Founded for Mission

(This is a *summary* of Dr. William Kohn's keynote address given during the Saturday morning convention session of the International Lutheran Deaf Association, Chicago, Ill., July 17. Ed.)

God intended that all of His people should find joy and comfort, strength and encouragement in their associations with one another. Persons who are handicapped, such as the deaf, are at a distinct disadvantage in achieving the full benefits of such fellowship.

Last night when we were gathering for the opening service of this convention, I had some feeling of what you experience rather often. I could not understand what you were saying to one another, because I cannot

read the sign language. Yet it was easy for me to read the joy in your faces as you talked with one another. Evidently you were pleased to be with one another. That kind of joy and fellowship is what God intended.

Though people may speak to one another in words or in signs, that fact in itself does not make for good fellowship and joy. The destroyer of the human relationship is sin. Sin breaks up friendship, breaks down trust, breaks out anger. Fellowship must have a way of conquering sin.

That possibility of conquering sin has been made a reality by God. He sent His Son, Jesus Christ, to destroy sin, to break its hold over man, to free man, to reconcile him with God and with

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his fellowman. The forgiveness which Christ earned by His suffering and death becomes the solid foundation for good fellowship, for a joyous relationship with one another.

An association like the International Lutheran Deaf Association will help to strengthen your fellowship with one another as deaf Christians, will deepen your joy in one another, will add to your feeling of unity and solidarity, and give you a spirit of community. But it must do more than this.

The International Lutheran Deaf Association must be interested in others and must, therefore, have in its purposes an appropriate and strong emphasis on missions. This puts your organization in line with Jesus' thinking.

A word of caution is in place at this particular point. It is easy for an association or organization to become very self-centered, to seek the protection of its members, and to add a dimension of exclusiveness. An evidence of such an attitude manifests itself when the members become especially interested in the rules and regulations of the organization and forget the purposes for which it is founded.

If you should find yourself overemphasizing the rules of ILDA and forgetting the missionary purpose, then please pause and evaluate, for you could be drifting away from one of the purposes of your founding. Because you do have missions emphasized

in the purposes of your organization, the Board for Missions of The Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod is pleased and rejoices with you in this first convention and pledges itself to help you succeed in every way possible.

A further reason for our interest in the success of your organization is that there are many people in this world whom you can reach better than I can, or any other hearing person. If the church is to have its most effective outreach to deaf people scattered all around the world, then the church and its Lord Jesus Christ need you, the deaf Christians witnessing to all but especially to others who cannot hear. Your association with one another can be a constant reminder to each of you of the need to be in mission.

It promises to be a wonderful weekend for you, getting to know one another, to rejoice with one another, and especially also to strengthen one another for the purpose of missions. God add His blessing to your efforts.

Louisville, Ky. Some 2,500 delegates attended the 14th biennial international Lutheran Women's Missionary League convention, June 22—24, in Louisville.

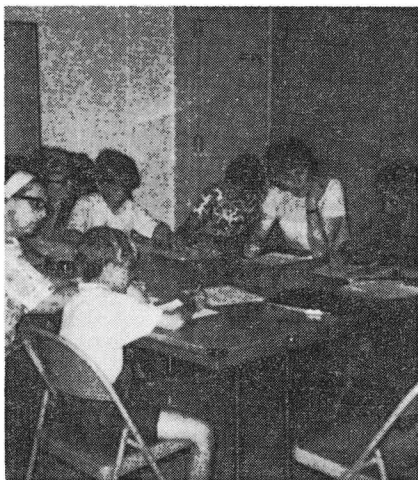
The convention approved a project budget of \$350,000 for the next 2 years. One of the 10 projects adopted was \$15,000 as "seed" money for the on-going and future production of "This

Detroit Pastor Awarded John of Beverley Medal

Milwaukee, Wis.

Rev. Norbert E. Borchardt of Detroit, Mich., who served congregations for the deaf for the past 40 years, was presented the John of Beverley award, June 11.

The presentation was made during the 49th regular convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in Milwaukee. The award honors and recognizes individuals for outstanding and faithful service to the deaf and is given by the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, an organization associated with the Lutheran School for the Deaf at Mill Neck, N. Y.

The award — a medallion — takes its name from the first known Christian clergyman to serve the deaf, John of Beverley of England, who in A. D. 685 befriended a deaf youth and taught him to speak.

