The Shepherd of God's People – Our Pastor –

Part 3

Pastor at Work

Throughout the history of time God has been the Shield, the Defender, the Shepherd of His people. As His people grew in number, God appointed men to "feed" and "lead" them. In Old Testament times God chose judges and kings to govern His people, priests to guide their worship, and prophets to teach His Word.

In the New Testament Jesus

called His 12 disciples and sent them into all the world as apostles to gather His people in churches. In turn the apostles instructed leaders for each church to guide His people in the way of truth.

By the Holy Spirit God established the office of the ministry, the pastoral office. He blesses His church with workers to "feed and lead" His people. *He gave us some men to be apostles, some to*

speak the Word, some to tell the good news, some to be pastors and teachers, in order to get His holy people ready to serve as workers and build the body of Christ till all of us get to be one as we believe and know God's Son, reach a mature manhood, and grow to the full height of Christ. (Ephesians 4:11-13 Beck)

In our Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod young men preparing to be pastors spend at least 8 years in study and practical experience. When a young man has completed his preparation, he receives a degree and diploma from his seminary. This diploma declares that he has satisfactorily completed the required courses of study and is qualified to have charge of a Christian congregation or mission field. Even though a young man has qualified to be a pastor, he cannot of his own accord preach and teach publicly. He must wait until he has been called to do so. In our Lutheran deaf missions a congregation together with the Board of Missions calls a man to be the pastor of that congregation and its mission field. The members of the congregation depend on God the Holy Spirit to lead the right man to accept the call to be their pastor.

Daily Preparation

Preaching the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus' love and forgiveness, is a great honor. But it also means great responsibilities. A pastor must continue to study, so that he can carry out his many duties in a God-pleasing manner.

Through the encouragement and teaching of the pastor the Holy Spirit deepens the faith of His people. He strengthens their faith and life through the sacrament of the Lord's Supper

Much time is spent in study, especially the study of the Bible. Study time is also spent with books and magazines on theology, the many teachings of Scripture and the church. The pastor must keep up with what is happening in the religious world, but more anything else he needs than strength and support in his faith. Someone wisely said, "As the battle (with sin and Satan) gets hotter and the enemies' methods of warfare become more refined, the pastor needs greater faith, love, wisdom, courage, zeal, patience, and endurance."

Pastoral Acts

The most important work of a pastor is to preach. The very fast and tiring life of our day together with the kind of sinful world in which we live generally make the writing and preaching of a sermon extremely difficult. Yet through the preaching of the Word of God the Holy Spirit leads people to faith and keeps them in the true saving faith. Most of our missionaries to the deaf preach in several cities every week and drive many miles to do so.

Besides conducting the worship service for the congregation, the pastor also administers the sacraments. Baptisms are performed and the Lord's Supper administered by the pastor in the stead of the congregation. He officiates at weddings, and he also conducts funeral services for those who have died in faith.

Pastoral Care

While the service of worship is a very important responsibility, it is only one of the pastor's many tasks. Equally as important, the minister of the Gospel is an overseer, a pastor, a watchman, a man who has been given the responsibility from God to care for souls. He is in duty bound to look after the spiritual welfare of each one of his members. Like Paul the pastor is to teach publicly and from house to house.

It is the most solemn duty of every pastor to visit the sick and the dying, to attend to their spiritual needs. However, members of the congregation should tell the pastor if they know of a sick person in their congregation. It can happen that a pastor does not know that a person is sick and is later criticized for not visiting the sick.

A pastor also visits people who do not belong to any church. The purpose of such visits is to bring them to know and believe in their Savior, Jesus, so that they may become members of His church.

Calls are also made on members who have "given up" going to church to worship God. These members are encouraged to use the means of grace, God's Word and the Lord's Supper, regularly. Through these blessings the Holy Spirit strengthens our faith and life in the world. Much time is used and many miles are driven by our pastors in making calls, but it is a necessary part of their work.

Time is also spent in giving advice and counsel to members with problems. The pastor is always ready to listen, and he kindly helps members to find the answers to their problems. Our missionaries to the deaf are often called upon to interpret in court and for other important occasions.

In Addition

Lutheran missionaries to the deaf attend pastoral conferences.

They attend the conferences of the Lutheran pastors in the city where they live; the conference of the District in which they work; as well as the sessions of Ephphatha Conference, which is held annually for our Lutheran missionaries to the deaf. These conferences help to keep the teachings of our church pure and also help to increase and enrich the pastor's knowledge of God's Word. It is both a duty and a privilege to attend such conferences regularly.

The missionary and pastor to the deaf who has given himself to the Lord's work does not have an 8-hour day, but often a 12- or 16-hour day. He has to be "on call" at all hours of the day and night.

Faithful pastors are mindful of the Lord's admonition through the apostle Paul, Do your best to come before God as one whom He approves, a worker who doesn't have to feel ashamed as he teaches the Word of truth in the right way. (2 Timothy 2:15 Beck)

As your pastor works with you in your congregation, encourage him in his work. Pray for him. Ask God to give him much strength in faith and zeal by His Holy Spirit. Your pastor is as human as you are. Forgive his mistakes as Jesus has forgiven yours. Always give thanks to your heavenly Father that He has blessed your congregation and your church with dedicated pastors. Rev. N. E. BORCHARDT

Notes from the Secretary for Deaf Missions

Dear Friends:

Our Lord has given us His command and work to go into all the world, bring the Good News of forgiveness and hope to all people, preach, teach, baptize, build churches, and continue to make disciples for Jesus. God promised to bless His work with the strength of the Holy Spirit, and He has kept His promise.

