FIRST APARTMENTS FOR THE DEAF OPENS

CHICAGO (AP)--Betty Jo Healey can see the door bell ring in her new apartment, which features a shaking bed and lights that turn on automatically. Mrs. Healey and the other 29 people who have moved in view the silent Cooperative apartments as a godsend.

The building, which officially opened about Aug. 1, is the first for the hearing impaired in the nation, its developers says. In other apartments Mrs. Healey said she knew of deaf people trapped in elevators, and they could not call for help. But in her new apartment, which she shares with her hearing impaired husband, Russel, Mrs. Healey, 56, does not have those concerns, she said in the sign language.

The building's main fire alarm is hooked up to a special electrical outlet in each bedroom. If the alarm goes off, the outlet turns on lights or shakes a bed to awaken the occupant. When someone rings the doorbell, a light flashes in the living room.

The eight-story building was financed by a \$5.86 million loan from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Mrs. Healey says the development is helping the hearing impaired enter into the mainstream of society. "Years ago, deaf people were always being pushed aside," she said. "But now, more hearing people are helping the deaf, and we're a part of society."

(Editor's note: Mrs. Healey is the former Central Regional president and her husband, Russel was formerly the business manager of THE DEAF LUTHERAN.) Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country, and for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer on us."

LUTHER SPEAKS ON BAPTISM

The following account is based on a hypothetical interview with Dr. Martin Luther, based on excerpts from his sermons and writings.)

- Q: Dr. Luther, why is baptism important?
- A: Baptism was not devised by any human beings, but was instituted by God.
- Q: Does not Baptism employ ordinary water?
- A: When the Word of God is pronounced over it, so that Baptism is to be administered in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, it possesses the power to wash away sin and to save them from death.
- Q: Then Baptism is not just an outward observance?
- A: It does not merely mark me externally before men but makes a different person of me before God.
- Q: How is this accomplished?
- A: Whoever is baptized in Christ is bathed in the blood of Christ and is cleansed from sins.
- Q: What does this mean in a personal way?
- A: I do not have a single work which is pure; but through my baptism God, who cannot lie, has bound Himself not to count my sin against me.
- Q: Is this baptism blessing also meant for little children?
- A: In baptism, a child comes to Christ as the little children were brought to Him long ago, so that His Word and work may touch them and make them holy.
- Q: Is faith connected to the blessing of baptism?
- A: Baptism is useless without faith. It is

performed so that you may receive in the water the promised salvation. Now, neither the hand nor body can grasp salvation; the heart must believe it.

- Q: How cam an infant, who cannot yet reason, have faith?
- A: When the person baptizing deals with children in Christ's stead, it is Christ who blesses them and grant them faith.
- Q: When the child comes to an age of understanding, should he be baptized again?
- A: No, but he is to be instructed in the faith. Baptism, once administered, is permanently valid. It is not to be repeated.
- Q: It's promise holds as long as we live?
- A: See what a splendid thing baptism is. It snatches us from the jaws of the devil; it makes us God's own; restrains and removes sin; and then daily strengthens the new man within us, It is and ever remains effective until we pass from this world to eternal glory.
