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The Abiding Christ

Report on Midwest Regional Conference

Bethlehem Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Omaha, Nebr., was the meeting place for the first Midwest Conference of Lutheran Pastors and Lay Members of the Deaf on October 16 and 17. Five pastors and nine lay delegates attended the meetings on Saturday afternoon and evening and Sunday afternoon. There also were a large number of visitors present. About sixty people registered during the two days.

Most of the business at this first meeting was organizational, such as discussing and adopting a constitution and the election of our first officers. The officers elected were: president, Nick Petersen, Omaha; vice-president, George Dietz, Den-

A very inspiring and instructive essay was read by Mrs. Eva Wear, member of our Deaf congregation in Kansas City. Her topic was "Stewardship." She stressed the fact that all we have has been given to us by God and we are now to be stewards of all our possessions. Five main points were mentioned in her essay: stewardship of time, mind, influence, health, and money. The conference passed a resolution that the editor of the DEAF LUTHERAN be approached on the possibility of printing this essay, either in its entirety or in part, in this paper.

It was decided that the conference henceforth meet in the fall of every year, next year's meeting to be held at Pilgrim Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Kansas City, Mo.

Special mention must be made of the fine inspirational address given by Pastor R. Cordes of Sioux Falls, S. Dak., at the Sunday morning worship service. Also special credit must be given to Pastor E. Mappes and the host congregation, particularly the conference committee, for the manner in which details of the conference were handled. V. M.

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Table of Duties TO CHILDREN — EPHESIANS 6:1-3

"Children are a heritage of the Lord," says Psalm 127:3. God gives children to parents. But parents may not do anything that they want with children, but must "bring them up in the nurture (training) and admonition (teaching) of the Lord," says God.

Children Must Obey

If the parents must train the children, then the children must mind what the parents say. That is God's will and order. Children must learn, and they can learn only by listening to what the teacher says.

Children sometimes think that they need not obey, but have the right to do anything they wish. This is very wrong. Parents are God's representatives; God placed them over the children. God gave the orders that this should be so, and it is a sin against God if they do not obey. How many children and also parents have the wrong idea about that! That is why there is so much juvenile delinquency, that is, "bad boys and bad girls" in the world.

"In the Lord"

Obedience "in the Lord" means to obey as being in the Lord, obey God's will.

A Different Commandment

The Commandments usually have no promise, but only threaten punishment if they are broken. But the Fourth Commandment is different; it is "the first commandment with promise." It has the promise: "it will be well with you, and you will live long on earth." God promises to obedient children that they will have a happy and long life if they are obedient children.

Catechism

Was your home happy? If you were disobedient, it was not; but if you were, you enjoyed your family life. It was so nice to be happy with father and mother and brothers and sisters. That was the first fulfillment of that commandment. And that happiness continues through life. The remembrance of the nice home goes with us through life.

Sometimes children die. That does not mean that they were bad; God has His own reasons for letting them go home to Jesus early. Parents therefore early have them baptized and laid in Jesus' hands to be ready in case God wants them in heaven soon.

Jesus was such an obedient child. He loved His Father's house and even forgot to go home because He loved the Temple so much. But then He went home with the parents and was obedient. He paid for our sins against our parents.

Children, thank God for Jesus and for your parents. And when the parents become old, give them a good home in your own house, "reguite" (pay them back) them for their love. 1 Timothy 5:4. U.



The Book of Judges

The name of the writer of this book is not given in the Bible. The lawbook of the Jews, called Talmud, mentions Samuel as the writer. The book was probably written during his time because under Samuel Israel got its first king, and the words "In those days there was no king in Israel" seem to suggest that Israel had a king when the book was written. It covers the time after the death of Joshua until Samuel, the 300 years between 1400—1100 B. C.

Joshua had warned the people that they would have trouble if they forgot God. God told them (chap. 2:2,3) not to worship the idols of the heathen nations about them but to destroy them; but they did not do so, and these heathen nations from time to time oppressed them and gave them much trouble. When Israel then again turned to God, He raised up strong leaders to save them. These heroes were called judges, and the book tells the inter-One, Debesting stories of these. orah, was a woman. There are twenty-one chapters in the book.

