WAR AND PEACE

(With excerpts from a message by Rev. Roy L. Dahmann, Our Saviour Lutheran Church, Fremont, Calif.)

Who would have thought that since the last issue of THE DEAF LUTHERAN, we would find ourselves a nation at war only a short time later? Yet, that is



later? Yet, that is precisely what happened Wednesday evening, Jan. 16, when the news came over the television broadcasts that hostilities had started in the Middle East. Af-

ter several months of attempts by the members

of the United Nations to urge Iraq to withdraw from occupied Kuwait and being rebuffed at every turn, that diplomacy would once again give way to war.

For years, the "Cold War" was a fact of life for many countries; the search for an elusive peace brought about by arming with the latest advances in modern warfare technology at a cost of billions of dollars. What a relief it was when at last a thaw became apparent and people could once again relax as the weapons of war were withdrawn and dismantled.

But, alas, it is not to be. And this starts us to thinking about something that Jesus said as we find them written in John 14:27, Please see WAR AND PEACE: Page 2

"THE CURE FOR DEATH"

"Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection. I am life. The person that believes in Me will have life again after he dies. And the



person that lives and believes in Me will never really die." (John 11:25-26, English Version for the Deaf)

Our world today fears death. People don't know what will happen after death. So, people try to stop death, postpone death, and avoid death. People want

to live forever. People will try many different ways to beat death. There was a retired psychologist who was dying of cancer, but he wanted his body preserved by freezing so that it could be revived again if possible. This is called "cryogenic." This man left \$4,200 to buy a steel tube for his body and liquid nitrogen to keep his body frozen at 200 degrees below zero. The man's body will be kept frozen in this tube in liquid nitrogen. The man hopes that someone will find a cure for cancer. Then scientists can "thaw out" his body, cure the cancer, and let him live healthy again.

This is a lot of work and a lot of money. Will it work? Probably not. We cannot stop death. Every person reading this story will die. YOU WILL DIE! Why? Death is our punishment for not obeying God. The Bible says, "When people sin, they earn what sin pays --death." We have sinned. We will die.

WAR AND PEACE

"Peace I leave with you; MY peace I give to you. I do not give peace to you as the world gives peace. Do not let your heart be troubled or afraid."

From these words of Jesus, it is plain to understand that the peace He gives us is not the peace sought by the world or even the peace that the world understands. I feel sorry for those people who think we can ever among nations here on have total peace earth. "When you hear of wars and revolutions, do not become alarmed. For these things must happen first, but the end will not come right away. Nation will fight against nation and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and famines and plaques in various places, terrible sights and great miraculous signs coming from heaven." (Luke 21:9-11). Then Jesus will come to judge the world and bring HIS people home! Yes, the world cannot give us real peace: peace that continues always. As Jesus' followers, we should understand this.

On the night before He suffered and died on the cross, Jesus said to His followers, "I told you this (you will scatter and leave Me alone) so you will have peace in Me. In the world you have trouble. But have courage; I have conquered the world." (John 16:33) Jesus showed His victory over the world by rising from the dead on Easter Sunday. Do you remember what Jesus' first words were to His disciples on Easter Sunday night and again next Sunday? That's right: "Peace be with you!" (John 20:19, 21, 26) Jesus fills His followers with true spiritual peace. A peace that ONLY JESUS can give.

Let us take a look at this peace Jesus wants to give to His followers. Jesus, the Prince of Peace, also said, "Do not think that I came to bring peace to the earth. I did not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I came to turn a man against his father, a daughter against her mother, a daughter in law against her mother in law. A person's enemies will be those in his own home. (Matthew 10:34-36; compare Micah 7:6) whoa!! Wait a minute! Does Jesus give peace or not? Yes, Jesus gives peace with God--spiritual peace.

But, that peace naturally causes "no peace" (war) with the world! For example, nations that support the military action against Iraq have peace with the United States. But, those who support Iraq are enemies of the United States. We are all born as enemies of God because of sin and have no peace with Him. Through Jesus we become His friends and have peace with Him. If you follow Jesus, then you will be at war (spiritually) against everything that is evil and sinful in you and in other people.

Yes, Jesus starts war (spiritually) by bringing you peace with God! This makes you an enemy of the Devil, the sinful world around you, and the old evil person ("Old Adam") inside you. Your warfare here on earth is short; but your peace with God begins now and continues forever!

Remember, you are not alone. All Jesus' followers are fighting with you. That is why Jesus brings His people together in His church. Soldiers don't fight alone: they are joined together in armies. "Stand up for Jesus, you soldiers of the cross ... the strife will not be long: this day the noise of battle, the next, the victor's song." (LH, #451) Jesus' church on earth is called "The Church Militant" (at war) and His church in heaven is called "The Church Triumphant" (victorious). Through toil, and tribulation and tumult of her war she (the church) waits the consummation (beginning) of peace forevermore." (Lutheran Worship, #289).

