He Is Risen!

HE IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED! These are the words that Christian people long ago used to greet one another. It would be good if Christians would again use these words to help remind each other about the wonderful thing that Jesus did on Easter Sunday.

HE IS RISEN! What does that mean for you and for me? Jesus tells us what it means for us. Jesus tells us, "Because I live you shall live also." In John 11:25-26, Jesus tells us, "I am the Resurrection and the life. Anyone who believes in Me will live even if they die. Yes, anyone who lives and believes in Me shall never die." That is the great joy and the good news in the meaning of the words, "HE IS RISEN" for you and for me.

Jesus suffered and died on the cross for our sins. Jesus died because God told Adam and Eve, "The day you sin you shall surely die." So death for our bodies is one of the punishments for our sins. To fully accept all the punishment for our sins, Jesus also had to die. But Jesus did not stay dead. On the third day Jesus rose again from the dead and defeated the power of death for us.

With His resurrection, Jesus shows us that He has the power to raise us from the dead. With Jesus as our Lord and Savior death has no more power over us. Death can't hold us forever. When Jesus comes again on the last day, He will raise our bodies from death and we will live forever.

The words "HE IS RISEN" shout to us that death has no more power over us. The words "HE IS RISEN" shout to us that we will live forever with Jesus in heaven.

St. Paul told the Christians in Thessalonica that when Jesus comes again, at the sound of the trumpet, all those people who died believing in Jesus shall be raised from death first, then those people who are living and believing in Jesus shall be caught up and carried up to the clouds to meet Jesus and we shall be with Jesus forever. (1 Thessalonians 4:16-17).

Although on March 26th of this year, we celebrated Jesus' Resurrection from the dead, our celebration should not be for only one day each year. Our celebration should be everyday of our lives. Jesus' resurrection should make much joy in us each day because we know Jesus destroyed death with His victorious resurrection.

