The John of Beverley Medal Awarded to Archie D. Marshall

Mr. Archie D. Marshall, editor of "The Deaf Lutheran", the official publication of the International Lutheran Deaf Association and the Board for Missions of the Lutheran Church/Missouri Synod, was awarded the John of Beverley Medal for distinguished service to the deaf. The medal was presented to Mr. Marshall at the LC/MS Synodical Convention that was held in St. Louis, Mo. in July.

The concept of the award originated with the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf. The

"Friends" wished to publicly recognize the signi-

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- INASMUCH AS Archie D. Marshall, an individual profoundly deaf in both ears as a result of spinal meningitis as a child, was one Easter morning taken by a friend to worship at St. Philip's Lutheran Church for the Deaf in Chicago, and was thereafter led by the Holy Spirit into instruction and confirmation into the Lutheran faith; and
- INASMUCH AS Archie D. Marshall subsequently placed his life and talents into the service of our Lord Jesus Christ, although engaged in earning a living by art work, and has continuously used his talents in his parish church in St. Louis in numerous capacities, and in various offices; and

INASMUCH AS Archie D. Marshall was one of the leaders among deaf Lutherans in St. Louis that brought about the formation of the present Holy Cross Lutheran Church for the Deaf, from a merger of a congregation for white deaf people and a congregation for black deaf people, one of the first totally integrated deaf Lutheran churches - and that well before toe days of the Civil Rights movement; and

ficant achievements of those who contributed their time and talents for the enrichment of hearing-handicapped people. The first award was bestowed in 1959, also at an LC/MS Synodical convention.

Know All Men By These Present

That the Board of Directors of the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf and the Board of Trustees of Mill Neck Manor, by virtue of the authority conveyed by the Board of Regents of the State of New York, have established the John of Beverley Medal in memory of that early English Churchman of the seventh century, who made special efforts to communicate the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the deaf. This medal is to be awarded to that individual who, in the opinion of said boards, has rendered meritorious, distinguished and outstanding service to the deaf, consistent with the ideals of the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf and of Mill Neck Manor.

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Wisconsin Bids Farewell To A Friend ROBERT W. HORGAN 1908 - 1979

Robert W. Horgan, a member of Madison Silent Lutheran Church passed into eternity July 5, 1979 following two weeks of illness. At that time he was 71 years old and still very active in affairs involving the deaf - a trait that had charcterized his entire life.

Born August 21, 1908 in Irma, Wisconsin, he became deaf at the age of 2 as a result of a bout with scarlet fever.

Bob Horgan attended schools for the deaf in Wausau (oral) and Delavan before entering Gallaudet College where he was graduated in 1925. It was at Gallaudet that he met Lola Holmgren who became his wife a year after graduation.

Following graduation from Gallaudet Bob worked for Madison Newspapers, Inc. for 35 years until retiring in 1972. Besides being the first deaf person to be hired by that newspaper organization, his outstanding performance on the job and pleasant nature enabled many doors to be opened to other deaf that hired.

For 21 years he edited the Wisconsin Association of the Deaf-Pilot publication. He was part-time director of the WAD State Service Bureau from 1950 until 1971. Because of the efforts of Bob Horgan this State Service Bureau was granted funds in 1971 putting it on a fulltime basis.

Bob served on the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Physically handicapped.

Lobbied for the passage of a bill to establish the Bureau for the Hearing Impaired of Wis.

Taught a Sign Language Class to staff members at the Deaf Treatment Center-Mendota Health Institute.

Held numerous offices in both his church and community, giving unstintingly of his

- INASMUCH AS Archie D. Marshall has served the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod in leadership roles in the Dixie Deaf Lutheran Conference, in the Central Regional Conference, and also in the International Lutheran Deaf Association, being elected to various offices, and for the last five years serving as editor of <u>The Deaf</u> Lutheran; and
- INASMUCH AS Archie D. Marshall has served his fellowmen in community, state and national affairs, among them as President of the St. Louis Chapter of the Missouri Association of the Deaf, Board Member of Telecommunicators of Greater St. Louis, Member of the Board of Advisors of the Missouri School for the Deaf, the first deaf man to be appointed to such a position and the first black citizen to be so honored; he serves on the Governor's Commission for Employment of the Handicapped; and nationally he has served on the President's Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and the White House Conference on Handicapped Individuals; and
- INASMUCH AS Archie D. Marshall has sought to respond to the leading of the Holy Spirit, and to react in loving service to the love of our Heavenly Father as shown in His Son, Jesus Christ; and

The theme for the 1979 Great Lakes Regional Conference was "FISHING FOR THE LORD."

Nearly 80 persons attended this conference which was held August 3, 4, and 5th at The University of Toledo's Continuing Education Center.

