The Candle Burns . . . 1996: A NEW YEAR OF OPPORTUNITY

Another Christmas has come and gone. We have before us another year and a new year is always a good time to look and think about what Christmas meant to us. For the followers



of Christ, whose first coming we have just celebrated, two very important events come to mind: His lowly and humble birth in a stable at Bethlehem; and secondly, when He shall return again in great glory as Lord and Judge.

The story is told about an event that happened many centuries ago in England. A revolt in the north part of the country forced the king to lead his army into battle, ultimately defeating the rebels. Following his victory, he issued a proclamation which read in part: "An amnesty will be granted and all rebels who were defeated in battle will be forgiven and their lives spared, only if they take an oath of loyalty to the king . . . while this candle is burning."

We know that the life of a candle is not very long. And neither are our lives, which are just a whisp of time in the clock of eternity. In the story, we have an offer from the king to "forgive and forget" everyone who would pledge loyalty to him. We, too, have a standing offer from our Saviour, which we find in II Corinthians 6:2, "Behold, now is the accepted time, now is the day of salvation." Yes, we can have that same forgiveness and a promise of eternal life with our God, if we will give our loyalty and trust to Him and accept in our hearts God's solution to the problem of sin.

In the third chapter of the Book of Eccle-

siastes, we read that there is a time to every purpose under heaven. There is a time to act, and a time when opportunity is no more. This is true of health, of wealth, of love, education and knowledge . . . and also of the pursuit of happiness. In life, every opportunity has its "candle." For each of us, the candle burns. What do you do with the opportunity?

As we go through life, we come upon many and varied opportunities. What is the greatest opportunity offered to us? Without question, it is the one that God offers to us. It was made possible by God sending His Son, Jesus, whose miraculous coming we just celebrated.

This offer is further clarified in the Book of Galatians 4:4-7, where we read the follow-

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HEAVEN:

THE DWELLING PLACE OF THE MOST HIGH

Recently, a small child was seen looking skyward, admiring the stars and the many wonders of the night time skies. He then spoke th his father, saying what many of us must have thought ourselves at one time or another, "If it is so beautiful on this side of heaven, what must it be like on the other side?" This innocent observation of a small child has captured the imaginations of Christians down thru the ages, that we feel compelled to look up a bit about the subject of heaven as revealed to us in the Bible.

WHERE IS HEAVEN?

First of all, it is good to notice that God speaks of three heavens: (1) the **atmo**-

After more than 40 years of faithful service in the Holy Ministry, most of which has been served in congregations with the deaf in Cleveland, Ohio, Pittsburgh, Pa. and in the Missouri area some people must be wondering whatever became of the popular and well known pastor. Following his departure from the office of Executive Secretary of the Board for Mission Services to the Deaf of the Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod in 1978, he accepted a call to two small hearing churches in Nevada and El Dorado Springs, Mo. where he resides today in quiet semi-retirement.

Pastor Rohe was visited early in October by Mr. Elmer Francisco, a former ILDA President and presently Business Manager of THE DEAF LUTHERAN and presented with an engraved

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ing: "But when the fulness of time was come, God sent forth His Son, made of a woman, made under the law, to redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons. And because ye are sons, God hath sent forth the spirit into your hearts, crying 'Abba' (dear) Father. Therefore, we are no longer servants or slaves, but a child. And being children, God has made us heirs, through Christ."

Why did Jesus come at Christmas time? Because sin separates us from God . . . and sins imprisons us from which we had no hope of ever getting out. Someone else would have to free us, and Jesus made this possible by taking upon himself our guilt and paid our debt which we had no hope of ever paying.

The Book of Galatians tells us even more: Not only has Christ freed us from the debt of sin but He has enabled us to become the adopted children of God and we become part of His family through faith, which He also gives to us. We can address God as "Dear Father" and look forward to an eternity with Him in heaven.

Now we must get back to that candle. It is still burning, and the opportunity for forgiveness and eternal life is still there. But it will not always be. "Seek the Lord while He may be found, call upon Him while He is near." Isaiah 55:6.

