for deaf children located on the church's seminary campus in Porto Alegre. Mrs. Naomi Warth, Director and founder of the school alerted the Lutheran church to the needs of the deaf in Brazil. Our readers may recall that Mrs. Warth, several years ago, received the John of Beverley medal from Mill Neck Manor for her work among the deaf of her country. A parochial school teacher for 26 years, she also studied at the Santa Maria State University, Brazil, in the field of special deaf education, and at teacher training centers in Germany and the U.S. She founded the Concordia Special School for the Deaf in Porto Alegre in 1966, beginning with 3 deaf students in classes held at her home, later using the basement of the seminary. The school has grown to its present enrollment of 81 deaf children.

The response of the children and their parents is most gratifying, whereupon Pastor Kraus was moved to comment, "We hope our people everywhere will support our Mill Neck Foundation as we seek to expand our interest and service to the deaf in foreign countries as well as at home."

THE REV. GEORGE KRAUS ON MILL NECK FOUNDATION FACT-FINDING MISSION IN BRAZIL AND ARGENTINA

The newly-created Mill Neck Foundation, true to its intention to seek out areas of need among the deaf, recently sent the Rev. George Kraus, of New Britian, Conn., on a fact-finding mission that took him to Brazil and Argentina where he was the guest of the Lutheran Churches there. Their hospitality and cooperation were the keys to the success of the trip. Pastor Kraus and the Mill Neck Foundation sincerely thank them all.

During the first two weeks in June, Pastor Kraus spent nine days in Brazil and three in Argentina.

The Lutheran Church of Brazil is already in deaf work. Escola Especial Concordia is a school

A one-week seminar in sign language and total communication was conducted by the Rev.Kraus at Seminario Concordia, Porto Alegre. The seminary, with a current enrollment of 150 students, trains the Lutheran pastors of the sister church of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.Fifty-four seminary students, wives, teachers of the deaf, seminary professors and interested laymen attend ed the program.

Pastor Kraus used Fischer Price toys to teach the language of signs. It is one of the most popular methods of teaching sign language today. During the seminar no speech was permitted, except for certain presentations which required voice. Pastor Kraus then spoke Spanish, which was easily understood by those speaking Portuguese.

The Bible has been called the "Book of Books." In this one book, the Bible there are 66 different books. 39 books in the Old Testament, 27 books in the New Testament. All the books of the Bible are the same in one way. They are the same in fact that each one has something to do with Christ. But each book is different from all the other books of the Bible. Because each book is different the "BOOK OF THE MONTH" will focus on a different book of the Bible each month.

THE PURPOSE OF JOHN: "But these things are written so that you can believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. Then by believing you can have that Jesus is the Son of God: 1. John the Baptist; 2. the Father; 3. the Holy Spirit; 4. the disciples; 5. The miracles of Christ; and 6. the Scriptures.

OUTLINE OF JOHN

to avoid sin, they boasted of their indulgences.

Luther was at this time not fully clear himself about the values of indulgences.He opposed mainly the brazen abuses, such as were practiced by Tetzel and others. He preached against these abuses and warned the members of his church. After much study and prayer Luther wrote 95 Latin statements or theses, in which he stated his ideas about indulgences. These he nailed to the Door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517. The posting of his theses was an invitation to learned men to discuss and debate the matter in order to find clarity and truth.Luther chose October 31st, because the next day was All Saint's Day. He knew a lot of people would come to church on that day. But Luther had no idea that his action in posting the theses would be the beginning of the Reformation of the Church.

Luther did not directly attack the Pope or the teaching of the Church in his 95 theses, as his statements came to be called, but he made clear the fact that forgiveness of sins cannot be bought for money. In one thesis he stated: "Every Christian who truely repents has full forgiveness of sins, even without letters of pardon." These were truths that were clear as the Bible, but they were also truths that were most distastful to the Pope and the Bishops of the Church, who used the letters of indulgences as a profitable plan for making money.

Fifty years ago this fall, a young professor of Old Testament stepped before a CBS microphone in Cleveland and launched what in time would become the largest radio program in the history of broadcasting. The golden anniversary of Dr.Walter A. Maier's founding of The Lutheran Hour is being celebrated over the coming months through a new motion picture, anniversary broadcasts and banquets, and especially with the publication of two books focusing on Dr. Maier's extraordinary ministry.

by Dr.Paul L.Maier, a son of the sainted Lutheran Hour founder, who is Professor of History and Chaplain at Western Michigan University.

A Sunday radio institution in the depression thirties and wartime forties, Walter A. Maier pioneered his broadcasting crusade from one station in a south St.Louis attic to a weekly program heard over 1,200 stations reaching 120 nations and territories, using 36 languages. By the time of his death in 1950, Dr.Maier had preached to more people than anyone in history, with a weekly listening audience estimated at 20,000,000.

A MAN SPOKE, A WORLD LISTENED (420 pages, \$12.95, \$8,95 paper) also details Dr. Maier's other careers, as a Chicago youth leader, St.Louis magazine editor and professor, Harvard scholar, and author of no less than 31 books and a voluminous amount of devotional materials. Because of this production and impact, Billy Graham has called Walter A. Maier "the greatest combination of preacher and scholar that America has thus far produced in this century."

on the Old Testament prophet NAHUM has been praised by conservatives and liberals alike.

