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# I KNOW THAT MY REDEEMER LIVES

If someone were to ask you, "What's the greatest thing that ever happened to you?", we would probably recall many possible an-



swers to that question. But as Christians, the greatest thing that ever happened to us, and indeed, the world, is that Jesus Christ rose from the dead and came forth from the tomb on the third day after His death.

It is that event that begin to focus on, ever so clearly, as we enter Lent

and Holy Week which culminates on Easter Sunday, April 19. During Lent and Holy Week, we walk with out Lord through the events that led to the cross and the celebration of His resurrection. As we prepare for Easter, we all think of Easter outfits, Easter eggs and Easter baskets. But our thoughts should be prayerfully centered around that Easter event that occurred just outside Jerusalem almost 2,000 years ago. Matthew helps us zero in on what happened and mentions three things that will help Easter be more than just an event to be celebrated on April 19. In Matthew 28:5, we read the words, "Fear Not!" The resurrection destroys our fear of death and replaces it with hope and the Lord's promise of eternal life. Why should we fear when we know that our powerful Lord has broken the chains of death, hell and the grave for us.

In Matthew 28:6, we hear the angel of the Lord invite the women to "come and see," to examine the empty tomb. We, too, look for evidence that Jesus is alive. We don't have to look for a tomb--we can simply look and see what he does in our lives as we trust Him. He lives in us! As the favorite Easter hymn says, "I know that my Redeemer Lives! He lives to silence all my fears, He lives to wipe away my tears, He lives to calm my troubled heart, He lives all blessings to impart."

Un Matthew 28:10, we read the words, "go and tell." The command is to go and tell others what the resurrection means. It means --that because He lives--we shall live also. What better way to celebrate Easter, than to tell some other person--He died, yes, for you and me--but He is alive, to let us know we are forgiven and accepted by God.

A blessed and happy Easter!

## Video Movies . . . Illegal in Church

Some congregations and youth groups, because of limited budgets, have resorted to video movies as a source of entertainment. Many youth groups enjoy recently released movies on video cassette as a portion of a retreat, lock-in, or recreation night. Full length movies can be rented for as low as \$1. Unfortunately, this practice is illegal.

The law allows video movies to be rented for the sole purpose of viewing "in the home" by a family or friends of the family. Under current law, a church, school or other formed organization cannot rent a movie from such local shops and show it in church. However, the current copyright law does allow a member to rent a film amd invite a class, youth group, or the entire church membership **to his home** to view the film. Naturally, charging a fee for such viewing is against the law. --Iowa District East Digest Page 4

## **IS IT WORTH IT TRAVELING HUNDREDS OF MILES?**

In missionary work, we usually deal in small numbers. It is seldom that people turn to Christ in large numbers. As a rule, men



are won to Christ one by one. It is the same with the work among the deaf. In most places, the gatherings are very small. Although at times, we can preach to several hundred, but more frequently, to 30, 40 or 50 deaf. But in most of our mission stations the attendance is small one. Our missionaries

often travel hundreds of miles to preach to maybe only five deaf and then go to another place and preach to seven, etc. Upon hearing this, a person is tempted to ask, "Is it really worth while?"

A missionary perhaps at times feels discouraged at these small numbers and asks this same question, "Is it worthwhile?" Our Lord and Master says, "Indeed, it is."

While going about to do His Father's will, He often took pains to win one soul and thereby intended to say, "Even if you win only one for My Kingdom, it is worth while." This our Lord also taught us when He healed the deaf person, we find written in Mark 7:31-37, when Christ came from the coasts of Tyre abd Sidon unto the sea of Galilee, through the midst of the coasts of Decapolis, they brought Him a deaf person and they asked Him to put His hand upon him. And what did Jesus do? Did He perhaps say, "I cannot trouble Myself with one deaf-mute, while I can teach a great multitude?" Oh, no! This

With a total of 2,206 students enrolled in undergraduate, graduate, preparatory and non-degree-credit sign language programs, Gallaudet University, Washington, D.C. saw a 3.7 per cent increase over Fall, 1985 figures. Encouraging are the achievement scores of matriculating students the past two years when compared with hearing students who have had a rather dismal scores in reading and math upon entering colleges and universities in the U.S. one deaf person seems of great value to our Lord. He left the multitude and took him aside, put His fingers into his ears, and He spit, and touched his tongue and looking up to heaven, He sighed and said unto him, Ephphatha, that is, BE Opened.

No one will be led to Christ. Let us look unto our Master! He left the multitude and went aside with one deaf person.

Let us not lose sight of the value of one soul. One soul saved, that is more than if a man gains the whole world. (Matthew 16:26) There is joy in the presence of the Angels of God over one sinner that repenteth (Luke 15:10). Brethren, if any of you do err from the truth, and one convert him, let him know that he which converteth the sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death and shall hide a multitude of sins (James 5:19, 20). How precious, if one soul is saved by our work among the deaf!

If only one were saved, that ought to make us rejoice forever. But, deaf reader, not only one, but hundreds of deaf have been brought to the saving knowledge of Jesus, to thousands . . . by missionaries who have preached the word of salvation in sign language. Is it not worth while?

Come, let us continue in this work. Let us ever turn our eyes to our Master, who thought it worth while to leave the multitude and help this one deaf person, and we will, with joy, carry on this work and diligently pray for it, and gladly give to the support of it.