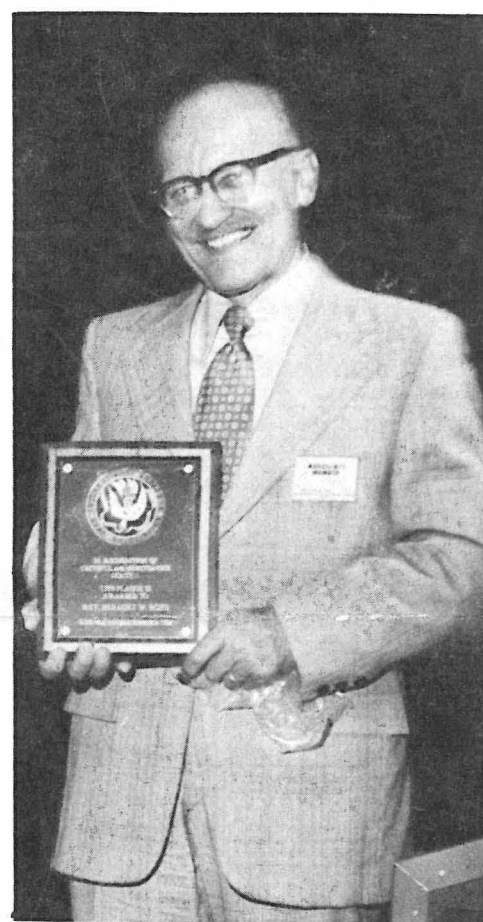

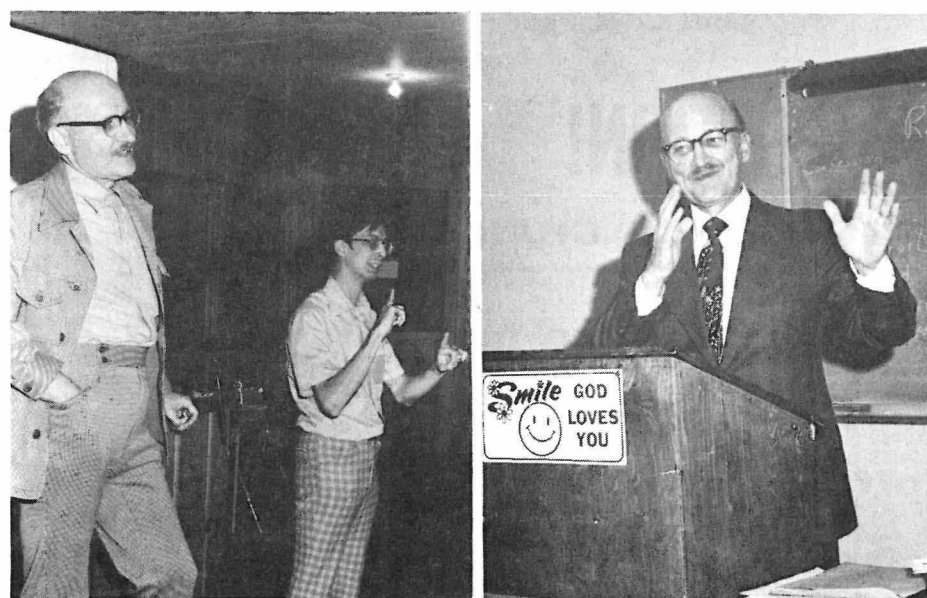
Rev. Herbert W. Rohe has accepted the call to Trinity and Faith Congregations in Nevada and El Dorado Springs, Missouri. Both congregations have been without a resident pastor for twelve years. Both are hearing congregations.

Rev. Rohe has served as Secretary for Ministry to the Deaf for about fourteen years. This includes the last year where he worked as acting Secretary for Synod's Deaf & Blind Missions. His office was located in The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod Headquarters at 500 North Broadway, St. Louis, Mo. It was at the Ephphatha Conference in Estes Park, Col. in July, 1964 when Pastor Rohe was installed as Secretary to the Deaf Mission field.

Rev. H. Rohe Leaves Deaf Mission Field

Rev. Rohe, left, introducing Dr. and Mrs. Warth to the I.L.D.A. Board of Directors that were meeting in Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Mo. It was at this meeting in February, 1977 that Rev. Rohe revealed that Mrs. Naomi Warth had been named to receive the John of Beverley Medal. Mrs. Warth was the most surprised of all at the news since she was not informed beforehand.

Since that time, Rev. Rohe has proven himself to be a tireless and faithful worker. He was a firm and steadfast friend of the deaf, a true disciple of Christ whose sole goal was to bring the Good News of Christ's salvation to as many deaf persons as possible throughout the world. He was blessed with a pleasant personality, and a charming smile. All those attributes won him a host of friends and admirers throughout the world.

In striving to reach his goal of bringing Christ to the deaf, Rev. Rohe encouraged deaf Lutherans to take active parts themselves in this mission work. He was one of I.L.D.A.'s strongest supporters since the beginning of this organization whose main aim is to give deaf lay men an active and meaningful role in carrying out Christ's mission. The present editor of The Deaf Lutheran received invaluable support and encouragement from Rev. Rohe since taking over this publication, and no doubt will miss him the most. All the other deaf Lutheran organizations such as Lutheran Deaf Mission Society (LDMS), The Regional Conferences, and Ephphatha Conference will likewise share in the loss of this so valuable a friend.

Rev. Herbert W. Rohe was born in Verndale, Minnesota. He is married to Effie Christine (nee Albertsen). From this union they were blessed with a son, David Walter.

Pastor Rohe received his Parochial School education at Immanuel Lutheran School in Albany, Minnesota. He was confirmed by his father, Rev. Walter E. Rohe in 1933.

He attended Concordia College in St. Paul, Minnesota and graduated from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri in 1945. He vicared in 1940 to 1941 at Immanuel Lutheran School in Albany, Minn. where he was a teacher in 8 grades. From 1943 - 44, he vicared at the Missions to the Deaf, Cleveland, Ohio under Rev. Theo. Frederking.

Rev. Rohe was ordained and installed at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Pittsburgh, Pa. on Feb. 25, 1945 by H. Lindke, V. Pres. Eastern District, Rev. Theo. Frederking, preaching, Dr. John Salvner, Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions to the Deaf, interpreted. Rev. Rohe

served the Western Pennsylvania and New York Fields in this capacity from 1945 until 1952.

