Central Region Supports ILDA's New Constitution At Its Meeting In Chicago

Ephphatha Lutheran Church for the Deaf in Chicago, Illinois was host to the 1975 Central Region Conference. It was held April 4-6 and despite a record snowfall in the northern Illinois and Chicago area the day before (April 3), every member church and field was represented and the conference turned out to be one of Central's most successful and best planned.

Following the brief article below by Central Region secretary, Mrs. Iva Eklof, we will present an extensive pictorial coverage of the conference. Pictures will be found on pages 2, 6, and 8. Most of the credit for those excellent pictures should go to Rev. Fred Allen of Chicago, whose assistance with the camera work is most appreciated. Thank you, Pastor Allen. The Editor

The theme of the 1975 Central Region Conference was "Forward Together." This theme is based on Hebrews 5:11; 6:1, and Ephesians 4:11-16.

The conference was held at the 50th on the Lake Travelodge Motel. Accommodations were very good and the view of the waves breaking on Lake Michigan was most restful and refreshing.

Rev. Fred Allen and his Ephphatha Congregation of Chicago were hosts to this conference and together with Program Chairman, Rev. Martin A. Hewitt of St. Louis, Mo. everything went off so smoothly.

President Joseph Kindred called the conference to order at 1:30 P.M. Friday, April 4th. A major part of the first day of the conference was used in reviewing ILDA's new constitution. With the help of an overhead projector, it was fairly easy to compare the new proposed ILDA constitution with the current one. Questions were quickly and satisfactorily answered by means of a panel discussion. Three ILDA officers made up the panel were: Russel Healey, Joseph Kindred and Archie Marshall with Rev. Martin Hewitt as moderator. Rev. Herbert Rohe, Secretary for Ministry to the Deaf, LC-MS also gave valuable assistance in answering some of the more technical questions brought up. The Central Region delegates voted to go on record as giving their

full support of ILDA's new Constitution and By-Laws. Central Region will submit its own Constitution to the ILDA Board of Directors with the purpose of becoming a recognized ILDA Region.

In other sessions of the conference, representatives from various congregations gave talks about projects and programs of their home churches. This sharing of ideas was very inspiring and I am sure many delegates went home loaded with new ideas and programs.

Saturday evening's banquet found the delegates enjoying a delicious chicken dinner in the Red Carpet Room of the motel. Russel Healey acted as toastmaster and introduced our keynote speaker, Mr. J.B. Davis, a well* known and respected leader of the deaf community of Chicago. Mr. Davis spoke on "Deafness and the Church." Afterwards we were treated to some excellent entertainment by John Marquette and his friends. This group of actors were made up of two deaf and four hearing people. Then there was Miss Joyce Richardson, a mimist of outstanding quality. She performed a beautiful selection of mimes including a selfcreated one, "Forward Together."

Sunday morning found us at Ephphatha Lutheran Church for the Deaf. We had a bible class then the traditional Sunday morning worship and communion service. Liturgists were: Rev. Marlow Olson and Rev. John Nickerson; Layreader, Mr. Winston Clausell; Rev. Martin A. Hewitt delivered the sermon, " Going Forward Together" ; Rev. Fred Allen, Celebrant.

After church services, we spent the rest of the afternoon enjoying an excellent and delicious lunch served by the women of Ephphatha before departing for home.

Lutheran Mission Society to Provide Counseling Service to the Deaf

The Lutheran Mission Society of Maryland, a Baltimore based organization, will begin offering a special service to the deaf in the Baltimore area it was announced today by Richard L. Alms, Ph.D., Executive Director of the organization.

In making the announcement, Dr. Alms said: "It has been long recognized that the deaf - or hard of hearing - in the Baltimore area have considerable problems in obtaining adequate medical care, legal advice, or family counseling simply because they cannot communicate effectively with doctors, lawyers or counselors. That is the professionals offering services cannot and should not be expected to, use sign language to communicate with the deaf - and the deaf oftentimes have difficulty in speaking.

