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Meet Mr. Gustave F. Kruse of St. Paul, Minn., Treasurer of the Board of Missions to Deaf, The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod

The DEAF LUTHERAN is very happy to be able to bring to its readers the story of the man who has served The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod as the Treasurer of the Board of Missions to Deaf for over twentyfive years. When the Editor asked him for data about his part and service in behalf of the Mission to Deaf, he expressed the thought that he did not feel that he played any particularly important part. Which is a statement that will flatly be contradicted by all the workers whose salaries he paid out over the years: for especially the wives of the missionaries and the children are very thankful for those services: and his checks were always right and promptly on time, and if not, probably the U.S. mail service slipped up. So far as we know, he does not make mistakes, and the Editor has often marveled at the speed with which his eye takes in a column of figures and comes up with the answer almost faster than the adding machine does.

Gustave F. Kruse saw the light of day August 6, 1878, in a small village 10 or 12 miles beyond the northern limits of the city of Hamburg in Germany. In the spring of 1879 his parents, C. Henry and Doris Kruse, came to America and settled at Pine City, Minn. He was baptized in Germany. He says that he recalls the small two-room country school at Pine City. The children learned the fundamental three R's, and grades were not much bothered with; but still the children learned to think and to read and write and to figure. And they learned to keep on learning. When he was big enough, the boy went to work, and he says he has had no regrets.

He was confirmed in April 1893 by the pastor of the German Lutheran church of Pine City, the Rev. August F. Ude, of which congregation his parents and Mr. and Mrs. John and Margaret Schoettler were

charter members. The latter were the parents of Elizabeth E. Schoettler, who was united with him in holy matrimony November 4, 1904. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary two years ago. They were early childhood friends and schoolmates. They have a son and a daughter, five grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Leaving school at the age of fourteen years, Mr. Kruse found employment at the Pine City station of the St. Paul and Duluth Railroad. His story is one of humble beginning and steady advancement to positions of great responsibility. When at the age of eighteen he with his parents moved to Sandstone, Minn., he entered the employ of the Great Northern R. R. Then he went up the ladder step by step. Starting as a section hand, he was engine wiper, hostler helper, call boy of train and engine crews, yard clerk, yardmaster, freight bill clerk at Sandstone, then held various positions in the division superintendent's office of the Great Northern at Superior, Wis., including that of chief clerk to the division superintendent. He resigned in 1913 to accept a position as transportation rate man and examiner with the Railroad and Warehouse Commission of the state of Minnesota, retaining that position for thirty-two years until his retirement on February 1, 1945. He holds certificates as a practitioner before the Minnesota Railroad Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Mr. Kruse loved outdoor sports, fishing, baseball, ice skating, and swimming, and liked to bowl until illness deprived him of a limb.

The Kruses have been faithful members of the Lutheran Church all their life. They have been members of Redeemer Lutheran Church, St. Paul, over 43 years under Pastors Kreinheder and Paul and Fred and Herbert Lindemann. He served as secretary and treasurer of the Sunday school and auditor of the congregation for several years. Mr. Kruse, who was a Western Union messenger at the time of the great forest fire of September 1, 1894, vividly recalls the scenes of that terrible conflagration, which destroyed a dozen towns and villages, including Hinckley, Sandstone, and Indian Creek.

Asked about his work as member of the Board of Missions to Deaf, of which body he has been a member for a quarter century, serving as treasurer, he modestly claimed no great service, though he actually held and faithfully executed very responsible functions. He was greatly interested in the Lord's work and in the bringing of the Gospel to the Deaf. "Every phase of the work has been interesting; but most of all satisfying is the knowledge that it has been a great privilege to serve my Lord in His vineyard, and as a humble servant under His guidance to do everything to the honor and glory of His holy name decently and in order."

These words are well spoken. May God reward and bless His faithful servant.

Our "Venture of Faith"

To venture something means to try something that seems to be hard or uncertain. The term "Venture of Faith" is used in our circles frequently since July 1955. Last July 500 "Visitors" had a meeting at St. Paul. The name "Visitor" is used in our church for the leader, or chairman, of the "circuit." A "circuit" is composed of a group of five to ten churches in a certain area or city, and each of the thirty-two Districts of our Synod has a number of circuits. These Visitors were assembled for an important meeting, discussing ways and means to regulate better some things of interest and importance to all, in this case the gathering of the funds for the extensive work of preaching the Gospel.

