Editor's Note: The letters below were sent to Mr. Elmer D. Francisco, I.L.D.A. Treasurer, but they can be viewed as personal letters to every member of the I.L.D.A. who gave their support towards these worthwhile projects!

Porto Alegre, Brazil

Dear friend Elmer:

Well, this was a wonderful day in the life of our school when we received your letter telling that we will receive \$1,000 for our deaf school here in Brazil. We hope to get this in a short time and I will let you know immediately when we receive it. (It was received shortly after this letter was sent). Please thank all my good friends for this special gift that comes from heaven to us through you.

It is difficult to believe that you gave us so much. May God continue to bless you all so that you may continue to be a Blessing for many, many people, especially for us here in Brazil. Too bad you are so far away, so I cannot shake your hand and give you a kiss. But I can pray for you and all my friends asking our Lord to bless you so much.

We have this year 60 children at the school and many are waiting to get a place. But I'm happy to tell you (even with a little concern) that we started the Parent Infant Program with little babies. We were afraid to start it, but people moved from so far to our city just to bring their babies to us. Years ago our school started for the first time in Brazil to work with children age 3 and everyone were afraid and did not believe in our work. Now it is accepted in the whole country after we wrote to many and told them about our work. Now the babies just

CHRIST IS RISEN!

CHRIST IS RISEN! That Easter greeting still gives joy to our souls. Death could not hold Jesus in the grave. He broke the bonds of death and came out of the grave alive and victorious. His disciples were filled with joy (after first doubting the story the women told them!) - a joy that has filled the hearts of Christ's people every since.

Now we look ahead to that day - 40 days later - when our Lord went back to His throne in heaven. Before He rose into the clouds, He told His disciples two important things:

"Go, then, to all peoples everywhere and make them My disciples." (Matthew 28:19) "You shall be witnesses for Me ..." (Acts 1:8)

It may not be possible for you and me to go "everywhere" to carry out this command - though in a sense we do go to far places when we send mission workers to go for us. But we can be witnesses for Jesus - and indeed we <u>are</u> witnesses for Him - any place we happen to be.

Being a witness for Jesus can be a simple thing, as I learned again on a recent trip with my family. We were eating breakfast in a restaurant when a man came over to our table and said, "Thank you for showing that you are Christians." He had seen us bow our heads to pray before eating.

I remember that as a teenager I felt ashamed to pray in a public place like that. What if we had been too ashamed to pray that morning in the restaurant? We would have missed an opportunity to strengthen this man in his faith. A little thing for us ... a very important witness to this man.

How can you be a witness for the Savior today? How can you show that you love the Lord? What kind of opportunity will God give you to tell some person about the love of Jesus that led Him to the cross for our sin? What kind of chance will you have to the joyful Easter news - JESUS LIVES, NOW AND ALWAYS!

Our daughter, Beatriz Raymann, has been an observer of a similar program such as we have at Central Institute for the Deaf in St. Louis, Mo. She was not more concerned at that time about the program since we did not think on going onto work with babies. But since then and up to that time we had worked only with children in the 8-9 year bracket.

It is difficult to do this kind of work with children when you have no literature to study and no one to get advice from. In our work with babies, we did not ask for such responsiblity, so at first we only did it with the help of mothers in our recess time. So, it was obviously a great need for our daughter, Beatriz to go and study under Dr. Simon Martin at Central Institute for the Deaf who had started the deaf infant training program there. God has put this important task before us and now we know there are friends who are helping us out. It would have been difficult for me to have asked for your help in this pioneer work in Brazil, but even without our asking, you have generously sent us some support.

Our government here estimates that there are over 35,000 deaf people in this area. We have no congregations, churches, or pastors working with the deaf in the whole country. This is something we must remember and there is much work God has given us to do together here!

Mrs. Naomi Warth founded in 1966, the Concordia Special School for the Deaf, in Porto Alegre, RS, Brazil, to serve our 1,300 congregations and missions there, and has taught in and guided the school. Dear Friend:

I write to you with a heart full of joy and thankfulness! I was told that the ILDA sent me a gift of \$1,000 to be used for traveling expenses to the USA.

Icannot express my gratitude enough and I pray that the Lord Jesus will bless you and the donors very much, and you will continue to be a blessing by helping others, especially deaf people.

