# **Realigment of Deaf Mission Fields**

. . . from <u>Silent News</u> <u>Letter</u> Delavan, Wis. - Rockford, Ill. & Madison, Wis.

Things are moving ahead in the matter of realigning the fields of deaf mission work in Northern Illinois and Wisconsin.

A recent news letter reported that the North Wisconsin District had called Pastor Robert Corl of Madison, Wisconsin to be their first full-time resident pastor to the Deaf. Pastor Corl has accepted the call and moved to Wausau on May 20th. He will be installed in his new field on Sunday, July 18th at 7:30 P.M. at Zion Lutheran Church, Wausau. Pastor Corl will continue to serve the following cities in the South Wisconsin District: LaCrosse, Menasha and the preaching services at Oshkosh.

This leaves the smaller Madison field with no pastor. Pastor Martin Kosche has been asked to serve there during the vacancy. A call meeting is scheduled at Madison for Sunday, June 6th. The new Madison field will include Baraboo, the Madison and Oshkosh school programs and the pastor will assist with the Delavan school program on Wednesdays.

The Northern Illinois District has accepted the suggestion of the South Wisconsin District that the North Wisconsin District take over the work in Rockford and Freeport. A candidate was called. A candidate is a student who has just finished his seminary training.

A graduate of the St. Louis Seminary, Ronald Friedrich, was assigned to the Northern Illinois District. The plan is that he will serve deaf missions in the western Chicago suburbs and also Rockford and Freeport. The one concern that the Rockford group expressed was that the new man do spend at least as much time in serving Rockford as was given to them in the past. Our South Wisconsin District committee on Deaf Ministry and also the Rockford members passed resolutions requesting the Northern Illinois District to do this. Hopefully the new man will have more time to spend in Rockford and the work there will grow

A wonderful secret: The greatest joy on earth comes to people who believe Jesus finished the great work of saving the world from sin. Their joy grows even bigger as they tell the good news to others. God gives us all more of this real Christian joy. Read: Mark 16: 14-20.

### MISSIONS AND YOU

A recent Lutheran mission publication told about the baptism of an 80 year old man, an African chief in Nigeria who was also a Juju priest, using charms to worship spirits. It told about helping the Indians in the jungles of Peru to make chicken feed from jungle materials so there would be more chickens and more meat in their diets. It told about the training of "promoters of health", medical assistants, to work in the villages of Central America. And it informed about social work for the deaf in Chicago.

## EASTERN REGION CONVENTION NEWS

....by Delaware Valley Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Philadelphia, Pa.

The Eastern Region of the International Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA), which comprises Lutheran deaf congregations from Maine to Washington, D.C., held its semi-annual convention this bicentennial year, very appropriately, in Philadelphia, the nation's birthplace.

Theme for the convention, held during the Memorial Day weekend, May 28-31, was (again very appropriately) "Working With the Saints."

Host congregation for the convention was Delaware Valley Lutheran Church of the Deaf (DVLCD), Rev. Jerold Munz, pastor, a New Jersey District subsidized mission. Convention chairman was Elroy Treibel of Hockessin, Delaware (near Wilmington), member of the above church and of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church, Newark, Delaware, a Southeastern District congregation. Mrs. Lillian Quattrone of Philadelphia, member of DVLCD handled registrations, and Norman Bishop, also of DVLCD, was convention treasurer. The Rev. C. Roland Gerhold of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Newark, New Jersey, was pastoral advisor.

Almost 100 attended the convention which was held at Chestnut Hill College, a Catholic college for girls run by the Sisters of St. Joseph. This was the first time they had ever made their facilities available to any other organization.

The main order of business passed by the convention was the adoption of a constitution under which the Eastern Region ILDA will now operate. The officers elected by the convention were: President: Elroy Treibel of DVLCD; Vice-President: Pat DeRose of Lutheran Church of the Deaf in West Hartford, Connecticut; Secretary: Dorothy Cohler of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Elmhurst, New York; Treasurer: Ettore Simonangeli of DVLCD; and Pastoral Advisor: Rev. C.R.Gerhold of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Newark, New Jersey.

Liberty Bell, and the Betsy Ross House. The Sunday afternoon tour took them to historic Valley Forge, site of a winter encampment of General George Washington's army.

A highlight of the convention was the banquet held on Sunday evening. An inspiring "Bicentennial" show was presented by the "Gospel Trio" from St. Matthew's Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Elmhurst, New York. The trio is composed of Dorothy Cohler, Linda King and Warren King. Their show comprised gospel hymns and humorous skits presented in signs and pantomime. Banquet speaker was the Rev. Louis Jasper, now of New York City, formerly a missionary to the deaf in Hong Kong, where he spent eight years working with the deaf before returning to the United States. A colorful slide show greatly enhanced Pastor Jasper's presentation illustrating his work in Hong Kong.

The convention climax was reached on Monday morning with an inspiring worship service with Holy Communion. The service was held in the magnificent Sisters of St. Joseph ConventChurch on the college campus. The church features an awesome white marble altar. The message from God was delivered by Rev. Kendig Bergstresser, retired pastor with the Central Pennsylvania Synod of the LCA which is also active in work among the deaf. Rev. Jerold Munz, pastor of the host congregation was the liturgist. Installation of the newly elected officers was performed by the Pastoral Advisor, Rev. Gerhold.

