# **First Aid Course Taught at Ephphatha To Help Deaf Save Lives in Emergencies**

Last October in Chicago, Illinois, eleven members of Ephphatha Lutheran Church of the Deaf enrolled in the Standard First Aid Course sponsored by the American Red Cross. The six-week course was taught by a team of three instructors, and nine of the deaf passed, including 83 year old Hattie Odom. The program was made possible through the cooperative efforts of ten staff persons. Two hearing persons from the community, Miss Emily Coleman and Mr. Mack



Harvey volunteered to assist Rev. Fred Allen in teaching. Another lady, Liz Ruskin (hearing) and a member of the church, William Jones, interpreted. Other church members were responsible for refreshments, supplies, and necessary service functions - Dorothy Miller, Mary Wallace, Elma Young, Carl Harris, and Reynold Hutson.

The class learned how to avoid accidents and received answers to a number of general health

questions. In the photo above, deaf class members are learning to apply splints. William Jones on the right is interpreting for Instructor Emily Coleman. In addition to basic skills ranging from artificial respiration, signed "help breathing", to short distance transfer. The instructors stressed repeatedly that the deaf can render life saving aid IF they train their minds to interpret visual and other clues at the scene of an accident and to render the necessary first aid. ( Example: The deaf first aider does not need to be able to hear in order to determine whether or not a victim is breathing. If he cannot see chest and abdominal movement or feel warm air from the nose, the victim probably needs artificial respiration.)

Among the visitors was Mrs. Nancy Green, from the public relations department of the local Red Cross Chapter. She said that the Mid-American Chapter had never offered the course for the deaf.

The students were graded on the basis of class attendance, participation, and a skill mastery test. At the conclusion of the course, the students demonstrated their skills in administering artificial respiration, bleeding control, general wound card and bandaging, first aid for poisoning, splinting, and treatment for shock.

Upon completion of the course, first aid cards were presented publicly to the graduates in conjunction with the regular Sunday morning worship service. (additional pictures on page 7)

# Citizen of the Year

For the second time a member of Bethel Deaf Lutheran Church has been named "Citizen of the Year" by the Colorado Advisory Council Serving the Deaf (CACSD). Rev. Donald Zuhn, pastor of Bethel Deaf, received the award at the Council's bienniel banquet in November 1974. Two years ago Herman Butler of Colorado Springs won the award during Deaf Awareness Week in Colorado.

Mr. Butler has long been active in deaf community affairs and in his church. He is currently serving as president of Bethel Deaf congregation, and has taught Sunday School for the Deaf and Blind, he has many opportunities to be a positive Christian influence on the students and the staff of the school.

Pastor Zuhn has been involved with the CACSD since its beginning in 1969, serving as a representative from Bethel Deaf during most of those years. He has also been active in the Colorado Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, having served as president of that organization. (Since receiving the award Pastor Zuhn has accepted a call from the Minnesota North District to serve the deaf there.)

Mr.Walter Feltz, a hearing man and a member of Our Savior Lutheran Church which is also a church for hearing Lutherans in Aurora, Illinois was presented a certificate by the Synodical Board of Missions. This certificate was also signed by Rev. Herbert Rohe, Secretary for Ministry to the Deaf. It is in recognition of Mr.Feltz's more than 25 years as friend and co-worker with the Deaf of the Aurora station.

The certificate was presented to Mr. Feltz by Pastor Arlan Brandt during the morning worship at Our Savior, and then admired by all the deaf during the evening service for the deaf.

The CACSD is made up of representatives from organizations of the deaf (social, civic, and religious) and agencies that serve the deaf. Two "Citizen of the Year" awards are given every two years: one to a deaf person and one to a hearing person who serves the deaf community.

Lent in the Lutheran Church is a season of contrasting emotions. It is a time to be "sorrowful, yet always rejoicing." It is a season of repentance and exultation.

During Lent which begins with Ash Wednesday on February 12 and ends with Easter on March 30 we go to Calvary's mournful mountain near Jerusalem and observe the great miracle of time-God's own complete sacrifice.

During Lent we learn to confess with the apostle Paul who wrote:"Jesus loved me and gave Himself for me." Christ's words, "It is finished," tell us that His serious struggle against the evil forces, namely sin, hell and the devils, is over.

Lent should be a time when none of us are permitted to escape the pointing and accusing finger of the Law, which says, "You killed Jesus the Prince of Life." No one has understood the meaning of Lent until he confesses within his soul:

- "Ah! I also and my sin wrought Thy deep affliction;
- This indeed the cause hath been of Thy crucifixion."

