The TOKYO Story

"Hey, this is completely different---a new language, a different world!" And yet it's not new; we've been here some twenty one years and by now should know both the Japanese language and the country. But just recently after entering the work with the deaf, I realized, "The world of non-hearing is indeed different, with unique life-problems and special difficulties in communicating."

A gifted young man has seen the tremendous, challenging task of sharing the Gospel with over 20,000 deaf in the Tokyo area alone besides those in other areas of Japan. And now for six years following seminary, Pastor M. Kojima has set himself to an effective ministry in central Japan. But besides this, last year he was also called to be the pastor of an important hearing congregation in Tokyo, with real need of revitalizing.

Therefore, this dedicated pastor is wearing two hats now, and carrying a double responsibility. And he has a great vision! That is, not to have two parallel congregations in the same building, one for the deaf and one for the hearing. But rather to have a single, unified congregation for everybody! No separations, no distinctions but rather a real spirit of Oneness, a genuine fellowship! Because we are indeed One in Christ, truly brothers and sisters in our Lord!

To say that is easy---to have it realized is something else. This kind of unity would be something drastically new over here. The broad, deep love that Jesus gives to enable us to really accept all others is not that evident in most of the churches, let alone out in the general community. As a matter of fact, in contrast to the normal politeness and kindness in this country, they often consider a handicapped person like an untouchable...mistreating and discriminating. And some of that attitude has slipped into the churches.

'LIFE' for Those Who Hear With Eyes

The next time you watch "This Is the Life" on TV, ask yourself how clear the story would be if you could not hear the words. That's the plight of over 200,000 deaf people in the U.S.

The first captioned "This Is the Life" films will be provided for the deaf with a \$15,000 LWML grant. It's a one-time investment that will pay long-term dividends. How? Rev. Herbert Rohe, secretary of Synod's Ministry to the Deaf, explains:

"We plan to caption 15 "This Is the Life" episodes. Six copies of each film will be produced. Three will go to our Synod's Library for the Deaf in St. Louis. Three will be donated to the Captioned Films Library of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in Washington, D.C.

Deaf groups throughout our country request films from HEW, and these films with a Christian message will be seen by many whom we have never been able to reach with the story of Christ's love. (Please turn to Page 2)

But we also get many requests from English-speaking deaf groups around the world. Government regulations prevent HEW from sending captioned films overseas, so by making these films available from our synodical Library for the Deaf, we can also reach the non-Christian deaf in English-language schools for the deaf such as those in Ethopia and India.

After this first-time investment, the project should then become self-supporting, for rental and donations income will generate more funds, so that more films can be produced in the future."

Much of the time-consuming work of choosing the episodes to be captioned is done by a volunteer committee of deaf lay Lutherans. They judge them on the basis of how the subject matter of the story attracts the deaf. Action in the film also must readily interpret the story line--for instance, they would avoid choosing an episode in which much of the action and conversation takes place with the actors' backs to the camera.

The actual word-captioning is done by a Lutheran professor at Gallaudet College for the Deaf in Washington, D.C., and a deaf Lutheran pastor in Seattle. The critical technical work of coinciding captions with the time and space available on a film is done by a master technician in Cairo, Egypt, who is recognized as one of the best captioners in the world...and is a Christian.

With deaf Christians giving so much of their time and effort to help communicate God's love to their deaf brothers and sisters, hearing LWMLers can say an extra "thank you, Lord," as they hear those coins drop into their mite-boxes!

Esteemed Sisters and Brothers in Christ! Dear Readers of THE DEAF LUTHERAN! Greetings in the Name of Our Lord Jesus Christ!

Nearly 30 million people in India, half of them children, suffer from hearing handicaps. According to a survey conducted in 1970, there are only 70 schools - 17 of them in Maharashtra - with a capacity of 60,000 for deaf children. The cries of the deaf for attention and care have so far fallen on deaf ears. The sum of Rs. 1 crore allocated for rehabilitation of the deaf in Third Plan was a drop in the ocean. The outlay was raised to Rs. 11 Crores in the Fourth Plan. Even this is only one percent of the total allocation for rehabilitation of the handicapped people. Government aid to schools for the deaf is also limited to 66 percent. (Quoted from THE ILLUSTRATED WEEKLY of India, February 11, 1973)

In Tamil Nadu where the India Evangelical Lutheran Church-IELC- has started its first school for the deaf, there are 12 schools. Of these, 1 is run by the government, 2 by municipalities, 1 by Hindus, and 8 by church bodies.

