The 1957 meeting of Ephphatha Conference will be held at Concordia Teachers College, River Forest, Ill., July 5—9.

The Eastern Deaf Retreat will be at Pocono Pines, Pa., June 7—9. Details from pastors. Theme: "Be Strong in the Lord."

The Montana Lutheran Deaf Lay Conference will meet June 23 at Billings, Mont.

The Northwest Laymen's Conference will meet at Lutherland, near Tacoma, July 19 to 21. Theme: "Fishers of Men." Speaker: Rev. A. J. Jonas.

NOTE: The Dixie Deaf Lutheran Conference was held May 11 and 12 at Oklahoma City with "Witnessing" as its theme; and the Great Lakes Regional Conference was held in Chicago also in May. Reports from these meetings should be forthcoming soon.

Our Synod has many requests from small congregations for church extension loans which these churches repay as time goes on. One little church is our Bethel Church in Denver, just organized, as an item in "Field Gleanings" sets forth. There is need for a parsonage. A loan of \$6,000 for down payment would get such a parsonage. These few Deaf cannot swing such a deal; but there may be among our reading Deaf and hearing people some who are able to loan money in any amount to the Church Extension Fund of Synod; and if the loans are earmarked for Bethel Deaf Parsonage in Denver, they will go to that place, and the need in Denver will be met. A service is always held in connection with this annual gathering, which usually attracts more Deaf than any other local event. — Our energetic San Francisco pastor, Rev. Theo. DeLaney, had a month's enforced "vacation" that was neither a vacation nor a picnic;

for he was stricken by an unknown malady which ran his fever to 104 degrees and was later suspected to have been pericarditis. Twice he spent periods at the hospital. He has been ordered to go on a reduced work load for some time. Dr. Gaertner took over a number of the preaching assignments and other tasks during the siege and was kept very busy. - On March 22, as Pastor DeLaney was conducting the funeral service for William H. Tripp, an old-time San Francisco member, the first of two strong earthquakes shook the city during the singing of a hymn. During the address, as he was calling attention to the lessons that had been read, and showed that a Christian has nothing to fear even if quakes and death threaten, another shock came, causing excitement among the hearing, but the Deaf remained calm. This incident caused considerable comment among the Deaf and hearing and brought home to many the reality of God's comforting presence in danger. It Happened Behind the Bamboo Curtain

Three Chinese men were arrested for witnessing of Christ. They were asked to stop it or be punished. They said: "We cannot deny the Lord Jesus Christ. He was willing to die for us on Calvary, and if it is necessary, we are willing to die for Him!"

They were tied by the thumbs and hung on a pole. The tips of their toes barely touched the ground, and there they hung as the agonizing hours went by. When the first day was ended, their tormentors came and asked, "Are you willing to recant now? Will you turn your back on Christ now? He hasn't saved you! You had better save yourselves." They all answered, "No!"

At the ending of the third day, one of the Chinese relented. He called for his captors. "Cut me down," he cried. "I will no longer be a Christian. I will be a Communist!" They cut him down. He was released. When he arrived home, he was greeted with joy until he made known why they had released him. His fellow Christians seemed stunned to think that he would deny Christ. His own family was astonished that he could leave his companions to bear the cross.

The man could not sleep that night. He could only think of the two hanging by their thumbs while he lay in the comfort and security of his bed. By morning he was wild with shame and grief. He hurried back to jail. He begged the Communists to hang him up with his companions. "I cannot deny Christ! I must be a Christian."

Now the jailers were astonished. They were so overwhelmed that they released all three of these Chinese. The three, knowing that their lives had been spared for a purpose, began preaching with a zeal they had never had before.

How about you, Christian? Are you ready to suffer and die for your dear Savior Jesus if necessary? You say, "Of course!" Well, if you are ready to make this *greatest* sacrifice, why are you not now making all the *little* sacrifices? Are you now sacrificing time, talent, and wealth for the Savior's kingdom work?

The Song of Solomon

This short book is also known as the Song of Songs, and King Solomon is given as the author and has always been accepted as its author. It is a song of love, and many opinions have been expressed about its meaning and purpose. The Hebrews read this book every year at the time of the Passover, and it has always been regarded a sacred book.

