John of Beverley Award

During the 47th regular convention of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod in New York City July 7—14, the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf awarded its 8th John of Beverley medal to Rev. Waldemar O. Ferber, who had distinguished himself in dedication and service to the deaf.

The John of Beverley medal was created in 1958 by the board of directors of Lutheran Friends of the Deaf and the board of trustees of Mill Neck Manor — Lutheran School for the Deaf. It recognizes outstanding achievement in any field of activity which helps the deaf.

The medal itself commemorates the accomplishment of Bishop John of Beverley, an English clergyman, who is believed to be the first individual of historical record named to teach a deaf person to speak and read. This work of love took place in 685 A. D., according to the Venerable Bede in his *Ecclesiastical History of the English Nation*.

On the convention floor on Wednesday, July 12, as the representatives of the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf were being introduced to make their John of Beverley presentation, the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf organization was publicly recognized and commended for its concern and effort in behalf of our church's mission to the deaf.

In the words of the speaker, "They are worthy of and merit this recognition. Not only have they made a significant contribution to deaf education and Christian education, but they have also contributed greatly to the program of our mission in other areas. All of our missionaries have been encouraged and strengthened in their work by the foresighted leadership and efforts of the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf."

Did you know?

Today some 15 million adults and 3 million children in the United States have a hearing loss of some degree, and the number is increasing.

Between 3 and 5 percent of the school-age children in the United States and abroad have a hearing loss to some degree.

Today a greater proportion of deaf young people are born deaf or are deafened before language has been acquired than occurred 25 years ago. This may be due in part to improved medical care for mothers and children. Thousands of children who would have died are now saved.

Rev. Waldemar O. Ferber Honored

July 12, New York, N.Y. The Lutheran Friends of the Deaf present the John of Beverley medal to Rev. Waldemar O. Ferber (center) for his many faithful years of dedication and service to the deaf. Pastor Ferber had been nominated for this honor by the North Dakota District convention of our Lutheran church.

This pioneer in the service of the Savior in Synod's mission among the deaf entered the ministry 50 years ago. Six years later his interest in the deaf led to his first call into deaf missions, which he served faithfully and devotedly for 44 years.

At one time Pastor Ferber's field of service included parts of three states — North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin — and three Canadian provinces — Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan. This area covered some 30 mission stations, 24 of which were served on a scheduled basis. Within this field Pastor Ferber also served four schools for the deaf and three state hospitals. Today this area has developed into four separate fields.

We congratulate Pastor Ferber, who has always cheerfully given of himself and his labors to his church and the deaf.

The Miracle of Life

Ebenezer

While Jesus walked the earth, people would sometimes come to Him and ask Him to do some miracle. They thought that if they would see proof of Jesus' power, they could accept Him as the Son of God and their Savior. Jesus did not perform magic to prove that He was God's Son. He did perform many miracles that were real and true to show people the love God had for them. His miracles of healing were a sign that God's kingdom had come, that God wanted to rule and lead the lives of His people.

If you were to ask me today where you could see a miracle, I would tell you to stand in front of a mirror. *The miracle is you!*

If medical science has discovered one thing, it is that birth and life are truly a mystery and a miracle. To be brought into this world alive is indeed a wonderful and divine thing, a miracle gift of God. Do we truly recognize and give thanks for this holy gift of life?

In a recent article Dr. Martin Koehneke said,

Thank you, Lord, for the gift of life — For a birthday to remember You — For blessings of a lifetime so numerous that to number them becomes an exercise in futility.

In the Old Testament, Job said, The Spirit of God has made me, and the breath of the Almighty gives me life. (Job 33:4)

Not only is it a miracle to be born and to receive the gift of life, however. It is also a miracle to be kept alive. Scripture encourages us to remember that life is in God's hands. What is your life? You're a mist, seen for a little while, then vanishing. You should say: "If the Lord is willing, we'll live and do this or that." (James 4:14-15 Beck)

A man named John Hall stood one evening watching some pure white flowers on a vine. The buds hung closed all day, but at sunset they unfolded into beautiful blossoms sending out a wonderful fragrance. He said a feeling of silent awe came over him as he saw each bud, under the touch of an invisible hand, slowly fold back its leaves until the vine was full of perfectly beautiful sweet blossoms. He thought, "If the finger of God can do this in a way beyond the power of human study to explain, cannot the same divine touch, in ways we know not of, do as much for human life?"

Surely you and I should stand in awe each day as we see and sense the breath of the almighty God continually giving us life. Surely we should give special thanks to our God, if not each day, at least each year as we celebrate our birthdays.

