How often does a church have an occasion to honor one of its servants who has given more than 65 years of his life to serving God and his fellow man and bringing the gospel of Jesus Christ to many thousands of deaf and hearing impaired brothers and sisters over his life time? Not very often.

Rev. Alvin E. Ferber, Kansas City, Mo., celebrated his 90th birthday on Sept. 10 this year. The third oldest in family of four boys, all whom entered the Holy ministry in the footsteps of their father, Rev. Ferber was recognized for his long service to the

Unable to be present to receive an award from Dr. Rodney R. Rynearson, counselor of ministries to the deaf and blind of St. Louis due to the infirmities of age, an appropriately engraved plaque from the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and signed by Synod President Dr. Ralph R. Bohlmann, Dr. Edward Westcott, director of the board of mission services and Dr. Rynearson was given to Mr. Harold Nord, president of the Midwest Conference of the ILDA, for presenting to him during meeting at Bonner Springs, Kan. July 29.

The four Ferber brothers cumulatively ministered a total of 210 years, with three of them devoting at least a portion of those years to serving the deaf. They were Waldemar, who served 70 years and is still living at age 95 and who will be 96 on Dec. 9 and Gerhardt who served the deaf for 15 years prior to entering the Army Chaplain Corps in 1942 in southern California. He died at age 83 in 1980 at Arcadia, Calif.

Despite his advanced age, Rev. Ferber demonstrated a remarkable memory for events of yesteryear and continues to preach on occasion and do some visiting to shut-ins and members in area hospitals at Kansas City.

We thanked and praise our heavenly Father for His gift of such missionaries of His Word and wish Pastor Ferber many more years of good health and happiness. And we extend to him hearty congratulations on receiving this greatly deserved honor.

## "HOW A THIRD GRADER SEES GOD"

One of God's main jobs is making people. He makes these to put in the place of the ones that die so there will be enough people to take care of things here on earth. He doesn't make grown-ups. Just babies. I think because they are smaller . . . and easier to make. That way He doesn't have to take up his valuable time teaching them to walk and talk. He can just leave that up to the mothers and fathers. I think it works pretty good.

An awful lot of this goes on, as some people, like preachers and things, pray other times besides bed time, and grandma and grandpa pray everytime they eat (except snacks). So you shouldn't go wasting His time asking for things that aren't important or go over your parents' head and ask for something they said you couldn't have."--Copied This belated news item, delayed for lack of space earlier, is nevertheless current in relation to our grief at the untimely death of 6-year-old Jessica Smith at the Iowa School for the Deaf at Council Bluffs last March 1.

Jessica's scarf became entangled in a playground slide during a 15-minute recess and in the process of trying to free herself, she fell off the top of the slide. When recess ended and the kids returned to their classrooms, Jessica was found to be missing. An immediate search for the girl was started, first inside the building, then outside. She was discovered dangling under the slide by the school staff and resuscitation efforts were begun right away, which proved to be ineffective. The county medical examiner said the child had probably been hanging about 10 to 20 minutes before she was found.

The whole school and the staff were very upset by the incident, and all parents across the state were notified of the tragedy. Funeral services were conducted a day before Jessica would have been 7 years old.

A memorial service for Jessica Smith was held in the school auditorium on March 6 with Dr. William P. Johnson, superintendent, delivering the eulogy.

# **80 YEARS OF CHRISTMAS SEALS**

In 1904, a Danish Lutheran postal clerk came up with the idea of using "charity stamps" as a means of raising funds for TB (tuberculosis) and other worthwhile causes. Three years later, the idea had spread to the United States, and were used by what is



now the American Lung Association.

In 1910, the Lutheran Sanatorium printed its first issue and sold them door-to-door to raise funds to assist patients who had come to Colorado to be cured of TB.

Later when treatment for tuberculosis had advanced enough for patients to be treated in their home communities, the sanatorium at Wheat Ridge, Colo. was sold, but the stamps have continued their mission of serving suffering people down through the years.

For 1989, a special sheet containing some of the designs from the past eight decades are included, along with the first issue.

Projects approved by the Wheat Ridge board of directors for 1989-90 will be more than ever, totalling with \$308,850 in first year funding and \$582,350 over the next three years.

# LOGISTICS

The word above is not generally in the realm of daily church uses, or even its language. However, it comes into focus when we read the episode in the Bible where Moses led God's people out of Egypt for the 40 years to the Promised Land.

Logistics has to do primarily with supply and it most often is connected with the military in war time. We shall use some mathematics from the Quartermaster General of the Army as to what would have been required to equip the people that followed Moses over that 40 years by today's standards, if God had not done it. We are looking at 3 or  $3\frac{1}{2}$ million people, which is only an estimate. They had to be fed and have water to drink . . . remember, they were in the desert.

A conservative estimate is that 1,500 tons of food would be needed each day which God supplied as manna. Do you know that to haul that much food today, two freight trains, each a mile long, would be required? And what about firewood for cooking? That would take 4,000 tons of wood and a few more freight trains each a mile long, just for one day. Don't forget, either, this was not for just a day, or even two days, or a week. IT WAS FOR 40 YEARS!

And drinking water, of course. That would take approximately 11,000,000 gallons each day, and a freight train with tank cars 1,800 miles long to bring it. And how about the crossing of the Red Sea? Since it happened very quickly, in just one night to escape Pharaoh and his army a space 3 miles wide was created by the Lord (it would be needed) for 5,000 to walk abreast to get across in that short span of time. If they had to walk a narrow path double file, the line would be 800 miles long and would take 35 days and nights for everyone to get through.

And camping? At the end of each day, a campground two-thirds the size of Rhode Island would be needed, or a total of about 750 square miles of space. When Moses said, "Yes," to God and that he would lead His people out of the bondage of the Egyptians, do you think that he thought of all this? I doubt it.

You see, MOSES BELIEVED IN GOD, and he believed that God would take care of His people. Let us have the same kind of courage as we face a new year soon. HE WILL TAKE CARE OF YOU.
