Mill Neck Manor's John or Beverley Chapel was the scene for the installation of the <u>Rev.</u> <u>Edward A. Rauff</u> as first executive director of the Mill Neck Foundation and Lutheran Friends of the Deaf. In the afternoon of December 4, 1980, a group of one hundred persons gathered for a service of worship and celebration. Members of the Boards of Directors for both Luther-Friends of the Deaf and the Foundation attend. ed. Lutheran Friends' Board chairman, <u>The Rev.</u> <u>George Kraus</u> from New Britian, Connecticut was the liturgist. <u>Pastor Rauff</u> was presented as candidate for the office by the Foundation Board chairman, **Mr. Philip Bauer**, of Largo, Florida.

The Rev. Howard Schoenfeldt, of Hendersonville, North Carolina, preached the sermon, with the theme of "Summonded for Special Service." A choir from the Lutheran Center in New York, under the direction of Mr. Milton Briggs, sang three selections, including a musical version of Psalm 121.

The Rev. Ronald F. Fink, President of the Atlantic District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, performed the Rite of Installation, commending Pastor Rauff to God's care and guidance, and charging him:

As a Director for these agencies, you will assist the boards in developing and implementing programs aimed at serving the spiritual and educational needs of the deaf wherever these needs are discovered; you will interpret the programs of these agen-



cies to their constituencies, to the church at large and to the general public; you will seek to raise funding to support this special work, in a way in which God is glorified and the people are led to give as to the Lord; you will represent this religious ministry to the world of colleagues who also serve the deaf and strive to alleviate the handicaps which the hearing impaired suffer; and finally, you will be a leader in prayer and concern and love for these less advantaged brothers and sisters in Christ.

Those assembled were asked to commit themselves to support <u>Pastor Rauff</u> in his ministry with their prayer and encouragement. Following the service, the group reassembled in the Wood Dining Hall for refreshment. Thanks are due to many of the Boards of Directors and to the staff of Mill Neck Manor for their help in making this installation a memorable event.

An Inspiring Testimony " You. . .

Love. Jesus?"

I have always wanted to share this particular story with you since it means a lot to me and maintains fresh for more than 25 years. Since this is a Valentine's month, I decided to take the immediate opportunity to share this love story with you.

In the summer of 1953, back home in Cleveland, I was at my sweetheart's childhood house playing with the deaf boy and his deaf sister. We were at the porch. All of a sudden, the boy saw a man park his car in front of the house and get out of the car. The boy immediately ran into the house shouting to his mother, "Preacher! Preacher!"

Preacher? Who was he? I had never seen him before. At that time I was only seven years old. I chose to remain silent and observe him closely and carefully. After he had finished talking to the boy's mother, he turned his attention to my friend and talked with him for awhile. I was impressed by the fact that this preacher could sign well and continued watching him silently. As soon as he saw that I was also deaf, he turned towards me and signed very slowly those three words -- "You ...Love...Jesus?" I nodded yes very slowly, and at the same time, wondering why it took him so long to sign just three words --"You love Jesus?" To me, it was as if it took him five minutes just to complete that one brief question.

Today, after all those years, this little story remains fresh in my mind -- in the back of my head for twenty-five years. I never could forget this one strange preacher and it was not for many years could I figure out why he signed those three words so slowly.

this experience has taught me how important it is that God wants us to spread this important lesson to others especially little children who must know of His love and His Son Jesus.

Little children are our future adults and missionaries and it is our responsibilities to see that they are brought up in the Christian faith.

Today, using the American Sign Language, I slowly sign---"You...love...Jesus?", imitating the method of Pastor Frederking which helped me to remember it for 25 years, hoping those to whom I ask the question will also remember it for as many years.

Let us love the Lord Jesus with all our hearts, minds, and souls. Happy Valentine!!!

IT PAYS TO SIN

There is a sign in a building downtown that says, "It Pays to Sin." Underneath it in small letters, is the statement found in Romans 6:23, "The wages of sin is death." Yes, sin does pay, but what wages!