Othniel, the first judge (chaps. 1 and 2), saved the people from the Mesopotamians, or Assyrians; Ehud (chap. 3), from the Moabites, Amalekites, and Ammonites. After him Shamgar was the third judge. The third trouble period was forty years later from the same tribes, and Deborah and Barak saved the people (chaps. 4 and 5). Later the Midia-

nites gave trouble, and Gideon's band of 300 men destroyed the foes (chaps. 6-8), and other judges after him were Abimelech, Tola, and Jair (chaps. 9 and 10). After forty years the Ammonites were destroyed by Jephtha (chaps. 11 and 12), and after him came the judges Ibzan, Elon, and Abdon. Very interesting are the stories of Samson, the strong but foolish man, who defeated the Philistines and perished with them (chaps. 13-16). Micah's idol worship (chap. 17) and that of the people of Dan (chap. 18) follows, and in the last two chapters (19 and 20) we read of the terrible crime of the people of Gibeah and the cutting into twelve pieces of the abused woman and the almost complete destruction of the tribe of Benjamin.

If you want to read interesting accounts of great acts of bravery, read the Book of Judges. Samson's deeds; Jephtha's hasty oath, the sacrifice striking his daughter; Jael's driving a nail through the head of Sisera; and other stories are in that book.

We read of sin and rescue from sin's punishments. These stories are told us to warn us against the sin of forgetting God. This sin always brings misery. In the New Testament we have much better chances to learn and to profit from the mistakes of others. Sin brings death, but through **the Supreme Judge Jesus** we have forgiveness and true liberty. U.

My Duties to My God and Savior

Martin Luther once said: "If someone rapped at the door of my heart and asked: 'Who lives here?' I would answer: 'Martin Luther once lived here, but he moved out, and Jesus Christ moved in.'" As a Christian steward, or keeper, of God's gifts I have many duties, the foremost being my duty to my God and Savior. If I do not give Him the first place in my life, I cannot be truly faithful in anything else.

He created me for His praise, redeemed me through Christ, and now asks me to live for Him and to give Him my heart, to love and respect and trust Him, and even to suffer for Him the loss of all things and lay down my life for Him.

When President Garfield was shot, he was taken to a lonely house for absolute rest and quiet in his fight for life. A special railway was constructed. The engineers needed to cross a farmer's front yard, but he refused permission until they told him it was for the wounded President. Then he said: "That's different. Why, if that railroad is for the President, you can run it right through my house." So my first duty in life is to give God the right of way in my life.

I Am to Live a Holy Life

I give myself to God when I try really hard to live holy. In Holy Baptism my sins were washed away, and I was buried with Christ in death and rose with Him to live a new life to the glory of God. I am no longer a slave of sin, and I cannot obey the wicked wishes of the sinful heart any longer.

A new pastor visited the home of one of his members. When the husband came home in the evening, the wife told him that the minister had "Does Jesus Christ live asked: here?" The husband said: "Did you tell him we are decent people and read the Bible and pray and go to church every Sunday?" The wife said: "He did not ask that; he asked if Jesus Christ lived here." True, we must not only do some things that Christians do, but all our life must show that Jesus lives in us. It is not enough to confess Christ with the mouth, but we must live the truth.

I Am to Work for Christ

God wants me to work for Him in the important work of bringing others to Him through the preaching of the Gospel. People will die in their sins if they do not believe in Jesus. They must be told. Jesus wants us to tell them. That's mission work. We ourselves must speak about Him to others with words and by a good life. In a bombed-out city of Germany in a destroyed church only the altar and a statue of Christ remained, but it had the hands broken off. The people kept that statue that way to remind them that God had spared them and because the statue told them that "Jesus has no hands, we must use our hands to do His work."

I Am to Consecrate My Gifts To the Service of Christ

My property must be used so that Christ's kingdom is benefited. So David Livingstone, the great missionary to Africa, said that He placed no value on anything he had except in the way it helped in the work of building the kingdom of God.

