# Progress In Realigning The Deaf Mission Fields

We have learned more about Ron Friedrich, the new man in the Northern Illinois District. Ron served his vicarage year in deaf ministry under Pastor Don Leber in Memphis, Tennessee. So he has had good experience in Deaf Ministry, signs well, and is ready to step in and take over the Northern Illinois Field.

Pastor Ron Friedrich and Pastor Martin Kosche met in Rockford and spent the day together on June 16th. They talked about the work assigned to Ron, namely that of missionary at large in the area of Deaf Missions for the Northern Illinois District. This means Pastor Friedrich is responsible for all deaf work in northern Illinois except that of two small areas in Chicago that are served by Pastor Allen and Pastor Nickerson. Pastor Friedrich's work will be big. In

Plans are developing in the realignment of fields. There are also some problems and the unanswered questions, but on the whole the outlook is that God is leading us into a great new era for Deaf Ministry in Wisconsin and Northern Illinois.

The Madison congregation, at its call meeting on June 6th, decided unanimously to call Pastor David Carstens of Connelys Springs, North Carolina. Pastor Carstens has acknowledged the call but has not come to a decision yet. Please pray for him that God will lead him to make the right decision.

Pastor Herbert Drachenberg of Reedsburg has agreed to serve the Baraboo station until a new pastor is installed at Madison, Wisconsin. We are grateful to him for this help. He will announce dates and times to the Baraboo folks. this time: Can he do all that work and at the same time give Rockford at least as much time as it had in the past? Maybe his work will be bigger and heavier than our work in the Delavan Field. In that case maybe Pastor Kosche ought to continue to help some in Rockford. Perhaps he can continue to help with the school program and sign language class on Thursday evenings for a while. These things will need more study and action by our and the Northern Illinois District committees on Deaf Ministry and the congregations involved.

Plans are being made to officially turn over the work of the gongregation at Rockford to Pastor Friedrich on Sunday, August 1st. A special service is being planned involving also the hearing congregation at Redeemer Church where the Deaf meet.

THE REV. NORBERT E. BORCHARDT

It pleased Almighty God to call from this life His servant, The Rev. Norbert E. Borchardt, on Sunday noon, June 20, 1976, following a brief illness.

He was born of Christian parents at Wayside, Wisconsin, on July 7, 1905, and received the new birth in Holy Baptism on July 16, 1905. After he was confirmed in 1919, he attended Concordia College, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, graduating in 1926. He continued his studies for the Holy Ministry at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri. He vicared at Modena, Wisconsin, teaching school and helping with pastoral duties. He graduated from the Seminary in 1930 and accepted the call to the deaf mission in Cleveland, Ohio Field from where he also served the deaf in Pittsburgh, Erie, Columbus, Findlay, Westerville, and Toledo.

He was married on July 20, 1932, to Hera Lemke of Morrison, Wisconsin. Two children were born to this marriage, Norbert A. and Elaine. Hera was called to her heavenly home on April 21, 1970. On September 5, 1971, Pastor Borchardt married Mildred Lemke, who survives him, Together with his son and daughter and four grandchildren.

In his retirement he served as Pastoral Assistant at Our Redeemer, Dearborn, until he was called to his Savior's side. The services for Pastor Borchardt were held at Our Redeemer with its pastor, The Rev. Arthur Strickert preaching and The Rev. Charles Zeisser, a classmate, officiating.

The Rev. Dr. Richard Schlect brought words of comfort to the family and friends from the Michigan District, of which he is President. The Rev. Herbert Rohe, Secretary for Deaf Missions of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, spoke on behalf of the Synod and the pastors serving the deaf. The Rev. Rodney Rynearson, Director of The Lutheran School for the Deaf, Detroit, expressed the sympathies of the Board, Staff, students and friends of the school.

Mrs. Borchardt asked that we share with you her thanks for the love shown to Pastor Borchardt by the members and friends of Our Savior Lutheran Church of the Deaf, both during his years of ministry at Our Savior and in his years of retirement. May the Lord richly bless you.

He retired from full-time service in September 1970 and received a special award from the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod in recognition of his 40 years of service to the deaf. He also received the Martin Luther -Doctor of Arts award in preaching to the deaf in 1957 and the John of Beverly medal in 1971. He was a member of the Board of Education at the Lutheran School for the Deaf, Detroit, from 1937 to 1970.

## CENTRAL REGIONAL CONFERENCE NEWS

More than 100 members of eleven deaf congregations in the four-state area of the central United States gathered at Indianapolis, Indiana, June 11-13th for the conference.

A highlight of the conference was the sharing time when a delegate from each parish told of their special tasks of mission and ministry.

Most of the business sessions were used in working through a new constitution for the region which is designed to agree with the international ILDA constitution and which will make our region an official branch of ILDA.

Elected to a three-year term of office were: President -Mrs. Betty Jo Healey of St.Louis - President-Elect - Albert Reeves of Indianapolis; Secretary - Diane Foster of Indianapolis; Treasurer - Mrs. Arlene Arman of Chicago; and Historian - George Perry of Fort Wayne.