Pastor Borchardt has served the deaf during the entire period of his ministry. After graduating from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., in 1930, Pastor Borchardt began ministering to the deaf in the Cleveland, Ohio, area. He served stations in Columbus, Findlay, and Westerville, Ohio, as well as Pittsburgh and Erie, Pa.

This is the **10th anniversary year** for mission work for the deaf in Hong Kong. The anniversary was celebrated on April 25 at the dedication of the new Mongkok School for the Deaf.

Miss Carol Wackler, parish worker at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church for the Deaf, St. Paul, Minn., recently resigned to return to a full-time teaching career this fall. She still plans to be active in the church on a vol-

unteer basis.

The Ears for Brazil Hearts for Jesus Project of the Colorado District gathered \$5,494 as of May 1 to help Concordia School for the Deaf in Brazil. The project goal is \$6,000.

Rev. Daniel Hodgson, New York City, was elected April 3 as corresponding secretary of the newly formed interpreters group, The New York RID Metro.

Pastor Borchardt served Our Savior Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Detroit, since 1937 before retiring last year.

Our Savior Congregation today numbers over 200 communicant members. In 1965 Pastor Borchardt organized St. Paul Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Flint, Mich. That same year the Michigan field was divided and another pastor called to serve the Flint congregation and six stations.

Pastor Borchardt was married to the former Hera Lemke of Morrison, Wis. Their marriage was blessed with a son, Norbert Jr. of Mount Clemens, Mich., and a daughter, Mrs. Elaine Vanni, of Macomb, Ill. Mrs. Borchardt passed away in spring of 1970.

Mr. Melvin Luebke, superintendent of the Mill Neck school, presented the award. The convention gave standing recognition to Pastor Borchardt and joined in

singing a hymn of Christian praise. The presentation was signed for the deaf visitors of the convention by Rev. H. W. Rohe, secretary in deaf ministry.

About eight former missionaries to the deaf and five active pastors were present at the con-

vention. Rev. Rohe commented that "Pastor Borchardt was thrilled at the reception-lunch-eon held for him" on Monday noon, July 12. The special gathering was also sponsored by the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf.

Deaf Lay Missionaries Begin Work in Brazil

A milestone has been reached in Lutheran deaf missions. On June 13 Mr. and Mrs. John Ames, communicant members of Pilgrim Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Los Angeles, Calif., received the blessings of the congregation as they prepared to begin their work for Christ in a foreign mission field.

John and Charis Ames with their sons Mark and Dennis left Los Angeles July 19 on the Argentina Maru, OSK Mitsui, traveling in the company of other missionary families to Brazil.

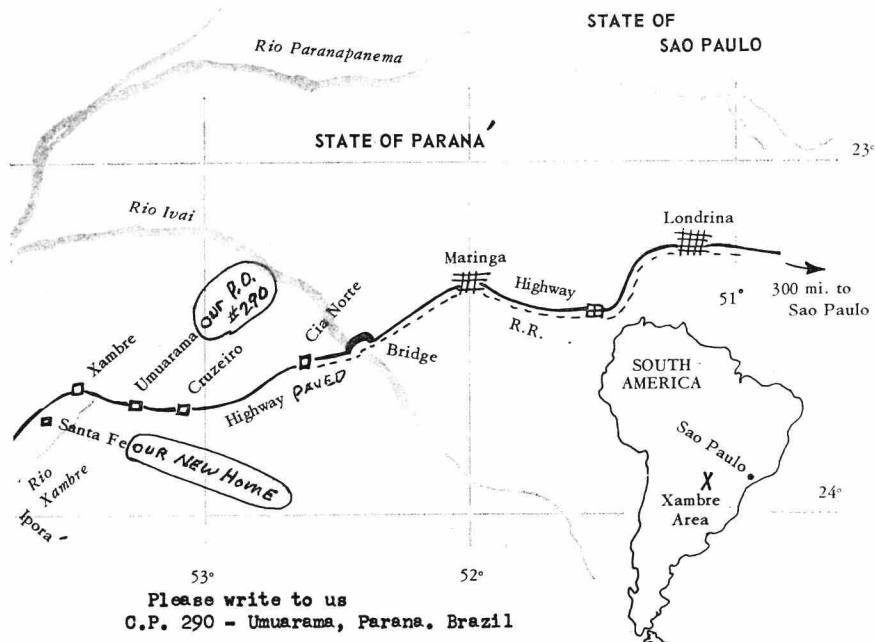
Charis put it this way: "When we read the February 1970 DEAF LUTHERAN, we felt that God was calling us to join my parents, Rev. and Mrs. Sand, who are missionaries in Brazil." Pastor Sand resigned from his Minneapolis, Minn., Lutheran parish and moved to Brazil when Charis was a little girl.

