Remember My Scars

In the Civil War a general saw one of his officers in deadly combat with the enemy. The officer was losing and would be killed. The general dismounted from his horse to help. In the fight the general's face was slashed by the enemy's sword from eye to chin, but the general killed the enemy and saved his officer's life.

Years later the two men were in opposing political camps, each running for the same office. Both were scheduled to speak on the same pro-



gram. While the older man gave his speech, the younger noticed the scar on the general's cheek. He remembered that day on the battlefield how the general risked his life to save him from the enemy.

When it was his turn to speak, he arose and said, "I had planned to say some mean things against my opponent, but I cannot. I cannot forget the scar."

Jesus does not want us to forget His scars. On Easter evening when the risen Christ appeared to His disciples, He showed them the nail scars on His hands and feet. We must never forget His scars of love which saved us from everlasting death in hell.

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The John of Beverley Chapel, Dallas, Tex.

Ebenezer Project Completed

A wonderful blessing has been given the deaf of Dallas — a chapel they can call their own. The John of Beverley Chapel, built for the special needs of a deaf congregation, was dedicated Nov. 20, 1966.

Ever since the first worship service was conducted for the deaf in March 1932, the deaf have looked forward to this day. Over those seemingly long years the deaf patiently worshiped in various buildings and facilities which were not designed for their needs. They had only limited access to borrowed facilities for worship and fellowship. Because Dallas had no resident pastor working with the deaf, their spiritual life lacked guidance and encouragement in Christian education and service.

The picture has changed. We praise our God who helps us, for on July 26, 1964, Rev. William Duey was installed as the first resident pastor in Dallas.

We praise our God, who has helped us until now. Through His guidance a grant of \$25,000 was drawn in advance from the 1967 Ebenezer Thankoffering for building the new chapel. This allowed the deaf to take advantage of the opportunity to join hands with a hearing congregation, thereby cutting down the cost for operating expenses and finding a church home for their hearing children. We praise our God, who guided Our Redeemer Lutheran Church (hearing) in their decision to relocate and provide larger and better facilities for their growing congregation. Their Christian

love for those living in the "silent world" led them to develop a unique building program which included not only a chapel for the deaf as a part of their congregational life, but also an office for their pastor.

Unique Chapel

The John of Beverley Chapel is unique in its design and function. Built in the shape of a circle, the chapel symbolizes that the church will continue forever.

The chapel has been planned to "show Jesus." As the worshiper enters the chapel, his eye is first

drawn to the "Jesus' hands" cross. In the center of the cross above the altar two large hands have been skillfully fabricated from a flat sheet of copper in modern design to make the sign *Jesus*. In its own way it tells the deaf worship-

The "Jesus' hands" Cross

The cross is the central focal point in the worshiper's view in the John of Beverley Chapel. It is a symbol of the crucified but victorious Christ who gives His people that peace which is above all understanding. (See cover)

The work of art in modern design was sculptured from a copper sheet by Prof. Heri Bert Bartscht of the University of Dallas. ers that this is their chapel, built and furnished for their needs.

The free-standing altar, which has been placed between the pastor and the deaf congregation, allows the worshiper to be totally involved in the worship service.

A rear screen projection unit has been included so that slides, filmstrips, or movies operated by remote control may be used in the worship service. The unit eliminates the need to darken the chapel and has the same viewing effect as a large 6-foot-square television screen.

Lighting in the chapel has been specially designed and placed to prevent shadows so that the deaf may always see the pastor's lips and signs for a more complete understanding of the service.

The Lord Helps Us

The Lord has blessed the deaf of Dallas with their own chapel. He has given it to us for a purpose — that we might "show Jesus" to the estimated 1,000 deaf population of the Greater Dallas area.

The Lord helps us more and more to realize our blessings of pardon and peace which we have through faith in Jesus, His Son. He helps us to hear His command to go and preach His Good News to every person.

We dedicated our new chapel together with our hearts and lives to the building of God's silent kingdom on earth. We gratefully acknowledge His blessings of the past as we continue to seek His grace and strength for the future. REV. WILLIAM E. DUEY

Political Unrest in Macao

Hong Kong Report

In the few years that have quickly passed, the Lord has showered His blessings on our Lutheran Church's work among the deaf of the Far East. These blessings also touched Macao. I especially remember Christmas Day of 1965, when it was my privilege to be visiting there. We all rejoiced as 27 deaf children were baptized on that happy day.

