The only reason we don't pray more often and more publicly is perhaps because we feel that to pray has no power, and that it is wrong. Notice in our story that angels came to close the mouths of the lions that they cannot harm Daniel. That is powerful! Daniel's prayers are heard by God, and God sends angels to help Daniel. Those are the facts. Prayer can be powerful. The other day I was on the phone with my friend, Bob Bauer, and when he heard about my physical problems that I had recently, Bob immediately asked me to fold my hands and bow my head and we prayed over the phone line. No one ever did that with me before, and I wondered why I never thought to do that over the TTY with people that I call. Bob's prayer had power to change me, and maybe my prayer will have power to help change someone else.

The GLORIA IN EXCELSIS in our Liturgy By George Ring

Divine Service I (p. 138) - "Glory be to God on high and on earth peace good-will toward men." This is a quote of Luke 2:14. It is a song or saying of a multitude of the heavenly hosts praising God and announcing peace toward men.

Divine Service II (p. 160 & 180) - "Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth."
In this service a substitution is made in the Gloria in Excelsis. "His people" replaces "men" which means all people. These words (his people) are perhaps taken from Matthew 1:21 - "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS: for He shall save his people from their sins." Here "his people" means the Jewish nation. Christ came to save the Jews. The words of Simeon clarify this. Luke 2:31-"Mine eyes have seen thy salvation, which thou hast prepared before the face of all people, a light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel." Notice how Simeon makes it clear that salvation is for all, that it is for both Jews and Gentiles.

PEACE to all people. PEACE to His people. PEACE to the Gentiles. PEACE to the Jews. All are correct statements, but to use them interchangeably in the Gloria in Excelsis does not seem right.

At one time in history a multitude of angels announced "peace on earth good-will toward men. To substitute what one angel said to one man in a dream for the words of many angels announcing peace to the world is hardly fair. The same is true of the words of Zacharias in Luke 1:68 - "Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed <u>his people</u>." Is it fair to use the words of Zacharias in the Gloria in Excelsis? His words are not the words of the angels.

Many translations of Luke 2:14 speak of a peace among people. But the peace which God announced through His angels was not a horizontal peace. It was a perpendicular peace; a peace between heaven and earth, between God and all men. Ephesians 2:14 - "Christ is our peace, who has made both one." Luke 2:10 - "Fear not, for behold I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." The GOOD NEWS is from heaven.

We rejoice that many of our hymns use the words of the Gloria in Excelsis:

Hymn 36 - Let Creation praise its Lord - verse 3

- 37 From heaven above to earth I come to bring good news to everyone
- 38 Welcome to earth, O noble Guest, through whom this sinful world is blest
- 49 Hark the herald angels sing, Glory to the new born King

Peace on earth and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled.

- 51 (Refrain) To God on high be glory, And peace on earth to men.
- 53 Joy to the world, the Lord is come.
- 55 Angels we have heard on high. Refrain Gloria in excelsis Deo.
- 59 O Little Town of Bethlehem (v. 2) And peace to all the earth.
- 70 While Shepherds Watched their Flocks (See v. 1 and v. 3)
- 215 All glory Be To God On High And offers peace good-will to all.

I have asked several people what "his people" in Divine Service II means. The answers that I get are: It means the believers. It means the Church. It means those who have faith. Does "his people" have the same meaning as "all people"? Is peace only for some people and not for others? Is his peace only for believers and not for unbelievers?

Peace and good-will from God are for me. They are also for you. How do we know? The Gloria in Excelsis tells us so.

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Dr. Luther Says . . . HOLY COMMUNION IS THE BREAD OF LIFE

"Now let us here notice that the Lord approaches us so lovingly and aciously, and offers us Himself--His blood and flesh--in such gentle words that it should in all reason move the heart to believe that this bread, His flesh and blood, born of the Virgin Mary, was given because He had to pay the penalty of death and suffer in our stead the torments of hell, and, besides, to suffer the guilt of sins He never committed, as if they were His own.

This He did willingly and received us as brethren and sisters. If we believe this we do the will of the heavenly Father, which is nothing else than the we believe on the Son. . . . It is now evident that whoever has faith in this bread of heaven--in Christ, in this flesh and blood, of which He here speaks that it is given to him and that it is His--he also accepts it as his own, and has already done the will of God and eaten of this heaverly manna. . .

The whole New Testament treats of this spiritual supper, and especially as does John. The Sacrament of the Altar is a testament and confirmation of this true supper, with which we should strengthen our faith and be assured that this body and blood, which we receive in the Sacrament, has rescued us from sin and death, the devil, hell and all misery."

THE CHRISTMAS CANDYCANE

A candymaker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would be a witness, so he made the Christmas candy cane. He incorported several symbols for the birth, ministry and death of Jesus Christ.

He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy. White to symbolize the virgin birth and sinless nature of Jesus; and hard to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the church, and the firmness of the promises of God.

the candymaker made the candy in the form of a "J" to represent the precious Name of Jesus, who came to earth as our Saviour. It could also represent the staff of the "Good Shepherd" with which He reaches down into the ditches of the world to lift out the fallen lambs, who like all sheep, has gone astray.

Thinking the candy was somewhat plain, the candymaker stained it with red stripes. He used three small stripes to show the stripes of the scourging Jesus received by which we are healed. The large red stripe was for the blood shed by Christ on the cross so that we could have the promise of eternal life.

Unfortunately, the candy cane became known as a candy cane--a meaningless decoration seen at Christmas time. But the meaning is still there for those who "have eyes to see and ears to hear" and we pray that this symbol will again be used to witness TO THE WON-DER OF JESUS AND HIS GREAT LOVE that came down at Christmas and remains the ultimate and dominate force in the world today.

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
