The Cover

The cover for this issue of the DEAF LUTHERAN is meant to show a double relationship between the infant Christ and His virgin mother.

There is first of all the close and intimate tie of mother and son, reflected in the fond gaze of Mary on her firstborn and her proud display of the son whom she has brought into the world.

In contrast there is the distance of eternity between the two as the infant Christ ponders with serious intent His unique position in the world. And the faint suggestion of three crosses in the background is part of the reality of His world.

Little does Mary know just what form the sword will take to pierce her soul. Perhaps in His state of humiliation Jesus also allowed His infancy to be as vague and disordered as that of every human infant, whose senses are not yet sharpened by experience, whose nervous system is not yet fully developed.

Even though an infant may not understand the nature of a cross and of death, for this Infant they are present even at birth.

Here are portrayed a mother and a son. Both are unique — the mother because she is a virgin, the son because He is the only-begotten Son of God. But there are ways in which they are not unique. Like other mothers, Mary knows both joy and pain in childbirth and in the future of her Child. Like other men, Jesus knows both the traumatic experience of birth and the equally traumatic experience of death.

This is the message of Christmas for every man—that Jesus shared our existence from beginning to end, from first to last. When God was with us, He entered not only our world but our very being, assuming manhood into the Godhead to effect our salvation.

As we adore the infant Christ, may we also see in Him an image of all humanity, a new creation, a new hope. It was for this that He came into the world. It was for this that He was born of the virgin.

The Lord's Prayer

We pray for faith and trust in God so that we may not have to suffer the pains, trials, and troubles of life, nor have to be corrected and brought back from the paths of the danger and darkness of human pride, doubt, and unbelief.

VII. Deliverance and salvation at last. But deliver us from evil. We pray that God will save us from all and every evil, trouble, fear, and sorrow, that at last He will bring us safely home with Him in heaven. Oh, to be free from every evil of body and soul, to be saved and safe in everlasting life and peace.

We can count on these things from God, for He alone is Master and Ruler of the universe. His is the *kingdom*. He alone shapes and guides all the things of this world. With Him all things are possible. Who can stop Him? He has the *power*. And so to Him is all praise and glory always. Amen.

Notes from the Executive Secretary

New Chapel Site for Columbus, Ohio

Property has been purchased for a new chapel for Holy Cross Lutheran Church for the Deaf of Columbus, Ohio. The property is on Morse Road about two blocks west of the Ohio State School for the Deaf. God willing, the chapel should be built in about two years.

St. Louis to Buy New Chapel Site

The Board of Directors of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, at its meeting in September, authorized the Board for Missions to the Deaf to proceed with negotiations to purchase a chapel site at the corner of Pine and Leffingwell, near downtown St. Louis. The area has been cleared of earlier buildings as part of a large urban renewal project in St. Louis. The new chapel site will make for a much more centrally located and easily accessible church for Holy Cross Lutheran Congregation of the Deaf.

Chicago Works on Building Plans

The building committee of Ephphatha Lutheran Church for the Deaf in South Chicago is busily at work developing building plans for the new chapel and educational center to be built on the lot purchased earlier this year at 80th and South Park. If funds are received from the 1964 budget as requested, it is hoped that the building of the chapel can get under way sometime next year.

Rev. Eichmann Takes Over Portland Field Temporarily

Rev Erich Eichmann, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Portland, Oreg., was granted a leave of absence from Trinity Congregation as of Oct. 1, 1963, to work full time in our vacancy in Hope and Salem congregations in Portland and Salem, Oreg. Pastor Eichmann has served as vacancy pastor in the Portland field since the first of July. However, with the school reopening he saw a need for more concentrated work and so asked for a leave of absence to take over the field until a new pastor is installed. Rev. Eichmann served the Portland field as missionary to the deaf from 1924 to 1942.

Ephphatha Conference to Meet in Estes Park

Arrangements have been made with the YMCA Conference Camp in Estes Park to hold Ephphatha Conference there in 1964 from July 7 to 10. The cool mountain climate of Estes Park will be a great change from the hot muggy weather our missionaries experienced during the 10 busy days they spent in Washington, D. C., last summer.

