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The Cover

Two of the sayings of Jesus make up the cover for this month. Both are a part of our Lord's teaching about prayer.

These two sayings make one thing very clear. Jesus wants our faith to be a source of joy and comfort. "In the day of trouble . . . I will deliver thee." "Ask . . . that your joy may be full."

There are probably many Christians who have not yet learned the real joy of faith. These are the people whose religion is written in the form of "Do not do this. . . . Do not do that." Religion means duty, obligation, responsibility, keeping commandments.

Now it is certainly true that Christians have a duty and obligation, both to God and to each other. But it was not meant to be an unhappy obligation. A Boy Scout does not consider it a dull duty to pledge allegiance to the flag. A soldier does not consider a salute to the President as an unwelcome intrusion on his freedom. Christians who allow their faith to become a burden or a drudgery are missing the whole point to it. Christianity is not a fence around our behavior. It is a gate and a road which guides our behavior and our life and our hope in the direction which it ought to take.

Why do you go to church? Do you go because it is your duty? Do you want to satisfy your conscience, so you do not have to feel guilty for staying home? Or do you go to church because you want to go, because you enjoy church and like to worship God with your fellow Christians? Your answer to these questions may show to what extent you have made your religion a burden for yourself or to what extent you have found the joy of Christian freedom in service to God.

When people find that their religion is a burden to them, their first impulse is to blame their religion. If they do not enjoy church, they say the sermon is dull or the service is not interesting. The truth is, when our church and faith become dull and meaningless to us, it is not something that is wrong with our church or our faith. There is something wrong with ourselves. We are in real spiritual trouble, and that is when we should call upon Jesus for His deliverance.

In this tug of war between duty and freedom. Jesus comes to us with the firm promise that the end result should lead us to glorify Him and to find fullness of joy. Jesus suffered and died on the cross to make it possible for Christians to become free to do their duty with patience and joy. He has made possible a whole new outlook on life, in which we look at our religion not as a duty that we must perform but as an opportunity to serve God and one another as best we can, by the help of God the Holy Ghost. "Serve the Lord with gladness" still says "serve," but not with a sour "have to" attitude. The service is done with gladness because the faith itself is a source of comfort and joy.

If your religion lacks joy, and if your faith seems to be more duty than opportunity, then "Call upon Jesus," "Ask, and ye shall receive."

Jesus will deliver you from your troubles and give you the kind of faith that leads to fulness of joy. That is the way Jesus wants it.

Pray that God will guard and keep us from temptations of easy money which may lead us to betray our faith and our Lord. May God give us the wisdom to weigh all our acts carefully, so that what we do will bring glory to God, not shame upon ourselves. Certainly let us pray that God will give us the courage to face life, regardless how bad our troubles may seem, and never take our life into our own hands by killing ourselves. "Thou shalt not kill" means that we should never take a human life, not even our own.

Twenty-fifth Anniversary

When Pastor Possehl accepted a call to St. Paul, Minn., Rev. C. Roland Gerhold became pastor of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church for the Deaf in Newark, where he has remained for the past ten years.

Honored guests at the banquet included charter members of Saint Matthew's congregation: Mrs. Mabel Felts, Miss Ruth Kievit, and Messrs. Oscar Rehling and Clarence Schaumberg. Also an honored guest was Mrs. Lydia Boll, widow of Pastor Boll.