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## GREAT LAKES REGION CONFERENCE NEWS

The twenty-third annual Conference of Great Lakes Region was hosted by Christ Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Cleveland, Ohio. It was held on the weekend of September 5-7, 1975 at Baldwin Wallace College in Berea, Ohio. Cross congregation of Columbus, Ohio arranged the devotional services. Rev. Donald Winkler preached on "The Problem of Pain." Mrs. Sarah Riddlebaugh led the choir through some very inspiring hymnals that were beautifully signed.

At 9:00 A.M. the first business meeting was called to order by the President of the Great Lakes Region. Election of new officers was held in the form of ballots. A five minute talk by each pastor from every field in the region was the next important thing on the agenda. Except for Rev. August Hauptman, who had to be absent due to a death in his congregation, the list of pastors giving the five minute report were: Rev. W.O. Neisch of St. Paul's, Flint, Mi.; Rev. Larry Guenzel of Alpha, Rochester, N.Y.; Rev. D.Winkler of Holy Cross, Columbus, Ohio; Rev. Clark Bailey of Our Savior, Detroit, Mich.; Rev. Bruce Stam of Trinity, Pittsburgh, Pat; and Mr. Robert Oettel, Layminister of Christ Church, Lakewood, O. Rev. Rodney Rynearson, headmaster of Detroit Lutheran School for the Deaf was a surprise guest of the conference. He gave a very interesting talk about the school.

Saturday afternoon session had four professional people, a preacher, and a lay-man giving lectures on the convention's theme, "TO LIVE IS CHRIST." The preacher was Rev. Winkler, the professionals were: Mr. Jack Scerba, an undertaker; Dr. Paul Conrad, M.D.; Mr. Tim Koral, a lawyer; and Mr. Eugene Schmidtke, an agent from Aid Association for Lutherans. The layman was Mr. Donald Mowl. A panel discussion followed the lectures.

Other business was re-arranging the Great Lakes Constitution and By-Laws to coordinate more closely with the ILDA Constitution. Hopefully this will be done by the next conference in 1976. Members of the Resolutions Committee were: Mr. Henry Walls, Mr. Clarence Schulz and Rev. M. Prok. Work on designing a regional banner was given to a committee for research and study.

About one-half of the attendees of the convention took advantage of the sightseeing bus tours which had been arranged. Saturday afternoon, they toured the historical sites of Philadelphia which are associated with our nation's birth, including Independence Hall, the The theme of the Conference was: "TO LIVE IS CHRIST", based on Phillipians 1:21. 100 registered guests made up the attendance.

The Friday evening devotion was in the form of a skit,"Color Me", given by the host field members and directed by Mrs. Shirley Prok. Entertainment was in the form of interesting games closely related to the theme of the convention. Snacks consisted of Pizza and soft drinks.

On Saturday morning Holy

The climax of the evening program was a talk given by the guest speaker, Mr. Ewald Kane, Ohio District Board of Parish Education.

Aiello will be responsible for conducting research on the present needs among deaf children for religious materials and coordinating the development and production of such materials. As part of his duties, the Rev. Aiello is serving as chaplain at Mill Neck Manor where he holds chapel services for the students and teachers on a weekly basis. Another aspect of his work will involve consultation with the religious leaders of the students' home congregation, parish or synogogue, should they so desire, for the purpose of assistance in the matter of materials for confirmation, communion instruction and the like for deaf students. In addition, the Rev.Aiello will act as liasion for the various districts and synods as consultant or promoter of ideas. For the benefit of adult deaf, Pastor Aiello will also serve as liasion for full-time workers among the deaf, such as pastors and teachers. In the area of deaf adult religious education, Pastor Aiello will survey needs, evaluate existing materials for instruction in evangelism, stewardship and Bible study... Installation of the Rev. Aiello as full-time Director of Religious Educational Services will take place at a later date.

#### THE CHRISTIAN PRAYS--

Dear heavenly Father, alas, this weak heart of mine fails Thee so often! My faith is so weak! Yet always I can turn to Thee for guidance and help. 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## Man Feeds Over 240 Children a Month on a Dollar

ST. LOUIS--A Lutheran layman from Maryland has found a way to feed as many as 240 children a month on one dollar. that his dollar would be increased, so he pledged five dollars a month to Lutheran Bible Translators. A few days later he received a salary increase, of which ten percent plus the Bible class dollar equaled exactly what he had pledged to LBT for a year.

Then there is Cox's experience, perhaps the most imaginative, and certainly the most fruitful in terms of "return on the dollar." The insurance agent took his dollar to work and talked among his fellow employees about how it could do the most for the cause he had already chosen to benefit world hunger. The office staff decided to invest the dollar in a box of Christmas ornaments, made a green felt tree for the wall and spread the word that anyone who made a donation to hunger within the week would have his or her name written on an ornament for the tree.

At the end of the week, all the ornaments had been "bought," and Cox went to his Wednesday evening class with sixty dollars in donations, which was handed over to the World Relief office of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, for hunger relief.

In a letter commending Cox and his office staff for their "thoughtfulness and concern for others," Dr. Leslie F. Weber, executive secretary for the LCMS Board of Social Ministry and World Relief, said that the sixty dollars contribution would provide 240 children in Calcutta India, with nourishment for a full month.

"While the other members of your Bible class spent their dollars in most wonderful ways of helping people," Dr.Weber wrote to Cox, "I suspect that your dollar will reach the largest number of people."