To us people of the Western world it may appear to be a somewhat strange book, but to those of the Eastern, or Oriental, world it did not appear so strange, for it breathes the grandeur of a king's palace. Its language is very choice and, in its original Hebrew language, beautiful and delicate. It has been called a drama of love in which different speakers and ladies of a chorus are heard. The joys and sorrows and hopes and disappointments of true love are expressed.

"Unto the pure all things are pure"; and in that spirit must this book be read and understood. Solomon and his beloved one are types of Christ and His bride, the church. The intimate relation between Christ and His church, as St. Paul speaks about it in Ephesians 5:23-32 and compares it with the relationship between husband and wife, is in the Bible often mentioned under the picture of a bride and her bridegroom, or a wife and her husband, even as turning away from Christ and His church is called adultery. In Hosea 2:19 God speaks to His people: "I will betroth [be engaged] thee unto Me forever; yea, I will betroth thee unto Me in righteousness and in judgment and in lovingkindness and in mercies. I will even betroth thee unto Me in faithfulness; and thou shalt know the Lord."

So we have here the longing of the Christian for his Savior, and the vow of faithfulness and love of Jesus for His church. John the Baptist, John 3:29 and 30, looked upon Jesus in that light: "He that hath the bride is the Bridegroom; but the friend of the Bridegroom, which standeth and heareth Him, rejoiceth greatly because of the Bridegroom's voice; this my joy is fulfilled. He must increase, but I must decrease." And Jesus, too, in Matthew 9:15 calls Himself the Bridegroom. When we have this understanding of the book. it will become unto us a solemn, sacred book and not a love story.

Growing to Mature Manhood Spiritually. Jesus, who became humble unto death and then was exalted, brought as a blessing of His victory gifts which He gives to His faithful followers. Mentioned are apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, teachers; His blessings made them such. And they are given that through their teaching the members of His body grow to manhood and get sense and understanding, so that the whole body develops. Let us not be like uncertain learners who are not sure of their faith, but through study of God's Word become firm and understanding Christians. Lord, let us grow in grace. Amen.

Wednesday, June 19

Read Ephesians 4:17-24

The Old and the New Man. The "old man" is the wicked heart that would like to follow the ways of the wicked, blind world; against this internal wickedness we must fight and put it off by daily repentance. On the other hand we daily should put on the "new man," created in righteousness, and try to live holy. This is a hard fight with many defeats; but it is a fight that must go on and will result in steady growth and greater victories through the power of the Holy Spirit. O Holy Spirit, strengthen us in our daily struggle with sin. Amen.

Thursday, June 20

Read Ephesians 4:25-32

Christian Living. The Christian life shows itself in truthfulness; and if we must be angry on account of and against wrong, still we should not sin by going too far; make peace before night; fight the devil; do not steal but give liberally to the needy; do not speak evil and worthless things but speak helpfully; grieve not the Spirit; don't be bitter but kind. These are all necessary reminders, for often we forget these things. How weak we are! O Holy Spirit, You come through God's Word; make me love it and study it so that I may grow in Christian living daily. Amen.

Friday, June 21

Read Ephesians 5:1-10

Children of Light. In our thoughts we connect evil with darkness and light with holiness. God is Light and Love; and so we are to walk in love as children of light. Paul mentions the sins of uncleanness done in darkness and hidden places but which God sees and strongly condemns, and he says that such persons have no inheritance in the kingdom of Christ. Yield not to temptation but rather reprove and condemn them that do such things. Instead let us do what God wants us to do. O Lord, forgive our many sins and grant us grace to walk Your ways. Amen.

Saturday, June 22

Read Ephesians 5:11-21

Understanding the Will of God. To reprove and condemn the works of darkness done in secret we must have the light and an enlightened understanding, which comes only through Christ. Then we can live wisely, make the best use of our time, avoid drunkenness and be Spirit-filled, thinking of and speaking about God's Word, being thankful for all things, and living peacefully with others. "Christ liveth in me," said Paul at another place. O Savior, give me Your spirit of kindliness and love. Amen. June 23 First Sunday After Trinity Read 1 John 4:16-21

Love. Love is the feeling of kindliness towards somebody. God not only is a loving God, but He *is* Love. And God wants His children to be loving people, people that love Him first and also love others, even the enemies. If a person says that he loves God while he loves only himself and not the neighbor, he shows thereby that the love of God is not in him. O God, help us to show our love to You by hearing and doing Your will and loving others as ourselves. Amen.

