We Need a Brochure on Churches for the Deaf

When a church is planned for a hearing congregation, the primary requirement is good acoustics.

The minister might like to use some movies or slides to help make his sermon more vivid to the congregation. I could go on and and on adding desirable features. And, some other deaf people can add many more.

What about making up a brochure containing exterior views of existing churches built for-by the deaf? Also, sketches of present floor plans?? Near the close of the brochure should be TWO lists: One listing the good points of the different churches. The other list would have the poor or objectionable classes at the California School for the Deaf in Berkeley. points of the present churches.

In the back part of the brochure should be a sketch of the IDEAL church for the deaf with a good check list of the many desirable features that the deaf would like built into these churches--or arrangements for adding them, when and if, money becomes available! Then, at the very back of the booklet should be several blank pages for notations of "dream" ideas or "brain-storms."

Ministers of churches already built for the deaf should be the first ones to send in exterior pictures and/or sketches of what they now have. Then, we will have a start! THE DEAF PEOPLE THEMSELVES SHOULD BE ASKED FOR SUGGESTIONS! It will take time to assemble all this material: pictures, sketches, blue prints and data. WHAT a brochure to put into the hands of our ministers-to-be now in training!

Oakland Pastor Uses

Oakland--For the last 19 years, the roaming Rev. Clark Bailey has used his hands to preach.

He has employed sign language because his parishioners are unable to hear.

As pastor of Lutheran Memorial Chapel for the Deaf at 10th and Grove streets in Oakland, Bailey, 44, helps members of the deaf community throughout the East Bay "find comfort in God's word."

"We carry on normal congregation activities, including worship services, men's and women's social meetings and religious education," he said. "Everything we use, in the form of materials, has to be translated into sign language".

"FOR EXAMPLE, we replace music with motion called 'signing'. When a deaf person leads the congregation in signing, he stands before it and works out the dialogue of the song with his hands and body--like a dramatic mime."

When Bailey gives his sermon, he always speaks and signs at the same time, for the benefit of the hearing persons in attendance. Oftentimes, he sings while the congregation signs, he said.

Among other duties, Bailey counsels individuals and families, shares in the joy of anniversaries, supplies social and educational services.

"The fact that I can communicate with the deaf enables me to deal with them not only religiously but be helpful in some of their other activities -- interpreting for them at

IN ADDITION to serving at Memorial Chapel, Bailey also serves the deaf in Sacramento and Stockton with church services every other Sunday. He is a member of the Ephphatha Conference, which is a national group of Lutheran workers serving the deaf.

Bailey is also a member of the East Bay Council and Referral Agency for the deaf and past president of the board. The agency is set up by the deaf to help them get available social services when they can't communicate or explain what their need is.

Bailey is presently one of seven regional advisers for the Lutheran deaf missions in the United States and Canada. He is chairman of Concordia Pastoral Circuit, made up of pastors serving congregations of the Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod in the East Bay. He also holds religious Bailey said he has no regrets about becoming a pastor to the deaf.

"It has its problems," he said. "But when I look at a normal parish's problems, I'm happy where I am. However, I do miss good church music."

BAILEY SAYS he enjoys his work because he "is helping people who otherwise might not have help and comfort in God's word."

He dislikes the long hours, travel and the fact the deaf are scattered throughout the area. (Continued on Page 6)

The Church Is -

Some people think that the church is only for good people ... no one else need bother to apply. The church is not a museum for saints! It is a hospital for sinners! It is not a place where good people come together to show off how good they are. If that were true, the church would not have any members (and no pastor, either).

Some people have problems finishing that sentence. They don't know what the church is (even though they may belong to the church themselves!) ... or they have some wrong ideas about what the church is.

Some people think that the church is a club. People join the church, because they will meet their friends at the church. They expect the church to provide plenty of social activities. And they hope that the dues won't be too expensive.

The church is not a club! It is a fellowship of people who believe that Jesus Christ is their Savior and Lord. They have one very important thing in common - they all love Jesus very much (yes, more than anything else in the world!).

They did not suddenly decide to join the church ... God chose them and joined them to the church. They are in the church, so that they can work with other Christian people to spread the Good News of Jesus to all people in the world. They are in the church, so they can receive help and encouragement from other Christians.

The church is full of bad people, who know they are not as good as God wants them to be (the Bible calls them sinners.) They are looking for God's forgiveness ... they are looking for His help to make their lives better. They believe that God does forgive them, because Jesus died for their sins. And they believe that God helps people who want to stop sinning and live the way God wants.

God invites YOU to His church, no matter who you are rich or poor, man or woman, young or old, "good" or bad. God invites you, so that you can get His good gifts. If you have already accepted His invitation (you already believe in Jesus and love Him!) - wonderful! May God make you strong in your faith and love. But if you have not accepted that invitation yet, we urge you - do it now! Today is not too late ... tomorrow may be!

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OAKLAND PASTOR USES SIGN LANGUAGE TO PREACH

"Because of the distances I have to travel, it takes more time to serve one person. I can't just pick up the phone and talk with them when they have a problem."

Bailey was first introduced to the ministry while attending Concordia High School in Oakland. He graduated in 1946 and went on to California Concordia College in Oakland until 1948, when he attended Concordia Seminary in St. Louis.