I would like to tell you a little bit about my projects and "dreams". When I was in St. Louis in 1973 with my husband, I attended classes at Central Institute for the Deaf from September to January. I knew that Jesus really wanted me to work for Him in this area. It was no doubt a marvelous experience and I learned very much. But it was a very short period. There one of the most impressive experiences I had was with the Parent Infant Program under the supervision of Dr. Audrey Simmons-Martin.

a healthy child and her baby is deaf. I felt a lot with her and knew this was the time (to began my work with deaf babies) and no later!

But, of course, I still have many, many questions I would like to ask. There are so many things I don't know. And here in Brazil nobody is working in this direction. There is early intervention being done, but in a clinical, different way. And from my readings and what I could gather at Central Institute for the Deaf (in St. Louis, Mo.) the way to work with babies is a maternal, home-oriented program. I am working with 3 mothers and their babies. There are about 15 children under four, and 50 students from grade 1 to 5.

The best solution would be to take a regular one or two year course in one of your Universities. This would be almost impossible at this point in my life for two basic reasons: the first one is because my two daughters are very young (4 and 2 years old), and the other reason is that I am finishing College. Unfortunatly, I had to interrupt my studies for some years because of health problems.

When my husband and I returned to Porto Alegre I started teaching at Concordia School for the Deaf. I feel great joy in my work and I thank the Lord everyday for it. I learned a lot with my mother, through experience and reading all the books and articles I could.

I always wanted to start a Program with the parents and babies, but honestly, I was afraid!

This year in April a young lady of about my age, came and brought her baby boy, 18 months old. He had been born premature under almost the same conditions as my second daughter, but with one big difference: the Lord gave me So all this gave me the idea of going to the USA for a short visit and try to get answers or suggestions to my immediate questions. Also I would try to collect resources to improve our work here.

And now that I know that friends are willing to help me and our School, gives me once again the assurance that the Lord Jesus sure has marvelous ways. Please accept my warmest thanks for this gift.

I was planning to go in the end of September and thought of visiting Central Institute for the Deaf in St. Louis, Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C., and Mill Neck Manor in New York. But I'm willing to change that if you suggest something different.

May the Lord bless you very much!

Minutes of the Feb. 21 - 23, 1980 ILDA Board Meeting in Des Moines, Iowa

LAW COMMITTEE: Charles Kotal asks that any changes made in Regional Constitutions be sent to him immediately in order to be reviewed and the old Constitutions be updated.

WAYS & MEANS COMMITTEE: ElRoy Treibel discussed his committee plans for making the I.L.D.A. self-supporting by 1982. Two ways could be by fund raising and by selling advertising space in <u>The Deaf Lutheran</u>. Rev. Zuhn contributed some of his own ideas that might help I.L. D.A. reach this goal.

D.L. Business Manager's Report: \overline{Mr} . Russel Healey said that as of January 31, 1980 his treasury stands as follows:

\$5,365.88. He requested permission for purchasing:

1. A new IBM Selectric II typewriter with correcting ribbon costing \$960.00

2. A new stabilization processor costing approximately \$460.00.

3. A new high stool with rollers costing approximately \$150.00

These three pieces of equipment has been requested by editor Archie D. Marshall and are to come from funds provided by Lutheran Friends of The Deaf. (see June-July 1978 issue of <u>D.L</u> Rev. Dorr suggested that a good idea to releive the work load of the editor was to "farm out" some of the typing chores that is required in each month's issue. The salaries of both the editor and the business manager are to be increased.

Mr. Healey is resigning his position effective Aug.1,'80 in order to enter into the Lay Ministry Program in the fall.He will be attending Concordia College in Milwaukee. President Kindred was named to represent I.L.D.A. at the L.C./M.S. convention that will be held in St. Louis next year.

Three resolutions were adopted by the board. One was to solicit contributions from every deaf congregation in our deaf ministry towards helping I.L.D.A. become a self-supporting organization. The second resolution was to make it mandatory for board members to submit a written report of their regional activities, etc. one month before each board meeting.

The third resolution thanked Calvary congregation in Des Moines and Pastor & Mrs. Ring for their assistance and hospitality during this board meeting. (These three resolutions in their entirety will be printed in the next issue.)

The resignation of Russel Healey from his position as D.L. Business Manager was accepted.

 $\underline{D}.\underline{L}.$ editor Archie Marshall was granted permission to expend funds for new equipment purchases.

Salary increases for the editor and business manager were granted. The business manager's salary per month now is \$100.00 and the editor's \$175.00.

The board will meet July 6 -9, 1981 at the Lutheran High School in Burbank, Calif. which is the same place where Ephphatha Conference is timed to meet.