On August 17, 1952, Rev. Rohe was installed at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Western New York by Dr. C.A. Behnke, President of the Eastern District, Rev. H.R. Frinke preaching and Rev. Theo. Frederking, interpreting. Rev. Rohe served in this Rochester N.Y. Field until 1961.

On August 29, 1961, Rev. Rohe was installed at Trinity Lutheran Church, Houston, Texas by Rev. H. Meyer, Rev. William Reinking, Executive Secretary of Board of Missions, preached and interpreted. Pastor Donald Black officiant.

Other services that Rev. Rohe has performed are:

Protestant Chaplain of the Central N.Y. School for the Deaf 1954 - 61

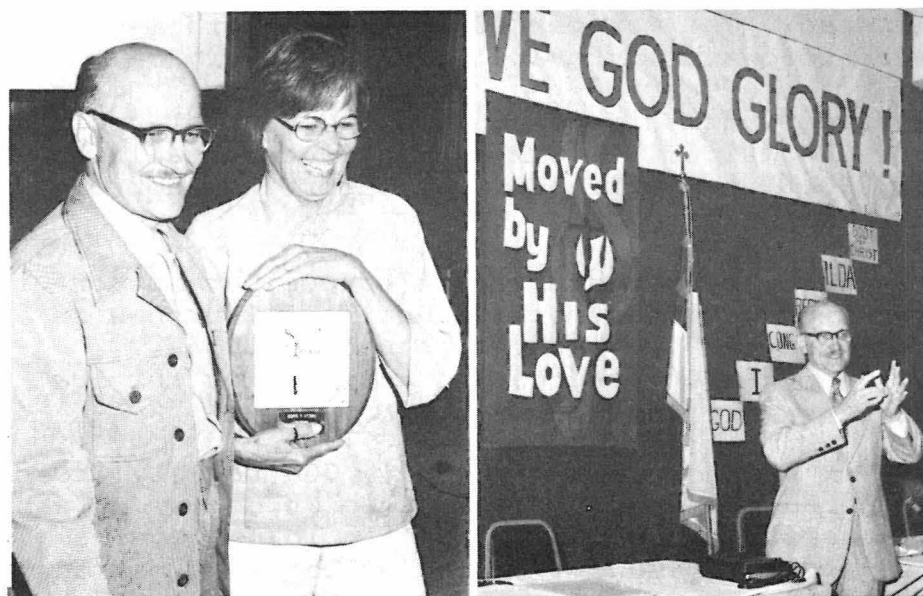
Representative of the Eastern District to the Board of Trustees of the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, 1953 - 61

Member of the Board of Trustees, Mill Neck Manor, Lutheran School for the Deaf, Mill Neck, L.I., N.Y., 1961 -

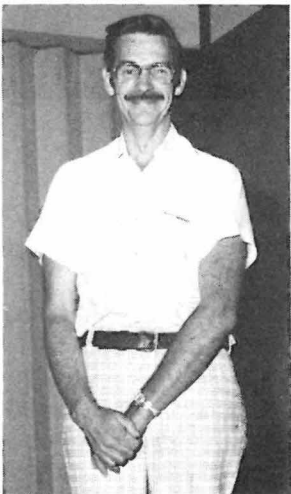
off the cuff news briefs from the i-l-d-a board meeting feb. 23-25, 1978

-condensed from a report prepared by Lester Ahls

This is the first meeting of the new Board of Directors of the I.L.D.A. since the close of the fourth biennial convention at Spokane, Wash.

The meeting was held at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri on Feb. 23-25, 1978.

Present were: President Joseph Kindred, Pres.-Elect Charles Kotal, Secretary Marion Van Manen, Treasurer Elmer D. Francisco, Regional Presidents: Richard Crossen - Great Lakes, Harold Thuve - Pacific, Elroy Treibel - Eastern, Lester Ahls - Midwest, Billy Fitzgerald - Dixie, Bettye Jo Healey - Central, Harold Rife - Northwest, Pastoral Advisor Rev. Paul Dorr, Representative-Bd. for Missions - Rev. Herbert W. Rohe, Deaf Lutheran Staffers: Russel Healey, Business Mgr., Archie D. Marshall, Editor, Visitors: LaVerne Mass and three others.

