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## Notes from the Executive Secretary

### **Texas Expansion Delayed**

Some of you may remember that a few months ago it was announced in this column that our Board had decided to divide the Texas-Oklahoma field and make a new headquarters in Austin and Dallas. We had hoped to make this division this month by placing in Dallas a candidate from the seminary. However, vou will see from last month's news that we received only two candidates instead of the three that we had requested, and so we were not able to place a candidate in Dallas. This does not mean the Board has changed its mind about dividing the Texas field. This division will only have to be delayed for a period of months until arrangements can be made to call a pastor to Texas. For the time being a vicar, James Bengelsdorf, will live in Dallas and begin to have more Lutheran activity for the deaf in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, along with handling the Oklahoma part of the field. We pray God to grant us a man soon for this needed new field in Texas.

# Ordination and Installation of Seminary Graduates

Candidate Donald Leber, a graduate of Concordia Seminary, Springfield, Ill., will be ordained to the office of the holy ministry at Saint Matthew's Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Newark, N. J., on Sunday, June 23. He will be installed as pastor of Grace and Peace congregations for the Deaf in Memphis, Tenn., and missionary to the Deaf in the North Dixie field of deaf missions on Sunday, July 14, at Trinity Lutheran Church in Memphis. On that same day Candidate Martin Hewitt, graduate of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, will be ordained and installed as pastor of Christ Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Cleveland, Ohio, and missionary to the deaf in the northern Ohio field, at Christ Church. May God bless these young men and make them a blessing to many others.

## A Challenging Synodical Work Program for 1964

On May 1 and 2 the leaders of Synod and its Districts met in Saint Louis for two days to discuss and finally adopt the Work program for Synod for 1964. The conference finally set the work program at \$36,132,210. During the next months until the end of this year all congregations of Synod, and this includes all our deaf congregations, will discuss this work program and pledge their part of it. In January 1964 all these pledges will be totaled up, and this amount will determine how much of the work program can actually be put into operation in 1964. This is now the second year of the Faith Forward program, and I hope that all our deaf congregations will realize more fully their responsibility and increase their pledges toward Synod's work program. Included in this work program is a total of \$656.521 for the work of our deaf mission. \$225,000 of this amount is for building new churches for the deaf, \$100,000 for a new chapel in South Chicago for Ephphatha Congregation, \$25,000 for a chapel in Indianapolis, Ind., and \$100,000 for the Salvner Educational Building in St. Paul, Minn. These projects can be built only if the money is available, and the total amount of money

will be available only if the congregations of Synod pledge to support the total \$36 million Work program. In the months ahead I entrust that every congregation of our mission will be thoroughly discussing its participation in the work program of Synod. It is my hope and prayer that each congregation will do its very best and more for the Lord in the expansion of His church.

#### A Visit to the Midwest

On Monday, April 22, I left the St. Louis airport on a TWA jet and 30 minutes later landed in a very hot and humid Kansas City, where our energetic missionary, the Rev. A. E. Ferber, met me. A few hours later the temperature rapidly cooled off, but the reception everywhere was warm. It was interesting to observe the classwork being done by Pastor Ferber at the Kansas School for the Deaf in Olathe. While there I had the pleasant opportunity for a lengthy visit with Mr. Parks, a very able principal of the school. It was encouraging to hear his fine words of commendation regarding our Lutheran program at the school. What a fine group of young people we have at the Kansas School! Eagerly they meet to study the Word of God, not only every Monday but also every Sunday morning at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Olathe, Kans., where our Rev. Warren Naegele is the pastor. The members of Redeemer Lutheran Church provide transportation for the children to and from Sunday school each Sunday morning. After the classes at the Kansas School we hurried back to Kansas City on time for a delicious potluck supper at Pilgrim Lutheran Church for the Deaf.

Afterward it was my privilege to show the slides both of the deaf in the Orient and of the work that we are doing in the United States and Canada. The next day Pastor Ferber and I boarded the train for Topeka, Kans., where we had the privilege of attending the second day of the Kansas District Pastoral Conference. That evening I presented my slide lecture for our deaf members at Olathe. Afterward Pastor Ferber and I parted company: He went on to Herington, Kans., and I back to Kansas City to catch a flight for Des Moines the next morning. Rev. Bailey met me at the airport, and the first thing on our agenda was to attend the LWML zone rally in Des Moines with a group of ladies from Calvary Lutheran Church for the Deaf. That evening I presented my slide lecture to a very fine group of interested members from Calvary Congregation. I had not been in Des Moines for some years, and so it was pleasant getting reacquainted once again. The next evening took us to Fort Dodge, Iowa, for my presentation of the slide lecture to that congregation. Here I had the chance of meeting many new friends.