More recently incidents have been happening in Macao which add more burden to the difficult tasks of our church. Riots broke out early in December 1966 as many Chinese citizens showed support for the Red China of Mao Tse-Tung.

Rev. Philip Ho, one of our Lutheran pastors working with the deaf in Hong Kong, reported that several deaf students who usually regularly attend the Evening School for the Deaf in Macao have not been coming to class. Their parents are fearful of letting them go out at night.

In his letter of Jan. 22 Pastor Ho wrote:

I am sorry to tell you that the situation in Macao is still very serious. Last week many people came to live in Hong Kong intending to stay for some time. Only a few people went the opposite way back to Macao. No doubt it will further affect the school attendance.

We do pray earnestly that peace will be restored soon so that the children can go back to school for the study they often enjoy.

I would certainly ask that you remember these deaf in Macao in your daily prayers.

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The National Technical Institute for the Deaf

The new 600-student National Technical Institute for the Deaf (NTID) will be located in Rochester, N. Y., near the Rochester Institute of Technology. The NTID will be the first technical college for the deaf in the United States and is expected to admit its first class in September 1969.

Students in the NTID program will have opportunities to work for degrees in all areas of study now offered by the Rochester Institute of Technology. These include the school's well-known programs in photography, printing, fine arts, applied arts, sciences, and business. Other new programs may also be developed.

The Federal Government is sponsoring NTID through the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The programs of NTID, including room, board, and tuition, are free to deaf students who qualify for admission.

The cost of establishing NTID is estimated at \$12,000,000.

Dr. D. Robert Frisina, dean of the Graduate School at Gallaudet College, Washington, D. C., has been selected to head the new NTID. Dr. Frisina will be responsible for recruitment and training of staff, for the design and coordination of the educational programs, and as an adviser in the construction of facilities.

Lutheran Campus Ministry

Establishing the NTID in Rochester, N. Y., has much significance for our Alpha Lutheran Church of the Deaf. Last year this congregation acquired new facilities by purchasing a church building which seats 150 persons.

These new facilities will give the congregation the headquarters for involving itself with the spiritual needs of NTID's deaf students in a campus-oriented ministry.

The congregation is currently serving the spiritual needs of deaf children at the 250-pupil statesupported school for the deaf in Rochester.

As this story is written, the Rochester Field is vacant, and the congregation is calling a new pastor.

Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf

New York City, N.Y.

The first board meeting of the newly established Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf was held at Kennedy Airport's International Hotel, Jan. 27.

Nine national religious and ser-

vice agencies were represented at the organizational meeting of the Council, which is concerned with the economic and social welfare of the estimated 200,000 to 250,000 deaf now living in the United States.

The primary purpose of the Council is to help eliminate social and economic barriers that prevent the deaf from leading satisfying and successful lives.

In addition the Council will support medical efforts to prevent deafness. It will seek to help the deaf by strengthening and coordinating the services and resources of the Council's member agencies.

The Council will develop ways of financing its work through both voluntary and tax-supported organizations. It will seek funds for special projects from interested organizations and agencies such as the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, which for many years has promoted the development of employment counseling and training programs for the deaf.

Officers elected for the new Council are: *president* for two years, Mervin Garretson (Silver Spring, Md., secretary-treasurer of the National Association of the Deaf); *president-elect*, Edward C. Carney (Beltsville, Md., president of the American Athletic Association of the Deaf); vice-president, Emil S. Ladner (Berkeley, Calif., president of the International Catholic Deaf Association); secretary, Kenneth F. Huff (Delavan, Wis., president of the Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf); and treasurer, Rev. H. W. Rohe (St. Louis, Mo., secretary for deaf missions of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod). Other agencies represented in the Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf, besides the five which we have named together with the officers listed above, are: the Gallaudet College Alumni Association, the National Fraternal Society of the Deaf, the Conference of Church Workers Among the Deaf (Episcopal), and the National Congress of Jewish Deaf.

Stamps for Missions

St. Louis, Mo. Stamps for Missions president Raymond E. Hodges recently reported that sales of cancelled postage stamps amounted to \$7,600 during 1966.

This amount was \$400 above the 1965 total. In addition the Stamps for Missions organization received four "fine stamp collections" which netted more than \$1,000.

The profits are invested in our church's synodical Church Extension Fund. The interest received from this investment pays for the expenses of printing, supplies, and postage.

During 1966 Stamps for Missions allocated \$35,000 for a new seminary in New Guinea and \$1,000 for a school boarding home in Zacapa, Guatemala.
