Eighty years ago the first service for the deaf was conducted in Chicago, Illinois. Can you imagine that our country was only 120 years old when the deaf mission was started?

Praise and thank the Lord for continuing to bless the deaf mission and please remember to thank Him for everything He did for our country during the last 200 years. I have much love and respect for all deaf mission pastors for their patience and tireless efforts. I know working in the deaf mission is very hard work and I want to take this opportunity to say "Thank you" to all pastors involved in this deaf mission work. timedia leadership training program. Presently, they are working on a tentative outline of what they will need to get this program working and will determine what is each church's share will be if this program is to be successful. As soon as those two men have completed this outline of their plans, it will be printed and sent to each church in our deaf mission.

Two other projects that the ILDA Board is now working on are: \$1,000 to be sent to Rev. Charles Tang of Hong Kong. The money is to enable him to complete his education in deaf missions which will enable him to more efficiently serve the Lord and us. \$2,000 will be sent to Mr. and Mrs. John Ames, first deaf couple to go to Brazil to help bring the word of God to the deaf there. The money is to help them purchase a Jeep for traveling deep into the interior of Brazil.

Seven Regional Conferences will be held this summer and fall. Hopefully, they will begin to consider and send in candidates and nominations to fill in the three offices of ILDA at the Spokane convention in 1977. The offices to be filled will be; President-Elect, Secretary and Treasurer. Names and biographies with photograph portraits of candidates and nominees should be sent to Secretary Archie Marshall who also happens to be our Deaf Lutheran Editor. He is instructed to print them all in a special edition atleast a year ahead of the convention to enable all candidates to be given careful consideration.

From this will come a printed ballot to be used at the convention. The Nominations Committee will take care of this. So all Regional Conferences, please do not let us down now.

New Regional Presidents that are elected at this year's Conferences will begin serving as ILDA Vice-Presidents after the Spokane convention in 1977.

Many different project ideas have been brought up at the recent ILDA Board meetings and have been given to the Ways and Means Committee to work on. Many of those ideas have materialized into concrete plans and are beginning to bear fruit.

# New Sign Language Textbook

Dr. Harry W. Hoemann, Associate Professor of Psychology at Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, Ohio, and former pastor of deaf congregations at Pittsburgh, Penna., and Washington, D.C., has authored a new textbook, The American Sign Language: Lexical and grammatical notes with translation exercises, for the teaching of Sign Language to hearing persons. Illustrated by his wife, Shirley A. Hoemann, the book is published by the National Association of the Deaf and recommended by its Communicative Skills Program as a resource for Sign Language instruction.

The book departs from traditional methods of teaching Sign Language, which typically rely on vocabulary lists with photographs or drawings to illustrate the signs. The Hoemann text makes use of translations from English to Sign Language, embedding the vocabulary in a meaningful context and providing examples of grammatical features of American Sign Language. Each translation is followed by extensive notes which call attention to the strategies which are available in a manual language for expressing the meanings specified in the English original.

Videotaped models of the Sign Language translations are in preparation at WGBU-TV, the educational television station at Bowling Green State University. It is planned that persons who wish to have a copy of the videotaped exercises may send a blank tape to the television station and pay a nominal dubbing fee to the studio.

The book is being marketed by the publications division of the National Association of the Deaf. It is available in both a hard cover and paperbackedition.

TV's WEATHER WARNINGS. . . Many large cities and towns all around the country where there are a large number of deaf citizens are flashing weather warnings on TV screens whenever a bad storm is approaching. If your local TV station does not provide this service, then all deaf citizens living in such areas should petition the station until it provides this vital public service.

If you see TORNADO WATCH on your TV screen, this means that everything is right for a tornado but none have been spotted (on radar or by sight). There is no reason for alarm but keep watching to see if there is any change. If you see TORNADO WARNING on your TV screen, this means a tornado has been seen in the area. If there is a tornado warning, look outside to see if there are heavy thunderstorms. If so, you should seek shelter in your basement. If you have no basement, stay on the ground floor away from windows or exterior walls. An interior closet or bathroom is often the best shelter. If you know a tornado is approaching your home, a good hint is to open your windows. This oftentimes will reduce the damage to your house. Why? Because the air pressure in a tornado is very low and the air pressure in your home is much higher. When a tornado comes by your home the air in your home will try to escape very quickly and if all your doors and windows are shut tight, the air will cause your roof to come off and cause considerable damage to the house.