The meeting began with Communion Service celebrated by Revs. Dorr and Rohe. Pres. Kindred lead the responses.

New board members were briefed by President Kindred. The minutes of the last board meeting were read and approved. The Treasurer, Mr. E. Francisco reported that gross receipts from the last convention totalled \$13,852.89. Net profits were \$4,741.11. L.D.M.S. has funds totalling \$2,792.87. The Treasurer's report was approved by the auditing committee.

The International Training Seminar in conjunction with the World Council of Churches in Washington, D.C. had receipts of \$98,347. \$5,924 was returned to Aid Association for Lutherans which had contributed \$53,000.

A plan of repayment of \$1,000 to Holy Cross Lutheran Church for the Deaf in St. Louis, Mo. was discussed. This money had been loaned to The Deaf Lutheran to aid in the purchase of reproduction equipment last year.

A motion was made and passed that \$100 be used from our treasury as a farewell gift to Pastor Rohe. (see story on Page 1). At the conclusion of the board meeting today, a dinner was held at "The Flaming Pit" in honor of Pastor Rohe and his wife, Effie. Along with the money gift, a large framed picture of "Hands" was presented to them.

Law Committee Chairman Charles Kotal reported that Bettye Jo Healey (Central Region) and Lester Ahls (Midwest) have consented to serve on his committee.

Billy Fitzgerald, 1979 ILDA Convention Chairman, reported that tentative dates of the Fifth Biennial would be June 21-24, 1979. There was some concern about lack of more preparations and President Kindred urged for a concentrated effort to get things moving. Bettye Jo Healey was appointed Convention Coordinator. She and a committee of her choosing are to make a trip

to Memphis, Tenn. to set up things there that will assure a successful 1979 convention. She is to report directly to the President and the Secy. upon her return.

Regional Presidents gave their reports. Law Committee Chairman Kotal requested updated Regional Constitutions and By-laws be sent to him. Francisco also reminded the Regional Presidents to make sure that they nominate officers to serve on the I.L.D.A. at their regional conferences this year and to send their nominations, pictures, biographical sketches, to him at their earliest convenience following the conclusion of their conferences.

Committee Chairpersons appointed by the President were: Ways and Means-Harold Thuve and Crossen; Media-Laverne Mass; Projects-President Kindred, himself.

Mission Projects adopted by the Spokane Convention were discussed. Following discussions the board voted to take immediate action on at least three of the projects. The President then directed the Treasurer to prepare three checks: \$1,000 to The School for the Deaf at Porto Allegre, Brazil; \$500 to Pax Natura Ranch at Edmonton, Alberta, Canada; \$500 to The School for the Deaf in Beirut, Lebanon. The Treasurer was instructed to give the checks to the Secretary for mailing.

Discussion about putting a 2"x2½" advertisement in The Deaf American at \$220 per year or an ad in The Church Directory at \$24 per year came to a stalemate. This was sent to Ways and Means Committee for further study.

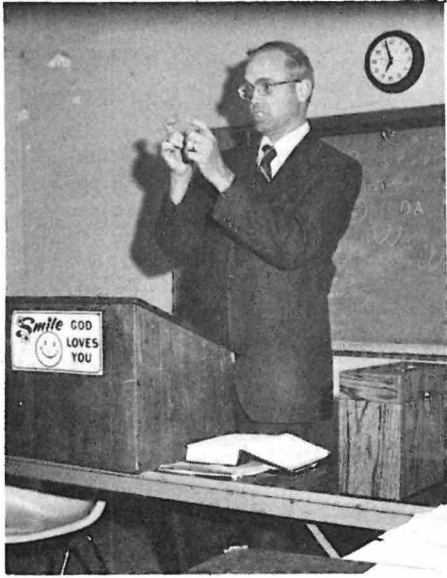

Two staff members - including the top executive - were chosen by the Missouri Synod's Board for Missions at its February meeting.

