THE POWER OF PENTECOST

We all know what happens when the electricity is shut off. In office buildings the computers and other machines suddenly stop, and workers become idle, except those whose duty is maintenance and fixing things. Outside, traffic signals stop working, hospitals must rely on auxiliary power, especially during



surgery, and homes become dark. there is no TV, VCR, and furnaces, refrigerators and freezers quit. A total blackout is possible.

The Church of God runs on spiritual power, the power of the Holy Spirit who lives in every member of the Christian Church and works through them. On the day that Jesus

ascended to heaven, He promised His followers, "You shall receive **power** after the Holy Ghost is come upon you." On the day of PENTE-COST, 10 days later, "they were all filled with the Holy Ghost." Read the entire second chapter of the Book of Acts in your Bible to see the result of this power of the Holy Spirit in the daily lives and activities of the Christians during 100 A.D.

This year we celebrate Pentecost, which means "fifty days after Easter" on June 4 You and I as members of Christ's church need the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives, too. Only when the Holy Spirit dwells in us are we true members of Christ's church, and our daily work and activities are pleasing to God and worthwhile.

Pentecost is truly an important day in the church year. The reason Pentecost never made it big in the secular world like Christmas and Easter is that it appears to hit the calendar at the wrong time. It never has a chance to create much interest or excitement because it comes when the people are busy with their lawns and gardens or when they are having outdoor pleasures such as hiking in the mountains, fishing, boating, swimming,

Luther's words show that deaf people came for the Lord's Supper. Some pastors did not think that the deaf should come, so they gave them unblessed bread. This meant that the deaf did not receive the Lord's Supper. Luther was upset about this.

Luther believed that deaf people can be Christians, too. The Holy Spirit work faith in their hearts and makes them children of God. They should be able to receive the same blessings as every other Christian. This includes the Lord's Supper.

These words from Luther show that the Lord's Supper (and worship) are important for the deaf Christians. In the Lord's Supper we receive forgiveness of sins. And with forgiveness we receive life and strength for our faith. It doesn't matter how well our ears work.

The sad things is that many deaf Christians don't think that the Lord's Supper is important. They are members of a church, but almost never come to worship services. They stay away from the Lord's Supper and let their faith die. Dr. Luther's words encourage us all--deaf and hearing--to be active in our coming for worship and the Lord's Supper.

the Macau government will not be reducing its subsidy to the school, which amounts to about 60% of its budget. The remaining 40% comes from the faithful who share their love with the school.

Despite free publicity from radio and television and newspaper accounts, not much has resulted in increasing enrollment at Concordia School. Only an estimated 10% of the children in Macau with impaired hearing have been identified. One of the struggles with this ministry is with parents who hide their handicapped children, believing efforts to educate them are a waste of time and effort.

In order to devote more time to professional training for staff and mission outreach, Dr. Jasper has tendered his resignation as director of Concordia School, to become effective when a replacement is recruited. A new business manager has been found for Hong Kong and Macau, which will further reduce his work load, perhaps in May.

LUCK? THERE IS NO SUCH THING

From the Holy Bible, please read the verses in GALATIANS 6:7-8.

You cannot fool God, so don't make a fool of yourself! You will harvest what you plant. If you follow your selfish desires, you will harvest destruction, but if you follow the Spirit, you will harvest eternal life."

So many of God's natural laws govern our lives. Washington State is famous for its apples. Suppose someone decides to plant apple trees to grow apples, sell them and make a profit. Doing this will take some work to prepare the soil, to cultivate, to water, to spray against the apple maggot and to protect the crop from birds. Finally, he needs a market to sell the apples.

When it is all done, he counts his profit. Wow! He made a lot of money! Suppose, then, his friends say, "You were just lucky." Lucky? Luck has nothing to do with it. God's

ASK THE PASTOR

Q: I do not feel comfortable talking to Mormons or Jehovah's Witnesses who come knocking on my door. What should I do?

A: Mormons and Jehovah Witnesses are non-Christian cults. They claim to be Christian, but don't believe that Jesus is true God and our Saviour from sin. Their religions lead to damnation.

Obviously, we don't want to listen to their false teachings, but we also understand they are lost sinners needing the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. A good way to prepare for speaking with cult members is to read books that teach how to witness to them. one excellent series is "How to Respond to" produced by Concordia Publishing House. In them you will learn more about the cults and how to share your faith with them.

The Second National Deaf Senior Citizens Conference at the Hyatt Regency Greater Columbus (Ohio) Convention Center drew 1,531 attendees. With 40 workshops and 45 exhibitors there was at least something for everyone who came. The next conference will be in Phoenix, Ariz. in 1997. natural law was working. You harvest what you plant, you reap what you sow.

Someone did a study on family trees to see how this natural law works. Here is one example:

Jonathan Edwards lived in New York in the early 1700's. He loved the Lord and made sure that his children were in church every Sunday. He served the Lord to the best of his ability.

Over the next 200+ years, Edwards had 929 descendants. Of these, 430 were ministers; 86 became university professors; 13 became university presidents; 75 were authors of good books; five were elected to the United States Congress and two to the Senate. One was Vice President of the USA. His family never cost the state one cent, but has contributed immeasurably to the life of plenty in this land today. Were they just lucky? Luck has nothing to do with it. It's God's natural law that He set in motion. We teach our children by example, and they are sharp to watch and quick to copy.

We will reap what we sow for years and years, and it will touch the children not yet born to your grandchildren.

Here is another example from the study: Max Jukes also lived in New York about the same time as Edwards. He did not believe in Christ or in Christian training. He refused to take his children to church, even when they wanted to go. He had 1,026 descendants in those 200+ years: 300 were sent to prison for an average term of 13 years; 190 were public prostitutes; 680 were admitted alcohclics. His family, at the same time of the study, cost the state more than \$420,000. These people did nothing good for their community.

Suppose a man is lazy and does not want to work, then he will not have a comfortable life. Do we name him "unlucky?" No, he sowed laziness and reaped no money. God's law works for everyone.
