FIFTY-FIVE YEARS OF SERVICE!

Fort Wayne, Indiana News...One of the Lord's faithful servants in deaf missions has recently retired from the ministry. The Reverend Doctor Walter A. Westermann, most recently serving in Fort Wayne, Indiana, has moved to Walkerton, Virginia for full retirement. He has a wonderful story of fiftyfive years in the ministry that we would like to share. This is not only a story of loving service, but also a part of the history of our deaf missions.

55 Years of Service... Rev. Westermann is a graduate of Concordia Theological Seminary in Springfield, Illinois, class of 1921 His first few years of service were in the hearing ministry. He was a missionary in Delano, California, then he moved to Albert, Kansas, St. Paul Lutheran Church.

"There it was that the good Lord decided to take away my sense of hearing. I became extremely hard of hearing and felt I could no longer serve the flock at St. Paul." He then applied to the then Board of Missions to the Deaf and meanwhile learned to communicate with the deaf.

"However the honorable Board decided they could not use a deaf man. The Pastors Conference of Kansas voiced a

strongly worded protest- no soap- "so, having resigned my charge - we were on the way to Gt. Bend to find housing and, please God, a job." "We stopped for our mail and, lo, an answer from the Lord - a call to the church of Our Redeemer - Seattle, Washington. So God pointed the way! We moved to Seattle in July 1928 and served there until 1941." While in the Pacific Northwest, Seattle was home base for the Westermanns. Tacoma, Everest, Mount Vernon, Anacartes, Yakima were stations. Later they were asked to explore Montana, etc. In Montana Pastor Westermann served Missoula, Billings, Helena, Butte, Boulder, and Montana School for the Deaf. He helped get the schools for the deaf separated from the school for the mentally retarded. "The Montana Congregation 0 voted to establish the school at Great Falls, GIVE Montana. We had the honor of having the invocation at the dedication and our work expanded - Valere, Great Falls, school, Boseman etc. THANKS "We traveled over one hundred thousand miles per year. Vancouver, B.C. was also a parish and we had the honor and joy to confirm the first UNTO class of deaf in Vancouver, now Trinity Luth-eran Church for the Deaf." "During our years THE in the Northwest we were gone from home for weeks and Ma held the home fort and raised our two sons." "It was a joy for us when the field we once tried to serve alone is now served by three men." On December 7, 1941 Japan bombed Pearl Harbor. Westermann says, "We did not flee Seattle, as rumor had it, but we were packed and ready for our move to our new field -Tennessee and the South. We arrived in Memphis on New Year's Day 1942." "Our little garden patch included Tennessee, Arkansas, Mississippi, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, Florida (the latter three on the basis of 'when you can'.) Included were cities of Hickory and North Carolina School for the Deaf at Morganton, Arkansas School for the Deaf, Little Rock Louisiana School for the Deaf, Baton Rouge, Then all of North Carolina, South Carolina LORD.. were added to the field and we were serving the state institutions as visiting chaplain -Goldsboro, Raleigh, Wilson, Butner, Tennessee School for the Deaf, South Carolina School for 0 the Deaf in Spartanburg, South Carolina. Our GIVE mileage never ran below 35-40,000 per year. The work called, it had to be done. Sometimes we kinda wished we had a job on some garbage THANKS truck. Then we could throw down the shovel at 5:00P.M. But this was God's work and when we felt lowest, God would show us how He blessed UNTO our feeble effort and new strength and zeal always came." THE Pastor Westermann was also in Washington, D.C. He was chaplain at Gallaudet College for thirteen years and Gamma Delta was organized at LORD. this time. He saw Gallaudet develop from a

small school to its present size. "So we have spent some 45 years in God's Silent World and would not trade 55 years filled with life as an ordained pastor, 55 as student preacher teacher." "And now - we have hung up our robe, we feel with God's blessing, and we can sit back and listen until that Great Call comes to us. We are happy in our new retirement on the banks of the beautiful Mattajoni River with its restless tide." "Our village of Walkerton dates from 1640 - one of God's garden spots." "When we look back over our 55 years of active service we marvel what God has done, not because of us, but in spite of us. To Him all praise, thanks, and honor. He hath done all things well!"

New Lay Minister In Ft. Wayne, Indiana

Fort Wayne deaf rejoice over God's gift of a new minister in the person of George Perry who was installed on August 18, 1974 The Fort Wayne area has long had a need for a resident minister. As a group, it is one of the oldest congregations of deaf people in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod 80 year ministry to deaf people.

Below is a brief autobiography of Mr. Perry explaining how he happened to become interested in the ministry to the deaf.



LAY MINISTER GEO.K.PERRY, JR.

... I'll give you what information I can about myself. I will be 25 years old in November. I am the son of deaf parents. My mother's maiden name is Dorothy Violet Hartling and my father is George K. Perry, Sr. I was born in Los Angeles, California on November 13, 1949. We moved to Chicago, then to Pittsburgh. I spent 16 years in Cleveland, Ohio. I graduated from John Marshall High School, Cleveland, Ohio in Jan. 1968. My parents still live in Cleveland. I worked for Republic Steel for six months before joining the Navy in July of '68. I was stationed in San Diego, California; Coranado, California; San Francisco, California; Memphis, Tennessee; Milton, Florida; and in Viet Nam. I was a hilicoptor mechanic. After my discharge from the Navy at the end of '71, I worked briefly in a factory that specialized in making lawn mowers. Following that, I enrolled in Concordia College, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. It was there that I entered the Lay Ministry program. I was graduated from Concordia in May, 1974 then entered the Summer Graduate Program at Gallaudet College. On August 18, 1974, I was installed a Lay Minister for the deaf at St. John's Church for the Deaf. One of my assignments will be to teach the Sign Language at Fort Wayne Senior College I married Karen Huston on November 20, 1971. Karen has been a part of my ministry and without her encouragement, I doubt if I could have made it through Concordia in Milwaukee. Not only did she give me courage but she taught me how to walk in faith. George K. Perry
