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The South Wisconsin District of the LCMS has decided to cut back subsidy to all mission churches, including Emmanuel, Milwaukee, an amount equal to \$3,600 by Dec. 31, 1993.

SYMBOLS OF PENTECOST

The color for the Day of Pentecost is red. It is the color of fire, for the spirit came in tongues of fire. The fire represents God, the 'consuming fire.' God the Holy Spirit comes to the disciples. The fire represents, moreover, warm hearts, fiery zeal, dedication and devotion.

Also, red is the color of blood and represents the blood of martyrs which is the seed of the church.

The color for Sundays after Pentecost, is green, a color of growth. It is during this season that Christians are to grow in the spirit. Incidentally, the word, "Pentecost" denotes fity, which is fifty days after Easter.
