## Can You Take a Challenge?

### Potential Power

At Ephphatha Conference this year we discussed at some length the resolution passed at the Denver convention (1-18a). It reads in the final resolved:

*"Resolved, That the deaf congregations, together with the Board for Missions and Ephphatha Conference, be urged to develop the potential of our ministry to the deaf to its fullest degree in matters of stewardship, evangelism, youth ministry, and expansion."*

Notice that it mentions first *deaf congregations*, that is, deaf laymen and laywomen and their families. The resolution urges you to sit up and take notice of what you are, where you have been, what you have done, and where you should be tomorrow as God's people doing God's work.

Next, notice the word *potential*. The dictionary defines potential as "capable of being or becoming; latent." Something that is potential is hidden or undeveloped power, but it can someday blossom into full life. Our deaf congregations have potential, a sleep-

ing power that must be awakened into full life of service to God and man.



The Denver resolution calls for us to wake up, to "develop the potential of our ministry to the deaf to its fullest degree." The challenge is before us to be responsible in our churches. That does not mean only pastors and elected officers. The challenge is given to each individual member of every congregation.

How we may grow is the subject of another editorial. But grow we must!

## ILDA in 1971?

### **Progress Report Milwaukee, Wis.**

The outcome of this committee meeting was rewritten proposed bylaws and a very enthusiastic group of deaf lay representatives.

So real was their interest in ILDA that the committee has suggested a date for ILDA's consti-

tuting convention — July 16—18, 1971, in Chicago, Ill.