THE BEST OF WALTER A. MAIER (252 pages, \$9.95, \$6.95 paper) shows the versatility of the Maier prose as it ranged across the epigrams, editorals, articles, essays, addresses, sermons, and devotions that flowed from his pen. Most likely, Walter A. Maier was the first American churchman whose published works exceeded 15,000 printed pages. One chapter offers some of his noted ephorisms, such as: "A college degree is no certificate of moral. ity: an uneducated thief will steal a ride on a train, but an educated thief will steal the whole railway system." Another reveals twenty specific preditions made by Dr.Maier that were exactly fulfilled years later. He formed these forcasts more as a keen student of current affairs than on any "gift of prophecy," and he regularly roasted those who -- like so many today -- misuse apoclyptic books in the Bible to frame their own neverfulfilled "prophecies."

His first, his finest, and his last Lutheran Hour addresses are presented intact, as well as his best seasonal sermons, most vivid illustrations, and most penetrating insights. Dr. Maier's essay on church/state relations, based on Jeffersonian principles, is also included because of its extraordinary application to the present moment. Excerpts from his scholarly THE BOOK OF NAHUM as well as his popular DAY BY DAY WITH JESUS devotional series complete the anthology, which includes illustrations.

Synod Vice President Retiring

St.Louis, Mo. The Rev.Dr.Edwin C.Weber, 70, says he will retire next year as vice-president of the St.Louis-based Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

In private live, his exuberant romance and happy family life inspired him to write his bestseller on marriage, FOR BETTER, NOT FOR WORSE. In public life, he left his broadcasting studio for numerous mass meetings and rallies across the nation. Crowds of up to 70,000 heard the Maier messages at the prominent stadiums, bowls, and auditoriums of America.

One of the most important fathers of the current evangelical resurgence, Dr. Maier was by mid-century the country's leading spokesman for classical Christianity in helping revitalize the nation's faith. His commentary The Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Weber

conservative who was closely allied with Preus during the controversies of 1974 that resulted in moderates leaving the denomination and forming the Association of

Evangelical Lutheran Churches and Christ Seminary-Seminex.

Everyday the newspaper boy rode up on his bicycle and stopped, ran over to the dog and petted it, and gave the dog some treat food.

The man had no time for the dog. So the dog grew more and more fond of the newsboy and trusted him. One day while the boy was petting the dog, the man came out and said, "Son, this is my dog. I paid much for him. I had him trained at dog school. I spent lot of money on veterianary medicine. But it looks like I don't really own him anymore. Everytime I let him off the lesh, he comes to you. I think I have lost my dog."

If you are depressed and wondering if no one cares, it's understandable. Much of life leaves that impression. The answer is to get the true perspective - God's view of things.

Recognize that you are a somebody with Him and that though you've sinned, He loves you. Trust Jesus Christ who died for you, and experience the reality of being in the family of God.

Followers of Christ joyfully reflect that new sense of being a somebody: "Now we rejoice in our wonderful new relationship with God- all because of what our Lord Jesus Christ has done in dying for our sins- making us again A special grant program called "200 Thanks," will provide \$200 to local groups of AAL members, called branches, for recognition events to honor Sunday Church School volunteers.

"Volunteer branch members have an opportunity through '200 Thanks' to honor another group of volunteers," said Sue Meyer, branch benevolences at AAL. "The types of activities they have planned show imagination and creativity," she added.

In some branches, the funds are being used to hold workshops and advanced training sessions for the Sunday church school teachers. According to Meyer, these workshops are used for both recognition of the volunteers and as a way to help them learn new techniques and increase their effectiveness as teachers. This is a good parable to remind us about who is influencing our children in making choices about religious matter. Some parents will say, "We will not influence or make decisions for our children in making choice."

Why not??? The television will!! Their business will!! Their politicians will too!! Shall we ignore our own children while these others are "petting" them? You know we are not comparing your children with dogs, even champion dogs but the message is clear: If we don't influence our children, someone else will!! -copied and adapted.

NCI NEWS

Dick Orkin and Bert Berdis, otherwise known as Dick and Bert, the dynamic duo who turn commercials into rollicking entertainment, have recorded a series of three public service announcements for National Captioning Institute (NCI). The 30-second spots will be released to radio stations in September. lic service spots in the same zany manner they use for commercials: a two-person comedy conversation. The message of the campaign is to "pass the word" about captioned TV to hearingimpaired people who may not know about the service. The National Captioning Institute's toll free telephone number is given to those who want more information about closed captioning.

At first glance, the seemingly sober public service organization and the playful duo appear an inappropriate match. But NCI President John Ball explained, "There was no doubt in our minds that we wanted Dick and Bert to help out on this project. People tend to be extra careful about what they say when dealing with any kind of handicap. But hearing-impaired individuals are no different from hearing people when it comes to enjoying humor." 1981 convention, to be held in St.Louis in July.

The National Captioning Institute is the nonprofit organization charged with closed captioning television programs for the benefit of hearing-impaired persons. Closed captioning allows televisions equipped with special adapters to receive about 20 hours per week of programming broadcast by NCB, ABC and PBS.

"Obviously, public service spots are not our principal business," says Dick, "but NCI in particular captured our interest. A lot of different organizations are cooperating in this project, and we're happy to be a part of it."