So it is my duty to give God first place in my life, live for Him, work for Him, and use everything so that "God in all things may be glorified through Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and dominion forever, Amen." (1 Peter 4:11.)

1 John 4:13-21

If we believe in Jesus and think, speak, and do as He thinks, speaks, and does, then we have His Spirit, and He really lives in us. Then we will have no fear, but will love God and feel kindly towards all mankind.

Prayer: Lord, we thank You that You have saved us. Now we fear nothing because You are our Friend and are stronger than all. Amen.

Tuesday, May 10 John 14:12-17

Jesus did great works; but He promises that He will answer the prayers of those that love and obey Him and give them the Holy Spirit to comfort them and to enable them through the Gospel to do greater works, namely, raise people to spiritual life.

Prayer: O God, bless our congregation with the gift of Your Spirit that Your kingdom may become large among us. Amen.

Wednesday, May 11 John 16:16-28

We ask in Jesus' name when we believe that He is our Savior who through His work made the Father our Friend, so that when we ask anything in prayer the Father gives it to us for Jesus' sake. Only a believer prays right.

Prayer: Lord, make us to understand and to remember that in every sorrow You give us comfort in Your holy Word. Amen.

Thursday, May 12 Matthew 6:5-14

Here Jesus teaches us the best prayer and gives us rules for right praying: Pray undisturbed as in your closet and not for show; think of what you say, and do not blabber thoughtless words; pray with a heart that forgives others their mistakes.

Prayer: Our Father, give us a heart that forgives others as You have forgiven us for Jesus' sake. Amen.

Friday, May 13 Matthew 7:7-12

Keep on asking and seeking and knocking; God will hear and give us a gift, good for us. Then let us thankfully walk the right, narrow way to heaven and love our neighbor as ourselves.

Prayer: Lord, give us our daily bread and a thankful, loving heart that shares the bread with the poor. Amen.

Saturday, May 14 Psalm 34:15-18

With love the eyes of the Lord watch the righteous, and He hears their prayers, but His angry face looks at the wicked. Only such are righteous as have faith in Jesus, through whom we get forgiveness and God's favor.

Prayer: Lord, give us a heart that sorrows over our sins, and save us from all troubles. Amen.

Sunday, May 15 James 1:5-8

We often do not know what is best to do. Let us ask God, who gives willingly if we in faith go to Him in prayer. But we must ask without doubting, ask and know He will give us what is best for us.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, let us be wise, trust our Lord Jesus for salvation and You for all needful things. Amen.

Monday, May 16 James 5:13-18

This tells us not to lose courage, but in faith to keep on praying, no matter what problems trouble us and others. Especially remember sinners and the sick to bring them to Him who alone heals soul and body.

Prayer: Jesus, You Good Physician, give help and peace to the sick and suffering by healing their souls and bodies. Amen.

Tuesday, May 17 Hebrews 10:19-25

The priest went through the veil (curtain) into the most holy place in the Temple; Jesus, by becoming man and redeeming us, brings us to heaven. We trust Him, go to God with confidence, keep our faith, and help others to remain true too.

Prayer: Holy Spirit, make us praying Christians who constantly pray that God's kingdom may come. Amen.

Wednesday, May 18 Ephesians 3:1-13

God showed Paul that He wants not only Jews, but all people saved and that Paul's work was to bring the Gospel to others. Let us firmly and confidently do mission work and thank God that He has called us to faith.

Prayer: Lord, make us eager to bring the Gospel to all men, and bless and protect our missionaries in faraway heathen lands. Amen.

Thursday, May 19

Acts 1:1-11

Going from our sight but still with us, Jesus gives us His last instructions to tell others about Him, and promises His Holy Spirit to guide and to move us to do so. He will come again; let us hurry to carry out His will.

Prayer: Holy Spirit, give us power to speak for Jesus, showing people their sin and their Savior. Amen.