You and I as Christian children of God, however, have an even

greater miracle for which we must thank God. This miracle is our *new birth*. To be "born again of water [baptism] and the Spirit" is indeed also a wonderful and holy thing.

The Lord Jesus said to Nicodemus, The wind blows where it pleases and you hear the sound of it, but you don't know where it's coming from or where it's going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit. (John 3:8 Beck)

An Indian chief who had become a Christian and truly loved his newfound Lord and Savior tried in many ways to show his thanks by always giving gifts to his Savior. One day his pastor asked why he gave so much. "Ah!" he said, "You have never been in darkness." He

Q. Why do Christians suffer while unbelievers seem to go unpunished? — Miss R. R., Columbus, Ohio

A. In answering this question first allow me to quote 1 Peter 4: 17: For the time has come for judgment to begin with the household of God; and if it begins with us, what will be the end of those who do not obey the Gospel of God?

The household of God means Christians. Since we Christians believe in Jesus who was crucified for our sins, we are free from the guilt and punishment of sin. Jesus took away the penalty of sin against us. Forgiven by His grace, we have peace with God.

According to 1 Corinthians 11:32, "judgment" means chastisement, which is *not* the same as punishment. As the loving father chastises his son to correct his wrongdoings, so God chastises us, His believing children. He allows us to suffer to test our faith, to preserve us from damnation, to improve our trust in Him, to keep us from straying far from Him, or to guide us in the temptatation-filled world.

Do not be fooled by the pleasures and prosperity of unbelievers. They refuse to accept the Gospel. While they seem to be without punishment, they too have their troubles. And their end will be eternal punishment in hell.

Trust in God, who chastises us for our good. He is taking care of us. Please also read 1 Peter 4:12-19 and James 1:2-15.

Ludwig, 360 Morse Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214 remembered the dark days of superstition, fear, doubt, and hopelessness in which his mind and soul had once been bound. He had come to the light and had received the miracle of life in Jesus Christ.

Another man named Gypsy Rodney Smith once wrote in a Brooklyn paper: "Tell me how He got a song from an angel, robed it in feathers and got a canary? Tell me, what I wish you could tell me now, how Jesus came to my gypsy tent — when we had no Bible, when I could not spell my own name, when I was only a little wandering gypsy boy with my brother and three sisters and my father, without God and without hope in the world — tell me how Jesus came to that old gypsy tent and opened my eyes and made me know He was my Savior and my Lord? Tell me how, for I do not know. But I know He did it!"

In other words, when you and I stand before a mirror, we are looking at three of God's miracles: the miracle of our birth and life, the miracle of being kept alive, and the miracle of a new birth in Jesus Christ. Surely this should cause us to be most thankful and grateful to our God and Savior. How do we show this gratitude?

All members of our Lutheran churches are being asked to remember these miracles and give thanks to God through the *Ebenezer Thankoffering*. The offerings that our members are contributing are being used to build churches and schools. These churches and schools will stand as lasting memorials to the gratitude and thanks of our people for the gift of life and the gift of the new life in Christ which God has so graciously given them.

After the great Chicago fire, three men were looking at the vast ruins. One said, "Well, I thank God I put some of my money where it could not burn." Surprised, the other two men asked, "Where did you put your money?" He quickly replied, "Into missions."

We can waste our money on so many things that do not last, but what we do for Jesus counts to all eternity — a continual service for Jesus Christ and His kingdom. That is what we are doing with our Ebenezer Thankoffering.

You Are a Teacher Sent by God

- Sept. 1 Jeremiah 3:19-25. Let us be repentant in our worship, for God has blessed us. Ask for power and wisdom to pray for all your needs and for confidence in Christ and your eternal triumph. Pray also for Mrs. Ottilie Ferber, pastor's wife, Fargo, N. Dak.
- Sept. 2-1 Corinthians 4:8-12. The purpose of working and earning is not to make a LIVING, but a LIFE to the glory of Christ. Pray for all people who work in offices, factories, farms, schools, government, in churches.
- Sept. 3 Jeremiah 9:17-24. Christian parents have the duty and privilege to teach their children the Word of God. Think of the blessings parents need to teach their children, and ask God to give them to you.
- Sept. 4 Jeremiah 10:1-16. Our children need more than training in the wisdom of the world. Ask God's blessing on children in your home, community, school, and church. Pray also for Mrs. Rhoda Rynearson, pastor's wife, Rochester, N. Y.
- Sept. 5 Jeremiah 30:1-11. We cannot teach people to hope unless we teach the mercy of God. Pray for grace to teach Christ to others.
