460 Years In Use . . . LUTHER'S SMALL CATECHISM



"The Catechism is the Bible of the layman, which contains the whole body of Christian teaching necessary to bring every Christian to salvation. . . . For that reason we should hold the Catechism honorable and worthy and use it diligently among the youth, because in it has been gathered together all the true, real, ancient, pure and Godly teachings of the holy Christian church."

--Martin Luther

The complete works of Martin Luther would fill more than 100 huge volumes on a library shelf and which would probably encompass the works of Shakespeare by more than a hundred times. Yet Dr. Luther is known to have said

once that he would not have minded if they were all lost, if only the catechism and one other work were saved.

Since the year 1529, the SMALL CATECHISM has proved to be one of the most effective books of Christian education ever written. The catechism reflected Dr. Luther's profound belief that if people were to have meaning and purpose in their lives, then they should have the Word of God as an ever present help in their daily lives.

Luther does not use the Catechism to point out where the ancient church has been wrong, nor is he argumentative. He merely points out what it means to be a child of God; what it means to be justified by faith; what it means to be both saint and sinner and what it means that God has revealed Himself in human flesh and comes to us in Word and sacrament.

The advent of Luther's SMALL CATECHISM had a long history and was about 13 years in the making. Luther encouraged others with whom he worked to come up with such a manual and more than 30 different versions were written, none of which exactly suited him, and only then did he settle down to write the book that we know today.

The invention of the first printing press by Gutenberg in 1483, the same year in which Luther was born, had the effect of revolutionizing teaching and learning in both the (continue on page 2) LUTHER'S CATECHISM

world outside as well as in the church. and at least some gratitude is due Dr. Luther for this coming about. Illiteracy was common during Luther's time, and the advent of printing drastically changed the picture and many were able to obtain books and even Bibles, of which they were previously scarce or non-existent.

The word, "Catechism" is derived from the Greek word, 'catechismus' which means a ringing out, an announcing, a calling down to man by God. Through its use in the church, it had come to mean a method of teaching Biblical truth. For Luther it was a collection of teachings, a whole body of doctrines which has been taught throughout the ages, with Christ as the center, or focal point of the entire ministry. To others. it was also considered as a manual or handbook.

What really spurred Luther to action to write the Catechism was a visit to some villages in Saxony during the year 1528. He was appalled by the religious ignorance he found. At one hamlet, there had been no Bible for 26 years since a fire had destroyed the only one there was; at another, the villagers refused to contribute to the church because no services were ever held there; at yet another, the priest could not recite either the Creed ot the Lord's Prayer. Some refused to learn because they felt the Lord's Prayer was too long. Shortly after he returned home, Luther dispatched materials about the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer and the Creed to the printers, which later in 1529 became a part of the Large and Small Catechisms.

The demands for Luther's Catechisms was

considerable and became common in most of the countries we now call Europe. It was significant and different in that Luther emphasized faith as the meaning of life with God. This faith is commanded by the First Commandment, because God wants us to trust His love and not our own merits.

The SMALL CATECHISM has been in America since approximately 1623, just a few years after the Pilgrims landed, brought by Lutherans who landed in New York. Swedes landing in Delaware brought theirs in 1638.

As we observe REFORMATION DAY this year on Sunday, Oct. 30, we want to remember and



praise God for sending a servant who did so much to return His word to its truth and purity as we find it in the Bible. And for those little booklets called "SMALL

CATECHISM" that so many of us used for instruction as we were growing up in the church.

SOUTHERN BAPTISTS SAYS

HOMOSEXUALITY 'AN ABOMINATION'

SAN ANTONIA, Texas--Southern Baptists charged modern society with an "erosion of moral sanity" Thursday and condemned homosexuality as "an abomination in the eyes of God."

"This deviant behavior has wrought havoc in the lives of millions," said assembled "messengers" of the 14.7 million member denomination.

On the last day of the convention, it adopted one of the most unqualified denunciations of homosexuality in recent church annals.

"The Bible is very clear in its teaching that homosexuality is a manifestation of a depraved nature," the convention said, adding:

"Homosexuality is a perversion of divine standards and a violation of nature and of natural affections."

The resolution said, "Homosexual are justified and even glorified in our secular media." Page 8

COMMON SIGN LANGUAGE TRANSLATIONS OF THE ORDERS OF WORSHIP MAY BE PRINTED AND TAPED

A new project being developed will, if fully funded, produce in print and on videotape new or revised sign language translations of the orders of worship most commonly used in Lutheran congregations.

The proposed project will have a team of six translators, two editors and a review committee of five individuals.

There will be two teams of three translators and each will be assigned an editor, whose duty it will be to watch for consistent application of the principles of translation and preparation of the gloss. The responsibility of the editors will be to review the