Elected as the new Pastoral Advisor was Rev. Fred Allen of Ephphatha Congregation, Chicago.

Mrs. Mary Jane Rhodes, prominent parent of a deaf child of Washington, D.C., formerly of Indianapolis, was speaker at the banquet.

Pastor William Reinking, formerly minister to the deaf in St. Louis and later synodical executive secretary of Ministry to the Deaf, and presently pastor of Pilgrim Lutheran Church of Indianapolis, preached the conference service on the theme "Love Unites!"

Holy Cross of Delavan, Wisconsin will host the next conference in 1977, and the conference probably will be held in the springtime.

## NORTHERN CALIFORNIA LAY CONFERENCE NEWS

The Northern California Lay Conference had its meeting at the Memorial Chapel for the Deaf at Oakland on Saturday, March 13, 1976. A good number of people attended it.

The meeting was called to order at 10:45 in the morning, and was opened with prayer by Rev. Marlin Sampson. Rev. Dahmann gave a short devotion including the hymn, "With the Lord Begin Thy Task." Rev. Mitchell gave a brief message. Mr. Davis of Lodi, who was elected President of this Conference, gave a sermon, prepared by Pastor Visser of Lodi.

Mr. Davis introduced Mr. Harold Thuve and Mr. Charles Kotal of Los Angeles. They came to talk about the plan to establish the Pacific Region of ILDA. They explained that our region was the last one yet to be formed, and that the regions in the rest of the United States were already established, and going strongly.

Rev. Mitchell, who is the Chairman of the Deaf Ministry Committee under jurisdiction of the California and Nevada District, LCMS, gave a report. Mrs. June Munro interpreted for him. He reported that an average of five deaf Lutherans are attending the committee meetings. He encouraged the deaf to use their "voices" to advise the hearing churches as to how they can serve the deaf all the more. He urged us to know what is happening in our churches and to be more vocal, that is, more active He reported that work continues in establishing the TTY answering service so that the deaf can more easily contact a hearing person for to get help and even to get a doctor or dentist appointments or emergencies.

Rev. Mitchell urged us to visit the sick and elderly deaf. He also said that there are 13,000,000 deaf and hearing-impaired deaf in the United States - and that society should not continue to ignore the needs of 13 million people. also introduced Mr.William White, President of the Memorial Chapel.

Business meeting followed. Secretary Florence Sampson read the minutes of the last conference meeting, held at Fresno, in October, 1975, and the minutes of a brief business meeting -held at the Memorial Chapel on Sunday, February 29th.

Elsie O'Connor and Ellie Clausen explained about the expenses in mailing the newsletter, especially when we do not have correct addresses, announcing activities in our district, giving news of members, listing prayer requests, and names and addresses of the shut-ins. Mr. Davis said that he felt that God's Word should come first. Mary replied a bit of wit and humor and items of interest would get people to read it.

Treasurer Carmelita Weinmaster was not present at this meeting, but nevertheless submitted a report that the Conference now has about \$48.00 in its treasury.

Mr. Kotal took the floor and explained fully about the ILDA and the Pacific Region. There were questions and discussion.It was pointed out that at the last regional meeting, held at Fresno a few weeks ago, it was agreed that at this meeting we all should decide whether or not we want to help establish the region, and that we should not procrastinate any longer. The vote was unanimously cast in favor of forming the region, and was witnessed by two people.

It was suggested that the President appoint a representative from each congregation, for the time being in order to attend the coming regional meeting. He appointed Elsie O'Connor to represent the Fresno area; Y.Sue to represent the Oakland area; Mary Aghabalian to represent the

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Rev. Mitchell said that our District wants to help the deaf, and also that our District needs our help in order to know how they can best help us.

Meeting adjourned for lunch and resumed again at 2P.M. when Pastor Dahmann led in prayer and Showed a film strip on JONAH and gave a brief talk on the subject. Mr. Davis introduced Mrs. Ellie Clausen of Fresno. She spoke about her call to serve the deaf and her love for them. Mr. Davis Peninsula area; and himself to represent the Lodi and Stockton area.

Mr. Davis announced that the next Lay Conference meeting will be held at Sunnyvale next fall. ## Handcuffed By Unbelief

In Capernaum Jesus healed the centurion's servant and did many other miracles. In Nain He raised the widow's son from the dead. But in Nazareth, His home town, He could do no mighty works.

Why was that? Did Jesus, as far as His omnipotence was concerned, suffer power failure? Did He do no healing in Nazareth because the local doctors were against it or because there were no sick? When He comes to us, He does not break down the front door; He knocks. He wants to come in and share with us all the gifts He brings. He wants us to open the door.

But when our heart has been pierced by unkind words or deeds, too often we carry the wounds for days or weeks or even years and let the infection of an unforgiving spirit set in.