# Fact Sheet—Employment of Deaf People

This listing of facts on employment and deaf persons was prepared and distributed by the Virginia Council of the Deaf.

1) The employable handicapped population of America between the ages of 16 and 64 numbers nearly 12,000,000, according to the 1970 census.

2) Impairment of hearing is the single most prevalent chronic physical disability in the United States.

3) Although deafness is America's largest physical ailment, less than 1% of our medical research dollars are spent in its study.

4) Among our working population, 250,000 are deaf and two million have serious hearing loss.

5) The deaf population in general has an unemployment rate of approximately 17%. The black deaf male has an unemployment rate five times greater than the white deaf male, and the deaf black female has twice the unemployment rate of the white deaf female.

6) In 1972, the employed deaf individual earned 72% of the income earned by individuals at large.

7) Underemployment is the largest problem faced by the majority of the deaf population.

8) The deaf are frequently stereotyped into automatic and assembly line operations where they quickly reach a plateau where they often remain.

9) The deaf college graduate linotype operator or pressman is quite common for example.

10) Deaf clients have a rehabilitation rate above the average for all disability groups. Eighty-two percent of non-speaking deaf students accepted by Vocational Rehabilitation agencies were successfully rehabilitated, compared to 78% for all disabilities.

# **Special Ed Named Federation Project**

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The Missouri Federation of AAL (Aid Association for Lutherans) Branches has named a St. Louis-based agency, Lutheran Special Education, as the organization the federation will rally behind for the next year.

The federation will raise funds which will be matched, though not dollar - for - dollar, by AAL's home office at Appleton, Wisconsin.

Lutheran Special Education operates a number of classrooms for handicapped children throughout the St. Louis area. The organization plans to use the federation funds for a statewide education program aimed at teachers, pastors, and congregations, according to Lloyd Haertling, co-ordinator for Lutheran Special Education.

"With the money we receive we hope to sensitize Lutheran teachers and pastors to the needs of the handicapped, to show congregations how they might start Sunday schools for the handicapped, and to produce a resource booklet to guide principals and pastors throughout the state to groups equipped to help handicapped students," Haertling said.

The coordinator said his agency at present is the only Lutheran day program in the country which provides classroom education for the handicapped. Concordia College at Milwaukee makes an effort in this area but does not take education into different neighborhoods.

Haertling said he hopes the educational program will make special impact in the Kansas City area because much needs to be done there.

The federation action came at the group's annual meeting, conducted this year on April 24 at St. Paul's College, Concordia, Missouri.

This is the second time in recent years that Lutheran Special Education has been chosen to receive the funds.

In other action the delegates elected St. Louisan Jules Bush, member of Glendale Lutheran Church, as President.

Roger Zimmerman, also a Glendale member, is immediate past president.

# **Editorial** A good choice

We're pleased that the Missouri Federation of AAL Branches has chosen Lutheran Special Education as its project for the year.

Although all the projects nominated for consideration could certainly demonstrate that they merited support, Lutheran Special Education has some qualities which make it an attractive project. As coordinator Lloyd Haertling points out, there is no Lutheran agency in the country guite like Lutheran Special Education. For example, the itinerant teacher project helps teachers in severalschools to diagnose and prescribe a course of study for students with learning or behavioral problems. The program makes an expert in this area available to teachers and provides help for children who might otherwise have to be separated from their fellow students.

Lutheran Special Education also provides day programs in several schools for handicapped children who might otherwise have to be separated from their families.

11) Deaf persons have demonstrated their capability to do almost any kind of work. Deafness per se should not bar a deaf person from any employment for which he is qualified by his education or experience.

12) In industries where the deaf have been hired for many years, the deaf worker has been no more accident prone than the workers with normal hearing.

13) In industries with high noise levels, one out of four job applicants has developed some hearing loss. Some deaf workers are uniquely qualified to fill jobs with high decibel

E.F. Stoppenhagen, director of the local AAL agency, explained that Lutheran Special Education was one of about 20 projects submitted for consideration by the federation. After screening by the federation board and AAL's home office, delegates to the federation meeting were presented with three projects to choose from.

Only one is choosen, Stoppenhagen explained, so that an effort can be concentrated behind one project.