Monday, June 24

Read Ephesians 5:22-24

Christ's Church, a Pattern for the Wife. Christ's church, the true believers of all time, is called Christ's bride, whom He loves, makes beautiful with the jewels of salvation and holiness, and rules with love. And the church loves and respects and obeys Christ, her Lord. So a man chooses a wife, loves, honors, and respects her, while she returns her love to him and willingly serves him in Christian obedience. That is the right Christian view of a wife's position: but Christian wives alone see that. When this order is changed, disorder and unhappiness will be the result, as sin always brings unhappiness. O Lord, let a wife see and understand her position and love You and her husband. Amen.

Tuesday, June 25

Read Ephesians 5:25-33

Christ, a Model for the Husband. Christ loved the church and gave Himself for it and made it beautiful, rich and glorious. It was all done for love and with love. So a husband should let love be the underlying and overshadowing thing in his life and relationship with the wife. Then he will carry her, lead her in a wise and kindly way, support and protect her, cling to her for life, and remember and respect his promises to her. Only a Christian husband fully understands that. When men forget Christ, then they will easily forget their duty toward their wives, and unhappiness for both and the children will result. O God, You instituted holy matrimony, preserve it by having people respect Your will. Amen.

Wednesday, June 26

Read Ephesians 6:1-4

Christian Home Life. Children, obey and respect your parents, for they are God's representatives to you. Parents, under the special leadership of the father, bring them up as Christians; don't cause them to become set against you and God. This is the prevention and cure of juvenile delinquency; and because people consider this old-fashioned, we have juvenile delinquency. Father in heaven, make parents wise and children obedient. Amen.

Thursday, June 27 Read Ephesians 6:5-9

Labor and Capital. The servants were slaves in those days, but Paul here does not talk to the servants as slaves, but to slaves as servants, and his statements hold good today. Be obedient, follow instructions, don't be two-faced, and know that as Christian servants you do your work to God. And you bosses, remember to be fair; don't exploit your help; you, too, have a Lord, up there, who is over you, and you must answer to Him. This is the solution of the labor-capital problem. On part of labor, honest work; on part of capital, fair sharing. Lord, let Your mind be in all laborers and in the employers. Amen.

Friday, June 28

Read Ephesians 6:10-17

Christian Warfare. Christians have as enemies the unseen spirits of hell that work also through humans as their instruments. Against them only spiritual weapons are good. But we have such; the Holy Scriptures, properly applied, protect the Christian completely and furnish him weapons that never fail. To use them means victory; to disregard them means defeat. Let us get to know our weapons by reading, studying, and using the Word of God and thus becoming expert in handling the weapons. Lord, let us never forget how dangerous our enemies are, the devil, world, and our evil heart: grant us the victory over these enemies through the use and application of Your holy Word. Amen.

Saturday, June 29

Read Ephesians 6:18-24

Christian Prayer Life. Prayer is the telephone line to God. We can always get Him by prayer telephone, the line is never busy. The answer is always there right away. So let us pray. Pray for the ministers who bring you the message of salvation, and for all believers and all people; all have need of our prayer support. Note the last verse and remember, if you love the Lord Jesus in sincerity, Paul prayed also for you. Lord, thank You for having given Paul to the church, and for having given us the Epistle to the Ephesians. Amen.

June 30

Second Sunday After Trinity

Read 1 John 3:13-18

True Love Shares Things. The world does not love those who are different from it. So to love one who does not love vou is foolishness in the opinion of the world. But a true Christian does not despise those who do not love him, but rather pities them and tries with kindness to overcome their unloveliness. Hate in the heart is murder before God. And true love will share goods and money with the needy and will do so for God's sake and not to get praise from man for it. Lord Jesus, You gave all to us by giving up all for us, give us Your mind that we may love God and our fellow man. Amen.