In Synod the funds are gathered for many purposes, ranging from the carrying on of preaching in the whole world to the education of pastors and teachers so that men are prepared for the work. Then there are many good institutions and departments that must be cared for. It takes much money, and frequently it was necessary to arrange for special collections, which are sometimes called "drives" or "campaigns" to get support for such special purposes; sometimes building programs must be carried out to replace or enlarge the facilities of the departments. The regular expenses were taken care of in the general fund which is simply called the "Budget." Then came the extra collections, which made it harder to gather the Budget requirements.

Last year's Budget called for \$9,100,000. Special requirements for various building operations and institutions are figured to require twenty million dollars the next five years.

At St. Paul these many leaders discussed the situation. It was felt that instead of having large "drives," why not divide the twenty million by five, which makes four million a year, and set our goal of the Budget for that much higher? And they said, "Can we venture, or try, to collect so much more for the Budget each year and do away with special "drives"?

Believing that our Christians realize that the need is there for much harder effort to gain this goal, they decided to ask Synod to try for that goal. So they set \$12,900,000 as the goal for 1956 and called this a "Venture of Faith."

It will mean a much greater effort for all; it will mean greater contribution by everyone for Christ and for the "faith which was once delivered unto the saints." It is delivered to us now, that is, it is given to us now to carry on the great work of preaching the Gospel to all.

Our Deaf are benefiting from that effort. Our Synod carries on a greater work among the Deaf in our country than any other church denomination. We have almost forty men doing this work, who devote all their time to serving the Deaf. So the Deaf have a great interest in the success of the effort to gather the necessary funds by regular, increased, steady contributions.

We need prayer, study, interest, money. If we prize what Jesus did for the world, namely, that He saved it with His suffering, death, and resurrection, we will with love and faith try our best so that the "Venture of Faith" becomes a "Victory of Faith."

But they progressed satisfactorily so that they could be baptized now before they became parted. One is reminded of the jailer at Philippi, whom Paul baptized in the night in prison, and one thinks of the work of many chaplains in prisons with the inmates of prisons. Freedom of the soul through the forgiveness of sin can be gotten even in prison while the body is not free.

Sidney, Nebr. - On January 13

eleven Deaf gathered here for a service by Pastor Clark Bailey of Denver. It was the first service for Deaf here. There are about twentyfive Deaf in the vicinity of Sidney, and fine interest was shown by them, for they invited Rev. Bailey to come again. Thus one place after another is added to the list of cities blessed with the Gospel brought the Deaf through our church. May the group at Sidney appreciate and benefit from these services.

Memphis, Tenn. — Rev. Victor Brugge, who has been a wonderful helper to the Deaf of Memphis, at the time of this writing lay very seriously ill at the hospital. For over nine hours the doctors worked over him at the operating table. A series of operations had to be performed, all serious, and about three fourths of his stomach was removed. He had been working de-

spite his physical handicap, until he had to undergo this operation. May God restore him again. He is pastor of Trinity Congregation, in whose parish house the Deaf congregation has its fine chapel.

Newark, N. J. - St. Matthew's Deaf Lutheran Church on January 29 in a special service of thanksgiving praised God for the privilege of having had services for twenty vears. Pastor C. Roland Gerhold. their minister, untiringly works so that no Deaf person in that area can on Judgment Day say to the Judge Eternal that he had no chance to learn the way to heaven. It is true: while many people, Deaf and hearing folks alike, think very little about hearing God's Word and accepting Jesus as their own personal Savior, they will one day wish they had done so, when the only One who can successfully save them from everlasting death, Jesus, will have to say, "My salvation you did not want; your own righteousness does not help you; depart from Me!" Let us use God's Word and believe, and thank God for the chance to hear it often. May God bless Newark's St. Matthew's!

St. Louis. - Holy Cross has lost its parsonage. The state of Missouri bought it for \$16,550, as it stands in the way of the Daniel Boone Expressway, which is being built through St. Louis. Pastor Reinking must vacate by July 1 of this year. No site for a new parsonage and chapel has been found at the time of this writing. - When Vicar Robert R. Rasch. now at Jacksonville, Fla., was married at Luther Memorial Church, St. Louis, on January 4, Pastor Reinking interpreted the service for the Deaf. Mr. Rasch had helped Rev. Reinking for a year at

Holy Cross, and many Deaf witnessed the ceremony, in which he and Miss Ina Aline, the daughter of Capt. and Mrs. Wayne Lockhart, were united in holy wedlock. -Rev. Reinking was guest speaker February 4 to 9 at Grace Church, Minneapolis, Rev. C. C. Bremer, pastor, and reports a wonderful success there during the Evangelization Week. The attendance of the Deaf grew every evening; and on the final night there were 51 present. This was in Minneapolis; and at Calvary in St. Paul, where Rev. L. M. Stacy of Des Moines was guest speaker for the host pastor, Rev. G. R. Kraus, in the same week, a very fine series of meetings was enjoyed.

