The Most Unexpected Trip of My Life

In this issue Rev. Gerhold completes his article on his part of the survey trip to West Africa to study the needs of the deaf. He concludes his comments with a recommendation to send missionaries to Africa. Continue to pray the Lord of the church to give us those pastors. ED.

Part 3 — Ghana

On Tuesday, Nov. 16, I left Nigeria and arrived in Accra, the capital of Ghana. This nation is located 500 miles west of Nigeria and has a population of 8,000,000 people.

I was met at the airport by Mrs. Dretke, wife of Missionary James Dretke, and her children.

That evening we visited the wife of Dr. Beeta, head of the Department of Theology at the University of Ghana. She knew of 2 deaf children. The houseboy of Rev. Dretke knew of 2 more.

The next day I met with Dr. Pike of the Wycliffe Bible Translators. His group is learning the 56 languages of Ghana and is translating the Bible into these languages. Two workers in his class knew of 4 deaf people.

A Surprise!

That same day Rev. Dretke drove me to Mampong-Akwapim, about 35 miles north of Accra. In this small town I was surprised to find a Teacher Training School for the Deaf — begun only 2 weeks before! We visited a short time there as well as at the Mission School for the Deaf nearby and arranged for a longer visit the next day, Thursday.

Cannot Read or Write

We returned to Accra for the evening, and I visited a night school for adult deaf who could not read or write. The school had been founded by a Rev. Foster, and now it had 3 deaf or hard-ofhearing teachers.

When these adult deaf students were children, Ghana had no schools for them. It was wonderful to see how eager they were to learn to read and write. Their teachers are Christians, and they have taught their students about our Savior Jesus. The teachers told us, however, that they had no Bibles, because Rev. Foster had taken all the books to Nigeria.

A Nursery School

On Thursday we went back to Mampong-Akwapim and again visited the teacher training school. The head teacher, Miss Hewitt from England, asked me to lecture to her class of 12 about the work of the Lutheran Church among the deaf in America. Her class asked many questions.

Then we visited the nursery school that Miss Hewitt had begun about a half mile away. Here 24 deaf boys and girls lived, and learned to lip-read and speak the English language. When they finish their few years here, they will attend the nearby mission school, where they will learn the language of signs and more finger spelling.

The Mission School

The nearby Mission School for the Deaf was the first school that Rev. Foster established in West Africa. Mr. Sam Aiexe and Mr. Seth Ocloo were the head teachers. Both asked me to talk to the 110 students about the Lutheran Church's work with the deaf in America. They understood my American signs and enjoyed the pictures I had with me.

The head teachers told me that Rev. Foster had to leave the school and that the government of Ghana was now supporting it completely. They also said that no pastor was working with them and that they would welcome a pastor to work with the deaf if the Lutheran Church would send one. Mr. Ocloo had contact with the Lutheran Church and Lutheran deaf missions when he trained at Gallaudet College. Mr. Aiexe said that his students had NO Bibles. because Rev. Foster took them back to Nigeria.

When I left, Mr. Ocloo, who himself is deaf, pleaded, *Please* send us a pastor for the deaf.

Deaf Population

Later that day I visited Mr. Adoo, chief rehabilitation officer of the Ministry of Social Welfare. His survey of the deaf in Ghana so far showed 900 deaf children of school age. Mr. Adoo estimated that between 3,000 and 5,000 deaf live in his nation.

More Lectures

The Ghana Society for the Deaf conducted another class of teaching adult deaf to read and write, but I never had another chance to visit it when we returned to Accra.

Instead I talked about the needs of the deaf to 20 Lutherans in three of Rev. Dretke's Bible classes on two nights. I also spoke to 500 young hearing people in high school about the needs of the deaf. Then I left for home, spending three more days in Madrid, Spain, on the way.

Long-Range Program

In my report to the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society I suggested that the Board for Missions of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod begin a long-range program of work among the deaf in West Africa.

Begin in Ghana

In the above paragraphs I explained the need for a Lutheran pastor to work among the deaf in Ghana as a resource man. It is clear that our church can begin work here for two reasons:

1) I met 150 deaf in Ghana and heard of 20 others. This, plus the government's estimate of 5,000 deaf, shows Ghana is a fertile field.

2) Mr. Adoo suggested that our church come to Ghana with two

programs. First, teach the adult deaf to read and write. Second, work with the preschool deaf children and their parents. In both of these areas we could proclaim the love of Jesus.

