Going home for the holidays should be happy and helpful. But for Michael it's always been hard. Michael is considered by people back home to be deaf and retarded. Actually he is aphasic and has epilepsy. He is also Indian. For Michael it's been uphill all the way for 33 years.

When Bob Bauer, pastor to the deaf in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada called me recently, it was to say that Michael was leaving the Pax Natura halfway house to go home 500 miles north for a visit.

"Les, do you have someone there to keep an eye out for Michael? Not being able to communicate, he withdraws, and forgets his medication. I'm afraid he'll have another sizure. Once he even mixed four spoons of stuff in a glass of water and drank it. By the time he comes back we have to start all over."

"I know that Gerry Mitchinson, our pastor/pilot in High Level, will do what he can, Bob. His wife, Doreen, is a doctor, too. Why not call them and give them some details. I know they'll help."

When he met Michael, Gerry brought an old LAMP Lighter issue showing him and his plane. From his back pocket Michael pulled a different back issue on which Bob had circled Gerry's picture. They were introduced.

You don't have to say a word to let a person know you care. In the car ride that followed few words were spoken.

They stopped at the home of Christians-in-Service Ron and Peggy Plunz. Not knowing what Michael liked, Peggy served both milk and tea. (A true Indian, MIchael loves tea.)

There are flights to Zama with Christians-in-Service to teach Sunday School (on Saturday). Meanwhile Doreen and two other Christians-in-Service, Dr.Reedyck, and Dr.Lawton care for 10,000 people in 15,000 sq. miles. Doreen has delivered more than 500 babies in the 4 years they've served with LAMP! That's 500 cries for new life. 500 opportunities to care. And every 2/½ days she delivers another. She's also met with many of those same mothers to help organize many spiritual retreats for

The LAMP adventure began "on a wing and a prayer" in 1970, when Rev. Les Stahlke became LAMP's first pastor/pilot. His task was to begin a flying ministry to people in isolated communities across northern Alberta.

As more and more northerners found strength in LAMP's ministry, it became apparent thet LAMP had to grow. The Lord chal-

While LAMP was growing, another flying ministry, WINGS TO THE NORTH, was being established in Yellowknife, Northwest Territories, by the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Canada. Most aspects of the two ministries have now been combined, and the Wings to the North pastor/pilot works in unison with LAMP pastor/ pilots.

Today, six pastor/pilots are serving on six fields from northern Ontario to the Northwest Territories.

Each northern base has a pastor/pilot and an airplane. Like pastors in the south, LAMP pastor/pilots have parishes. The major difference is that each pastor/pilot has a "parish" of 50,000 - 200,000 square miles, and must use an airplane to visit his parishioners. Their primary responsibility is to reach out to the more remote settlements. They do this by providing support and encouragement for the ministries of LAMPaffiliated Christians-in-Service and other northern Christians. But they also do "frontline" missionary work by sharing Christ's love with people who have had little or no contact with Christians.

Christians - In - Service

The backbone of LAMP's work is the "grass roots" ministry of Christians-in-Service -- lay persons who live their faith on the job and in their daily lives. Christians already working in the North have been joined by more Christians-in-Service from the South, the latter placed by LAMP in communities scattered across the north. The six pastor/pilots visit these Christians-in-Service (construction workers, nurses, storekeepers, teachers, doctors and many others) to support and strengthen their individual ministries.

Service is to provide an ongoing daily witness to the message of God's love in Christ.

Anyone can become a Christian -in-Service with LAMP who has a personal commitment to Christ, a personal sense of ministry, and an employable skill.

Why Planes?

The airplane is the most practical means of transportation, year-round, in the North. The Edmondton base has a twin Cessna. The other five bases have single engine Cessna 185's - modern bush aircraft equipped with floats and skis. Skis make landing practical almost anywhere during the treacherous winter months; floats make it possible to land on any of the countless lakes in the summer.

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There are small communities in the bush country where there are no television, no clergy and few Christian people willing to give evidence of their faith.

Life here is built around the cold. Epuipment is pampered and treated like royalty. Engines are taken in for the night. Airplanes must be heated for hours with portable burners to bring the congealed oil to liquid viscosity. Clothing is added, layer upon layer, in great respect for the cold's power to turn tissue into frost.

News from Aid Association for Lutherans



APPLETON, WI (Oct.23,1980)--

A \$48,725 grant from Aid Assocition for Lutherans (AAL) is being given to the Lutheran Church-Missour Synod's Board of Parish Education. The grant will allow completion of a prodesigned to help project fessional and volrntary Lutheran school and church teachers to more effectively deal with handicapped students. Part of the money will be used to train new special education methods to 15 persons in five LCMS districts.

"We want to make (these instructors) more aware of the needs of these children," said Dr. Victor Constien, executive secretary of the board. "We want to provide them with skills to help these children mature and grow in regular classrooms as well as in special enviroments created for them."

The LCMS also will benefit from two other recent AAL grants dealing with the handicapped. Constien, as chairman of the Inter-Lutheran Coordinating Committee for Corperative Projects in Cangregational Life, will oversee a grant of \$43,515 that will be used to provide packers of resource materials to all LCMS, ALC, LCA and AELC parishes in an effort to help them deal eith the mentally and physically handicapped. The comittee also has received a grant of \$46,215 to aid in the development of a confirmation course for low frnctioning youth and adrlts.

a general neglect, an indifference, an apathy, because the disabled person, the family and much of the community would prefer to keep them hidden."