Miami, Fla. - At the beginning of 1955 the classes instructed at Saint Augustine had fifteen children; the year closed with 80 on the roll. Pastor Gyle of Miami and Vicar Rasch of Jacksonville instructed these classes. - Pastor Gyle writes that the Miami group, which is working and saving to gather funds for its own chapel, has over \$1,000 saved up, doubling its savings in 1955.-Pastor Gyle, who hails from California, reported that three of his relatives passed on during the year, one of these being his father. While one regrets the passing of loved ones, Christians always know and realize that God's hand governs cur lives, and when He calls some loved one, the Christian finds comfort in the thought that the Lord's ways are always good and wise.

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Studies in Luther's Catechism CHRISTIAN QUESTIONS WITH THEIR ANSWERS

Questions 1-6

Following the Table of Duties in our Catechism you will find "Christian Questions with Their Answers. Drawn Up by Dr. Martin Luther for Those Who Intend to Go to the Sacrament." What a blessing if everyone would read and study these questions before going to the Lord's Table! Paul says: "Let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup." 1 Corinthians 11:28. Our Catechism therefore adds these words at the close: "These questions and answers are no child's play, but are drawn up with great earnestness of purpose by the venerable and pious Dr. Luther for both young and old. Let each one take heed and likewise consider it a serious matter." Therefore before we go to the Holy Supper, let us prayerfully ask ourselves these questions.

. To Know Our Sin Is Most Necessary

The first question therefore reads: "Do you believe that you are a sinner?" If you do not believe that you are a sinner, then you will not see the need of Jesus and also no need of the Lord's Supper. The Holy Supper will be a blessing to you only if you can say: "Yes, I believe it; I am a sinner." "How do you know this?" is the next question. And the answer given is: "From the Ten Commandments; these I have not kept." Study the Ten Commandments, and you will learn that God's Word is true when it says: "By the Law is the knowledge of sin." Romans 3: 20. The Ten Commandments are like a mirror unto us.

With Sorrow for Sin Go to the Holy Supper

People who say: "Sin is only a little mistake. God is like a good and kind Father who will overlook these little mistakes," these are not prepared to come to the Sacrament. Only those who are sorry for their sin are well prepared. The third question therefore is: "Are you also sorry for your sins?" Blessed are you if you can answer: "Yes, I am sorry that I have sinned against God." Great sorrow must fill our hearts, for we daily sin much. And our God is "not a God that has pleasure in wickedness." Psalm 5:4. Therefore this question: "What have you deserved of God by your sins?" Our Catechism gives us this answer: "His wrath (anger) and displeasure, temporal (bodily) death and eternal damnation." Many laugh at the idea of an angry God and punishment in hell. But here is what God says: "Cursed is everyone that continueth not in all things which are written in the Book of the Law, to do them," Galatians 3:10. Therefore a poor sinner must say: "I am lost."

The Book of Esther

At first glance one might think that the Book of Esther is just an interesting story telling how God defeated a wicked plot that would have destroyed the Jewish nation. Its importance becomes clearer when we remember what this destruction would have meant.

Esther was a beautiful Jewish girl who became the queen of Ahasuerus, who is known as Xerxes of Persia and who ruled 485—465 B. C. This was the king who tried to conquer the Greeks but was not able to do so.

Esther, the Jewess, became queen when Queen Vashti fell into disfavor. Esther did not let it be known that she was Jewish. She was the cousin of Mordecai, a respected man at the palace, who had saved the king's life from assassins but had not been rewarded.

Haman was an ambitious man who was made chief of all the princes. Mordecai refused to honor him, and Haman then planned to kill Mordecai and all Jews, casting lots to pick the day of slaughter. Mordecai urged Esther to ask the king for mercy and to stop Haman. She did, and the Jews were saved, and Haman was punished.

Since that time Jews celebrate the Feast of Purim, meaning lots, because Haman had cast lots to pick the day for the killing of all Jews. Esther's stepson Artaxerxes became king after Xerxes and gave Nehemiah permission to go to Jerusalem and to rebuild the walls and city.

If the Jews had been destroyed, there would have been, humanly speaking, a different course of history. But that the nation be not destroyed so that Jesus could come, therefore they were preserved. And Esther has become a heroine, being the instrument through which God foiled the wicked plan of Haman and protected the people.

The book was read every year at the Feast of Purim in the early part of March.