*Temporary Chairman — Clarence Schulz, Detroit, Mich.*

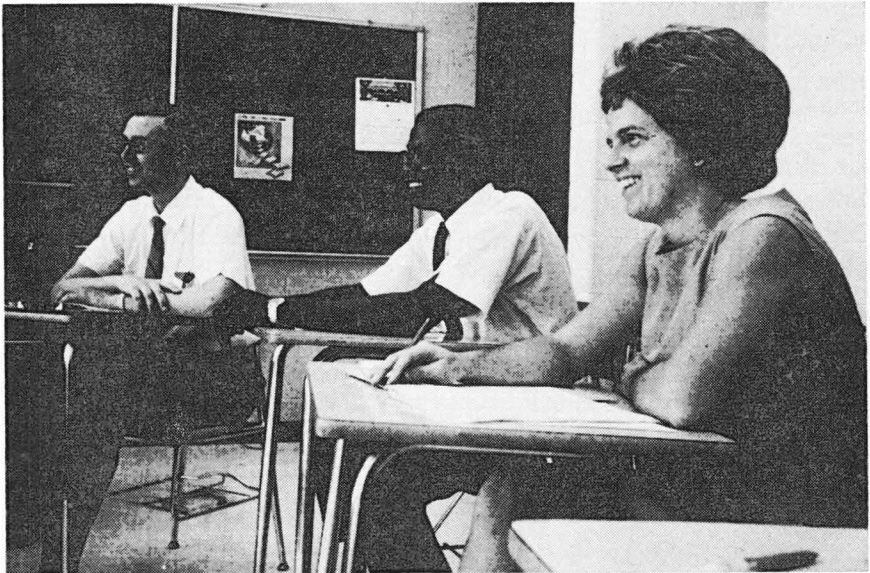

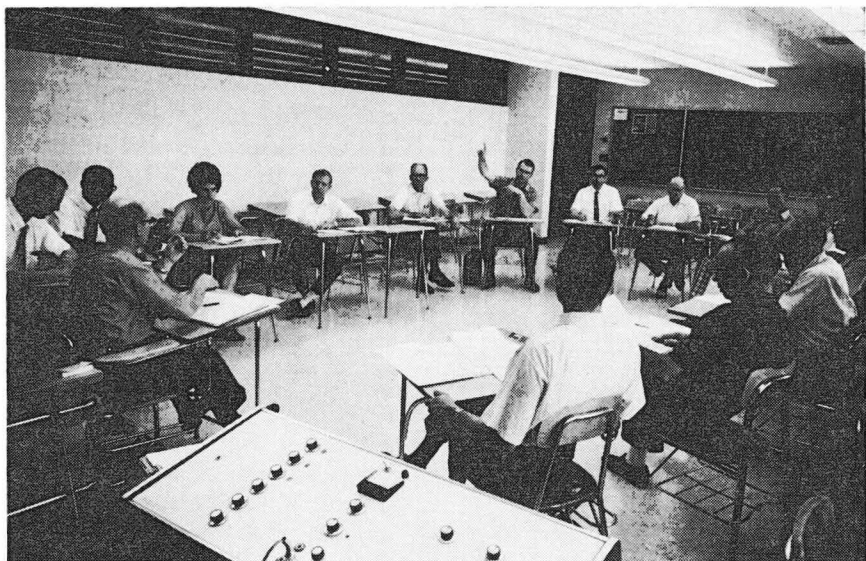

To give ILDA the needed funds to start, the committee suggests each deaf congregation include a figure of \$125 in its 1971 budget and send the \$125 to the treasurer before May 1, 1971.

Each region is asked to help in making ILDA 1971 a success by accepting part of the work of the

constituting convention. The assignments are as follows:

*Eastern Region — nominations and elections.*

*Great Lakes Region — worship services.*

*Central Region — arrangements, housing, registration, equipment.*

*Northwest Region — subcommittees and special assignments.*

*Pacific Region — program and speakers.*

*Midwest Region — promotion and publicity.*

*Dixie Region — displays.*

The new copy of the revised proposed bylaws has been printed and 25 copies were sent to each congregation for study this summer and fall. The committee invites your response — your questions, your feelings, your suggested changes. Write these to Rev. H. Rohe, 210 N. Broadway, St. Louis, Mo. 63102. The committee plans another meeting in late fall for the final drafting of the proposed constitution.

## Are You Included in the Census?

No count has been made of deaf Americans for 40 years. A national census of deaf people is badly needed. Money for vocational rehabilitation services is given to your state depending on how many people will be served. Those concerned with deafness realize how little is known about deaf persons in the United States.

The National Association of the Deaf is conducting a national census of deaf citizens. Money for this project is provided by the Social and Rehabilitation Service of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

All services for the deaf population are inadequate. Information gathered by a census will help identify the services that are now available and what services are needed. This study will affect *all*

deaf persons in the country, not only those that would receive services from the Social and Rehabilitation Service.

It is the goal of the census that no deaf person be overlooked. It is hoped that all deaf citizens will feel a responsibility to cooperate with the census. Information about deaf people not in the mainstream of deaf life is critically needed. This means people not in the clubs, churches, or other organizations of and for the deaf. You may know some of them. Under federal law, information sent to the census must be kept completely confidential and names will not be given to any individual or organization.

Everyone cooperating with the census will be asked to give only general information such as age,



race, sex, degree of hearing loss, age that they became deaf, etc.

## — The Question Box —

**Q.** *How much should I give to church? I think \$1.00 is enough each time I attend.* — A Dixie Reader

**A.** *Be alert, be on watch! For your enemy, the devil, roams around like a roaring lion, looking for someone to devour (1 Peter 5:8 TEV). Many people, myself included, have been victims of the devil at offering time as he tries to make us think less and less of God and more and more of ourselves. Often he wears the mask of a greeth (a greedy thought), an ugly thing that makes us forget the proper way to honor our Lord and Savior.*

To give on the basis of what is "enough" is wrong. The church will never have enough money to do its work. To give on the basis of how often we go to church is wrong. Who can say with honesty that they go to church as much as they should?

The basis of proper giving should be a desire to return love to God because of the love He shows us. That love was shown in the death of His Son Jesus for us. That love is shown in His continuous care and generosity (Psalm 31:15; 37:3; 116:12). This is the best basis for giving to the church.

Remember, anyone who gives what is left over or just what is enough, isn't showing much appreciation for the blessings God has given him. The "greeth" (greedy thought) has devoured him. The right and proper gift is that which comes from the thankful heart, meant as a show of sincere love. The right and proper gift is that which is planned in advance, set aside before all other needs, at the top of the budget.

### Trinity Burns Mortgage, Dedicates Organ

*Pittsburgh, Pa.* June 21 was a big day at Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Pittsburgh where 131 members and friends witnessed the burning of their mortgage note and dedicated a pipe organ.