Although Bailey was interested in teaching, the faculty at the seminary encouraged him to study for the ministry.

I HAD THOUGHTS of becoming a pastor in a normal suburban parish and had not planned on becoming a pastor to the deaf. However, when graduation came in 1953, there was a need for deaf workers and I was called to be one.

I had taken a semester of sign language with the idea if deaf persons were in my parish, I could communicate with them. That was a point in my favor."

Bailey trained for four months with a pastor in Kansas City. Eventually, the pastor divided his field--the states of Kansas and Colorado--with Bailey.

"I worked as a pastor to the deaf in Denver, Colorado Springs, and Pueblo Southwest Colorado, Western Nebraska with an occasional trip to Utah," he said.

"I guess I could have been called a roaming reverend, since I had one teaching congregation and five preaching stations. I taught in Colorado for six years, until I was called to Des Moines, Iowa, in 1960."

IN DES MOINES, Bailey served two organized congregations and 10 preaching stations which met once a month. In 1964, he was called to Memorial Chapel in Oakland.

When Bailey's not busy counseling or preaching, he spends his time railroading--primarily building model trains and doing both black and white photography of railroad equipment and buildings.

"I guess it started from a childhood fascination with trains," he said. "I grew up near the main line of the Santa Fe railroad in Fresno. I could see the track from my house.

"Also, during my first two years of college, I rode the train to Oakland from Fresno. As a pastor, I did most of my traveling by train and bus as well," he recalled.

The Board of Directors of the I.L.D.A. met at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Mo., last November, 1971. Members of the Board of Directors who were present at the meeting were: Rev. Rodney Rynearson, Dale Paden, Uriel C. Jones, Gary Schlub, Bob Baker, Harold Thuve, Ralph Foster, Warren Riege, Evelyn DeMeyere, Herman Spencer, and Marion Van Manen.

Warren Riege and Gary Schlub gave reports on the financial standing of the I.L.D.A. Most of the member congregations had sent in their \$125.00 dues at that time. The expenses of the I.L.D.A. Convention in Chicago, July, 1971, had been paid. The total balance at the time of this meeting was \$6139.09. The travel and board expenses of the Board members to this meeting were to be paid out of this amount. It was decided that the \$362.66 offering from the last I.L.D.A. Convention worship be added to the I.L.D.A. Fund. Gary Schlub is our new I.L.D.A. treasurer.

It was reported that 365 registrations were received for the I.L.D.A. July Convention and that 400 people attended the banquet and 268 received Holy Communion in the Sunday worship.

The Board of Directors spent much of their time discussing the proposed I.L.D.A. Constitution and By-laws, changing them to their present form. As the Constitution proposes, President Van Manen appointed Warren Fiege to the Finance Committee.

It was proposed and passed that the I.L.D.A pay Archie Marshall the \$50.00 award for his winning I.L.D.A. emblem design, and also pay the \$10.00 each to the three winners in the cultural arts. It was decided that the I.L.D.A. emblem design be kept safely in the Home Office where it will be easily available, and that the emblem be used on a banner using Archie Marshall's choice of colors.

Uriel C. Jones talked about his new job as Editor of THE DEAF LUTHERAN and explained his ideas for the future of the publication.

Dale Paden moved that the I.L.D.A. take over the responsibility of THE DEAF LUTHERAN and the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society (L.D.M.S.). Discussion followed on what these responsibilities would involve and action on the motion was tabled until 1973 so that a more detailed study could be made of this proposal with Ephphatha Conference and the Board for Missions. President Van Manen appointed Uriel C. Jones as negotiator for THE DEAF LUTHERAN and the L.D.M.S.

It was decided that President Van Manen present at the Memorial Service for Rev. Quintin Quade a memorial collection of \$24.50 from the I.L.D.A. Board members and Regional Advisors.

It was decided that the I.L.D.A. ask the Board for Missions to let the I.L.D.A. be the Lutheran representative on the Board of C.O.S.D. (Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf). Marion Van Manen was appointed the I.L.D.A. representative to C.O.S.D. and Gary Schlub was appointed the alternate representative.

President Van Manen appointed Dale Paden Chairman of the 1973 I.L.D.A. Convention Program Committee. He also appointed Evelyn DeMeyere, Ralph Foster, Herman Spencer, Harold Thuve, Pearl Goff, and Warren King as committee members. Discussion followed on the next I.L.D.A. Convention, which will be held in Kansas City, Mo., July 12-15 or 16, 1973. It was moved and passed that member congregations must pay their \$125.00 dues before the next convention in order to have a voice at that convention. The Pregram Committee met and suggested the theme, "Sharing Love in Christ" for the 1973 Convention, and assigned the following responsibilities to the regions: Midwest Region; Arrangement, housing and equipment; Central Region: Registrations, Treasurer's assistants; Great Lakes Region; Speakers and Programs; Eastern Region; Publicity and Promotion; Dixie Region; Special assignments; California Region; Worship; and Northwest Region; Displays.

The highlight of the Zurich tour will be seeing the world's only organ for the deaf and watching the mime chorus.

Week three, on to Klosters near St. Moritz where the group will have more time for skiing, and vacation-retreating.

Costs: travel from New York City to Switzerland and back to New York City by Swiss Air: Adults - \$240, Student fare - \$229, and children under 12 - \$120.