The coordinating committee projects are intended to increase the sensitivity of parishioner to the special needs of the disabled by helping to remave the physical and emotianal barriers to the handicapped. Constien says these projects are particulary appropriate because next year is the United Nations International Year of the Disabled.

AAL ia the nation's largest fraternal benefit society in terms of assets and life insurance in force. Headquartered in Appleton, Wisconsin, AAL has 1.2 million members who belong to 5,300 local branches in all 50 ststes.

NCI News

National Captioning Institute (NCI) President John Ball announced that NCI will add closed captions to television commercials and first-run specials sponsored by Proctor and Gamble Company, the nation's largest television advertiser.

NCI is the non-profit entity established in early 1979 to caption television programs for the benefit of hearing-impaired persons. Closed captions are similar to subtitles on many foreign motion pictures except that they are invisible on TV screens unless special equipment that decodes the captions is used. Sears, Roebuck and Co. markets the home-use equipment.

In mid-March, NCI began to add closed captions to 16 hours of predominantly prime-time programs each week for broadcast by ABC, NBC, and PBS.

Initially, Proctor & Gamble will have its upcoming 8-hour mini-series, "The Adventures of Marco Polo" captioned, as well as its commercials for many evening network programs. Filming of Marco Polo, which will dramatize events in the life of one of history's most remarkable men, will begin later this year in six countries. Most of the production will be done in China.

In making the announcement, Mr. Ball stated: "We are very pleased that Proctor & Gamble, the largest TV advertiser in the country, has decided to join this innovative effort to make television more meaningful for the nation's 14 million hearingimpaired citizens." Page 6

WASHINGTON, D.C. . . Hearing and speech-impaired persons who use teletypewriters and other keyboard devices to communicate by telephone can now call a single, nationwide toll-free number when they need assistance to complete their calls. The nationwide number, which went into effect June 29, is 800-855-1155.

The number can be used by approximately 50,000 persons who have telecommunications devices for the deaf (TDD) in their homes or offices as well as those with portable TDDs.

Previously, deaf callers have had to seek the aide of a third person to call an operator when they needed assistance.

The toll-free number is a service of the Bell System, but can also be used by those who call from independent telephone systems.

ST.PAUL, MINN. . . Good news for TDD users! The Minneapolis Public Service Commission announced in June that telephone users with speech or hearing impairments will enjoy lower long-distance telephone bills. The rates will apply to direct dialed, station-tostation calls made by certified residential customers. Discounts are 35% from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, 60% from 5 p.m. to 11 p.m. weekdays and 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. weekends, and 75% from 11 p.m. to 8 a.m. everyday. Higher discounts also on holidays. A certification form must be obtained from Northwestern Bell and signed by a doctor or other authorized person. Those in the Twin Cities may call the telephone company at 338-2382 (TTY), or 344-6405 (voice). Those outside the metro area should call toll free number 1-800-752-8139. TDD devices are available from Northwestern Bell for a monthly cost of \$24.95. This includes all servicing needed for the equipment.

A reminder also about the 24 hour toll-free number for operator assisted calls for TDD users. This number can also be used for emergencies. Call 1-800-855-1155.

SEATTLE, WASH. . . "Rooted for Mission and Ministry" was the theme of the 52nd convention of the Northwest District held in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho on June 13-15. Present were: 205 lay delegates including David Harmon of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Seattle; 174 pastoral delegates and 131 advisory delegates and about 200 visitors. The meeting was held at the North Idaho College campus (in the new auditorium). The Synodical report and the Sunday morning worship address were given by Dr. Edward Westcott Jr., Synod's Chairman of Missions and Special Ministries. Recognition was given to Pastor Hewitt and Pastor Petzoldt for their interpreting services Sunday afternoon.

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COUNCIL BLUFFS, IOWA. . . A new Iowa law was adopted which requires the court to appoint an interpreter for a deaf person in the courts of Iowa. This means that a deaf person has the right to an interpreter without cost to him or her in an Iowa court. This law became effective July 1, 1980.

Thanksgiving In Bible Times

Do you believe that Thanksgiving was started by the Pilgrims? Thanksgiving is much older than that! Long before the Pilgrims came to America, long before America was even discovered, long before Jesus was born, Thanksgiving was a holiday.

The first books of the Bible tell us that a time was set each year to thank God for His wonderful goodness. The people of God called their thanksgiving "The Feast of the Harvest." Many of the foods served at those Thanksgiving holidays are known to us also. Beef and lamb were the most common meats. If possible, wheat flour was used for bread and cakes. Those who did not have enough money used barley flour.

Fruits such as figs, dates, melons, and grapes were grown then as they are today. Beans, onions, cucumbers, and lentils were some of the common vegetables.

The next time you eat salad, remember that when Jesus was a boy, people ate salad then, too. In His day, lettuce, endive, chicory, sorrel, and even dandelion greens were known as "bitter herbs," and were a very important part of daily meals.

Everyone drank a great deal of milk. Some of it was cow's milk, which we know best. But milk from goats and sheep and even camels was often used, as it still is today in that part of our world.

In early Bible times, sugar was grown in only a few areas, and people did not know how to extract the sugar from the cane. But honey was plentiful and was used to sweeten foods. Often it was served as a desert, still in the honeycomb.

There was thanksgiving when Jesus was a boy!

There was thanksgiving at the time of the Pilgrims!

There is thanksgiving to God for His goodness to us today!