At the request of Dr. Herbert W. Rohe and the encouragement given to us by Rev. James W. Mayer we want to tell you briefly about the work of IELC among the deaf children.

Desire to Start Work Among The Deaf

The IELC had shown its concern for the deaf and a desire to start work among them over a number of years. Committees spent hours in studying the question, men specially qualified showed us how the problem could be approached. Individuals in the church evinced keen interest by picking handicapped children and putting them in schools. But it was only as late as in 1970 that the Church entered this new venture.

Story of The First Year of School

On July 1, 1970, a group of about 10 Christians with only 3 teachers knelt down for the Opening Worship at our new school for the Deaf here at Ambur, India. All that the church was willing to afford at the time was an old missionary bungalow and other facilities in good shape, a 3-acre compound and budget of Rs. 6000 (\$800).

Through local dailies we had given publicity about our school for the DEAF. Many people came to see what is happening here. It is such a strange thing for some of them to know that you can help a deaf child. The news spread quickly and parents of some of these deaf children who once were under the idea that the lot of their child was only misery, were amazed to see what is happening here. They saw Christians here who are not their relations nor are their "caste" showing love to their deaf children; they saw about 12 deaf children whose faces were beaming with joy living together as a family.

Within almost four weeks we had forty children in the age group of 5-8 and that was too many to be handled by our 3 teachers. But the teachers were willing to take extra work and showed keen interest in the children. The school survived the first year in the midst of extreme financial stress.

Work Beginning to Bear Fruit

At the close of the first year it was heartening to hear comments from the parents of some of these deaf children. One of them said, "You have given a new life to my child; he was like a doll and puppet before he came to the school. He now understands what is going on around him;" Similar remarks from other parents moved us to praise Him they would "recognise" our Institution. The District Educational Officer made the following remarks: "Visited the IELC School on 18.12.1971 at 9. A.M. The Head Master and three Staff members were present. I am very happy to see the children taking part in their instruction. The teachers were enthusiastic in their duties. The management is taking every possible step to improve. May God bless them and give encouragement in their endeavours."

We are now a recognized institution for imparting education to the deaf under the Madras Educational Rules and this places us on a par with other educational institutions to receive financial assistance from the Government. However it does not mean that our problems have all been taken care of by them.

In Him We Continue to Serve

The school has now entered its third year of ministry to the deaf children and we rejoice to see great things that can happen when we place ourselves and ours into His hands. To substantiate this we shall pick the names of some of our children:

1. <u>Suthakaran</u>: (Means Son of my arm) is coming from a Christian family which lives in Kolar Gold Fields of the Mysore State where IELC is at work. There are nine children in that family and you can notice that unlike some other parents with deaf children, Sutha's parents give him a special care and hold special affection for him because they know as Christians that he is precious like other children who are normal. In Christ Sutha has a future. He makes a good leader in school.

2. <u>Dawood</u>: (Means David) is a Muslim boy from the town of Erode which is about 200 miles north of Ambur. Normally a muslim would not turn his child over to the hands of a Christian for training in early years, but this is a case to prove that the normal rule can be broken. Some day Dawood may become a Christian preacher of Christ to his own people. Yes, the Holy Spirit can do miracles.

3. <u>Kalavathy</u>: (Literally it means, Queen of arts) who is in the arms of Rev. James W. Mayer, is 9 years and is the child of a widow who is living right here in Ambur. When she first came she had a despair and sadness on her face but now it is radiating with joy becuase she sees and experiences the love of Christ practised by our Christian teachers. She can now join in the Lord's Prayer although she comes from a non-Christian family.

Group of Children at Play

The deaf children would normally be out in the streets loitering but here you see them playing happily under the care of their teachers.

Our Ambition to Make the Teaching More Effective

A good Christian staff is an asset to a school and by God's grace we can say we have that. But they should have proper tools to work with. Even for my country's standards a teacher in a classroom ought to have a desk and a chair for his use. At the time we opened, even this basic facility was not there; but it came as God opened the hearts of individuals. Today the class room is fairly well equipped but there's a lot to be done to improve the standard of our teaching which only would keep the school in its status. Group hearing aids and individual hearing aids are effective tools in the hands of teachers. We are grateful to the Principal of the Lutheran School for the deaf, Detroit, for sending us used group hearing aids with one of our missionaries.