Friday, May 20 John 20:11-18

Mary had much to ask, but Jesus tells her to tell His disciples that He will go up to His Father, who through His victory is now their loving Father too. It is true: We come to the Father only through Jesus.

Prayer: Lord, when we feel lonesome and forgotten, make us remember that You are always with us. Amen.

Saturday, May 21 John 16:1-11

Because the suffering and death of Jesus brought victory and the Holy Spirit to us, we have comfort when people persecute us for our faith and we have correct instruction about sin and salvation.

Prayer: Thank You, dear Jesus, for sending us the Holy Spirit, who brings faith and comfort to us through the Gospel. Amen.

Sunday, May 22 Joel 2:28-32

The outpouring of the Holy Spirit was Christ's ascension gift to all believers. Terrible happenings on earth warn people that only in Zion, in Christ's church, is salvation through faith.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, we thank You that the Holy Spirit has brought us to faith and into Your holy church. Bless this church for Jesus' sake. Amen.

Monday, May 23 Matthew 10:5-22

As servants of Jesus the disciples were first sent to the Jews. God supported and protected them. We now should preach to all, and when we tell people God's Word, the Holy Spirit really speaks through us.

Prayer: Holy Spirit, give us courage to speak for Jesus, and give us the right words to speak at the right time. Amen.

Tuesday, May 24

1 Corinthians 2:1-16

With simple words Paul preached the Gospel which is the deep wisdom of God. Many think that that kind of preaching is foolish and do not believe; but it clearly shows us the only right way to heaven.

Prayer: Lord, bcause many leaders among men despise Your simple Gospel, give us leaders that themselves are led by Your Holy Spirit. Amen.

Wednesday, May 25 Galatians 5:16-26

We all have a wicked heart called "flesh" that wants to do the wicked things here mentioned. Let us "crucify the flesh" and overcome it with the Spirit and live the new life that our Lord wants and that honors Him.

Prayer: Lord, give us faith, love, hope, peace, patience, and a humble mind through Your Holy Spirit. Amen.

Thursday, May 26 Mark 3:22-30

When the Holy Spirit stops working in a person, that man will never come to faith and get forgiveness. So Jesus warns against this sin against the Holy Ghost, which Jesus' enemies here were doing.

Prayer: Lord, create in us a clean heart, and renew a right spirit in us, and let Your Spirit lead us in the right way. Amen.

Friday, May 27 Romans 8:9-17

A Christian, led by the Spirit through God's Word, still has a wicked heart, but will fight against evil. The fight is hard, but the Spirit helps and assures us that we are God's children and heirs of heaven.

Prayer: O Holy Spirit, thank You for making us God's children through faith so that we now can with a loving heart call God our dear Father, Amen.

Saturday, May 28

Romans 8:18-27

Sin brought suffering to all creatures, but through Jesus we become free of suffering. The Holy Spirit helps us by giving faith and keeping us in it and by praying for us. What comfort to know that God is so interested in us!

Prayer: Lord, give us the Spirit of prayer that constantly goes to the

throne of mercy and asks for the things that we and others need for soul and body. Amen.

Sunday, May 29 Acts 2:1-21

It was a glorious Pentecost day when they were all together and the Holy Spirit was poured out. This same Spirit speaks through the mouths of faithful pastors and wins souls for Jesus when we meet in our churches.

Prayer: O Holy Ghost, bless those who attend the services in our church so that they may be spiritually benefited thereby. Amen.

Monday, May 30 Acts 10:34-48

God wants all, Jews as well as non-Jews, to be saved through the preaching of the Gospel. It is our duty to carry on mission work in foreign lands also, and many have been saved; but still there are many millions without Christ and hope.

Prayer: Lord, give grace that the millions of Hebrews and the millions of heathen may hear Your Gospel and see in You their Savior. Amen.

Tuesday, May 31 Ephesians 2:13-22

Christ died for all, and so believers of all nations and in all ages are united in the one holy Christian Church through the Holy Spirit.

Prayer: Dear Jesus, You redeemed all; therefore help us to recognize and love as brothers Christians of another color. Amen.
