The words, "Alive in Christ" not only give the appeal its name, but direct our attention to the verse found in Romans 6:11, which read "Likewise you are to think of yourselves

as dead to sin but alive to God in union with Jesus Christ." In remembrance of God's bountiful grace, we live a life of continous mission and ministry in whatever way pleases Him.

In the logo above, the Biblical verse appears against the open book, symbolizing the Holy Bible. In this verse is the Word of God, containing the message of salvation, hope and peace that we share with the entire world.

The dark cup and circled wafer remind us of the Lord's Supper; while waves behind them recall Holy Baptism. The cross on the wafer points to the atoning work of Christ. Through two sacraments God offers and gives us for-

#### No Unity Anytime Soon . . .

### BOHLMANN: DIFFERENCES REMAIN BETWEEN LUTHERANS AND CATHOLICS

The president of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) has discounted suggestions that Lutheran-Roman Catholic unity may be close at hand.

Dr. Ralph A. Bohlmann, writing in the Lutheran Witness, an LCMS publication, took note of the recent exchange of letters by Bishop James R. Crumley Jr. of the Lutheran Church in America and Pope John Paul II.

Bohlmann said "The spirit of Christian goodwill evident in the letters is surely cause for thanksgiving, particularly when we recall tha harsh feelings-even hostilities-that sometimes flared between Roman Catholics and Lutherans when we were children.

"We often find ourselves working side by side to correct such evils as abortion, pornography, and the corruption of family life. I, for one, am grateful to our Lord (continue on page 2) BOLHMANN

for every such instance of Christian love and goodwill."

#### Sobering Fact

But, Dr. Bohlmann continued, "honesty compels us to underscore the sobering fact that the Roman Catholic church itself has done little, if anything, to correct its doctrinal positions which caused the divisions of the 16th century. Its condemnation of Luther's Biblical teachings remain the official position of that church body. Tradition Roman Catholic teaching in such areas as justification, papal primacy and infallibility, the role of Mary and apostolic succession remains unchanged.

President Bolhmann also noted, "The fact that some theologians, pastors and laity in both church bodies have made recent progress in such difficult areas is indeed cause for gratitude and hope. But such progress ought not to be promoted and discussed in such a way as to suggest that Lutheran-Roman Catholic unity may be close at hand."

#### Strong Commitment

Dr. Bohlmann, who met Pope John Paul II at the Vatican in March 1984, described him as a "charming and hospitable man" but added "clearly and consistently he communicates a strong commitment to maintaining traditional Roman Catholic dogma and practice. That includes the nature and unity of the church, with all that implies for a 'return to Rome' as the basis for Christian unity. ". . . much is made of the 'convergence' supposedly established in theological dialogs over the past 20-plus years. I believe that such claims are greatly exaggerated. . . .' Dr. Bohlhmann said. The word "convergence" he said means something quite different from consensus.

The 2.7 million member LCMS is not in altar and pulpit fellowship with any other U.S. Lutheran or Christian church body. Nor is it one of the three Lutheran church bodies uniting to form a new U.S. Lutheran church body. year-old son and brother. Two days later, the little girl gave up the fight, also. In less than a week, the baby died, too. Only the three-year-old escaped the deadly diphtheria.

When Easter came, the parents and remaining child were in church. The mother's face was pale, but tender and beautiful. She wore no emblem of her sorrow, and the lillies and violets on her coat were like those she had worn every Easter since I had known her. When the congregation rose to sing, she sang softly the words, "The powers of death have done their worst, but Christ their legions hath dispersed."

Her husband stood with his head bowed. He could not sing. But she touched his hand as it lay on the back of the pew, and when they recited the Creed, I heard him say the words steadily, "I believe in . . . the resurrection of the body; and the life everlasting." She taught her class of girls that day, and he went to his superintendent's desk, led his class in worship, and read the Easter story with only a break now and then in his fine voice.

All the faces lined with suffering, rebellion, and despair in that Easter congregation had seen a miracle. As a 15-year-old boy rode home with his family from Sunday school, he said, "Dad, I guess Mr. and Mrs. B--- really believe it, don't they? They believe in Easter.

Finally, the short waves flowing from the left side of the cup stand for the Spirit of God who abides in us, as He did with the first disciples of Jesus.

Thus, armed with God's Word of grace, strengthened by His sacraments and guided by the Holy Spirit, we go forth, Alive in Christ, to proclaim His gospel in whatever way we can in the life He sets before us. ### DEAFNET ELECTRONIC MAIL CONNECTS CHURCHES SERVING THE DEAF IN LCMS

ST. LOUIS--The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod is now the first church body in the United States to have all of its ministers to the deaf connected through a telecommunications network. Through a grant from the Mill Neck Foundation of New York, DEAFNET for Lutherans is now in place.

DEAFNET is a special users group on an international telecommunications network. A pastor equipped with a special modem (a device which transmits data signals across telephone lines) and a personal computer can pull materials and information from a central pool or "bulletin board." Special liturgies and Bible studies suitable for work among deaf people can be sent to the bulletin by pastors and can then be pulled off instantly by others in the system.