But Lent must also be a time when we come out as winners over sin and death and hell, as "more than conquerors through Him who loved us." No one should be in doubt as to the fullness of Jesus' forgiveness for sin, the sureness of full pardon for every sin, and the assurance of eternal life in the risen Christ. Lent tells us that we are free through faith in Jesus Christ: free from sin's guilt, because He was declared guilty by God for us; free from sin's punishment, since God held Him responsible for our sins; and free from sin's powerful rule, because He smashed sin's power over us. But now for a word of caution, we are not only "free from." We the believers are "free to." We are free to live for Jesus Christ and not for ourselves; free to love God by loving everyone around us (our neighbors); free to serve our Savior daily, not by

or for the reason of proving our own holiness, but free to serve Him because He is our Righteousness and He is our Peace.

When God made a sacrifice of His Son, He went all the way. It is fully finished, completed, done and accomplished! What remains for us is to learn from His Word what His complete sacrifice brings us, to thank and praise Him, and to serve as His active witnesses by word and example.

WHAT IS LENT???

- LENT is a special time of the year to remember how much God loves us.
- LENT is a time to repent-which simply means to feel sorry for doing things that are wrong, and for not doing things which are right.

What kind of Lent would we be observing today if Jesus had not been doing what He did? He delt with priests and criminals, friends and enemies. That's the way He made and brought peace between God and man.

The church is a good place to recall what Jesus said and did because it was for us. But that's the good news that must get out of the church where people are: In the streets.

The Rev. Erich O.D. Eichmann a daughter, Joyce Elouise. was born on July 11, 1896 in Alma, Missouri. He went asleep in Jesus on January 8, 1975 in Portland, Oregon at the age 78, with 53 of these years being spent serving the Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Rev. Eichmann, upon graduation from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., he was ordained at Zion Lutheran Church of Seattle, Wash., Sept. 11, 1921.

In 1924, Rev.Eichmann became well trained in the language of signs by the Rev.Dr.George W. Gaertner of Seattle, Washington.

He was installed as the missionary of the Oregon field by Rev.Gaertner, and from Dec. 1924 until April 1942 he served as pastor of Hope Lutheran Church of the Deaf. From 1935 until 1938, Rev.Eichmann served as vacancy pastor of Faith Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Spokane as well as vacancy pastor of the Western Washington field a good part of 1942, until he installed Rev. Arnold Jonas to serve that area on March 15, 1942. Again later Rev.Eichmann attended the installation of the present pastor, Rev. William Ludwig in 1971. In 1942, Pastor Eichmann accepted a call to Trinity Lutheran Church (hearing) where he remained for 25 years. Upon retirement he joined the staff at Our Savior's as a part time assistant to the Pastor. He continued

Mrs. Eichmann preceded her husband in death in 1967.

Funeral services were held for Rev. Eichmann on January 11, 1975 at Our Savior Lutheran Church. Rev. George Natonick interpreted the service to the deaf. Private interment was at Skyline Memorial. Survivors include a son, Kenneth W. of San Jose, California, a daughter, Joyce of Portland; sisters, Hulda Eichmann and Erna Weise, both of Chicago, Esther Hanson of Mt. Home, Ark, and Martha Poppe of Burlington, Wash.; two grand children and four great-grand children and a host of deaf friends in the Northwest who really loved him .

# ILDA - YESTERDAY...TODAY!

The first buds of the ILDA blossomed forth in Chicago in 1971 at the very first biennial convention. However, there was much confusion and only a scant few actually knew the course charted ahead for this wonderful association of deaf Lutheran lay people. The horizons most of the delegates at the Chicago convention envisioned were more of some kind of a social club rather than a fellowship of love, devotion, lay work, evangelism, service and worship.

In 1973, at the second biennial convention of the ILDA, not much had been accomplished to change the scene or improve the image of the ILDA Nevertheless, the ILDA had progressed in the area of having its name recognized. And at this convention in Kansas City, the minds of some of our lay people began to function in the direction of developing the image of the ILDA as it appeared to our founders.

With an enthusiastic and energetic new board of directors, several devoted and aggresive lay leaders and the cooperation of the Secretary for the Ministry to the Deaf working with the Board for Missions of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, a reformation began to take shape. The constitution that had first been ratified was actually a confusing jumble that left the reader in a state of uncertainity.

Editor: Please send me \_\_\_\_\_ copies of <u>THE OFFICIAL ILDA PROGRAM</u> magazine as soon as possible. I am enclosing a check or money order in the amount of \$1.75 for each copy ordered. The first goal of re-organization was to rewrite the ILDA Constitution properly so it would be an effective document in not only helping develop the ILDA image, but also facilitate the operation and administration of the association.

