The baseball season is well under wav. Many of us eagerly watch the games played by our favorite team. As you watch a ball game, have you ever stopped to think about the private lives of the various men on your team? You might be surprised to find that many of the players are dedicated Christians.

Alvin Dark, formerly a star infielder with the Chicago Cubs and now manager of the Kansas City Athletics, was one who lived a Christian life as he rose to na-



tional fame in baseball. He started his dedicated Christian life when he was a newsboy in Lake Charles, La. Even at that early age he was a tither. His weekly earnings were only \$2.50, but he put 25¢ or 10 percent of that into the Sunday school offering plate each Sunday.

As his income increased, so did his offerings, until he was giving several thousand dollars each year for the support of the Gospel ministry. About this lifelong habit Alvin Dark said, "I was

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taught that tithing would not bring me riches, but that it would bring His blessings. I found that to be true."

The tithe is a simple formula: set aside 10 percent of your income for God to use through His church.

Both Abraham and Jacob were tithers even before God made it a law for His people Israel. Paul says that Abraham is the spiritual father of all of us because he believed in Jesus for the forgiveness of sins. (Romans 4:11)

While tithing is no longer required for us New Testament Christians, it is a guide for our cheerful and thankful giving. The love we have for Jesus, our Savior, ought to pull on our hearts and lead us to do even better than the Old Testament law.

Why don't you try tithing? Like Alvin Dark and many other dedicated Christians, you will find that it brings God's blessings. Not only does it bring His bless-

A Census in Eastern Nigeria

A year ago the DEAF LUTHERAN printed Rev. C. Roland Gerhold's series of articles on his visit with a survey team to West Africa. Rev. Gerhold visited Nigeria and Ghana to study the needs of the deaf living in these two countries.

On the basis of the survey reports our church studied the possibilities for taking over and supporting the Home for Young Deaf as a Lutheran school for the deaf in Ibadan, Nigeria. The possibility of starting a deaf mission program and sending missionaries to work with the deaf was also discussed. However, because of the shortage of pastors working with the deaf and because of the lack of funds, the Board of Missions has decided not to begin the work at this time.

This decision has not discouraged the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society, which conducts an annual appeal to raise funds to support mission work for the deaf of foreign countries.

Recently the secretary for deaf missions in St. Louis, Rev. Herbert Rohe, received an interesting letter from Mr. P. C. Obidigbo, a deaf welfare and education specialist at the Municipal School for the Deaf and Dumb, Ogbete, Enugu, Eastern Nigeria. Mr. Obidigbo gives an encouraging report concerning their government's interest in the deaf. We quote from his letter:

A survey on incidence of deafness [how many deaf] was conducted at Enugu, Aug. 16—23, 1966. From the survey it was discovered that 102 deaf persons live in Enugu. Of this number 11 are adults, while 91 are children. Only 30 of these children are in elementary school, 5 attend a special day school, and 25 others are cared for in elementary schools for hearing children.

The remaining 31 children stay in their homes. Their parents think of them as useless to the family and give them no educational opportunity.

These hearing-handicapped children need help and sympathy. The help can be provided by establishing a Residential School for the Deaf in Enugu, where they can be given education and special training in speech, lipreading, and the use of hearing aids.

During the survey it was reported that parents often send their children to rural areas as soon as they discover that the children have a hearing impairment. This would show that many deaf live in rural areas.

On the strength of this I have suggested that our survey be extended to reach all parts of Enugu Province and even to extend it to Onitsha Province. It is obvious that the number of hearing-impaired persons in the two provinces will be very great.

Readers of the DEAF LUTHERAN are encouraged to pray for the deaf of Nigeria and West Africa that someday soon the Good News of salvation will be preached to them. Let us support our Lutheran Deaf Mission Society.

Deaf Texans Will Benefit by State Laws

The Hon. Paul Floyd introduced 14 bills on Jan. 17 to the Texas State House of Representatives. The bills were concerned with services and facilities for the deaf of Texas.