Guest speaker was their former pastor, Rev. Frank P. Wagenknecht of Clearwater, Fla. He delivered an inspiring message based on Psalm 126:3, "The Lord has done great things for us, therefore we rejoice," and Psalm 116:12, "How can I repay the Lord for all His gifts to me?" The

congregation's struggle to own a church building was compared to the 40 years of wandering of the children of Israel in the wilderness. "Now your debt is paid in full," Pastor Wagenknecht told the congregation. "You are happy and rejoice. But each one of us carries a debt we cannot repay, a debt that makes us sad. We cannot pay the debt of our sins. All the wills in the world cannot pay that bill. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Our debt has been cancelled—paid in full—not with gold or silver, but with the precious, holy blood of Jesus Christ."

The pipe organ was dedicated to the glory of almighty God in loving memory of Mrs. Nettie Stewart, whose bequest to the congregation made it possible to buy the organ and also pay off the mortgage.

All the officers of the congregation participated in the burning of the mortgage note before the altar. The fire was lighted by Donald Mowl, head deacon of the church. Joseph Derkiss, treasurer of the congregation, presented the copy of the mortgage note, stamped PAID, to the president of the congregation, John Saraka. Mr. Saraka burned the paper and offered words of praise and gratitude for God's manifest blessings.

At noon a delicious dinner was served by the ladies of the church. Special cakes added to the occasion. Moving pictures of the activities at Trinity, dating from its groundbreaking service in 1963, were shown. Then a special announcement was made to the surprise of Rev. Wagenknecht that the two halls in the church basement would henceforth be known as Wagenknecht Hall 1 and Wagenknecht Hall 2. Clyde Bachman, the contractor who erected the church and the educational wing, was invited to share this Big Day with us and helped to put the plaques in the appropriately designated halls.

Chief deacon Donald Mowl, speaking at the occasion, said to Rev. Wagenknecht: "It must be of great pleasure to you to see how the Lord has permitted your faithful labor to be blessed. We want to honor you because you helped us build a church with your talents that were directed by God's will."

We at Trinity were happy that Rev. Wagenknecht could bring his family to help us celebrate this special and meaningful occasion. We thank them for coming, and it was a pleasure to see them looking well and tanned. To them

we say, "God be with you till we meet again."

ing Institute in Milwaukee, will edit gleanings from the Pacific and Northwest Regions.

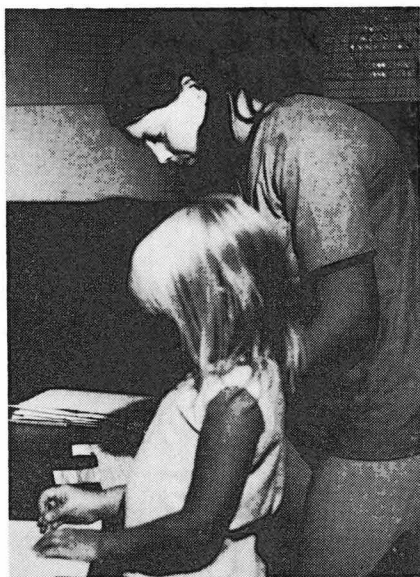

The older deaf did some experimenting with drama during the two-week VBS. They acted out the stories of God sending Moses to Pharaoh, Joseph in

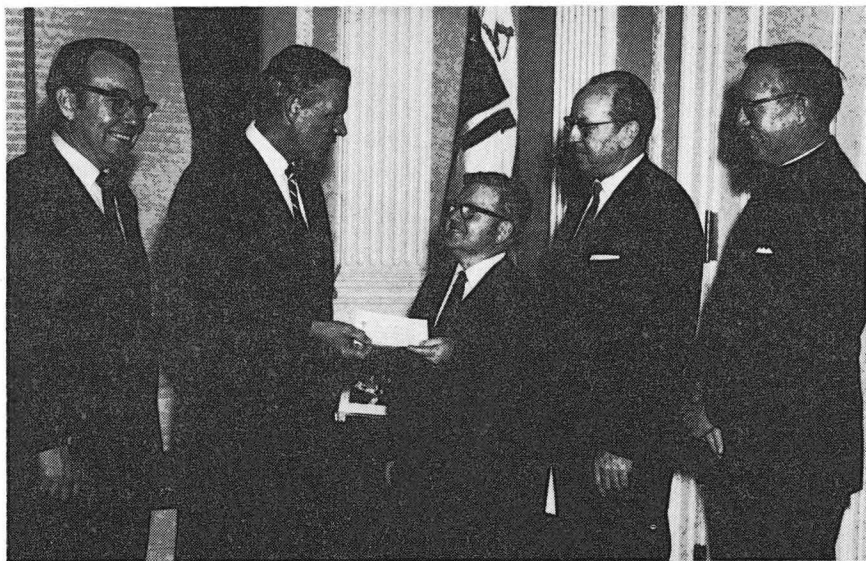
Egypt (picture), and the Good Samaritan. The skit of the Good Samaritan was presented as part of the closing worship service of the Bible school on Friday morning.