Pres. Kindred and Mr. Crossen will design and maintain a booth at the NAD Centennial Convention in Cincinnati,O. this summer. This booth will promote the purposes of I.L.D.A.

The next I.L.D.A. board meeting will be held in Detroit, Mich. on October 23-25, 1980.

The editor of $\underline{D}.\underline{L}.will$ be instructed to print more news concerning the regions and to see that congregational news get top priority over any other news.

I outlining the purpose of the event, Rev. John Gimenez, chairman of the "Washington for Jesus" National Steering Committee, said,"Christian leaders share a common concern that the United States has gone off course spiritually and is consequently facing serious crises. We believe the spirit of II Chronicles 7:14 is a common ground on which all Christians can stand together and seek God in humility and repentance."

In the verse cited by Gimenez, God promises that, if His people will turn back to Him in humility, and pray and seek Him, He will hear their prayers and heal their land.

Program co-chairmen for the event are Dr. M.G.(Pat) Robertson, president and founder of the Christian Broadcasting Network (CBN), and Dr. William R. Bright, president and founder of Campus Crusade for Christ International, and interdenominational organization. Gimenez, Robertson, and Bright head a National Sponsoring Committee of more than 50 other pastors and American Christian leaders who represent most of the recognized branches of American Christendom.

More than a million persons from every state and nearly every Christian denomination will converge on Washington, D.C. on April 28 & 29 for two days of repentance and prayer in behalf of the nation.

The events, called "Washington for Jesus," will include a pastor's conference, a women's meeting, a 50,000 person youth rally in RFK Memorial Stadium, visits by state delegations to members of congress, a 100,000 person march of state delegations through downtown Washington, and a sun-up to sun-down program of repentance, fasting, and prayer for more than a million persons who will gather on the mall between the capitol and the Washington monument. The high point of the two-day schedule will be the gathering of Christian leaders, national government leaders, and a crowd which rally officials expect to grow to over a million persons on the mall. Plans call for a day-long agenda of prayer, music by Christian artists and a 1,000 voice choir, numerous short talks by many of the nation's most familiar Christian leaders.

\$99,000 GRANT FROM AAL ASSISTS GREAT COMMISSION CONVOCATION

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St.Louis, Mo. Aid Association for Lutherans has granted \$99,000 for use in connection with the Missouri Synod's Great Commission Convocation to be held here Nov. 6-9, 1980.

The Synod's Board of Evangelism has requested the grant for prayer support material, training of District committees for follow-up, and for scholarships to enable each of the church's 6,100 congregations and 15 colleges and seminaries to send at least one participant to the convocation.

"Discipling in the '80's" is the theme for the convocation, the first of such a scope in Missouri Synod History. It will concentrate on study, inspiration and learning how to impleRev. 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ment Christ's great commission to "make disciples of all nations."

In addition to the major addresses and Bible studies in general sessions, plans call for rallies and workshops which will feature 60 congregations with successful discipleship ministries. Special ministries will be addressed in 30 other workshops.

Congregations should do two things in advance of the convocation, said Dr. Erwin J. Kolb, executive secretaryof the Synod Board of Evangelism. Kolb urged regular prayer for the planning and preparation of the convocation, and consideration of the representatives to be sent to the convocation.

phasize that the activities are specifically nonpolitical. "No specific legislation is being requested and no candidates are being promoted by 'Washington for Jesus'," said Gimenez. No political figures are scheduled on the program although all the nation's highest ranking government officals -- including the president -- have been invited and many are expected to attend.

The April 29 date was selected, a spokesman explained, because it is considered to be the day in 1607 when the first English settlers in the New World came ashore at what would become Cape Henry, Va., planted a cross in the beach, and prayed that the new land might arise with God's blessing and to His glory.

"We are going as Christians in a spirit of unity and love," Gimenz said. "We are going to the District of Columbia to meet with our representatives and openly pray for our nation, our leaders, and our government.

Logistical planners for "Washington for Jesus" are working closely with Washington, D.C. officials of the National Capital Parks Service on arrangements for parking, traffic management, etc., according to National Coordinator Ted Pantaleo.

"Washington for Jesus" leaders are using a plan developed by the National Capital Parks Service for handling an event involving a million participants, Pantaleo said. The plan was developed in 1979 in anticipation of Pope John Paul II's visit.

While most participants are expected to come by chartered bus from within a radius of several hundred miles of the capital, other groups have announced plans to come by chartered train and plane, some from as far away as Hawaii.

There have also been experssions of interest from Christians in other countries concerning the possibility of similar events they might sponsor in their own nations, Gimenez said.