"I was trying to encourage her, because I had some television experience in "Sesame Street' and she'd never worked in television before. It would have been good for her.

"When I got the part, it really hit me. I was really surprised."

Before she came to television, Miss Bove said she had toured with the NTD in a production called "My Third Eye," a series of five vignettes about the lives and outlook of the deaf.

One vignette, she said, "described our journey to the hearing world that we'd never seen before. It was a gentle satire on hearing and what we thought and felt about it."

In the show's closing segment, she said, "we acted out the song, 'Three Blind Mice,' to show the audience how we'd sing it. Then we asked the audience to sing it as we acted it out."

She giggled. "They never could keep up with us."

Miss Bove, who can read lips, said she doesn't go to many plays "because too many people just use words, words, words to try to say something. You don't need to do that. It doesn't mean anything unless you show you feel it."

What does she look for in any acting performance? "Concentration is the most important of all," she said after a long, thoughtful pause. "You have to analyze the character and use motion in the right way.

"You can tell if someone really means what he does or is just faking it," she said through Miss Worth, who is an aid to Hayes.

Linda Bove was asked what her parents thought about her life as a professional actress. Her smile had a glow that softened the harsh glare of the cold, white dressing room where she was relaxing.

"They're very, very proud," she said with her hands and eyes. "They tell everyone to watch me on television. You know how parents will do that."

findings. However, the Bible has not changed. It will never change. Therefore we can trust it.

The Bible has stood the test of time. It has never been proven to be wrong. When someone says, "The Bible is filled with mistakes," ask this person to show you just one mistake. The people scoffed at Columbus in 1492 when he said the world was round. Yet, the Prophet Isaiah said in 712 B.C. that the world was round (Isaiah 40:22). man (Genesis 1:27). 2) Christian Scientists do not teach evolution. Only the ungodly men and women who don't know God teach it. 3) Believing in evolution makes God a liar and the Bible an untruth.

According to the Bible, about 6,000 years have passed since the creation of Adam and Eve. If man evolved from a monkey, then why, during these 6,000 years, haven't some monkeys evolved into people? Evolution is only man's teaching. The Bible opposes such teaching.

Some say Adam and Eve were cave people, evolving from a monkey. The Bible says man was made in the image of God (Genesis 1:27). The Garden of Eden was a place of perfection. verbally and with signing ... using video tape recording and play-back on T.V. for improvement.

The deaf members have wonderful patience with us who are attempting to learn to communicate. And I think they are enjoying a chuckle now and then with our mistakes. But it's obvious they appreciate anyone who tries to learn some of the signs. The same is true when you begin to use any new language. The other person is very happy you made the effort and at least tried a little. Perhaps that apparent attempt does more to bridge the gap than one ever realizes. And it must be because it demonstrates the interest, the is more powerful than any vocabulary!

We enjoy doing everything together now. Obviously deaf members take full responsibility and are on the council. But we even have a unified choir, both hearing and deaf, that attracts a good portion of the congregation.

Pastor Kojima uses all kinds of visual aids including video tape recording and overhead projector. And I'm using chalk-art with colored lights and our little talking puppet. Everyone is encouraged to use their talent and do their thing. "Making and doing" for an annual fellowship sale has caught the interest of many. To share the message, the young people are gathering around folk guitars, electric bass and they allow my clarinet with them ... Bible study has sprung up spontaneously.

Pastor is a busy man: called upon to interpret for the deaf all over Tokyo, teaching signing, counselling, preaching, conducting regular meetings across this metropolis, Bethel Bible classes, and every week sending out two different sets of mighty, mini-news-letters in small print on post cards.

The significance of Pastor Kojima's approach is felt and realized by the unique call that he extended to us, and keeps reiterating. Namely that I am to come as a genuine fellow pastor to share the work equally together. Not as someone different, like a "missionary", but rather to face all the burdens and joys together. And he feels that people will be affected by the example of us working together in harmony...and that, in spite of all my foreignness in appearance, language and thought patterns. But He is deeply desirous that together we live out the ONENESS that we have in Christ Jesus. Then the congregation will really be established and many others will be brought into this tremendous barrier-crossing-fellowship of our Lord! What a privilege and joy to work in such a setting!

Yes, a new world, a different language --- but Jesus is the bridge!
