1. The I.L.D.A. Board of Directors met at Pilgrim Lutheran Church for the Deaf,Los Angeles, Calif. July 7-9,1981.

2. Acknowledged two letters of thanks from last year's scholarship recipients, Rebecca Hannemann of Concordia College, Sewart Neb. and Beth Firnhaber of Concordia, Portland, Oregon.

Rev.Don Zuhn gave a report on the upcoming Convocation on Deaf Ministry scheduled for November 20-22 of this year. He said all is progressing well.

 Approved a plan to accept advertising in <u>The Deaf Lutheran</u>
 Picked a "Coordinator" to help plan the 1983 convention at Pittsburgh.