"As a result, the deaf do not avail themselves to necessary services. We as the Lutheran Mission Society are going to try and change that situation."

Dr. Alms indicated that the Mission Society has acquired the services of Mrs. Bernice Hoeper who will serve as an "intermediary" between the deaf, doctors and lawyers.





Mrs. Hoeper, a native of Wisconsin, is particularly suited to this unique role since she herself is deaf and is an expert (please turn to page 7)

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A LOOK AT THE LAMB



God paints beautiful pictures in the Bible. He wants us to know the truth.

No Bible person is described in more ways than Jesus. He is called: the Lily of the Valley, the Rose of Sharon, Wonderful, Counselor, the Mighty God, Master, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace, Redeemer, Savior, Son of Man, Son of God, Lord, and many more.

One name given Jesus is "Lamb". He was introduced by John the Baptist as such when John said: "Look, there is the Lamb of God; it is He who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1:29)

The people John introduced to Jesus were expecting a King. John told them about a lamb. What a switch! John could have introduced Jesus by many names. But none better than Lamb.

as one of the primary sacrificial animals in the worship of the true God. The Israelites sacrificed a lamb and wiped its blood on the door jabs so that each family would be "passed over" and spared from the terrible visitation of God on the firstborn sons in Egypt.

Isaiah explained whom these sacrificial lambs were picturing. He described Jesus by saying: "He was led like a sheep to the slaughter, like an ewe that is dumb before the shearers." (Isaiah 53:7)

Jesus is also pictured as a lamb in the New Testament. In the last book of the Bible, He is pictured as being crucified and identified by His scars. He is also magnified when we are told that multitudes of His people lift up their voices in hallelujahs to the "Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world."

ANCHORED IN/E In LOVE

In a time when families are being pulled, swayed, twisted, torn, and tossed about by various elements of today's society and life-styles, the ship of the family needs anchorage. What is an anchor? It is anything that gives sure support-a secure positioning in a time of storm - a secure hold for a heavy pull.



WITH GOD WE ARE ... ANCHORED IN LOVE

Any anchoring in love will be an anchoring in God. For God is love. God's love is totally unconditional and unmotivated - demonstrated by The lamb is pictured in the Bible His sending Jesus Christ to reconcile a sinful world and to overcome the most radical split between what is holy and what is unholy. Christian love originates in God's own love for man. His love never fails. With Him we are rooted and grounded. He is our stability, He is the center of vibrant family living in accord with His purposes.

Do our little loves fail so often because we are reluctant to trust 2 a big, solid love?

We now look at five aspects of marriage and family living that need anchoring:

1. ONENESS - ANCHORED IN LOVE!

The essence of love is union. Disunity comes from a lack of love. God unifies in Christ Jesus. But family solidarity and oneness need to be felt by every member. Love requires communication to be real. Words and actions go together. However, it is precisely at the time when the greatest love is needed that the individual is most unlovable. At this point love stoops to conquer. God draws people to Himself in community. In the family, as in the church, there must be room for diversity in the oneness of that community. An unhealthy emphasis on sameness breeds legalism and discontent. However, the unity must be real. Too often families have come to be mere cooperatives rather than communities. Sometimes people substitute other secondary groups for the meaning of the primary unit of the family.

ANCHORED IN LOVE!

How do children receive tangible, down-to-earth, sincere love?

II. FREEDOM - ANCHORED IN LOVE!

Each family member should enjoy the freedom to become what God intended him or her to be. Love seeks what is good for the other-rejoicing in the development of the other's potential. How does this happen? Love is ready to die to self. The action of self-assertion at the expense of others is broken down by the kind of love that is self giving. Today's stress on the freedom of the individual must be realistic and balanced by the individual's concern for the family unit.

Freedom is anchored in love. For love frees us from the fears anxieties, and self-concern that mark a life of unfaith.