During the Saturday's business session new officers were elected to serve the next two years. They are: Richard Crossen of Columbus, Ohio, President; Frank Cassese, Jr. of Cleveland, Ohio, President-Elect; Helen Shoup of Frewsburg, New York, Secretary; Henry Walls of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, Treasurer; and Lillian Long of Cleveland, Ohio, Historian; Rev. Clark Bailey, Regional Advisor. The Great Lakes Regional Conference is made up of churches in Cleveland, Columbus, Detroit, Flint, Pittsburgh, Rochester, and Toledo. The conference goers were surprised with three important visitors who came up from Brazil, South America. They were Rev. and Mrs Maurice Sand, Missionaries and Mrs. Charles Ames, our deaf missionary to whom I.L.D.A. presented with a motor vehicle (Jeep) about six years ago. Mrs. Ames thrilled the conference with an interesting slide show of the work she and her husband are

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The guest speaker for this conference was Rev. Donald Zuhn, Secretary of North American Ministries for the Blind and Deaf, Lutheran Church/Missouri Synod. His lecture was very interesting and seriously reflected on our Lutheran Church's future. By making use of an overhead projector, Rev. Zuhn showed charts that reflected a decline in memberships in our deaf congregations. Presently there are 54 Lutheran Deaf Congregations with a membership totalling about 5,000. These congregations are located throughout the United States and Canada. That we may become more dynamic and show more growth, there must be some changes made by I.L.D.A. and it's Regional Conferences, reported Pastor Zuhn. He also pointed out that there are 11 churches with vacancies.

Learning To Serve

God's Deaf People





Ft. Wayne, Indiana. . ."A - B - C - D. . ." This is the way most sign language classes start. The alphabet and a vocabulary of signs is how most people start learning about the deaf. But, at Concordia Theological Seminary in Ft. Wayne, Indiana, the Deaf Ministry class is done a little differently. True, sign language is a big part of the class, but also studied is History of the deaf, Education of the deaf, Psychology and sociology of the deaf, audiology and, most important, ways to minister to the deaf.

Thirteen seminary students and several of their wives are taking part in the deaf ministry class to learn how to best bring Christ to the deaf and the deaf to Christ.

The three credit class is one of two Deaf Ministry classes taught at the seminary for the past several years. While the seminary was in Springfield, Illinois, the classes were taught by Rev. Delbert Thies and later by Rev. Orlin Anderson. Before these two men, Rev. N.P. Uhlig taught sign language for several years to interested students. After the seminary moved back to Ft. Wayne, the classes were taught by Rev. Robert Rowland until last year when he accepted a call to Colorado.

Currently the class is being taught by fourth year seminarian Mark Seeger. His wife, Carol, is teaching the advanced sign language class, working primarily with idioms and syntax of sign language.

With the Lord's blessing, this may be an indication that we will soon be able to fill some of the many vacancies in our LC/MS ministry. (Editor's note: At this time Rev. Seeger and his wife, Carol, are now in California. See page 3)

an interpreter, Ms. Rita Mooney. Ms. Mooney was not paid for her work as an interpreter. Judge McNaught said that the county could pay for an interpreter for a deaf defendant, but not for a deaf juror.

Mr. Freedman said that he would have been "disappointed not to have this opportunity to learn about the courts, trails and the law." This case sets a precedent for showing that deaf people can successfully serve on a jury.

Deat Juror In Massachusetts

In November, Sheldon Freedman of Beverly, Massachusetts received a notice to appear for jury duty.

Usually people like Mr. Freedman are automatically excused from jury duty. Mr. Freedman is deaf. However, Mr. Freedman told Judge John Mc Naught of the Essex Superior Court civil session that he wanted to serve. Massachusetts is one of the few states that does not have a law saying that deaf people cannot serve on a jury. In November, Sheldon Freedman served on a jury panel which heard an accident case.

With the approval of both attorneys in the case, Mr. Freedman was selected and seated with

ent symbol was selected. The British plan to use the symbol in public places such as bus stations, airports, etc., to indicate where hearing-impaired persons can go that have staff members trained in communicaing in sign language.

A Flat Tire Or A Blow-Out?

A pastor-friend of mine went to Duluth for a wedding recently. As he was leaving the motel to go to the rehearsal, he discovered that his car had a flat tire. He almost wished that it had been a blow-out the night before while driving around town; then he would have known about it. He would have had time that morning to change the tire, but he did not know about it until it was time to leave. Luckily he was able to catch a ride with another person also going to the wedding, so he was at the rehearsal on time.

This is the same kind of trouble some people have with their religion. Seldom do they lose it by a blow-out. Usually it is just a slow leak. If you asked many un-churched people who were once active Christians, "When did you lose your faith?" - they probably would be surprised to hear they had lost it. The fact is that many lost their religion through the slow and un-noticeable process of a slow leak. If they had lost it by a blow-out, it might have been better. At least then they would have known, and they would have had a warning to wake up before it was too late.

How sad it is for a person's faith to slip away and not even realize it is happening, to sleep away the years while his or her faith grows weaker and dies. How will they face the crises (big problems) of life? And what will they do when God calls them from this life? For then it is not just a rehearsal, but the real thing. Then there will be no chance to catch a ride on the faith of another person.

Is it possible that something like this is happening to some of us? If you are seldom in church, or if you have not received Communion for a very long time, or if you almost never read the Bible, then it is possible that your faith is slip