The board also allocated its \$9.78 million budget for 1978.

The board's choice for its executive secretary was Dr. Edward A. Wescott, a Scottsdale, Ariz. pastor who served as a missionary in Nigeria from 1948 to 1954. He also was a member of the Mission Study Commission that surveyed the entire Missouri Synod mission operation in 1974 and 1975.

Chosen as secretary of blind and deaf ministries by the board was Rev. Rodney R. Ryneerson, who is executive director of the Lutheran School for the Deaf in Detroit.

Neither Westcott nor Ryneerson has yet announced whether they will accept their appointments.

The mission budget of \$9,78 million is about \$75,000 higher than the previous year's budget.

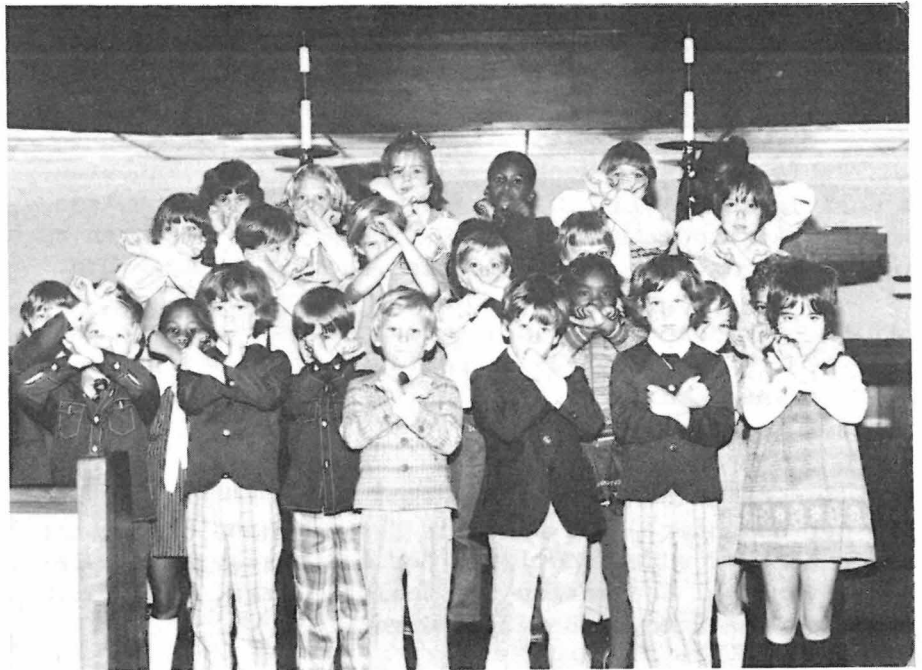
In Spokane, Wash. Mrs. Millie Francisco has been nominated and elected "Deaf Woman of the Year 1977".

Reaching Out to the Deaf Overseas

It is good to remember the deaf overseas who are our friends in Christ and whom we are helping through the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, the I.L.D.A., or through individual donations.

AUSTRALIA - John A. Hoopman (January '78 Deaf Lutheran), a deaf layman living in Adelaide. His church provides monthly services for the deaf. Mr. Hoopman has been on a round-the-world journey, visiting the U.S.A. last Dec.

AFRICA - Ibandan, Nigeria - A school for the deaf, now largely supported by the Methodist Church, was first began by interested Lutheran members in the 60's. It now has about 30 pupils.

BRAZIL - Porto Alegre - Mrs. Naomi Warth (July '77 D.L.) and her daughter, Mrs. Beatrice Rayman, have been conducting classes for deaf children for ten years. At the recent Synodical Convention in Dallas, Texas, Mrs. Warth received the John of Beverly Award.

BRAZIL - Umuarama, Parana - A Lutheran deaf couple, John and Charis Ames, (July '77 D.L.) are working with illiterate deaf there. A group of deaf students from Los Angeles Trade-Technical College plan to go there for 6mos. to a year and help build a deaf school. Mrs. Hester Battad of the L.A. school is in charge.

HONG KONG - The work among the deaf has been carried on for more than twenty years. One of the early workers was Rev. George Winkler, who is now pastor for the deaf in Denver. Presently there are two good sized deaf congregations and the Mongkok Lutheran School for the Deaf has 205 deaf students enrolled.

