Easter Sunday marked the dedication of the 125th Anniversary Cross at Siouxland Church for the Deaf in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. The beautiful, illuminated cross was a gift of Mr. and Mrs. James Macek, senior members of the congregation, in grateful appreciation of the mercy of God to them and



their church.

The three foot high cross is made of faceted cathedral glass. The blocks are one inch thick and set in dark gray material.

Center blocks in the four arms are a deep blue surrounded by a row of rich reds. The five large blocks at the junction are gold.

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RESEARCH GRANT AWARDED TO GALLAUDET COLLEGE

Washington. D.C. --A \$47,238 research grant has been awarded to Gallaudet College by the National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Stroke, Dr. Edward C. Merrill, Jr., college president, has announced.

The grant is for research in the area of perception of complex auditory stimuli by the deaf. The research project will be administered by Dr. James M. Pickett, director of Speech Communications Research at Gallaudet, the world's only accredited liberal arts college for the deaf.

In announcing receipt of the grant, which is for a period beginning Jan. 1, 1972, and ending Dec. 31, 1973, Dr. Merrill expressed the appreciation of the students and faculty of Gallaudet College to the National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Stroke for their interest and support. -- Gallaudet News Release

LORD TEACH US TO PRAY--MEANINGFULLY

It seems to me that Lutherans don't take their praying seriously. Now, before you "turn me off" as the young people say, because you've heard that before, let me straighten that statement a bit more by saying that Lutherans pray dangerously.

Of course, I suspect that other Christians treat prayer much as we do. We pray thoughtlessly. We say prayers. We don't pray them. We say the same prayers so often at home, at the table, in bed, at church and at meetings that we can do this with our minds closed.

Some people are so good at this kind of praying that they can put together a series of often recited bits and pieces of prayers and it sounds like earnest praying.

Long ago, most of us have figured out how to use general statements which seem to cover everything and anything in our praying without the burden of feeling a special closeness or obligation to any one person or any single situation.

Now this kind of praying is dangerous. It's dangerous because we don't mean what we say and that's hypocrisy, a charge which is being hurled regularly at people over 30. This kind of praying is dangerous because it comes mighty near to being blasphemy, if it is not actually blasphemy.

If I remember catechetical studies of years ago, blasphemy is the sin of making fun of God, and the making fun of God comes about because we are using God's name in vain, that is, uselessly or carelessly.

Careless praying is dangerous also because God might just answer our prayer in the way we ask for something. Take the man who prays, much without thinking, "Lord, help me today to witness for you to someone!" And just like that, the Lord does provide a person and an opportunity! We better mean what we say and we better say what we mean when we pray.

Of course, there are several ways in which we can rid ourselves immediately of meaningless praying. We ought to pray for real people by name and for special and individual situations. We ought to pray prayers from the heart. I guess pastors call these kind of prayers "ex corde" prayers.

Get a new prayerbook once in awhile if you can't pray prayers from the heart. Use your influence to change the praying in the public worship service. Preface prayers with some personal notes. Involve the congregation with at least a few more spoken "Amens." For that matter let's really work at making the liturgy. Scripture readings, hymn singing and everything else in the service, truly meaningful.

But pray seriously; pray prayers that count and pray always and without ceasing as the holy Scripture reminds us.
