Easter, 1995 THE CERTAINTY OF CHRIST'S RESURRECTION

They still did not understand the Scripture which said He must rise from death. (John 20:9). One scholar who is quoted cites the reality of this verse with the words, "Of all-the tombs in the world, one is empty." And this truth is clearly shown to us as we go with Peter and John to that tomb on the first Easter morn so long ago.

THE EVIDENCE OF THE EMPTY TOMB Early on Easter Sunday, Mary Magdalene, accompanied by some other women, came to the



women, came to the tomb. When she saw the stone rolled away, she left the others and ran to tell disciples. Peter and John immediately set out for the tomb. By the time they arrived, the other women had left and there was no one there. Peter went inside

and saw two very important facts besides the fact that the body of Jesus was not there.

He saw the linen clothes lying where the body of Jesus had been. If Jesus' body had been stolen as was claimed, then the clothes would have been taken, too. But there they were, as though still wrapped around Jesus' body. But Jesus was gone. Thus the only explanation was that Jesus has slipped out of those clothes when He arose.

Again, Peter saw the linen napkin for Jesus' head lying in a place by itself. This

would indicate that Jesus had removed it from His head after He arose. Again, if His body had been stolen, this napkin would have gone with it. When John saw the empty tomb and the linen clothes and the napkin, it convinced him that Jesus was alive and he believed. However, this is not the only evidence we have.

THE TESTIMONY OF SCRIPTURE

Throughout Scripture, we find evidence that we could enter eternal life in body and soul. Already in Genesis, we are told that Enoch "disappeared because God took him away." Thus, he did not die, but God received him into heaven bodily. The same thing happened to Elijah who "was taken up to heaven by a whirlwind." Thus we have these two examples of people who did not die but were taken directly to heaven.

In the midst of his trials, Job speaks of his faith in the resurrection when he says, "I know that my Redeemer lives and though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh will I see God." He was certain about the resurrection of the body. when the Sadducees came to Jesus, disputing the fact of the resurrection, Jesus reminded them that "God is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob." God is not the God of the dead, but of the living." Each of the Gospels tell us the story of Jesus' resurrection and the empty tomb and the many witnesses who Him.

And Paul speaks of Jesus' resurrection saying, "For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance; that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, and that He appeared to Peter, and then to the Page 2

All religions speak about some kind of life after death but christianity says and we confess that even though our body dies, it will be raised from the dead and we who trust in Christ will live with Him forever in His new heaven and new earth.

REV. LAVEN M. MASS DIES

Rev. LaVern Mass departed this life on Saturday morning, Dec. 17, 1994 at his home in Laurel, Md.

He was united in marriage to Joan G. Fonder of Sisseton, S.D., on Jan. 31, 1954.

Survivors besides his wife of 40 years are three children, Alfred, Lou Ann and Bobby; a sister, Janet and four grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a son, Lon.