INDIA - Ambur - Mr. P. Albert Durairaj is principal of the school for the deaf at Ambur, India. It was begun in 1970 by the India Evangelical Lutheran Church.

JAPAN - Tokyo - Rev. Philip Luttio and Rev. Mitsuyoshi Kojima both served the deaf under the sponsorship of the A.L.C.

LEBANON - Beirut - Rev. Andeweg has returned after the war there and the school for the deaf has 70 enrolled. There is a second school for the deaf at Salt, Jordan, where they have 85 deaf students. The government of Egypt has recently granted permission to open a school for the deaf at Cairo. The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod has assisted Rev. Andeweg with funds and Lutheran members have also helped.

PUERTO RICO - The work is largely carried on by the L.C.A. However groups connected with the Missouri Synod have provided assistance to the Evangelical School for the Deaf at Luquillo. The school was begun in 1971 by the United Missionary Fellowship, an independent, non-denominational group based in Sacramento, California.

TAIWAN - Five Lutheran Churches serve the deaf with the aid of interpreters. Lutherans are also active in the Taiwan Association of the Deaf.

This mission work is a testimony to the power of the Gospel and to the activity of the Holy Spirit in all the world - also the deaf world. It is also only a small part of the mission work among the deaf of the world. Praise God for His grace!

Indiana Selected as New NAD Branch Office Site

- from The National Association of the Deaf (NAD)

The Indiana Association of the Deaf has won the bid for the National Association of the Deaf Midwestern Branch Office. Operations will begin July 1, 1978 in Indianapolis. Mr. Gary Olsen, Assistant Executive Director for State Affairs, will manage the office under the direction of Dr. Frederick C. Schreiber, Executive Director of the NAD.

The site selection was determined by the NAD Board of Directors after recommendations based on correspondence and on-site visits. Both

Cleveland and St. Louis presented excellent proposals with supporting letters from the communities but the Indiana Association of the Deaf exhibited extraordinary public awareness with support from the Governor of Indiana on down to individuals throughout the state.

The primary thrust of the Branch Office is toward development of more active and involved state associations of the deaf and consumer oriented activities rather than activities of the national scope of the NAD Home Office. Advisory Panel Cites NASA for Lead in Research to Aid the Handicapped

- from the Committee on Science and Technology
U.S. House of Representatives

Congressman Olin E. Teague (D-Tex.), Chairman of the House Committee on Science and Technology, just announced the release of a report by the Panel on Research Programs to Aid the Handicapped. The Panel, assembled by the Science Committee as a select advisory group, was directed to further develop the findings of a previous Panel and the recommendations of the recently concluded White House Conference on Handicapped Individuals.

The focus of the Panel's five months of deliberations was how America's vast scientific and technological resources might be directed into programs to address the problems of those with disabilities.

The Panel singled out the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) as existing government agency most capable of carrying out such an effort.

Among the concerns enumerated by the Panel were the present unresponsive, piece-meal approach in existing research programs; both the proliferation and low level of priority of these programs within various agencies; the need for a lead agency to direct the programs and, the severely limited funding for this research in comparison to the needs of handicapped individuals and the potential benefits to be gained.

The Panel was headed by Dr. William A. Spencer, Chairman of the Department of Rehabilitation at Baylor College of Medicine. Former Chief of Naval Research, RADM. M.D. Van Orden was Vice Chairman and the other sixteen experts represented the public and private research community, the medical sector, industry and handicapped advocacy groups. Some of the major recommendations included in the Panel's report were:

- * Our Nation's effort on behalf of handicapped persons should be embodied in a national program which represents a comprehensive and multi-disciplinary organization.
- * A Science and Technology Board for Handicapped Persons should be established which will include representatives from government, industry, practitioners, and consumers.
- * This effort should be viewed as an additional commitment, not one which would adversely affect small programs already in existence.

According to Congressman Teague, "The Panel's work has pinpointed the issues and pro-

vided a framework for a national program. It is now up to the Congress, the Administration and the American people."
