A FIRST! Trans-Atlantic T-V Phone Conversation Successful!



By pre-arrangement on Monday, February 26, 1973, the telephone in the Interfaith Room (Chaplain's offices) rang at 3:30 P. M. EST and the voice on the other end of the phone began to speak in German. It was a very long distance call from Daetwil, Switzerland, the home of Mr. Roger Jauner, an eighteen year old student at the Zurich State School for the Deaf. His mother said that he was ready to "talk" for the first time on the telephone and that there were newspaper reporters on hand to take pictures and record the event. So it was that Pastor Dan Pokorny of Gallaudet put the telephone into the Phonics Corp. unit "The T. V. Phone" and began to type. The words appeared on the screens of the television both here and in Switzerland, "Roger Jauner, bist du da in der Schweiz?" (Roger Jauner, are you there in Switzerland?" The answer came back clearly and the first trans-Atlantic T. V. Phone conversation began.

Various technical problems must be solved before the T. V. Phone can be used by many people in Europe, but this was a start. Leaders there are trying hard to work for it in their own countries The problem is especially complex because there are about 3 or 4 different TV systems in the various European countries and so one T.V. Phone will not work on all television sets. The chaplain's offices have led in the development of better communications for the deaf. They had the first TTY on the Gallaudet Campus when we still had a telephone switchboard and no direct dialing. Now, with the T.V. Phone unit they carry on the tradition. We have received a few questions about the way water should be put on a person in holy Baptism. The Greek work in the New Testament that we translate as baptize is used to mean 1) wash, 2) pour, 3) sprinkle, or 4) immerse (put entire body under water.) See Mark 7:4 for the use of the word to mean "wash." In Matthew 3:11, also Acts 2: 16-17, the word baptize means to pour out. From the letter to the Hebrews, chapter 9, verses 13, 18, and 19, we learn that the word can also mean "sprinkle."

The important thing in Holy Baptism is <u>not</u> HOW the water is put on - it can be by immersion, by washing, sprinkling, or pouring - the important thing <u>is</u> that the words and promises of God be believed; and that Baptism be given the way Jesus said: "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost." The water does not give forgiveness or any blessing. It matters not how the water is used. The blessings are received by faith. Let no one tell you an untruth: that unless you were put under water you were not baptized. Rejoice in your baptism blessings daily.

Silence Moving in Church of the Deaf

On Sunday I visited a church where the people didn't bow their heads when they prayed and made no sound when they sang hymns.

It was the Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf at 409 Swissvale Ave., on the Wilkinsburg-Edgewood border.

I went in somewhat hesitantly, feeling like an intruder, but a young girl in the vestibule assured me that visitors are quite welcome. She and several other young people seemed to be "hearing" children of deaf members.

CHURCH LIGHT, CHEERFUL

The church proper turned out to be a cheerful place with light modern decor. I sat at the end of a pew in the back, hoping I wouldn't be noticed.

People came in smiling and "talking" to each other with their hands. Occasionally someone would wave and toss a greeting to a friend across the room.

The service began as a man in white vestments and a younger one with a black robe over a green shirt walked down the aisle to the altar.

Everyone stood. Surprisingly, an organ was being played, but the congregation and the two men on the platform were going through the opening ceremonies in sign language.

During the hymns three persons in choir robes would face the people and lead them through the song with their hands, accompanied by the organ.

No one looked at a hymn book, although they were in the pews. I guessed that holding a book and using sign language would be virtually impossible.

AUDITORIUM ALIVE

During prayers the audience looked straight ahead, following the prayer visually. When the time came for the Lord's Prayer the auditorium was alive with moving hands.

For his sermon and other parts of the service, the pastor spoke as well as used sign language. After the service I introduced myself and asked if this double speaking created any difficulty.

He said it did. Deaf people THINK in the sign language he explained, and that language doesn't translate exactly into the spoken word.

He speaks because visitors are frequent and quite a few children of members attend services. The organ is played for much the same reasons, plus the fact that some of the deaf persons have a bit of hearing ability.

The pastor is the Rev. George Ring. Unfortunately he is leaving in a couple of weeks to become pastor of a similar church in Des Moines.

This one is the only full-time church for the deaf in the Pittsburgh region and the only one in Pennsylvania to own its own church building. The main structure is 10 years old. An education wing was added in 1966.

MEMBERSHIP WIDESPREAD

The congregation is 50 years old but met in various places around the Pittsburgh area before getting its own small but attractive church home.

Members come to services, and other church-related activities, from Greensburg, Indiana, Jeannette, Washington, Weirton and other far suburban communities as well as the immediate Pittsburgh district. They number about 170 at the moment. They have fun as well as a religious life. A large assembly room in the educational building has a pool table and other recreational equipment. There was to be a valentine party and dart ball contest Sunday afternoon. Incidentally, I discovered that they are delighted to have visitors. After I introduced myself, everyone still in the church foyer came over to shake hands, and they willingly stepped outside for a picture. If you would like to go, and are driving from downtown Pittsburgh, take the Parkway East to the South Braddock Exit, then take Greendale to Race Street and go left at the Edgewood Municipal Building.