Begin in Nigeria

In parts 1 and 2 of this article I showed a similar need for a pastor to work among the deaf in Nigeria as a resource man. Our church is already working among the hearing people in this nation with many more pastors than in Ghana. Here our resource man could teach these pastors how to serve the deaf in a nation that has seven times more people than Ghana. Such a pastor could develop the work among the deaf in Nigeria.

Lack of Money

Right now the mission board of our church has no money to send one resource man, much less two. However, our board began longrange planning by calling Rev. Reinking from Hong Kong to be the counselor of all our missions in Africa and the Middle East. Because he has worked with the deaf, we should be thankful that Pastor Reinking accepted this important call.

Two Important Things

1) American deaf have had schools for 151 years and almost

all our deaf can read and write. However, in West Africa the deaf have had schools for *only* 7 years!

2) The Lutheran Church began preaching to the deaf in America 72 years ago. In West Africa the deaf are only beginning to learn about Jesus our Savior. Thousands of deaf do not know Christ!

What Can We Do?

Every Lutheran deaf person should thank God for his school and his church. Then pray that our church will send pastors to the deaf in Ghana and Nigeria.

Let us put our pocketbook or wallet in our prayers by sending our gifts to the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society (LDMS).

Answer the Call!

Can we dare say *no*? Not when we remember the love God had for us when He sent His Son Jesus to pay for our sins and rise from the dead.

Executive Board Meeting

The executive board of the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society met at River Forest, Ill., July 5, during the annual Ephphatha Conference. The board members are the six regional counselors of our Synod's mission to the deaf in North America.

One of the major tasks of the board at this meeting was the rewriting of the society's constitution. When this constitution has been approved by our Synod's legal advisers, the Mission Society will be incorporated.

A new office was added to the constitution to fill the need for a financial secretary. The duties of a financial secretary shall be to receive, record, and deposit all contributions to the society. He shall also send acknowledgments as well as membership cards to donors of \$1.00 or more. Rev. R. G. Blakely was chosen for this office and will begin his duties as financial secretary on Sept. 1.

Another new regulation is the *application for funds* form. In the future this form must be filled out by any person or organization which requests funds from the society. Such a form will give the board all the information they need to approve or reject an application in a businesslike way.

New officers for the coming

year: president — Rev. Martin Kosche; vice-president — Rev. George Ring; secretary — Rev. N. E. Borchardt; treasurer — Rev. Rodney Rynearson. These officers will serve until the close of the 1967 Ephphatha Conference. The newly elected counselor, Rev. Louis Jasper, replaces Rev. H. W. Hoemann on the board. The sixth board member is Rev. W. A. Westermann.

The financial picture is this: The society sent Rev. C. Roland Gerhold on a survey trip to Africa at a cost of \$1,082. Receipts of the Pentecost Day effort total \$688 as of July 15. The present balance in the treasury is \$3,724. No action was taken by the board to expend any of the funds in the treasury at this time.

The board suggests that congregations and preaching stations that did not have an offering for LDMS in the spring or did not reach their goal at that time make an effort to reach their goal in the fall.

In other words, let's make our goal \$5,000 in contributions to LDMS in 1966. The board resolved that an annual campaign will be made throughout our mission to support the work of the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society.

+ Mrs. Pauline Gustin + Gives Inner Ear to TBB

Seattle, Wash. Mrs. Pauline Gustin, a member of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Seattle, ever since it was established in 1918, departed this life on Saturday, June 18. Mrs. Gustin was 100.

Mrs. Gustin was born in Chicago and moved to Seattle in 1889. She had been deaf since age 2. Her deafness was caused by a fever.

Mrs. Gustin took an active interest in the affairs of the deaf and was a charter member of the Puget Sound Association of the Deaf. Accordingly, Mrs. Gustin decided to give her middle and inner ear bones to science after her death.

The temporal ear bones were willed to the Temporal Bone Bank center in Chicago, which will study them in their program of finding the causes and treatment of deafness.

Mrs. Gustin is the first Seattle resident — and, we might add,

the first Lutheran known to have donated her temporal ear bones for scientific research.

Mrs. Gustin was well thought of by many. In a devotional book she received on her birthday from a deaf-blind friend this comment was written: Upon this your birthday my thought is of you and of the blessings your life has brought to me and others. It was a glad day for them when you were born. It was a happy day for me when you gave me yourself as a friend.

"Happy are the dead that die in the Lord . . . because they can rest from their labors and their works follow them." (Revelation 14:13)
