleeding to death on the cross for us.

Prayer: Lamb of God, have mercy on us, and take from us our sin. Amen.

Monday, March 21 Colossians 1:9-22

Let us be "filled with wisdom" and live holy, thanking God for saving us through Jesus, the Creator and Redeemer of the world.

Prayer: Lord, make us joyful about our salvation, and help us to be ready, waiting patiently for the time when we shall see You. Amen.

Tuesday, March 22 Hebrews 2:9-18

Jesus became lower than the angels by becoming human that He might be able to suffer as one of us in our stead; He knows our feelings and temptations and can and will help us in every situation.

Prayer: O Lord, give us Your help when the devil tempts us to sin. Amen.

Wednesday, March 23 Matthew 20:20-28

Jesus teaches that in His kingdom we must expect suffering and give humble service, as He humbly served and gave His life as a ransom (payment for freedom) for the world.

Prayer: Jesus, make us willing and eager to serve You humbly in Your church. Amen.

Thursday, March 24 Colossians 2:8-15

We are warned not to let anybody lead us from Christ by accepting the "rudiments of the world," the human ideas about salvation, because Jesus has done completely everything needed to save us.

Prayer: "I am trusting Thee, Lord Jesus, trusting only Thee." Amen.

Friday, March 25 John 11:45-53

Many thought Jesus' religion would make the Jews lose their national liberty. Caiaphas said that if one, Jesus, would die, all would be saved. That is true. His death has removed sin and hell for all.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, by Your death You made it possible that now all believers are united in one holy Christian Church. Amen.

Saturday, March 26

Romans 5:1-11

Through faith we have great blessings: peace, hope, comfort. If God loved us so much while we were His enemies, we surely now are safe in His love, since He is our Friend through Jesus' work.

Prayer: Jesus, thank You for giving me perfect peace of the heart by taking away my sins. Amen.

Sunday, March 27

John 3:1-18

Nicodemus had to learn that man must be made new by the Holy Spirit, who makes us believe that Jesus died for our sins and that He alone is the world's Savior.

Prayer: Create in us a clean heart, O God, and give us a new right spirit. Amen.

Monday, March 28 Titus 2:11-14

Because Jesus has won salvation for us, we must live for God and be done with the wicked things of sin. Let us live for Him who saved us and will come one day as Judge.

Prayer: Father in heaven, make us eager to serve You with good works from a thankful heart. Amen.

Tuesday, March 29

Ephesians 2:1-10

"By grace" — not because we deserved or earned it with doing good works, but because God loved us and gave us a Savior — we are saved. We accept this Savior by faith.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, keep us from being proud and from boasting about our good works, and help us to trust You alone for salvation. Amen.

Wednesday, March 30 1 Peter 1:13-21

Jesus bought us back to God with His precious blood, not with silver or gold or other things that have only earthly value. Now we are freed from our old sins and useless way of life and behavior.

Prayer: Give us hope and strong faith, Lord Jesus, that at the end of the world we may be ready for Your coming. Amen.

Thursday, March 31

1 Peter 2:21-25

Jesus accepted our sins and suffered for them instead of us. We call Him our Substitute. He had no sins and needed not to suffer, but He suffered because He loved us and wanted to keep us from hell.

Prayer: Jesus, You gave us an example by suffering patiently and not speaking evil. Give us strength to follow that example. Amen.

Did the troubles that the Apostle Paul suffered for the Gospel when he was in prison in Rome, hurt or really further and help the Gospel? Philippians 1:12-14. Who was a wild olive tree? Romans 11:17 (see also verse 13).

Who warned the people against idol worship? Deuteronomy 4:14-18.

Who furnished a tomb (grave) for Jesus? Matthew 27:57-60.

What was the name of the first city ever built? Genesis 4:17.

Did the Israelites ever have a woman ruler? Judges 4:4.

How were foxes used in Samson's war against the Philistines? Judges 15:4, 5.

Although much of Bible history happened near the Dead Sea in Palestine, it is never called the Dead Sea; what name does the Bible use for it? Numbers 34:12. Joshua 3:16.

The first person in Europe to become a believer through Paul's preaching was a woman; what was her name? Acts 16:14. (Read the whole story, Acts 15:9-15.)

Did the Old Testament soldiers use passwords? Judges 12:5, 6.

Who was the first musician? Genesis 4:21

What three great patriarchs (old fathers and rulers) are buried in the cave of Machpelah? Genesis 49: 28-30.

What happened to the thumbs and big toes of Adoni-Bezek, king of the Canaanites? Judges 1:6.

Does prayer sometimes lengthen life? 2 Kings 20:1-6.

Who helped bury Jesus? John 19: 38-42.

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