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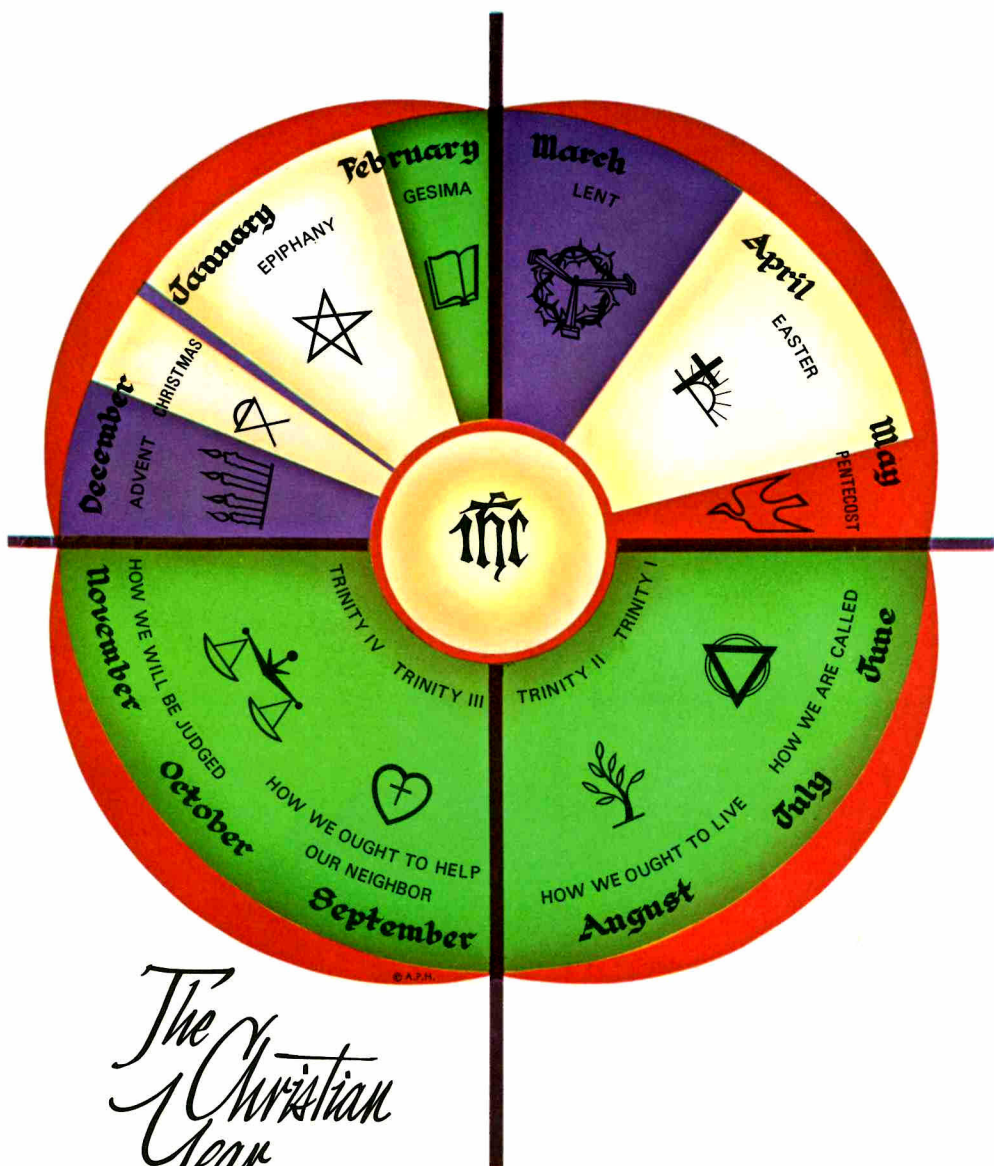