"One of the greatest problems through the years among our pastors working with deaf people is the isolation they feel in their work. They must use a foreign language (American Sign Language or ASL) as they serve a special group of people who have their own culture and organizations.

"One way to break through this isolation is to use DEAFNET. Through DEAFNET we can join all of these workers into a network of mutual support.

#### Don Fairman Retires: To Be Succeeded by Rev. David Mueller

For the first time that anyone can remember, Iowa will have both of its mission fields vacant in April with the departure of Rev. David Mueller who accepted a call from the Southern District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod to succeed Don Fairman at Jackson, Miss.

Mr. Fairman is retiring after a long tenure as pastor in the Jackson area with work largely centered around instruction of students at the Mississippi School for the Deaf and carrying out interpreting services for the deaf.

Pastor Mueller, a native of Paullina, Iowa, has served Word of God Lutheran church in Cedar Rapids for approximately five years, as well as stations in Dubuque, Davenport, Burlington, Rock Island, Ill., and Ottumwa, and western Illinois. at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, first learned of DEAFNET in July 1982 at the annual meeting of the National Association of the Deaf. The use of DEAFNET by pastors in the Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod came about through the persistent efforts of Pokorny in seeking the help and support of various organizations. Of primary importance was the support of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML). Through funds provided by the LWML on a district level, Pokorny was able to purchase the necessary equipment to subscribe to the DEAFNET system. Not long ago, the Mill Neck Foundation provided \$15,000 for research, demonstration and expansion of the system among the ministers of the deaf of the LCMS.

Looking toward the future, Pokorny says, "It would be trite to say "I have a dream,' but I do. I have a dream that one day all of the districts and the churches of our synod will be linked."

#### Lutheran Church Headquarters Picked

#### After Commission Meets in Minneapolis

A new Lutheran church body, encompassing three existing Lutheran church bodies in America has agreed to merge, effective Jan. 1, 1988 with headquarters tentatively set to be located in Milwaukee, Wis.

Chicago, Minneapolis and New York City were contenders for the site of the new church's headquarters, but a 70-member commission eventually choose Milwaukee, subject to approval of the three merging churches later this summer during conventions.

The new Lutheran body, to be known as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America will replace the Lutheran Church in America, currently with 2.9 million members; the American Lutheran Church with 2.3 million and the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches with 110,000 members. The new church will be the largest Lutheran body with 5.3 million.

The Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod will not be a part of the new organization. The LCMS, with 2.7 million members, will continue to have its headquarters in St. Louis, where it recently finished construction of a new International Center.

### SCANNING THE NEWS FROM HERE AND THERE . . .

The Great Lakes Regional Conference will convene at Lutheran Memorial camp, Fulton, Ohio on the dates of Aug 15-17. Everyone attending this year's meeting will get a free T-shirt with the conference logo. Theme for the conference is "One Family in Christ."

Meeting under a theme of "Hope Is Remembering with Praise," Hope Lutheran church, Portland, Ore. will observe its 60th anniversary of deaf missions to Oregon and southwest Washington on May 16-18.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) has given a grant of \$5,000 to buy videotape equipment for the three deaf churches in south Wisconsin. Other preaching stations (like Menasha, Wis.) will be able to have church and Bible study more than once a month. Deaf churches in Iowa (and Colorado) are already doing this. Deaf churches in northern Illinois are putting worship services, Bible studies and captioned religious programs on cable TV (for free!!). There are many ways to use videotape equipment to help people grow in their faith.

It is not too early to mention now that the next great commission convocation of the Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod will be held in St. Louis on the dates of Nov. 3-6, 1988 according to its planning committee.

Another reminder: the 1986 Ephphatha Conference will convene at Indiana Central unversity on the dates of July 16-20 with its opening scheduled to begin with the evening meal on the 16th and concluding with the noon meal on the 20th. Indiana Central is located in Indianapolis.

for Life, and who chairs the Missouri Synod President's Commission on Women, was one of 20 pro-life leaders to meet with President Ronald Reagan at the White House Jan. 22, the 13th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion. The group made a strong appeal for research into abortion's effects on women. Abortion is the sixth leading cause of maternal deaths, and at least 5,000 cases of serious medical complications are documented annually from the procedure.

Two officials of Lutheran World Relief were in St. Louis in January to thank the Synod for its support of LWR. From fall 1984 through last December, LCMS members gave almost \$2 million in funds designated for African drought and famine relief.

A speical service of remembrance to honor the memory of Rev. Frederic Schumann was held at Trinity Lutheran church, Pittsburgh, Pa. on Jan 12. Rev. Schumann was instrumental in securing the building lot and parking space for the members, as well as being deeply involved in assisting the deaf with the needs for their worship services for many years. A granite cornerstone marker was dedicated at the Jan. 12 service to perpetuate the memory of a man who did so much for the deaf.