"Grace be unto thee and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

spheric heavens where the clouds float and the birds fly, as we have in Genesis 8:2 "the rain from heaven was restrained," and (2) The celestial heavens, where the planets spin in their divine orbits, mentioned in Joel 2:10. "The heavens shall tremble: the sun and the moon shall be dark; and (3) Finally, the third heaven, the dwelling place of God and His throne (Deut. 26:15; Matthew 5:34.

God's dwelling place is far above all heavens. The apostle Paul was "caught up to the third heaven", where the Lord dwells (II Cor. 12:2) and the Lord Jesus, after rising from the dead, ascended up far above all heavens" (Eph. 4:10) "When He had Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high." He has "passed through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God" (Hebrews 1:3, 4:14 R.V) Thus we see that God's heaven is far above, not only the clouds, but the whole universe.

WHO DWELLS IN HEAVENS?

By reading you have noticed that the Lord Jesus is in Heaven. Holy angels are there also (see Mark 12:25). But people are there, too--those who trusted Christ in their lifetime. The apostle Paul said he had a "desire to depart, and to be with Christ, which is far better" (Philippians 1:23). He was "willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord" (see II Corinthians 5:8) How could anybody be so sure? They answer is simple! God says in John 3:15, "That whosoever believeth in Him (the Lord Jesus) should not perish, but have eternal life."

All those who have trusted the Lord Jesus as their own Saviour, have the following promise directly from the Lord Himself, "In My Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto Myself; that where I am, there ye may be also (John 14:2,3).

WHAT IS HEAVEN LIKE?

Heaven is a place of endless day: no pain; no sorrow or tears--a place where eternal life will be enjoyed in its fullness! There is no parting and no dying there. Full of bliss and joy the redeemed of the Lord will gather around their Redeemer, the Lord Jesus Christ, to sing His praises forever and forever. They will joy in the fact that the Lord Jesus died for their sins on the cross (I Cor. 15:3); that He loved them, and washed them from their sins in His own blood (Revelation 1:5). The absolute guarantee of being in heaven forever can be yours today! Forget what "religion" says and believe God! "Verily, verily, I (the Lord Jesus) say unto you, that he that hears my Word, and believes Him (God the Father) that has send Me, has eternal life, and does not come into judgment, but is passed from death into life." There are many beautiful psalms in the Bible but have you recently read Psalm 65? It says, "Praise is waiting for YOU, O God, in Zion." If you could have one wish for the year of 1996, what is the most important thing that you would want to see happen? Let me share with you my dream or vision. I would really like to see every seat in our deaf church here in Los Angeles filled with people raising their hands in praise to Jesus the Saviour.

God's people began a long time ago in the Old Testament worshipping and praising God by piling up stones and making an altar on which they offered their burnt offerings to God. Later God showed Moses how to build the Tabernacle (Tent Church) that the Jewish people carried around from place to place, then set it up and worshipped God.

Next God gave specific directions to King Solomon on the way to build the temple. All of these places for worship are God's gifts to us for us to go and hear HIS words of love and forgiveness, and for us to go and offer our prayers and praises to HIM. We are truly a most blessed people. We have more opportunities for deaf people here in the United States than any other country in the world. We have more deaf churches and pastors than any other place on this beautiful earth. There is no reason that our deaf churches should have empty seats.

Become a friend to someone and show them the love of Jesus shining in your life, and then you can more easily lead that wandering sheep to that special seat next top you on Sunday morning. And all God's people said, "Amen! Praise the Lord! Amen!"

LUTHER'S BIBLE FOUND

A researcher, who was cataloging a huge collection of Bibles in the Baden-Wuerttemberg State Library in Germany has found what appears to be Dr. Martin Luther's personal Bible. Hand written notes found in it and compared with known samples of Luther's handwriting appear to lend authenticity to the find. The Bible, the ancient Latin version known as the Vulgate, had unnoticed for over two centuries.

The Bible was printed in 1519, two years after Luther posted the historic 95 theses that brought him into irreversible conflict with the Roman Catholic Church. From the Bible's date, it was likely that Dr. Luther used it in 1521-22 when he translated the New Testament into German.