The first thing that sin does is to hurt the man or woman who commits sin. Think of the people whose bodies have been damaged by the excess use of God's gifts, of drink or food, or sexual looseness; the people whose lives were made mean and so miserable because of jealousy, and fault-finding or gossip. People hurt themselves when they sin. God says "Be sure your sins will find you out." (Numbers 32:23) Sin always does.

Sin pays wages in makingpeople hate one another. Before sin came into the world, Adam and Eve lived happily together, loving each other as human beings should. But the moment they sinned against God, they found a wall of separation had come between them. This was not only between them as individuals, but between them and God their creator. These walls are still there. Sin makes homes unhappy, causes bitter struggles between groups of people, and brings war to mankind. Sin pays plenty!

But sin's greatest pay-day is the judgement day. That is the last and final pay-off. "For we must all appear before the judgement seat of Christ, that everyone may receive the things done in the body, according to what he hath done, whether it be good or bad."

"I assure you that if you have faith as big as a mustard seed, you can say to this hill, 'go from here to there!' and it will go. You can do anything!" (Matthew 17:20)

The words of Jesus which are quoted at the top of this column are powerful words for us to think about. He spoke these words after He had healed a son who had epilepsy. The disciples wondered why they could not cast out the demon that made this young boy ill. Jesus explained to them that it was their "unbelief" that hindered their ability to heal.

In the movie, "The Empire Strikes Back," there is a scene when Luke Skywalker is called upon to demonstrate his new found power of the Force. His X-Wing fighter has sunk beneath the murky waters of a swamp. Yoda, the Jedi instructor, tells Luke that he can use the Force to lift the fighter out of the deep water. Luke tries but fails. He cannot lift the mighty fighter from the bottom of the swamp. Fatigued, he falls to the ground,

Yoda, a rather smallish looking figure, proceeds to lift the X-Wing, not only out of the swamp's depths, but also deposits it on dry land. Luke is very awed by this demonstration of the Force's power. Yoda informs Luke that he had failed only because he, Luke, did not believe in his ability to do it.

The example of the mustard seed is a similiar kind of example. The mustard seed is a very small seed. Once it was believed to be the smallest seed known. But from this tiny and minute seed grew very largetrees. Trees that not only produced additional mustard seeds, but also trees that gave shelter and homes to the birds of the air. From the tiny seed grew very large results. This could happen because the seed had the potential to grow.

LUTHERAN HOUR'S 50th YEAR

"Let's not get hung up on history," Dr. Oswald Hoffmann told an audience of more than 1,000 people who had gathered at Zion Lutheran Church in Cleveland, Ohio on Sunday, October 12, to observe the 50th anniversary of the first Lutheran Hour broadcast.



included Mrs. Hulda Maier, widow of Lutheran Hour founder and first speaker Dr. Walter A.Maier and former members of the Cleveland Bach Chorus who had sung on the first Lutheran Hour broadcast over radio station WHK, Cleveland, on Oct. 2, 1930.

Other participants in the anniversary service were Associate Lutheran Hour Speaker, Rev. Wallace Schulz; former Lutheran Hour Speaker Dr. Armin C. Oldsen; former Spainish Lutheran Hour Speaker Dr. Andrew Melendez; Manager of Lutheran Hour International Operations Dr.William Kniffel; Dr.Paul L. Maier and Dr.Walter A. Maier, Jr., sons of Dr.Walter A. Maier; and Rev.Clarence Schuknecht, pastor emeritus of Zion. Special music was provided by the choir and brass choir of Concordia College Ann Arbor, Mich., under the direction of Dr.Paul F. Foelber.

Following the service, the anniversary celebration continued with a reception and banquet at the Cleveland Engineering Society. The main feature was the world premiere of a new documentary film on The Lutheran Hour. The 42-minute, film entitled "The Lutheran Hour, The Dream That Wouldn't Die," was produced through a fraternal benevolence grant by AAL. Here, Wolf was sent on his way by cheerleaders from Lutheran High West and joined for about six miles by 11 members of the high school cross country team.

