District's Deaf Mission Outreaches To State's Retarded Youth

One of the most exciting things that has happened to deaf ministry this past year has been the request of the Greenbrook Regional Centerand the Hunterdon State School in Clinton, asking that Pastor C.Roland Gerhold of St. Matthew's Deaf in Newark,give a "religious experience" in the language of signs.

At the Greenbrook Regional Center, just one block east on Route 22 in Greenbrook, the group originally numbered 10 geriatric retarded persons which subsequently has been expanded to forty. The older retarded are being prepared to leave institutions from which they came and go to homes and employment in the community surrounding them.

The Hunterdon State School is giving retarded hearing handicapped and speech problem young people to this "religious experience" that Pastor Gerhold is conducting. Both the School Recreation Department, under which this

service is performed, and the Dormitory Counselors appreciate the sign language basic concepts that are beingtaught to these young retarded teenagers, some of whom are extremely hard of hearing.

In both situations, the requests have come from hearing and speech therapists who learned sign language at the Trenton State School and realized the teaching value of sign language and the "freeing" power that sign language gives to those who are retarded, especially in the case of the Greenbrook Regional Center, where there are no deaf in the group.

Pastor and Mrs.Gerhold report that this is a very interesting experience and a great experiment in the field in which they are so proficient.

Previously Pastor Gerhold had been teaching at the No. Jersey Training School in Totowa for some 30 years. His wife has assisted him there. This was with deaf retarded people. Now they are teaching two boys' cottages as well as one women's cottage and they have only three deaf in their classes, but have a total of 60 from these three cottages.

This is a great outreach for the District's deaf mission and we ask the blessing of the Holy Spirit on this work.

My teenager says, in a tone of distress, that I don't understand his position. It seems that the key to his social success is the same one that fits the ignition.

6. CONVENTION SPEAKERS: The Detroit Mission Committee headed by Clarence Schulz and Elmer Francisco shall select all speakers for the opening ceremony on Thursday and for the Saturday evening banquet. Mr.Lester Ahls will be master of ceremonies and Dr.Herbert Arkebauer will be the main speaker at the banquet. Rev.Dan Pokorny will be speaker at the opening ceremony.

7. WORSHIP SERVICE: The Columbus Mission Committee, headed by Sarah Riddlebaugh and Rev.Donald Leber, will coordinate with Ephphatha Conference to conduct worship services throughout the convention. The Pastoral Advisor, Rev.William Ludwig, shall be responsible for the installation of officers and be in charge of that ceremony.

8. ILDA BUSINESS: The ILDA Board of Directors approved the original schedule of the convention program for all ILDA business and it will be broken into five sessions for Friday and Saturday. Ample time has been allowed for all the sessions, and if this is done effectively, adjournment should be possible by 5 p.m. on Saturday.Five sessions with a total of nine to ten hours should be sufficient. This means all changes in the constitution and by-laws must be submitted to the law committee well ahead of the convention and all nominations for officers ready for the ballot to avoid time consuming arguments.

9. REGISTRATION: All plans for registration of the delegates, room assignments, recording, accounting, etc. are complete and we have a very effective system planned. Refunds on any arrangement will be made only if they are of an extreme nature.

10. BANQUET: The Pittsburgh Committee will be in charge of banquet arrangements.Every table will be arranged so all can see the table of distinguished guests and the master of ceremonies platform. The "Breakthrough" group that will be performing at the Saturday banquet is a Pittsburgh based entertainment group and we are sure you will be delighted with them.

11. REMINDER: The boat ride and river cruise scheduled for Friday is limited to 200 persons, so be sure to send in your reservation early. This event must be managed on a first come, first served basis.

To all who are planning to come to the ILDA Convention be sure to bring three things: First-- bring a rock or stone with your hometown written, printed, or taped on: Second-- bring a picture of your home church building or the place where you worship;Third bring a color photograph of yourself, alone or together with your family.

1982 IRA DEADLINE NEARS

April 15 would be the target day to open an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and have the option to deduct that amount before filing 1982 income tax returns.