On Friday morning I left by plane for Omaha, Nebr., to spend the weekend there with Pastor Mappes and Pastor Graef. Arrangements had been made by the pastor for stewardship workshops in Omaha on Friday evening, in Lincoln on Saturday, and in Sioux City on Sunday afternoon. Before each of these workshops I had the opportunity of presenting my slide lecture, and then we sat down to discuss the program of Synod and our participation in the program as mem-

Missouri Synod. The interest and the response of the people in all the congregations was very gratifying. I was especially pleased that in every one of the congregations that I visited on this trip a collection was gathered after my slide presentation as a gift to our deaf mission in Hong Kong. This money is certainly welcome over there and will be put to good use in the development of our mission program. In Omaha I was also thrilled to see the fine Sunday school program under way for the children from the Nebraska School for the Deaf who are transported to Bethlehem Church each Sunday morning. When a full-time pastor was called to Pittsburgh as a resident missionary in 1945, members of Trinity Congregation took courage, and with prayer and dedication they struggled on toward their goal. Another chapel fund was started.

In January 1962 the fund had grown to an amount large enough to purchase land. The lot purchased is just half a block from the Western

#### **Dedication Ceremonies**

Approximately 600 people crowded into the new Trinity Church for dedication day services. Rev. William F. Reinking, Executive Secretary of the Board for Missions to the Deaf, preached the dedication sermon in the morning service. Rev. George Kraus, pastor of St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Brooklyn and missionary to the Deaf for 12 years, was the speaker for the afternoon service of thanksgiving. Rev. Harry Hoemann, missionary to the Deaf in Washington, D. C., and former pastor of Trinity, assisted Pastor Wagenknecht with the liturgy.

#### The Church Building

The church was designed especially for the Deaf by Wallace V. Moll of Niagara Falls, N. Y. The nave of the church seats approximately 90 in pews, with an overflow seating of 130. The fellowship hall in the basement seats about 100.

Also included in the building are pastor's study, a sacristy, the kitchen, storage rooms, and restrooms. The interior furnishings of the church are of mahogany stained very light blue. The total cost of the structure complete with furnishings was about \$34,000. This low cost was made possible by general contractor Clyde Bachmann. A "hearing" man, Mr. Bachmann belongs to a Lutheran congregation in the Pittsburgh area, where he takes a very active part in the church's work. He sacrificed his profit for the love of God's kingdom among the Deaf.

The members of the congregation were not idle "sidewalk superintendents." They participated actively in the building of the church. James Paul deserves special recognition for building the ladies' beautiful birch cabinets in the kitchen. Mr. Paul took upon himself the work and worry connected with

a custom installation. At the present time members of the congregation are busy landscaping the church lawn. The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, through the Board for Missions to the Deaf, gave Trinity Congregation \$25,000. The LWML,

Eastern District, made a grant of \$4,000 to be used for interior furnishings. Other funds were gathered from sister congregations and from the Deaf themselves.

### The Church Activities

Trinity has a very active ladies' aid and men's club. The ladies have sponsored several projects throughout the years for the new church. The largest single project was probably the fall bazaar two years ago, when \$600 was gathered for the building fund. The men are actively engaged in the Lutheran dartball league in Pittsburgh and gained the final playoffs in their first year in the league. The newest organization, a result of the new church, is the choir. Many of the young people at the school for the Deaf are active in this area of service to the Lord. The ladies also enjoy offering praise to God through singing in the choir

and are ordering their own robes. An altar guild has also been organized for the care of the chancel furnishings and Communion vessels.

#### **Mission Outreach**

Pastor Wagenknecht serves the Deaf in western Pennsylvania: Greensburg, Beaver Falls, Franklin-Oil City, and Erie. He also extends services to the Deaf in Warren, Ohio, and Youngstown, Ohio. These mission stations receive services once a month. Although smaller in membership than the Pittsburgh congregation, they still receive God's Word and sacraments. They participate in prayer and praise to their Creator and Redeemer. Some of the mission stations enjoy a fellowship hour after church services. Almost all the mission stations supported the new Pittsburgh chapel with a special memorial gift.

## The Task

The primary function of Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf and its mission stations is not boasting over statistics, not planning dinners and meetings, sales and socials. The
