Rev. R. W. Luce of Christ Lutheran, where services are held, states: "It is a wonder to behold the many deaf children attending well-planned Sunday school classes here in the heart of the South. Much of what Don and Lois do goes unnoticed, yet strikes me as being so characteristic of the ministry of our Lord. They speaks on behalf of the deafs' rights in public offices and sometimes in court. We love and admire them for their patient, loving work on behalf of these, the least of His."

The Ephphatha Award, a large plaque with the figure head of Christ showing loving attention to two children, was presented to the couple by Rev. Rodney Rynearson, executive director of the Lutheran School for the Deaf as LC-MS president, Dr. Ralph Bohlman offered his congratulations.

1483-1983: The Martin Luther Quincentenary The Man for All Ages

Each year towards the end of October, many Lutheran churches throughout the world celebrate the Festival of the Reformation which began on October 31, 1517 when Martin Luther posted his list of 95 theses on the door of



Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, thus raising these issues for discussion.

Ordained a Catholic priest in 1507 after first studying law, Luther began to have serious doubts concerning the practice of selling "indulgences" as a way of "paying" for sins and lessening time spent in purgatory.

A devout student of the Bible, Luther came upon Paul's words in Romans 1:17 which read, "The just shall live by faith." He came to believe that salvation was a direct gift from God to those who had faith in Jesus Christ---not by doing good works or through priests and other intermediaries. This is the doctrine of "justification by grace, received in faith" which Paul writes in Ephesians 2:8-9.

earned Doctorate in Theology, created a sensation and he was summoned to appear before the Pope in Rome and requested to take back the statements he had made, to which he refused.

In 1521, Luther was excommunicated (expelled) from the Catholic Church and also during the same year, he was called before Emperor Charles V and ordered again to change what he had written. It was at this time he spoke his famous words, "Here I stand; I refuse to recant. I cannot do otherwise." Charles had Luther adjudged a heretic, placing his lfe in great danger.

Luther, however, was not without friends. He was spirited away and hidden in a castle for a year where he completed his work of translating the New Testament into German.

Luther's works are many. He wrote many hymns, both words and music. Our small Catechism is used throughout our churches as are his commentaries. It is estimated approximately 400 works are attributed to him.

For all that Luther accomplished during his 63 years, he found time to marry Katherine von Bora, a former nun, and to their union were born six children. They also were able to give a home to 11 orphans.

Reformation, During we remember with thanks to our heavenly Father, who throughout history has raised up leaders to lead His people. Luther was such a person, whose works did much to keep God's Word in its purity.

Springboard for Discussion . . . A Pastor Asks: "Why Don't the Deaf Give More to Support their Church?"

Recently, someone asked me, "Why don't deaf people give more money to support their church?" I immediately started to defend the deaf people by saying, "Deaf people don't have very good jobs," and "deaf people don't understand about giving offerings to God," and other answers that pastors of the deaf use again and again. But as I was giving those answers, I thought, "that isn't true." I caught myself lying to defend the deaf. I know many deaf people with very good paying jobs. I know many deaf people who do understand about giving to God. Some of them have told me, "we will start tithing," but they never do.

Now, I am asking you, the deaf Lutherans, "Why don't deaf people support their churches better?" Why don't they give more than a dollar or two to God?" Please send me an answer!

I have seen deaf people spend hundreds of dollars to go to a bowling tournament or a yearly reunion. I know deaf people who have boats, summer cabins, nice homes and cars, campers and other luxuries. I have seen these same deaf people give a dollar a week to God and act like it was a great sacrifice.

As long as I have been associating with deaf people (10 years) I have only known three who tithed (giving 1/10 of their income to the Lord).

So please, you deaf Lutherans out there, send me your answers. The next time a district official, a special ministries board member or a pastor of a hearing church asks me, "Why don't deaf people give more to the Lord?" . . I will be able to give an honest answer from deaf Lutherans.

Pastors must, themselves, judge whether or not they should have an inner circle of friends.
