The funeral was held on Monday, February 14th in First Lutheran Church of Knoxville, Tennessee, Reverend Harry D. Smith officiated. He was buried next to his wife who died in 1971.

Mr. Jones was born on May 4, 1902, in Wainwright, Kentucky. His parents were members of His parents were members of the Methodist Church His father, Obadiah B. Jones, died in 1910 and his mother, Frances E. died in 1912. Until he was six years of age his parents lived in Kentucky. They moved to Florida and Mr. Jones lived there until he was seventeen years of age.

He attended the public schools in Ocala, Florida, until age fifteen when he entered the Florida State School for the Deaf in 1917, graduating in 1919, From 1919 to 1924 he attended

From 1941 to 1943 he attended the University of Tennessee where he received his M.A. in administration and industrial education. He has also attended summer schools in the University of Florida. From 1923 to 1924 he taught intermediate classes at the Kendall School, Gallaudet College, where he was a teacher in training.

His professional career centered in teaching deaf young people. He was a classroom teacher and printing instructor at the Idaho School for the Deaf(1924-1928); a classroom teacher and printing instructor at the Mississippi School for the Deaf (1928-1936) where he edited The Deaf Mississippian; and an editor of the Tennessee Observer (1936-1971) at the Tennessee School For the Deaf, Knoxville, where he was a printing instructor for 10 years and the vocational principal for 25 years.

Well read and widely traveled, Uriel has often been called upon to speak at conventions and banquets across the country.

When Mr. Jones retired from active teaching he still held membership in the following nation -al organizations: the Gallaudet College Alumni Association, The National Association of the Deaf, the Convention of American Instructors of the Deaf, the National Fraternal Society for the Deaf, and the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf.

Uriel was married, June 29, 1930, to Evelyn McMullen who was also an instructor at the Tennessee School for the deaf. She passed away on February 27, 1971. They were blessed with two children, a son who lives in Crete, Illinois - Uriel C. Jones, Jr., Vice-President of Roadway Truck Lines, and a daughter, Barbara Ann, wife of Rev. Leslie Ulrich, LC/MS Campus pastor at the State University in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

His editing experience also included the vocational bulletin of the Convention of American Instructors of the Deaf (1939-1947), a Rotarian Club publication (1960-1966), and numberous school yearbooks. During World War II he worked for the Knoxville, Tennessee, Journal as an editorial assistant.

Uriel is well known on the national scene for his outspoken support of the potential of the deaf to succeed in all walks of life if given the education and the opportunity, and he has contributed articles on various subjects to

Upon his retirement in 1971 he was hired as editor and subscription manager of The Deaf Luther -an by the Synod's Board for Missions, January 1, 1972. He took up residence in St. Louis, Mo. shortly after becoming editor of this publication and became a member of Holy Cross Lutheran Church for the Deaf in St. Louis.

Mr. Jones also was very active in The International Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA), and was its first president elect.

Closed fist or open hands? One shows anger, the other shows love. When a person is ready to fight he closes his fist...when a person is ready to hug he opens his hands. One shows selfishness, the other shows concern and assistance. One shows human weakness, the other shows divine strength.

How important our hands are! What things they can reveal (show) about us! Our hands are instruments (tools) that God has given to change our world and care for ourselves. Our hands are instruments through which our minds and hearts express themselves in action and in words.

A new baby usually has its fists closed. The Christian Gospel helps people to looseen up that closed fist. Sconer or later it must happen. Some never come to that point during life, but at death it happens. A person dies and he loses his grip. His hands are open. He takes nothing with him. The story of our hands is the story of our lives.

The Creating Hand:



Christ's open hands bear the scars of nail wounds inflicted for our sins that we might become healed and forgiven. His hands invite, "Come unto Me all you who are weary and loaded with cares, and I will give you rest." (Matt.ll: 28). Some people around Jesus raised closed fists in anger towards Him. Jesus' hands were open for blessing. His strong hands gave sight to the blind, opened deaf ears, gave health and cleansing, and raised the dead. His open hands were on the heads of the children in blessing and His were the hands that broke bread with the disciples and offered the cup of wine to them. Today He meets the needs of all people through the Gospel brought to them through our hands and voices.

Praying Hands: 🕅

Are hands folded in prayer, then raised high in worship before God's throne. There we receive hope through the knowledge of forgiveness. Hands lifted in praise will not allow closed fists of self-love and bitterness.

Witnessing Hands:



Hands that knock at the neighbor's door in answer to the command of Jesus, "You shall be witnesses for me..." (Acts 1:8). Hands may point or show the way to Jesus, the Word of Life, the "One Way" that God has provided for lost souls to find eternal life, peace, and hope. How far can we reach with the Gospel? The automobile, the printing press, the radio, television, and the airplane have placed the whole world very near to our hands. Christ's message is very clear, "You are My hands!"

Choice Items From

The ILDA Board Meeting

1. No Regional President may serve on the ILDA Board of Directors until he or she has been installed at an ILDA National Convention.

In order to give the ILDA continuity, Regional Presidents will serve for one year on the ILDA Board and as Regional President and then one more year on the ILDA Board after théir Regional Presidency ends. (unless reelected by their regions).

For example:

- a) Region. . . 1976 1978 b) ILDA Board- 1978 - 1979
- There will be a banner or flag contest as one of the events at the Spokane Convention. This contest is being sponsored by the Editor of the <u>Deaf Lutheran</u>.

The dimensions or size of the flag should be approximately 29"X48". Construction should be of cloth or felt, similiar to the way our church banners are made. Any number of colors may be used and the seal of ILDA must be somewhere on the banner. Wording should be kept to a minimum.

A cash prize of \$50.00 will be awarded to the creator of the winning flag design. The flag will then become the property of ILDA and be flown or displayed at its conventions.

- Active Honorable Life Memberships in the ILDA will be given free to our elderly (65 or older) Deaf Lutherans who request them.
- 4. A budget of \$18,470 was approved for the Feb. 1, 1977 Feb. 1, 1978 fiscal year.
- 5. Rev. Rynearson will treat to a steak dinner atop the Ridpath Hotel the first Regional President who sends in 77 new ILDA memberships. This does not include renewals of old memberships. The dinner will include the wife of the winning president too.
- 6. Rev. Herbert Rohe suggested we form a "GOD'S ILDA 1,000 CLUB". We will try to recruit 1,000 members who will be willing to contribute \$10.00 per year. This will help ILDA to become stronger financially. Everybody on the Board was enthusiastic about the idea and immediately signed up and planked down their \$10.00 The latest



members on this club are Mr. and Mrs. Ed. A. Trainor, Sr. So far we have 12 signed up.