St. Paul tells us that we should put away bitterness "and be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgives you." (Ephesians 4:32)

When we refuse to forgive others, we close our own heart to God's forgiveness. The bitterness that we hold robs us of all peace and joy in the Lord until we, like the little boy, These were meant to become diamonds, but stopped halfway in the transformation process. Many of us, too, are half jewel and half slag. We have stopped short of our spiritual progress toward complete control by the will of God. No satisfaction can be found in such a situation. Two persons interested in ministry to the deaf -overseas - are currently receiving training here in the States. <u>Cheng Hsi Pan</u>, Springfield seminarian, attended the Gallaudet summer program. <u>Bessie Lau</u>, teacher of the deaf from Hong Kong who has just completed a years training at Central Institute for the Deaf, St. Louis, will be taking two additional courses at Washington University this summer, Bessie hopes to complete her masters training at Manchester, England this next year before returning to Hong Kong.

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LWML GRANT. . . The Lutheran Women's Missionary Leagues continue to be favorably supportive of our ministry to the deaf. The Missouri District LWML at its last convention provided a project of \$8,000 to Pilgrim congregation in Kansas City for a bus. The Cal-Nevada District News Bulletin of the LWML reports it has selected as Project #4 \$1,625 for "equipment for the deaf" in that district. I am sure the deaf congregations blessed with and by these projects are indeed deeply grateful and appreciative.

# PROJECT FEEDBACK Getting The Word Back To The Doctors

"Medical doctors need feedback from their patients," says Dr. George W. Fellendorf, executive director of the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf. "And so do speech therapists, audiologists, and special educators," he adds.

Project Feedback, a new program announced by the Bell Association, urges parents of hearing impaired children to write the physicians and specialists whom they have consulted in the past, providing current information on their children's progress. Through parent feedback, physicians, audiologists, and educators are receiving information on patients whom they might not have seen for 10 or 20 years.

In an editorial in the Association's journal, The Volta Review, Fellendorf explains. "Perhaps 30% of the nation's population moves every year." "Many pediatricians, general practioners, audiologists and special educators see young hearing impaired children, diagnose the condition, make recommendations and then don't see these children again. Without a knowledge of what has happened to a child after his family has moved away, the chances are that these authorities will never know if their diagnosis and recommendations were right, wrong, or some where in-between."

The Bell Association respondes with suggestions for a letter and instructions to aid parents and others on how to provide full details of their child's growth and changes since he or she was last seen by the various medical authorities. As a result, doctors are updated, enriched, and more fully informed so they can better advice other patients with hearing losses.

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## A Challenge To Parents

Sr. Joyce Buckler, Director St. Joseph Institute for the Deaf St. Louis, Missouri taken from <u>THE</u> <u>STAR</u>, St. Louis what you, his parents, value; he is deaf but he deserves to know the things that worry you, that cause you concern; he is deaf but he too, needs a wide range of interests.

Three incidences have occurred recently which cause me concern. A parent acknowledged that he had not discussed the

"facts of life" with Johnny because he was afraid "he wouldn't understand"; a child took a personality test which showed a lack of value/moral code present --a parent acknowledged setting a different set of standards for the deaf child from those set for the rest of the family.

What do these incidences reveal? -that the deafness is taking precedence over the child --if we are striving to make our children a real part of society, this must start within the family. It is this initial society where they will learn to share, organize themselves as full persons absorbing because they are exposed to you - you in your greatness - and you in your weakness!

May I challenge you to give your deaf child one of the greatest gifts you have - a chance to live his or her life as a full member of your family! He or she will bless you forever!

This CHALLENGE TO PARENTS asks two very good questions. Do we use our child's deafness as an excuse to cop out of one of our most important responsibilities of parenthood - passing on our faith to our children. Sometimes it is too easy to say. "Let the pastor do it." or "Let the school do it." After all, "they are trained to communicate with Johnny."

Underway since early April, Project Feedback is daily receiving favorable comments and requests on how to proceed from parents and other interested persons working with hearing impaired children. Comments received by the Association include:

"We are very excited by Project Feedback."

"We are anxious to have the brothers and sisters do. He is parents of our preschool hearing deaf, but he deserves to know

I would like to ask you two questions: Do you really communicate with your child the depth within you? Relative to this question is another: Is your child deaf first or a child first?

This second question is basic to the first. If we are to say or even assume: "Johnny won't understand what I'm saying --"then we don't share with him our deepest values, beliefs, worries, concerns and interests which are his right to share. As a full member of your family, he deserves to know his family as brothers and sisters do. He is deaf, but he deserves to know

Does your deaf child understand your feelings, your faith, your God? When was the last time you had a significant two-way conversation with your deaf child? Perhaps you say, "I don't know his language." -- Well you better learn; or perhaps you might say --"I don't have the time." Well you better make time! Your chance to pass yourself--your morals, values, and faith on to your child comes only once. Before you know it the time will be too late and you'll ask, "What did I do wrong?" Take the time now to get to really know your deaf child and let him/her really know you -- it's your God-given duty and right.