In fact, God has opened so many doors for our mission programs and congregations that our church cannot keep up with its task. The cost of the proposed needs of our mission program is too far above the present budget. Last year the mission program was cut back because not enough money was available for missions. This has even cut into the building needs for our deaf missions at home.

Synod's Decision

The DEAF LUTHERAN (Dec. '65) has reported that our church at its June 1965 convention voted to accept a plan to gather a special offering for missions and for improving our colleges and seminaries. Plans for this special offering are taking shape, and it will be called the *Ebenezer Thankoffering*.

Ebenezer Year — 1967

Remember that word — *Eben*ezer (Eb-e-NE-zer)! The word is taken from 1 Samuel 7:12 and is the name of a stone which Samuel set up to praise God for His help given to His people Israel to win a victory. The verse reads:

Samuel took a stone and set it between Mizpah and Shen, and called the name of it **Ebenezer**, saying "Hitherto (up to this time) the Lord has helped us."

Just as Samuel took the stone and set it in a special place to mark a special time of remembrance and thanksgiving to the Lord for all His many blessings of the past, so Dr. Oliver R. Harms, President of our Synod, has proclaimed 1967 as an *Ebenezer Year* for our church. Dr. Harms, speaking for the 1965 synodical convention, urges the 3,000,000 Christians of our Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod to give special thanks to our Lord. *Hitherto the Lord has helped us.*

Deaf Lutherans too

I remind you that our many deaf congregations are also responsible to Jesus' command to go into all the world. Let us be part of the whole church as it goes forward with faith and trust in God and with love for all men!

Let us — each one of us — make a special effort to cooperate with this Ebenezer Thankoffering. The church wants to set aside \$800,000 of this thankoffering for deaf missions, especially to build new chapels for the deaf.

We will be reading and thinking much about the Ebenezer Thankoffering at our regional conferences, in your congregational meetings, and at the pastors' Ephphatha Conference.

Please pray fervently for the success of this thankoffering and give it your wholehearted cooperation.

Messengers for Christ

St. Matthew's "missionaries" have accepted their Christian responsibility to bring Jesus to others and to bring others to Jesus.

The program began on Mission

Sunday, Feb. 6. The morning worship service had as its theme "Discipleship," or how we follow Jesus. It was emphasized that all Christians must be active followers of Jesus.

Instead of preaching a sermon Pastor Louis Jasper talked back and forth in dialog with Vicar Daniel Hodgson. They used a large flip chart to explain how to follow Jesus as His disciple. Vicar Hodgson spoke the central ideas of true discipleship. Pastor Jasper explained these ideas with prac-

tical advice and examples from life and from the Bible.

Only talking about it does not make us followers of Jesus. We must also act. At the end of the dialog four practical steps were explained to show how Christians could use words of faith to beactive faith come more in (1) Choose one person you know who needs Jesus. (2) Pray for that person. (3) Visit that person and invite him to come to church with you. (4) Tell the pastor or vicar about your visits and talk with him about any problems or questions you have.

Each member of St. Matthew's who serves Jesus as His follower is called a *missionary for Christ*. Names of missionaries are divided into groups according to the area where they live. A poster in the church hall lists the names of each mission group, and each group has meetings from time to time to discuss their experiences in visiting and to further study about personal witnessing for Jesus.

An effort is being made to include all members of St. Matthew in this program. Hopefully, each member will actively accept his responsibility to follow Jesus and daily serve his Savior with personal witnessing.

In addition to this mission program of the congregation, the young people's Walther League has also been active in visiting. The youth try to visit all the young people who are often absent from church. If possible, they see these people on the same Sunday they are absent or on the following Monday to encourage them to worship their Savior regularly.

News Notes from the Field

Rev. William Lange was installed as pastor of Bethlehem Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Omaha, Nebr., and missionary to the deaf of the Omaha Field on April 24. Pastor Lange had been serving the Denver, Colo., Field.

Deaf-blind across the country observed the **Anne Sullivan Centennial Commemoration** during the month of April. Miss Anne Sullivan is one of the very few persons in history whose life was one of devoted service to the deafblind. She was the "teacher" of Miss Helen Keller, one of the most outstanding deaf-blind personages of all time.



Our Deaf Sunday School

from September to June. The average enrollment is 30 children. Two taxicabs bring the children from the St. Paul area. The church's Volkswagen bus, two private cars, and one taxicab gather children from across the river in Minneapolis. The cost of this transportation is covered by Sunday school offerings and gifts. When necessary, it is supported by the congregation.

Our teachers use the oral method in the Sunday school. Opening worship follows the order of a hearing Sunday school, with a few changes. After the opening worship with the hearing children, both hearing and deaf children go to their separate classrooms. Classes are made up of 4 to 7 students. Lessons are taken from the Concordia Sunday school series. These lessons are prepared to the grade level of each class and are presented with visual aids.

Students from Concordia College in St. Paul help teach the deaf children. They are dedicated to this challenging task of bringing deaf children to know their Savior. The students develop their own lessons and visual aids with guidance. Their learning to know the deaf and the work of our missions, we feel, will be of benefit to the deaf mission program as these future church workers go into their chosen fields.

The hours and money we have spent to bring the children to the Sunday school each Sunday and to know their families has been worth the effort. Through the Sunday school program more than 20 young deaf became members of Prince of Peace by confirmation. Today, while only 33 percent of our adult members maintain regular church attendance, 75 percent of our young members attend church regularly.

These young deaf have also shown themselves to be active and interested members. Our church ushers are active Junior League members who have been organized by schedule for each Sunday by the head usher, who is a teenager. Our acolytes, who light the candles for each worship service, are chosen from the confirmation class. The girls also help as assistants in the Sunday school and once in a while even substitute for an absent teacher.
