at Bethlehem, something which even Calvary could not stop. These weeks leading to Christmas remind us of that fact, and direct us to look ahead to the final triumph of God's Kingdom, when our exalted Lord returns to judge all.

Therefore' ADVENT calls us to have faith and obey our Lord. Our ever present danger is that we settle for nostalgia rather than obedience. The pre-Christmas season is often the "silly season" for the church as well as the world when we allow the sentimental things of the season to hide the spiritual truths.

ADVENT calls us to preach the Gospel to all nations before the end comes. We are to adventure for our dear Lord and Saviour. There is an obvious link between the word "advent" and the word, "adventure."

The dictionary defines adventure as "risk, danger. daring enterprise and hazardous activity." Does this describe what you have been doing in your church?

Our Lord Jesus adventured for us when He left His home in heaven the first Christmas and came to earth to live and die for our salvation. Jesus took plenty of risks and endured the greatest dangers for our sake. Can we do less for Him?

Let us use these days of the **ADVENT** season to examine ourselves and our church life. Let us ask God to inspire us with Jesus' loving, daring and hopeful spirit.

Let the adventure begin!

is Jesus" much different than the Bible does. The movie shows Jesus is only a man, not the Son of God. The film shows Jesus with many doubts about who He is or what He should be doing. The movie says: Since Jesus was a man, He had all the weaknesses--even sins--that all men have.

This is really nothing new! Unbelieving people have always had some very bad things to say about Jesus--that He was an imposter or a fake-- that He was not born of a virgin (Mary just "played around" and got pregnant) . . . that He was a sinner.

From the Gospel, Jesus asks: "Now, what do YOU say? Who am I?" This is the key QUESTION! Peter answered, "You are the Christ, the Saviour God promised." How true! Jesus is the Holy God; long ago He said He will come and rescue His people from their sin and evil. He was the perfect man, without sin, although He truly felt all the temptations any man or women feels. Jesus was the Saviour who knew from the start what must happen, that He must suffer and die for the sins of all people. And He also knew that He would rise from the grave on the third day.

Now, a question for us **personally** . . . Jesus asks each one of us: What do you say? Who am I?"

Our answer is the same. "Jesus is the Saviour . . . our Saviour." He touched our lives with love and mercy. Jesus forgave our sins and still does that every day. He leads us each day, as we live for Him. He is our Lord --our God!

ents had not the financial means to send him to school. A friend of the family suggested the letter to Dr. Walther, whom it was felt, would know what to do.

Dr. Walther's letter, dated June 3, 1862, is now in the Archives of the Church in St. Louis. Dr. Walther gives much encouragement to the 14-year-old boy and said in part:

"Neither do they consider what glorious promises God gives to those who preach the saving Gospel to this lost world. For it is written: "The teachers will shine as the brightness of heaven, and they who point many to righteousness, as the stars forever and ever." (Daniel 12:3)

"May the dear God strengthen you and richly give His Holy Spirit to you, so that you remain firm in your resolve to be a servant of Jesus Christ, who is also your faithful Saviour. May He also move your dear parents to give you joyfully to the service of God's house."

It is good, as we approach Thanksgiving once again, to praise and thank God for the gift of dedicated servants, who work tirelessly to bring His word to His people.

(The boy graduated with honors from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, in 1872 and became known far and wide as an excellent pastor.)

THE CHRISTMAS POINSETTIA

In the United States, the flower most symbolic of the Christmas season is the Poinsettia. It was brought to this country in 1828 by Dr. Joel Poinsett, the first United States ambassador to Mexico who discovered it there and for whom the flower is named.

A Mexican legend tells that many years ago in a certain village there was the custom each Christmas Eve of placing gifts before the creche in the church. A small boy having nothing to give knelt to pray in the snow outside. When he arose, he found in the spot where he knelt a beautiful plant with scarlet leaves and a yellow flower in the center. He picked the stalk and presented it as his gift to the Christ Child.

The Mexicans call it the "Flower of the Holy Night" and think it resembles the Star of Bethlehem.

PROJECT LIFT

Sometimes we not only need to have our spirits 'lifted' but our physical beings as well! Enter "Project Lift." This is an effort by two of our churches to raise capital to fund elevator projects within the church proper to assist certain members with physical disabilities to negotiate the steps in their buildings.

Prince of Peace Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Minneapolis, of which Rev. Donald Zuhn is pastor, has received a gift from the Minnesota South District of the LWML of \$20,000. Also assistance is being received from the Minnesota south District of the LCMS. The church itself has set a goal of a minimum of \$3,000 in a fund raising project and it is hoped the improvement will be in operation by Christmas this year.

Faith Lutheran church, Spokane, Wash., has a similar project in mind. The church, which is served by Rev. Martin Hewitt, has received \$7,000 from the LWML for a chair lift that will run on a rail up a stairway. The gift represents three-fourths of the project cost.