The second goal was to recruit as many lay people as possible and get them actively involved in ILDA affairs to enhance the prospects of obtaining a task force needed to carry out our objectives of serving our Lord and His Church and to obtain the financial support that would lead to self sufficiency. Once this had been accomplished, the many programs and projects for the ministry and mission of the ILDA that had been placed in perspective could become a reality.

In 1973, the ILDA showed a supporting membership of approximately 300 members, however, it is difficult to verify this as there are no records to support this figure. It is based entirely upon the fact that about \$300.00 was received by the Treasurer in paid membership dues in 1973. And the 1973 Kansas City ILDA Convention showed a profit of \$1,700.00.

In February, 1974, the ILDA board appointed a Program & Finance Director to help them accomplish their mission of re-organization. The first membership drive was successfully carried out and a new constitution evolved from the old one.

Attention was directed towards THE DEAF LUTHERAN and many innovations were introduced that greatly assisted in the development of the image of the ILDA and inspiring the readership to want to participate in the ILDA. Even though the readership of our paper is near 7,500 we only received 570 paid ILDA memberships which is not exactly a great showing if you consider how many readers we have, but it is an improvement of almost 100% over the paid memberships in 1973.

Today, the ILDA is still struggling to obtain the genuine support of our pastors and lay people and to become self-supporting. We have set out a goal for membership of 4,000 by 1977 and are now directing our attention towards the regions and our congregations and fields. The Eastern Region has taken the lead in establishing the ILDA in regions by adopting a constitution that is in complete accord with the International constitution. One of the most beautiful concepts of total involvement in the ILDA that is incorporated in the Eastern Region Constitution is the forming of local ILDA Chapters with their own officers in each congregation and/or field of the Eastern Region and the holding of region conventions on the even numbered years. The Eastern Region has set up its own board of directors which consists of a representative from each congregation and/ or field and the region officers. The president of the Eastern Region is chairman of the board and also serves as the Eastern Region representative on the International ILDA board of directors. The 1975 ILDA Convention Chairman devised and developed a new concept for our biennial convention that did not do away with our traditions, however, greatly enhanced the prospects of making conventions inspiring, exciting and meaningful. This was accomplished by introdicing activities and innovations that would give all delegates an opportunity to enjoy themselves while they gathered to carry out the work of the Lord, and also gave them the opportunity to participate in group activities designed for congregations and/ or fields which is another concept of total involvement. ## DEAF COUPLE FROM U.S. OPERATE BRAZIL SCHOOL

A deaf North American Lutheran couple who have served for three years in a ministry to the deaf in Parana, Brazil, have returned to the U.S. for a year's furlough.

Mr. and Mrs. John Ames are former members of Pilgrim Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Los Angeles. Their work in the interior of Brazil with a school for deaf children is described by Mrs Ames' father, the Rev. M. H. Sand:

"The Ames have faithfully carried on in spite of many difficulties in a new language area with its subsequent culture shock. Officials have marveled at their courage to wade right in, to ferret out the many hidden deaf children in this large area, enroll them in their school and bring them into an entirely new life.

"Pastor Rolf George of the local Lutheran church has been most helpful. The school has been recognized officially by the government God has given much favor to this dedicated work."

At this stage of the school's development, the government will finance the training of qualified teachers. The Ames have indicated that they are interested in recruiting some dedicated teachers and building up prayer support during their furlough in the United States, according to the Rev. Herbert Rohe, secretary for deaf work of the Board for Missions.

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Opa-Locka, Fla... (Deaf Zion) The Dade Association of Parents of the Deaf and Hardof-Hearing met at Deaf Zion. A panel of teachers representing four of the five Dade County Elementary Schools which have classes for the hearing-impaired children, told about the pro gram at each of their schools represented were Tropical, Auburndale, Amelia Earhart, and Gulfstream. At least some of the teachers in each of the four schools are in training programs for total communication. This is new for the Dade Schools, although it was being used in a limited way in some classrooms.



Sunnyvale,Cal...(St.Luke)... The California-Nevada Dist. met at St.Luke's on January 25th and discussed ideas re: TTY services for all deaf in church offices, newsletters for Deaf Lutherans in north California, having more representatives from each deaf congregation to be involved in deaf mission, etc. Those attending this meeting were: Rev.Harold Mitchell, Rev.M. Sampson, Mr. and Mr. Charles O'Connor, Mrs.Ellie Clausen and M.J. Van Manen. They ask that we all pray for them and the work of deaf mission

Total number of worshippers was 4.4 billion for the year. On a single Sunday about 40 percent of the population, some 85 million people, go to church, yet in a year's time 44 million people make it to a professional baseball and football games.