THE DEAF LUTHERAN carried two articles that influenced the Ames family to accept this challenging work. Mrs. Naomi Warth's "We Could Not Tell Them About Jesus" told the heartrending ex-

periences that led to the establishment of Concordia School for the Deaf in Porto Alegre, Brazil. Rev. Herbert Rohe's "A Closer Look at South America" related his impressions of the deaf world as seen on a 3-week trip in November 1969 and future possibilities for deaf missions in Brazil.

Over the years Pastor Sand developed a large Mission Farm at Sante Fe, Parana, Brazil, about 300 miles west of Sao Paulo and about 450 miles north of Porto Alegre. The Ames family will be working here to develop a school for the deaf. (See map on the next page.)

In the frontier areas of Brazil, such as Sante Fe, the deaf have no schools or churches. "Because they have no one to teach them to speak or understand, no one can tell them how to become Christians," Charis pointed out. "This will be an entirely new work with the illiterate deaf, so we need much prayer. We will have to learn so many new things. We will miss all our deaf friends in the U. S. A., but your letters will

be a great help.

"St. Paul reminded the Colossian Christians to pray for his work: *At the same time pray also for us, that God will give us a good opportunity to preach His message, to tell the secret of Christ. . . . Pray, then, that I may speak in such a way as to make it clear, as I should* (Col. 3-4 TEV). Please remember to pray for us."

- Oct. 1 — Matthew 16:13-23.** A wonderful confession of faith followed by a stern rebuke. Pray the Lord to give you courage to confess your faith openly, without shame and fear.
- Oct. 2 — Mark 9:2-8.** Three leaders see the glory of God on the mount of transfiguration. Ask God to give you an understanding of the glory that He has promised you.
- Oct. 3 — Matthew 26:30-35.** A self-confident man makes a proud promise. Pray that God may give you an understanding of your own weakness, and ask Him to give you the strength to overcome it.
- Oct. 4 — John 13:1-10.** A true and false humility. Ask God to teach you to accept forgiveness humbly.
- Oct. 5 — Matthew 26:47-56.** Peter takes matters into his own hands. Pray for the deaf of the world that the Lord will have mercy on them and send His church to serve them.
- Oct. 6 — Matthew 26:69-75.** Faith and trust in God are lost in a moment of trial. Ask God to give you a strong faith in times of doubt and temptation that you do not deny Him.
- Oct. 7 — John 20:1-10.** God gives new hope to Peter. Ask God to support you in your hope of an eternal life with Him.
- Oct. 8 — John 21:1-8.** Peter, soon to be a leader in the church, returns to Jesus. Pray for faith to see God's hand in all that comes to you.
- Oct. 9 — 21:15-23.** Jesus again gives Peter his work. Pray that God will support you as you believe and do His work as a member of His congregation.
- Oct. 10 — Acts 2:1-16.** The first Christian sermon. Pray for the wisdom to speak to the needs of men.
- Oct. 11 — Acts 3:1-16.** Because of their faith they had the courage and power to heal. Ask God to increase the love of all Christians as they seek to help the needy the world over.

- Oct. 15 — Acts 10:34-48.** The first non-Jew believes in Jesus and receives the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Pray for Christians of all nations that we may be united in the truth of God's Word.

- Oct. 16 — Acts 12:1-17.** Peter is freed from prison. Pray for all Christians who must suffer hurt because they were not afraid to speak to others about the Lord Jesus.
- Oct. 17 — Galatians 2:11-18.** A conflict between two Christian leaders. Ask God to heal the divisions in the church.
- Oct. 18 — 2 Peter 1:12-21.** Peter speaks his concern for the church to come. Pray for the people who hear our missionaries, that they may believe in the Lord Jesus.
- Oct. 19 — Mark 3:13-19.** John is commissioned with all the apostles. Pray for your pastor that the Lord will give him more strength in his work.
- Oct. 20 — Mark 5:35-43.** John is one of Jesus' inner group. Pray for yourself that you be drawn closer to Jesus in love.
- Oct. 21 — Mark 9:38-50.** The disciples misunderstand Jesus' purpose and are corrected. Pray for your church leaders that the Lord will guide them.

Full-Time Pastors