EDUCATION TASK FORCE CONTINUES RESEARCH

-from PSAD newsletter At a December, 1980 meeting, the Department of Education's Task Force on Education of the Deaf decided to meet for six more months.

The Task Force (a group of about twenty persons representing public and private schools, parents, and deaf consumers) has been meeting almost monthly since the fall of 1979, to try to solve problems stemming primarily from Public Law 94-142. This is the Federal Education of Handicapped Children Act of 1975 which called for a "free, appropriate education"for handicapped children and placement among non-handicapped children to the maximum extent commensurate with the handicapped children's needs. Representatives of PSAD (Pennsylvania Society For The Advancement of the Deaf) insisted that a complex chart placement alternatives (showing student and program characteristics) developed and preliminarily released by the task force last September, do not answer the basic questions for which the task force was convened.

Dr. Hoffmann, speaker on The Lutheran Hour since 1955, continued: "Let's not talk about 'the good old days' as so many pious people do, because the best thing about them is that they're over! "So on this date we want to get a bead on what is happening in the future, and the future is that God is doing things that only He can do in this world of hours. God is at work, and we must be alive to Him!"

He acknowledged many in the audience who had played a part in Lutheran Hour history. These A third phase of The Lutheran Hour anniversary celebration began Monday morning, Oct. 13, at 8 a.m. at Zion, E. 30th St., where Lutheran Hour 50th Anniversary Chairman Blake Wolf started his Cleveland to Detroit Jogalong to call attention to the anniversary and raise funds for The Lutheran Hour through sponsor pledges.

On the first day, Wolf covered approximately 20 miles from Zion Church in Cleveland to Avon Lake. He made intermediate stops at The Lutheran Center, 4100 Franklin Blvd., and in Rocky River. The main concerns, ranking in order of importance by the task force members are: (1) interpretation of "least restrictive environment" for deaf children; (2) weight of parental preference in placement decisions; (3) what are "needs" of deaf children, and who determines these needs? (4) reliable demog-

The goal hoped for is \$40 million in Synod, over & above the regular gifts and pledges by members to their own congregation's work. Of the \$40 million, \$15 million will be used in world missions; \$15 million is set for North American missions; and \$10 million will be used training new church workers.

"SIGN ALONG WITH ME"

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT MANDATES RIGHTS OF HEARING IMPAIRED

The Justice Department recently adopted regulations which will provide for more effective communication for hearing impaired people. These Section 504 regulations state that police, courts, and correctional facilities must provide sign language interpreters for hearing impaired arrestees, victims, and witnesses.

The regulations were developed, in part, from suggestions made by the National Center for Law and the Deaf (NCLD), a unit of the National Academy of Gallaudet College. NCLD drafted comments to the Justice Department concerning the regulations. The NCLD staff also testified at hearings held by the Justice Department.

The need for these regulations has become evident in recent years, especially because of cases in which deaf men were left in jail several days after their arrests without being provided interpreters. This failure to provide interpreters has meant that Deaf defenders were frequently unaware of their rights and were unable to communicate with lawyers.

The analysis of the regulations explain that:

Law enforcement agencies should provide for the availability of qualified interpreters...to assist the agencies when dealing with hearing-impaired persons.

The analysis also declares that when a hearing-impaired person is arrested, the Miranda warning (an explanation of the person's rights) must be written down when an interpreter is not available. The police must inform the hearing-impaired suspects that an interpreter will be provided at no charge. In addition, suspects do not have to answer police questions until an interpreter is present.

Under these regulations civil and criminal courts must provide qualified interpreters to people with hearing or speaking impairments. Deaf prisoners are also entitled to interpreters so they can better understand and participate in disciplinary hearings, counseling sessions, and vocational and educationsl problems.

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raphics (counts and characteristics of hearing- impaired children by areas of the state); and (5) definition of "appropriate" education program. There are several other related concerns, such as definition of "mainstreaming" and whether and how after-school activities should be taken into account in educational programming and placement decisions.

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NCLD feels that these regulations are especially important because they give deaf people the right to challenge any agency that does not provide the services outlined in the Section 504 regulations.