One of the most interesting of the bills introduced is House Bill

No. 25, which proposes to create a State Commission for the Deaf. This commission would have six members, who would be appointed by the Governor. Two of the members of the commission must be deaf, and the term of office would be six years. The commission would appoint a qualified deaf or hard-of-hearing person as executive director. This person would oversee the rendering of all services to the deaf except those which are by law the responsibility of other state agencies.

The commission shall conduct a census of deaf persons in Texas and compile a current registry. It will collect all kinds of information concerning the deaf and will act as a source of information about the deaf for interested persons. The commission would be able to accept gifts or grants of money for use in expanding and improving services to deaf persons in the State of Texas.

Another bill, House Bill No. 36, encourages the state to pass a law providing interpreters for the deaf in civil cases. The interpreters would be paid for their services out of court funds.

It is noteworthy to mention that Texas already has a law to provide interpreters for the deaf in criminal cases.

The Question Box

Q. What is the never-forgiven sin?

- Mrs. L. C., Cincinnati, Ohio

A. Our Lord Jesus says in Mark 3:28-29 (Beck): I tell you the truth, anything that people do will be forgiven, their sins and their slanders, though they slander ever so much. But anyone who slanders the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven. Yes, he is guilty of an everlasting sin. See also Matthew 12:31-32; Luke 12:10; and John 12:39-40.

The never-forgotten sin is the slander or sin against the Holy Spirit. Why can it never be forgiven?

Holy Scripture teaches us that the Holy Spirit's work is to convince a person of his sin, bring him to repentance, and give him faith in Jesus Christ as his personal Savior. That person may understand the Gospel truth; and yet he says to himself, "I know what the Bible says about Jesus is probably true, but I will never believe it." As he argues and fights against this truth, he always resists the Holy Spirit's effort to make him sorry for his sin. He stubbornly refuses to turn away from his sin and seek forgiveness through Jesus Christ. This is the sin against the Holy Spirit.

If this person refuses until his death to believe in Jesus, whom God sent to remove his sins, how and where else will his sins be forgiven? God tells us in His Word that forgiveness can be found in no other way. That is why the sin against the Holy Spirit can never be forgiven.

Anyone who feels guilty about his sins, who is sorry for doing them, and who seeks God's forgiveness for Jesus' sake is NOT guilty of the never-forgiven sin. Anyone who fears he has done the never-forgiven sin is surely not guilty of it, because the Holy Spirit is at work bringing that person to a stronger faith in Jesus his Savior.

Dallas, Tex. March 5 marked 35 years of Lutheran services for the deaf in Dallas. Guest speaker was Rev. Harold L. Fleischhauer, Sulphur Springs, Tex., former vicar among the deaf in New Jersey.

the new John of Beverley Chapel, which was dedicated on Nov. 20.

During the special anniversary service the "Jesus' Hands" cross was dedicated.

The theme of Rev. Fleischhauer's sermon was "Remember Who You Are," with a text from Deuteronomy. He reminded the worshipers that God has chosen us through Jesus to be saved and to save the world. Each Sunday at worship the deaf will see the reminder in the "Jesus' Hands" cross.

The first Lutheran worship service was conducted in Zion Lutheran Church, then on Swiss Avenue, by Rev. Martin E. A. Mueller of Waco. Services were continued on a monthly basis.

Rev. A. E. Ferber, residing in Kansas City, Mo., began cottage Bible study meetings with the deaf in Picher and Commerce, Okla., as early as 1927.

In 1931 Rev. Martin E. A. Mueller, who had studied under Pastor Ferber, was commissioned to begin mission work among the deaf in Texas. For several years he resided in Waco. The first confirmation service for the deaf in Texas was conducted by him on July 26, 1936.

Since that time 11 other missionaries have served the Dallas congregation. In 1964 the Texas field was divided. Today Rev. Donald Haug, stationed in Houston, takes care of South Texas, while Rev. William Duey serves the deaf of North Texas and Oklahoma from the Dallas headquarters.