How does one overcome the feeling of being "trapped" in marriage or family living?

Does the emphasis of the freedom of the individual place a child into a role for which he is not prepared?

III. RESPONSIBILITY -ANCHORED IN LOVE!

The shock of the second great sin recorded in Scripture is accented by Cain's statement that he had no responsibility for his brother's welfare. No marriage or family can rightly be called responsible unless it is motivated by love and understanding.

Spouses should recognize that their marriage is a joint undertaking, and that they share in authority and responsibility. The responsibility of being a parent involves a divine calling and an awareness of God-given responsibility.

Sometimes a spouse or child will overlook all that others have done for him, in order to concentrate on what they failed to do.

In what ways should a marriage be considered a social contract as well as a sacred union? Actually, the word has its root meaning in the positive sense of leading and guiding. A parent sometimes makes the mistake of concentrating on the child, when it would be more helpful for the child if the parent would concentrate on himself. But love continues to cover a multitude of disciplinary mistakes.

Has society gone too far in the democratization of the family? What is the difference between patience and indulgence? When should children's habits be managed for the convenience of the parents?

V. FORGIVENESS - ANCHORED IN LOVE!

In love a Christian spouse is able to respond with forgiveness towards his wife despite the most radical kind of separation that sin might create. Forgiving love enables a couple to live with the tension between what is and what ought to be their relationship.

The power of God's love shapes forgiveness in the family to include:

a) the seeking of genuine reconciliation and reunion;

b) The suffering of anothers sin without self-pity;

c) the risk of having to forgive persistent failure. Forgiving love accepts the other person in his or her weakness and goes from there.

Biblical ideals for marriage and the family must be sought even if they do not always fit contemporary thought forms or please modern man. We need to stop and ask the question: "For what am I striving?" The family ship anchored in love is not afraid to look into the future, because Jesus is captain and He has everything in control.

in the use of sign language. In her new position with the Lutheran Mission Society, Mrs. Hoeper will work with doctors and lawyers who have deaf clients, and will help deaf clients obtain these services.

In addition to serving as an "intermediary", Mrs. Hoeper will also counsel deaf clients on personal or family problems they may have. She received her MSW degree in social work from the University of Maryland and conducted her field work in counseling at Maryland School for the Deaf in Frederick.

"We are most fortunate to obtain the services of Mrs. Hoeper," Dr. Alms said, "since she is only one of five qualified counselors in the country who also know sign language. She will be a welcome addition to our staff and we hope she will perform many needed services to the deaf community."

Professionals and deaf persons wishing to use the services of Mrs. Hoeper should contact Dr. Richard Alms, at the Lutheran Mission Society of Maryland, 1201 S. Charles Street in Baltimore, or call Dr. Alms at 539-7322. Appointments are preferred since Mrs. Hoeper's workload will be limited, due to the limited nature of funds available.

Dr. Alms also says, "Pastor Robert Muller, who is doing a fantastic job in the area, really was at the basis of setting up this program, and I am sure he will see it through. It is new; it is different; it does need much support."



IV. AUTHORITY - ANCHORED IN LOVE!

Frequently, some modern voices try to gloss over the concept of authority, to force it out of sight, to claim that it is "undemocratic." Uncertainty and chaos burst out of the lack of leadership. There is a need for authority in today's families as always. Children have a need for parents who know what life in this world is all about and can assert their knowledge in a responsible way. Love is the key to maintaining family authority without tyranny.

Too often we think of discipline in its negative aspects of restraints and punishments. Take time to play... It is the secret of youth.

Take time to read... It is the foundation of knowledge.

Take time to worship.... It is the highway of reverence.

Take time to help and enjoy friends.. It is the source of happiness.

Take time to dream...

It hitches the soul to the stars.

Take time to laugh... It is singing that helps life's load.

Take time to love... It is the sacrament of life.