The Call to Hong Kong

You read in the October issue of this magazine that I have accepted the challenging call as counselor for work among the deaf in the Far East with headquarters in Hong Kong. It was not an easy decision to make, but God through His Spirit led me to know that it was His will that I accept the call. Being convinced of this, I look forward to the move to Hong Kong, knowing that there is where the Lord wants me to serve Him and that He will be there to bless our efforts in expanding His kingdom among the more than a quarter-million deaf in that part of the world.

In preparing for this move with our family, there are of course many things to do. By the time you read this we will have received all the necessary immunization shots and should have our passport and visa. We are presently engaged in selling our house and many of our furnishings, since we will be taking only a limited amount of household items to Hong Kong. Our exact departure date has not yet been set, but it should be sometime during the first week of March. The Board for World Missions was kind enough to allow me to take a one-semester course in Chinese at Washington University here in St. Louis, and I have found study of the language very fascinat-

Central Regional Conference Judged Success

Indianapolis, Ind. The Lutheran Beacon, parish paper for the Indiana field, reports that the Central Regional Deaf Lutheran Conference was a huge success in many ways. There were 123 persons registered for the conference, which was held at the Sheraton Lincoln Hotel Sept. 14 and 15. Joe Kindred was master of ceremonies for the Saturday night banquet program, which featured a talk by Executive Secretary William F. Reinking about the deaf of China and Japan. Entertainment was provided by B. Horwitz, N. Harwicke, "Stephanie & Ronnie," A. Arneson, and B. Smith.

Sunday morning, 157 people came to the service with Holy Communion at Trinity Lutheran Chruch. The service was conducted by Pastor D. Pokorny, with Rev. William Reinking delivering the sermon and student R. Johnson serving as lay leader. Diane Thaler, Gloria Reeves, and Donna Vorhies sang under the direction of D. Sellers.

Three essays were presented under the title "Growing Together in Christ." The *Beacon* reports: "All who attended said they had a wonderful experience and went home joyful and thankful for the Conference."

Different Approach to Teaching Sign Language

Indianapolis, Ind. For the first time an Indianapolis sign language class conducted by Pastor Daniel Pokorny was held four nights a week for three consecutive weeks.

In past years the classes had been taught on one night a week for four or five months. The different approach was made with the hope that such a "crash program" would overcome the tendency of students to forget many signs during the week when classes are held weekly. Pastor Pokorny also felt that members of the class would find the experience more enjoyable, because nightly classes would make it possible for them to learn much more quickly.

Pastor Pokorny conducts classes in sign language also for students at Concordia Senior College in Fort Wayne, Ind. Over 20 students came out for the first session this fall.

Interested in Sign Language Instruction

Washington, D. C. Louie Fant, assistant professor of education at Gallaudet College, is interested in various methods of teaching sign language used by individuals who serve the deaf and who offer instruction in the language of signs to deaf or hearing people.

Mr. Fant has already assembled a small collection of manuals and syllabi. He would appreciate hearing from those who are conducting sign language courses in Lutheran mission fields.

Mr. Fant has expressed a willingness to open his library to anyone who would like to study his collection of materials when in the Washington area.

DeLaney Speaks at Conference

St. Louis, Mo. Rev. Theodore De-Laney, archivist for the Lutheran deaf mission program, spoke on the "Necessity of Developing and Sustaining Interest in History" at the seventh Archivists' and Historians' Conference, sponsored by Concordia Historical Institute Oct. 15—17 in St. Louis.

The program centered in seven essays and a panel discussion on the mechanics of historical research and patterns within the Lutheran Church.

Stamps for Missions

Washington, D.C. Used postage stamps can help raise money for missions. Two kinds of stamps are collected by Stamps for Missions: commemorative stamps (the large stamps with pictures on them) and high-denomination stamps (6 cents or more). Many congregations already save postage stamps for mission projects and send them to Saint Louis when they have collected a large quantity. During the first six months of 1963, Stamps for Missions was able to buy \$4,500 worth of Church Extension Fund bonds with proceeds from its sale of canceled postage stamps.

With the Christmas season ahead, many people will be receiving usable canceled stamps on cards and

letters. Each congregation in our deaf mission fields can help with this project by appointing someone to collect these stamps until after the first of January and to send them to Stamps for Missions. The stamps should not be removed from the envelope. They should be cut from it, leaving a ¹/₄-inch margin of paper around the stamp if possible. It is very likely that also a hearing congregation in the area saves stamps for missions. Perhaps stamps gathered from deaf congregations and preaching stations can be turned over to the Stamps for Missions secretary of a local congregation.