Although war is part of the world we live in, the Bible also tells us in Psalms 46:9 that "He maketh wars to cease" and therefore our prayers to God that He may allow that to happen should be offered up to Him, according to His will.

Friend in Christ, there will never be peace in the world around us. In fact, if we follow Christ Jesus we can expect spiritual war also with those in our own families sometimes! But, Jesus wants to give us true spiritual peace with God that begins now and continues forever. Members of our church, please remember Paul's words: "Also let the peace of Christ, to which you were called as one body (church), rule in your hearts--and continue to be thankful!" (Col 3:15).

"May the God of peace be with you all." Romans 15:33.

DOCTOR'S FAITH STRENGTHENED BECAUSE OF CHILDREN'S VISIONS

The first time Dr. Diane M. Komp sat at the bedside of a dying child, she was there from duty and certainly not from any sense of "anticipated joy." But the 7-year-old, afflicted with leukemia, taught her differently.

Before the little girl died, the pediatrician said she "found the energy to sit up and say, 'The angels--they're so beautiful! Mommy, can you see them? Do you hear their singing? I've never heard such beautiful singing."

Komp, a professor of pediatrics at Yale University School of Medicine, has sat at the bedsides of many dying children. She said that she has seen so many of her young pa-

steel tube and liquid nitrogen. You don't have to freeze your body. You can beat death because Someone beat death FOR you. That "Someone" is the Son of God, Jesus Christ.

Jesus died on a cross on Good Friday many years ago and was buried in a cave, or tomb. If the story ended there, 'it would not be an important story for us. A Jewish teacher dying 2,000 years ago means nothing to us.

However, the story about Jesus does not end on Good Friday. Three days later, on Easter Sunday morning, Jesus rose from the grave and became alive again. Jesus lives and never dies! That is an exciting story: a man was dead and becomes alive again!

But what does it mean for us? Jesus made a promise to His followers, "The person that believes in Me will have life again after he dies. And the person that lives in me will never really die." Jesus beat death Himself! And Jesus promises that His followers will also beat death and live forever. Our bodies will become old, weak and die, but we will never really die. If we trust in Jesus Christ as our Saviour, we will continue to live with Jesus forever in heaven.

Christians all over the world will celebrate Easter because of this happy news: we have the cure for death through Jesus Christ. We have no reason to fear getting older. We have no reason for being afraid of death. WE WILL LIVE AGAIN! WE WILL LIVE FOREVER! tients die in peace after having had visions that she no longer is the skeptic whose religious convictions were derailed in medical school. "The impartation of peace is one of the things that was convincing to me" in reaffirming her Christian faith, she said. She has found among the children reliable witnesses to Jesus' admonition "to look to the children to find the secrets of the kingdom of God."

Her favorite story is of a dying boy at Yale-New Haven Hospital whose parents had given strict orders not to have death or religious faith discussed. "There were two women who were volunteers for a hospice type of activity to support the family, but they had been forbidden to touch on any of these topics which were off limits from the family's point of view.

"And that child, who had leukemia, had a dream.... A school bus pulled up to his house and in his dream Jesus was on the school bus and invited the child onto the bus. Jesus told him of his coming death and in the telling gave him great peace, which is one of the common threads in all of these stories. --L.A. Times News

Operation Desert Storm SENDING "CARE PACKAGES"

In a nutshell, don't ship just anything to U.S. Servicemen serving in the Persian Gulf area during the current conflict. There are strict guidelines enforced by Saudi Arabia's customs office.

DIVORCE IN THE NINETIES

Is your family in trouble? We are well aware the current statistics show the divorce rate to be fairly steady or rising some where between 50% and 60% of all the marriages. But the saying "that the family that prays together, stays together" is still very true.

In families that go to church together, only one out of 40 get a divorce.

In families that pray together, only one out of 400 get a divorce.

CHILLING ABORTION FACTS

Since 1973, there have been 25 million abortions in the United States, 1.5 million annually; 4,400 daily and one every 20 seconds. That number is equal to the population of 13 western and mid-western states: CO, KS, UT, NM, OK, WY, NE, IA, MN, SD, ND, ID and MT.

The apparent ease with the way teens can get abortions nowadays was demonstrated when one girl was told by the school nurse that she would need parental consent to receive an aspirin, and she is seen telling a friend that she will 'just have an abortion' with no advance consent from the parents needed.

A recent survey of 1,900 women showed 95% as giving social reasons as the basis for their decision to have an abortion with only 1% citing rape or incest.

WHAT IS A "COLLOQUY?"

From time to time, we are asked what a "colloquy" is. The dictionary defines a colloquy as a "conversation." In the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod it is the way lay people who have graduated from a non-synodical college or university can obtain the theological training necessary for full-time church work, whether it be a pastor, DCE (Director of Christian Education) or teacher. Candidates in the colloquy program are required to pass the religion courses taken by undergraduate students in our synodical colleges. After completion of these courses, comprehensive written and oral exams are given to determine competency and orthodoxy. Upon successful completion of this procedure, the candidate is eligible for placement in the Lutheran Churches.
