## DOES GOD WANT PEOPLE TO GO TO HELL?

First of all, we must be absolutely sure about one thing: there is a heaven and there is a hell. There is also an almighty God who



has the right to decide who goes where. We also know that it is not possible for God to make a mistake about any thing, it being Who He is.

To answer our question, the Bible, which is the inerrant Word of God, makes it very clear that it is not His will that any of His people should be lost in hell. Rather, because of the sacrifice His Son on the cross, His will is that none should perish, but that

all should come to repentance. Because sin cost God the dearest and best thing He had, His beloved Son, the death of Christ shows us that God is very sincere that none be lost. As people of God, we should not play haphazardly with such a precious gift as eternal life. There are people who feel that as long as salvation is assured, it does not matter what they do. God's Word warns such people, "He that believeth not shall be damned." We are to live as a priesthood of believers, carefully living according to His law, remembering that our salvation depends on God's grace in giving us faith to accept His Son as our Saviour.

As we again approach Reformation Day, the question might be asked: "Is the Bible reliable as a guide?" Most people would probably answer yes, although not all will readily admit to leaning on the Good Book for advice in daily living. Many of the Christians of today feel that the Bible was written in a different time and a different age and many of its precepts are not relevant today. As evidence of this way of thinking, we need only look at the proliferation of gambling; decline in morality; the killing of the unborn to name a few.

When Dr. Martin Luther posted his 95 Theses

### **DOES LCMS WORLD RELIEF REALLY HELP?**

If you are one of the many who have shared your bounty with those in need in Somalia, you must have wondered if your gift really did any good after hearing reports of theft of aid shipped to those in that drought ravaged country. So did the editor. The following are excerpts from a reply to that very question from Mr. Al H. Senske, director of LCMS World Relief in St. Louis.

"Your questions regarding the sending of food into Somalia are very important and ones which we ask of ourselves and our partners in this activity. Fortunately this procedure has been monitored quite closely. The reports we have received indicate that approximately 98% of the materials we have helped send into the country have gotten to the persons in need.

There are a number of reasons for this. First of all, we did not utilize convoys of trucks but airlifted all items into several locations. Each plane load was restricted to the amount of materials that could be loaded onto one large truck at the airport. on the truck without utilizing a warehouse or turning it over to others. The truck, with its paid guards, drove di-

rectly to the feeding stations where the raw materials were cooked by hired and volunteer staff for the hungry. Security personnel were hired to organize the people so they would only get into line twice a day, so that children got to eat first, to keep out unwanted individuals, etc. Different types of food were prepared for the variety of health conditions present. For example, the worst of the children were often fed a biscuit rich in sugar for quicker energy and restoration of strenght. Later they were placed on a porridge-type drink that was a little more difficult to digest. Most adults received a soup-like materials made from sorghum, rice and beans. Nutrents were usually added.

At no time did we give sacks of grain to a family to carry off to their home. That was a sure way to invite robberies and even death. Water and fuel has been a big problem. In some places water had to be rationed to less than half a pint per day per person. As the rains came the dead were washed up from their shallow graves causing more pollution of the water and bringing more disease.

We pray that the military personnel now in Somalia will be able to restore a more lasting peace. But it will be difficult.

What happened? Why did all these people, some of them children, have to die in such a terrible, preventable way?

There are lots of different views about what happened and who is to blame for this, and I can see that there are good arguments for all the different views. However, the biggest problem that I see, is that one man decided to interpret the Bible in his own way, and by doing that, led his followers to death.

I can't find any place in the Bible that tells us to get guns and fight against the government. When Jesus was arrested, one of His followers took a sword and cut off the ear of the high priest's slave. Jesus told him to put away the sword and "all who live by the sword, die by the sword."

Be careful of false prophets. They are out there and they are willing to lead you to hell with them. They will take God's Word and teach it any way they want. That is why it is important for you to study God's Word. His Word is your sword. You can defend yourself against Satan and the false prophets if you use God's Word.

After ordering the Snyders to remove the communion vessels from the altar and telling Gerald Ahrens to extinguish the candles, and Pastor George to follow him last as everyone filed out of the chapel.

The carefully orchestrated "protest" was



in joyful remembrance of the 25th anniversary of Pastor George's ordination with a worship service at Calvary Lutheran Church. The same text used 25 years earlier from Isaiah 52:7, "How beautiful are the feet of him who brings good news" was the theme for the day's worship led Rev. Larry Schmidt, pastor of Cal-vary. The service was followed by a reception in the Fellowship Hall. Congratulation, Pastor George!
